SIFTON MINISTRY'S GOOD MAJORITY IN ALBERTA

BULGARIA TO FIGHT GREECE FOR SALONIKI—PROPERTY OWNERS CONSIDER THE BY-LAWS

LIBERALS HAVE UNDOUBTEDLY WON IN ALBERTA ELECTIONS

WITH REMOTE POLLS TO HEAR FROM, THE LIBERALS ARE CONCEDED THIRTY-TWO SEATS TO EIGHTEEN FOR CONSERVATIVES.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Calgary, April 18 (12:30 a. m.)—From all returns thus far received, with some remote polls to hear from, according to the forecast of the Alberta, the Liberals have elected 34 members and the Conservatives 13, with two seats deferred and ten doubtful. Premier Sifton claims that the next issue will have 40 Liberals and 10 Conservatives, but Conservative Leader Michener considers that this Liberal majority will be greatly reduced on the final returns.

Edmonton, April 18.—Early returns seem to give the Liberals 18, Conservatives 18 and Independent 4. Premier Sifton is elected in Vermilion but defeated McLeod. Hon. Mitchell is elected in Medicine Hat.

BULGARIA TO FIGHT GREECE FOR SALONIKI

Is Taking Military Measures to Oust Greece from Her Conquest from the Turks.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, April 18.—The complications of the Balkan question are being added to by the attitude maintained by Bulgaria in regard to Saloniki, now occupied by Greek troops. Bulgaria's claims are supported by the triple alliance, which is likely to produce a breach of the amity supposed to exist among the great powers. She is taking military measures to support her claims and Greece, meanwhile, is concentrating her army along the railway leading into Saloniki. It is reported that Greece has now an army of 100,000 men there.

DEATH WAS DUE TO ACCIDENTAL CAUSES

No Evidence Produced to Explain How Accident Happened.

The adjourned inquest into the death of Herman Abrahamson, who died at the general hospital on Tuesday morning, was resumed at 10 o'clock this morning before Coroner McMullin. Mr. Besner, proprietor of the Knox Hotel, told of being called down stairs and finding the unfortunate man in an unconscious condition early Tuesday morning. He knew nothing of any row in the house in which the man could have been injured. Several acquaintances of deceased also gave evidence. They had seen him on Monday night but did not notice that he was injured. He was a heavy drinker and had been drinking on Monday.

The principal witness was Dr. C. A. Eggert, who performed a postmortem on the body and who was called to attend him before death. The witness described the nature of the wounds he found. There was a lacerated wound on the right side of the face with a cut about an inch long from the side of the nose and another cut at right angles to this extending to the bony socket just above the eye. There was also a contusion on the forehead about two inches in diameter. The wounds were inflicted, he said, not more recently than twelve hours before he saw them and not more remote than three days. The cause of death was due to subdural hemorrhage. The wounds were such as might have been caused by a fall and the person sustaining such injuries might be able to get up and walk around afterward.

After hearing the evidence of several witnesses the jury returned a verdict of death from accidental causes, probably fall.

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PROPERTY OWNERS MEET FOR DISCUSSION OF MONEY BYLAWS

AFTER EXPLANATIONS NO QUESTIONS WERE ASKED, THE MEASURES APPARENTLY BEING WELL UNDERSTOOD BY ALL THOSE PRESENT.

There was a good attendance of property holders at the meeting called by the city council to discuss the money bylaws, which was held in the Empress Theatre last night. There was no discussion, however, and no questions asked. The property owners listened with interest to the explanations of the bylaws by Mayor Pattullo, who presided; the city engineer, Fred Stork on behalf of the drill hall bylaw, and O. H. Nelson for the school bylaw, and seemed entirely satisfied. After this the mayor asked if there were any questions or if any gentleman desired to speak on the subject before the meeting and there being no response the meeting was adjourned.

The mayor opened with a brief statement of what the money was required for and that if the bylaws carried the work could go on. He laid particular stress on the sewer bylaw, which, he explained, would provide permanent trunk sewers that would be an essential part of the whole system to be put in. When these trunk sewers were made the temporary sewers could be connected up with them for the time being, but there was an urgent necessity for a start to be made on the sewer system or the health of the city might suffer.

