I would like to say that so far as I can judge the temper of parliamentarians generally they regard the freedom of debate as one of the dearest rights of the representatives of the people; and if any attempt is made under the guise of amending the rules to prevent the freest discussion of all public questions, I can only say that, in my judgment, the government will invite a good deal of trouble." In a period of 22 months they shipped 5.915 tons of a gross value of \$63,664.50, and a net value of \$58,822.81.

There are 47 full claims and six fractions in the group, making it one of the largest in surface extent in British Columbia. It is equipped with docks, ore bunkers, trams and buildings.
