## LARGE GRAIN ELEVATOR SOON TO BE BUILT HERE

### SALE OF OCEAN FALLS PROPERTIES FIXED FOR TODAY—FREIGHT RATES ARE DISCUSSED

#### BOARD OF TRADE DISCUSSES FREIGHT RATES WITH OFFICIALS

DISCRIMINATING STEAMERS ARE TACKLED FIRST AND THEN THE RAILWAY RATES THAT DON'T ENCOURAGE THE SETTLER—VICE PRESIDENT DALRYMPLE REPLIES.

The question of freight rates was taken up by the board of trade and the visiting officials of the railway at a conference held at the Inn Saturday afternoon. The subject was thoroughly discussed. There were present representing the railway Vice President Dalrymple, Assistant Passenger Traffic Manager Bell, General Passenger Agent Hinton, Captain Nicholson and Local Manager McMaster. F. H. Mob. took the chair. The chairman in his introductory remarks pointed out that the freight rates to Prince Rupert were the highest on the coast. He instanced the fact that although the distance from Seattle to Staggway was double that from Vancouver to Prince Rupert the rates were cheaper between those United States ports than they were between the Canadian ports. So much cheaper gasoline carried to the port Ketchikan that local merchants were considering the advisability of buying in Ketchikan. The rates now in force made it very difficult for the settler to get into the country, and the rates of Prince Rupert were desired of seeing the settlement of the district. Captain Nicholson said the

companies operating between the southern ports and Prince Rupert were trying to arrive at a basis of freight rates that would be satisfactory to all. Vice President Dalrymple, in his reply, stated that his company, with the C. P. R., was giving the city a first class steamer service. It had cost them money to do this and some return was expected. The company he was connected with wished to do all they could for this city, but they had been to heavy expenses. He did not think they should compare the Alaska rates with those here. That was something his company had nothing to do with. For his own part he was prepared to do all that could be done, but unfortunately revenues had to be considered as well. The matter of local rates on the railway was then taken up and all the vice president had to say upon this point was that he would take notes of the burdens complained of for further consideration. Until the line was taken up by the traffic department, however, there would be some difficulty in arranging rates to suit all concerned. The thanks of the board were tendered to the officials for the courtesy shown and the conference ended.

#### OPPOSITION LEADER'S REPLY TO GAG GAME OF THE TORIES

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Loudly Applauded as He Told the Conservative Cabinet He Could Plainly Forsee a Bitter Day of Reckoning

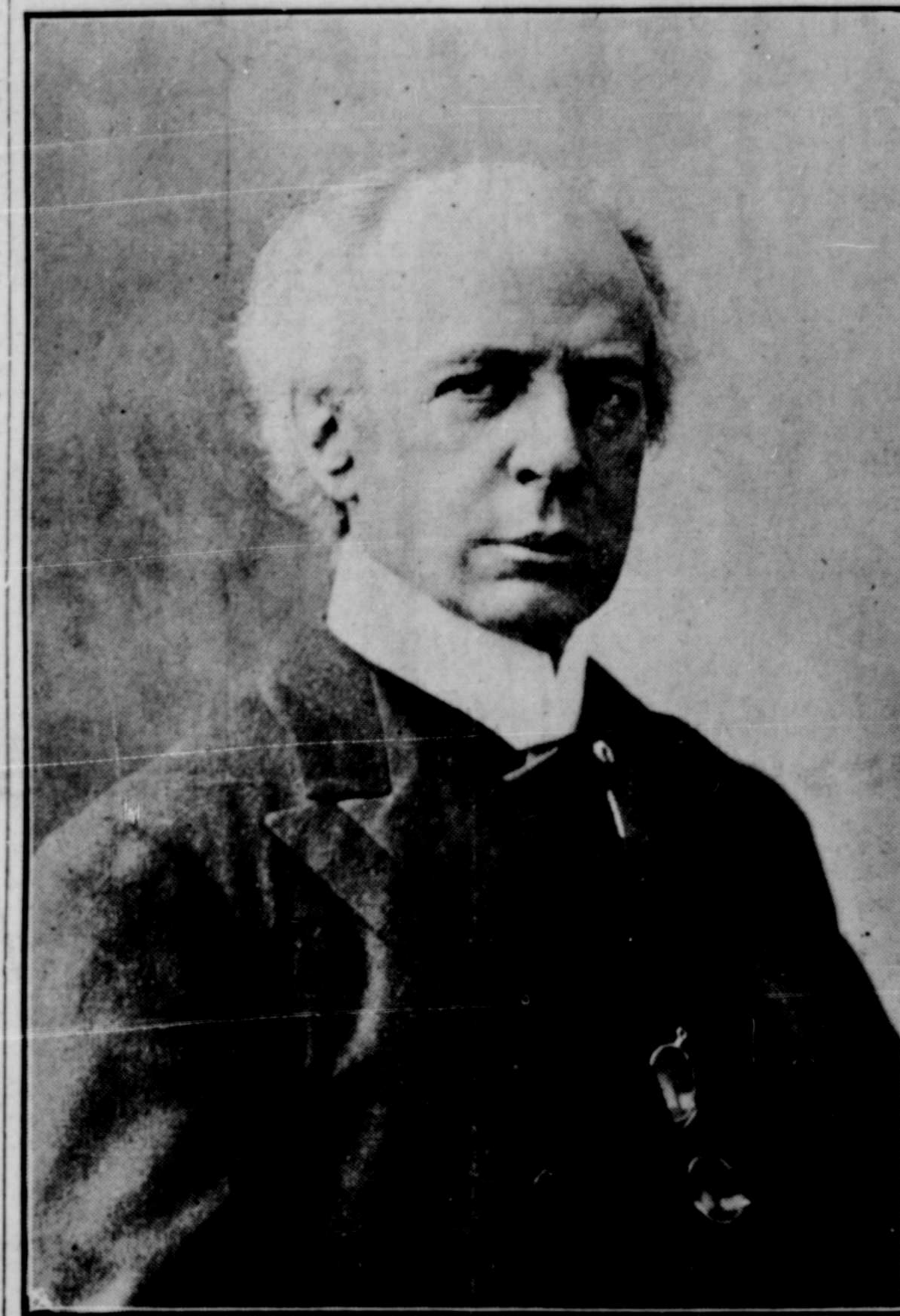
Sir Wilfrid Laurier obtained an opportunity to speak in the House of Commons despite the disorderly scenes and the methods of the government to hurry the closure motion to a finish. The opposition leader was heard after a motion introduced by Dr. Pugsley that the house adjourn at 9 o'clock had been voted down. This gave the Liberal chief the opportunity he sought.