He pointed out that the \$35,000 asked for the Morse Creek bridge

was the city's portion of the cost of that work. It was estimated the bridge would cost \$100,000 and the remainder had been promised by the provincial government and the railway company. He believed this portion to be paid by the city should come out of the general revenue of the city, but he could not speak for the council on that subject. He then briefly explained the rest of the bylaws and expressed a hope that they would pass, but said that was a matter for the property owners themselves to decide.

City Engineer Mason, at the request of the mayor, then explained the details of the sewer bylaw and was followed by Captain Fred Stork, who made a strong plea for the passage of the drill hall bylaw. He said they had been struggling to obtain this for the city during the last three years, it being known that the government would not erect such a building unless a suitable site was provided by the municipality. He pointed out the great value of such a building for recreation purposes as well as for militia headquarters and concluded with an eulogium of the present council that had set the city in the path of future prosperity.

O. H. Nelson, chairman of the school board, spoke in favor of

SCHEME FOR THE REFORM OF THE PRESENT HOUSE OF LORDS

OUTLINE OF MEASURE NOW BEING CONSIDERED IN SUBCOMMITTEE OF CABINET TO BE BROUGHT IN NEXT YEAR.

London, April 16.—In view of Premier's declaration that he will himself at the earliest opportunity, and certainly within the year of this parliament, propose to replace the present House of Lords, the Daily News and other papers give the outline of a measure which it says is now under consideration by a powerful sub-committee of the cabinet.

According to this, the scheme provides for a house of lords of 200 persons. With trifling exceptions, the News and Leader say, all these persons will be directly selected from constituencies based on the parliamentary register. The choice of candidates will be unrestricted, as it is for the House of Commons, and the size of the constituencies will tend to limit candidatures to persons of acknowledged position.

The person so elected will be styled a lord of parliament, and in order that labor may have full opportunity of securing admissions to the House of Lords, it is at least possible that payment of the elected lords will be proposed. There is a hope in many quarters that the high commissioners of the great dominions may sit in the house.

The powers of the new chamber, according to the Daily News and Leader, will be: Over finance; nil; over ordinary legislation, the right to reject or amend bills in the first session, subject always to joint sittings to decide disputed points. To this extent the Parliament Act will be superseded. In all cases where a government can secure a majority of a joint sitting the two years of delay is reduced by from six to nine months.

NEXT GREAT WORLD'S FAIR TO OPEN TOMORROW WEEK

EXHIBITION WILL SURPASS IN MAGNITUDE AND MAGNIFICENCE THAT OF BRUSSELS HELD IN NINETEEN-TEN

London, April 16.—The Ghent exhibition will open on Saturday, April 20, and the event is being looked forward to with the greatest interest by all the people of the kingdom. And not by them alone, for in several foreign countries steps are being actively taken to co-operate in an enterprise the magnitude of which will come as a surprise to most of those who visit Ghent during the approaching season. The exhibition is to cover much more ground than the Brussels Ex-

hibition of 1910, and is being laid out with an elegance which cannot fail to render it attractive.

Ghent is famous for its gardens and one of the principal features of this exhibition will be the flower shows which are to be held within it. The first of these will be the quinquennial show of the Royal Society of Agriculture and Botany of Ghent. It will be arranged in the principal azalea and rhododendron hall, a vast edifice covering three acres and a half of ground. There is also

DIRECT CABLE FROM THIS CITY TO LONDON

Messages Now Sent Direct from Rupert to England Without Loss of Time Relaying.

Prince Rupert has been brought in closer touch with the heart of the Empire by the establishment of a cable-telegraph line. By the installing of a newly invented telegraph instrument messages need no longer be rewritten at the cable stations, but flash on to their destination. Formerly messages had to be relayed from Vancouver to Montreal, thence to Hazel Hill, Nova Scotia, across the Atlantic to Waterville, England, there to be distributed over the continent. The exact nature of the instrument installed at Hazel Hill is as yet an official secret.

ONE BIG ADVANTAGE PRINCE RUPERT HAS.

