

To whom is your ultimate loyalty given, to the country called Canada or to what we are pleased to call the British Empire? Assuming for a mocircumstances might some day arise in which the two loyalties would be imcompatible, which would you sacrifice? This is a question put by Canadian Colliers, and in these times of great babble and prattle about patriotism it is worth giving it the consideration we otherwise might not think of. The question is submitted not in order to cast any doubts upon our affection for the Mother Country and for the Empire flag. We do not hold that a man cannot now at once loyal to Canada and loyal to the Empire, which really means to Britain. But it is not altogether impossible. that the day might come when a man might be forced t choose between the two. For ourselves we believe the great mass of Canadians three or four generations hence will be loyal to the Mother Country and to the ties of the Empire only as a secondary consideration. If attachment to the Mother Country or to fellow partner in the Empire threatens. or even seems to threaten, the welfare of Canada, we believe those attachments would be cut without hesitation, be the cost what it might.
