A BYLAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXCAVATION AND GRADING OF A PIECE OF LAND OWNED BY THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT, SITUATE ON FULTON STREET, AND TO AUTHORIZE THE INCURRING OF A DEBT OF THE AMOUNT OF \$12,000 TO PAY FOR THE SAME AND INTEREST BY ISSUING DEBENTURES THEREFOR.

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to excavate and grade a piece of land belonging to the City of Prince Rupert described as follows: Commencing at a point on the easterly property line of Fulton Street, distant ninety-two (92) feet more or less south of the southwesterly corner of Lot 10, Block 34, Section One, thence along a line bearing astronomical north forty-three degrees and forty-seven minutes east (N. 43 degrees 47 minutes E.), 85.04 feet more or less, thence astronomical south 1 degree 20 minutes 26 seconds E., 135.22 feet more or less, thence astronomical south 88 degrees 30 minutes 34 seconds west, 60 feet more or less, thence astronomical north 1 degree 20 minutes 26 seconds west, 75 feet more or less to the point of commencement, and containing 709.87 square yards be the same more or less, being a portion of Parcel 22 as set out in an agreement between the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company, Limited, and His Majesty the King in his right of his Province of British Columbia.

New York, April 8—Eugene Smith, a Tammany political leader, was shot and killed on Park Row early today by four gangsters, who were seen only by one witness, and escaped.

A brother of the murdered man said that Smith had been mistaken for someone else, but the police were told that Smith had recently become involved in a gang feud and had moved to Brooklyn because of threats against his life.

He saw reason for this in the instance of those who do not desire Canadian youths to man ships, and who take contribution as the less of two evils. BERLIN STADIUM TO BE OPENED IN JUNE

Stand for Olympic Games Three Years Hence to Cost Half a Million.

The opening of the German Stadium, where the 1916 Olympic games will be held, will take place next June. When the stadium is completed it will have been erected at a cost of about \$500,000.

The stadium is situated in the dip in the middle of the race course at Grunewald, near Berlin. The opening of it in June will mark the beginning of a strenuous period of preparations for the 1916 games.

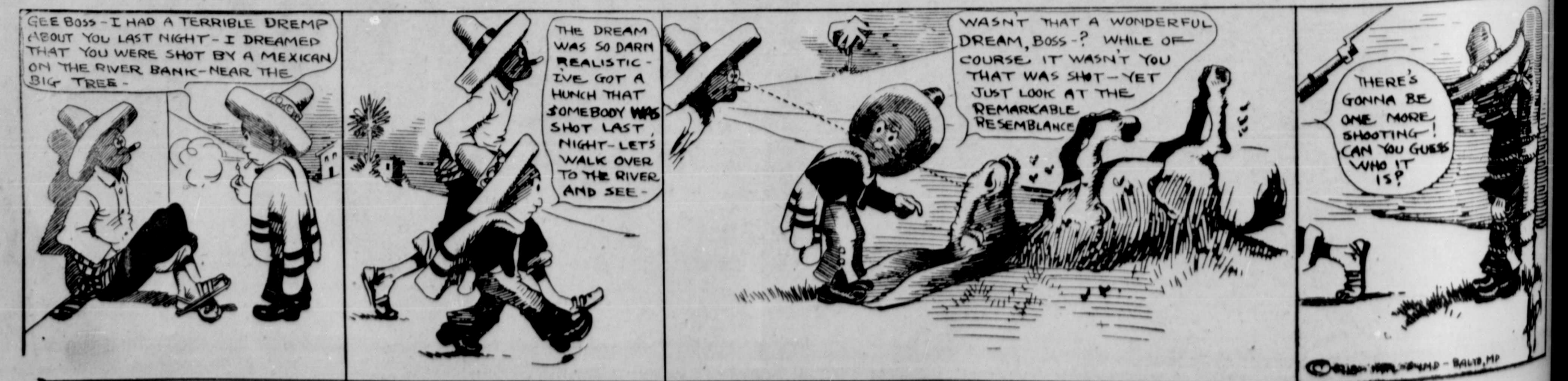