Judging from the general feeling prevalent at the public meeting held last night for the consideration of the money bylaws, no misgiving need be entertained but that all will carry by a large vote. It could not well be otherwise. The improvements proposed are works of pressing necessity and furthermore are of a permanent character that would have to be made sooner or later, and therefore the sooner the better. During the past few years interest rates have shown an upward tendency and money is probably as cheap today as it can possibly be in the next decade, with so many great cities growing and new towns opening up and the multitude of enterprises of immense magnitude that are projected. Also the long terms of payment offered to the property owners for their portion of the cost is a noteworthy feature.

The proposed improvements are all of a utilitarian character, and there will be many of this character to be undertaken before the city can take a breathing spell in such work and consider the adornment of the city. When this time comes Prince Rupert will have one distinct advantage over all other cities in having made ample provision for this period in our young history. Before a house was built here plans were made and the whole area of Kaien Island platted by the most distinguished scenic architects of the continent, for a city that in its grades and contours and many beauty spots should vie with any great seaport. An examination of these plans and what they call for makes the property holder's heart beat high with proud anticipation.

Let us turn to Calgary, which is comparatively a young city, and see what is being attempted there to make it "The City Beautiful." They are paying T. H. Mawson, a noted English architect and city planner, a retainer fee of \$10,000 to replan the city. That Prince Rupert will never have to do. Also, Mr. Mawson has advised the city that any comprehensive scheme to replan Calgary along modern and scientific lines, will cost the city several millions of dollars and many years to complete the work. Calgary is preparing a bylaw asking for a million as a start and a tentative beginning at the great work which confronts them.

To carry out any replanning Calgary, the same as so many other cities, will have to spend considerable in tearing down, in the condemnation of property for the purpose, in destroying much of the work in which its early city fathers no doubt felt a justifiable pride. There is Prince Rupert's supreme advantage. There will be no vast sums to be spent for tearing down. Beginning with a clean slate our improvements can be made for all time as those now under construction will be, and ourselves work out without additional expense "The City Beautiful."

MUST BE A SCREW LOOSE SOMEWHERE.

The provincial government is calling for tenders for a lock-up to be built at Terrace. In the government advertisement for tenders it says that plans and specifications can be seen at Terrace, Hazelton and Victoria. Is this a sign that the Prince Rupert contractors are being "disciplined" by the resident member? Why are the plans not to be seen here?

WITTY ANECDOTES OF EARLY COURT OF LATE QUEEN VICTORIA

PIQUANT DOMESTIC SCENES SHOWING THAT THE QUEEN AND PRINCE CONSORT HAD THEIR LITTLE SPATS LIKE COMMON PEOPLE

London, April 16—The married life of Queen Victoria which has been compiled by Mrs. Jerrold, carries a stage further the study of the Queen which she began in the "Early Court of Queen Victoria," and many little anecdotes she tells which have never been published.

She prefaces her work by saying that had the Prince Consort lived long enough, the history of England would have been very different. There would have been, she says, no "great" Queen Victoria, for by 1860 the Queen had so entirely transferred all work to her husband that, excepting as an appearance and a signature, the Queen might almost be said not to have existed and it would have been on that point that an English revolution would have occurred.

Many of the stories of court life told in the book will cause a smile in these latter days. For instance, it is narrated how the Queen ardently desired that Prince Albert should be made the King Consort, which caused Lord Melbourne to respond impetuously: "For God's sake, say no more about it, for those who can make kings can unmake them."

Here is another: Echoes of quarrels between the royal couple got abroad and on one occasion the Queen rushed from the room. Returning after a time she found the door locked and knocked for entry.

"Who is there?" called the prince.

"The Queen of England," was the haughty reply and all remained quiet behind the door. Again Victoria knocked and again came the same question and answer, until at length the conquered Queen responded: "Your wife, Albert." The door was opened and the weeping Queen was comforted.

Another time the disagreement was over the tea table, with "the result that she of the passionate temper flung the contents of a cup into her lord's face."

In 1847 there was a famine in Ireland and the Queen wished to exercise economy in her household. Two kinds of wheat known as "firsts" and "seconds" were

in use, the "firsts" being Essex white and the "seconds" Baltic red. Naturally the residents in the palace were fed on the best flour, which cost twenty-five per cent. more than the other. But now that the time of the stress had arrived, a royal order was issued that no description of flour except "seconds" should be used in her majesty's household and that the daily allowances should be restricted to one pound per head for every person in the palace.

The result was that the price of "seconds" flour rose until it equalled that of the best and the want grew more bitter. The Queen's economic example, says Mrs. Jerrold, was much commented upon at the time.

SEAL INJURE SALMON

Representatives of the Dominion Fisheries Advisory Board and Fishermen Discuss Ravages.

New Westminster, April 12.—The ravages of seal among the salmon of the Fraser River were among the topics discussed at a conference this afternoon between Mr. Cunningham and Mr. McIntyre, the representatives of this province on the Dominion Fisheries advisory board, and some of the fishermen of the Fraser.

It is agreed that the seal, especially during the spring run, do a great deal of injury. Some of the fishermen were in favor of a bounty being paid by the government for the destruction of the seal, but not all.

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A COLONY OR SELF GOVERNING DOMINION

Difference Between Tory and Liberal Views on Canada's Status.

The Ottawa Citizen, a Conservative newspaper, has the following:

Mr. Lapointe of Kamouraska said: "The Churchill policy, if persisted in, will lead to only one thing—the disruption of the Empire from Great Britain."

Mr. Devlin, who followed, was arguing about the status of Canada when Mr. Foster, of King's, interrupted, quoting Mr. Bennett, of Calgary, as saying repeatedly that "Canada is a colony."

"Why certainly it is not a colony," said Mr. Devlin.

"What is it then?" came from the government side.

"Why, since 1867 it has been a self-governing dominion within the Empire. To say it is only a colony is to belittle Canada. Let Winston Churchill do that."

Mr. Bennett, referred to by Mr. Foster, is the great Tory apostle of imperialism. In the House of Commons on February 25th last he said:

"The simple fact remains that we are only a self-governing colony."

And again:

"Let us concede without further argument that we are subject to its legislation and that the parliament that sits at Westminster might well legislate for us."

How many Canadians would make such concession?

EXCURSIONS PLANNED FOR THIS SUMMER TO ARCTIC

Canadian Northern Preparing to Carry Passengers to Land of Midnight Sun.

Winnipeg, April 16.—Excursions into the Arctic, over the same route as that on which V. Stefansson, the Canadian explorer, started his journey to the hinterland, are shortly to be established by the Canadian Northern Railway.

P. Gamsell, chief clerk in the passenger department, is now making schedules and rates, and declares that within a few days the Canadian Northern will have the only railway connections with the Arctic in the world.

After railway travel to Athabasca Landing the route will continue northward via the route of the Mackenzie River. From the Landing passengers will travel direct by water to Fort McMurray, Fort Chippewyan, Fort Smith, Fort Resolution, Fort Providence, Fort Simpson, Fort Wrigley and Fort Norman. At the next point, Fort Good Hope, the passenger is within the Arctic Circle, and from Fort Good Hope will be carried to Fort McPherson, which is well within the Arctic Circle, and at Fort McPherson the midnight sun is to be seen.

AIMED AT ORIENTALS

Measure That All Boards of Trade in Province Will Be Asked to Take Up.

The Board of Trade of Duncan has taken the initiative for the introduction of a measure having for its purpose the prevention of Orientals becoming land holders in the province. It is proposed that representations shall be made to the British Columbia government toward this purpose. The Board of Trade will submit the matter to every board of trade in the province. The boards are invited to join in petitioning the government.

the bylaw for a new school on Borden street and announced that the new school at Seal Cove would be opened on Monday. If sewers were not put in it might be a loss, but not an irreparable loss, but the education of the children was a supreme necessity. The Seal Cove school was one of two rooms only; the one proposed to be on Borden street would give accommodation for the high school until a building specially for that purpose should become necessary. He said Principal Hunter would have fifteen to sixteen students for the high school this year and at present they only had a small room in the city hall, which the city might require at any time.

The mayor was perfectly satisfied that what Mr. Nelson said regarding schools and the necessity of education was true, but he could not agree with him that it was the most important matter before the meeting. He thought the sewer system was the most necessary thing before them, because if a dry summer should happen to occur they could not say what might happen in the way of sickness and contagious infectious diseases. He then invited the property holders to ask questions on any point they did not thoroughly understand, so that they might know what they were voting for, but no one responded and the meeting was adjourned.