Sir Wilfrid roused his followers to a high pitch of enthusiasm when he declared he would rather stand defeated in opposition than be in office by power of gag rule. The Liberals rose and cheered so persistently that the speaker had to ask them to preserve order in the house.

Sir Wilfrid charged Mr. Borden with unfairness in his treatment of himself and the opposition. He had applied the gag when he should have gone to the people, as the Liberals had done when reciprocity was obstructed. The opposition could be gagged because they were in a minority, but a day of reckoning would come as soon as there was a dissolution.

Sir Wilfrid was given a prolonged cheer by his followers. He said that the spectacle that had been witnessed that afternoon was a very apt commentary on the speech of his honorable friend, the prime minister, who had stated and reiterated that the new rules were not to prevent free speech, but to prevent abuse. The prime minister had been profuse in declaring that the minority could always rely on fair play, but the words were scarcely out of his mouth before the opposition knew how much fair play they were to get.

By the unwritten law of parliament, not to speak of common courtesy, the opposition leader always presents the views of his party after the leader of the government has spoken. He had risen under that impression. He was greatly surprised to see the minister of marine rise also. In the exercise of fair play, he said, the speaker called on him to take

the floor. Then the majority took away his right to speak. "Every man on that side of the house rose to gag me," said Sir Wilfrid. "When I saw the minister of marine rise, I concluded that he had an announcement to make. All he had risen to do was to 'move the resolution.' That is closure in anticipation. Obstruction is a fault," said Sir Wilfrid.

#### GOVERNMENT DISFRANCHISES VOTERS OF GRAHAM ISLAND

LESS THAN FORTY APPLICATION FORMS SUPPLIED FOR FIVE HUNDRED ENTITLED TO CITIZENS' PRIVILEGE.

(From Vancouver Sun.) Masset, April 16.—It is more than probable, if there is a by-election, the Queen Charlotte Islands will offer an independent Conservative candidate in the event that it is found impossible to get their candidate accepted by the Prince Rupert machine.

Magistrate Charles Harrison, one of the best known pioneers of Northern British Columbia, has said he is willing to make the race, either as a straight Conservative, or, if he is not nominated, to run independently, and, in the latter event, he will have the solid backing of the voters of the Queen Charlotte Islands, and much of the Skeena district outside of the northern metropolis where dwells a considerable spoke in the McBride machine. It seems more than likely that William Mansor, present member for the Skeena district, will be given a job in Victoria.

Mr. Harrison came to the islands thirty years ago as a missionary to the Haida Indians, leaving London and Berlin, where he held important church posts, on account of failing health. He is heavily interested in lands here, and in Prince Rupert property. His influence from a political standpoint is extensive, and it is thought that even inde-

pendent of the Conservative association, he can win over any candidate who may be selected.

The action of the government in disfranchising voters will make the Queen Charlotte Islands suffer probably worse than any other district in the province. Just three weeks were given by a notice from Prince Rupert that all the rolls had been obliterated, and new registration were necessary. There was not another boat due for three weeks. And not more than a hundred application blanks could be found in the town, and the government agent at Prince Rupert had sent less than forty over here.

It is estimated there are more than five hundred persons on the north end of Graham Island who are entitled to vote, but most of them live on scattered pre-emption or settlements, so that, had there been even sufficient blanks, there would still be hundreds left off the new voters' lists for the reason that they could not be reached in that short time with the news of the government's action.

#### RAILWAY TO CONSTRUCT LARGE GRAIN ELEVATOR AT THIS POINT

ASSURANCE GIVEN BY VICE PRESIDENT DALRYMPLE AT THE CONFERENCE WITH THE BOARD OF TRADE SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

The board of trade at its meeting on Friday decided to get into communication with the grain commission and invite that body here to look into the question of elevator sites. The subject was again referred to at the meeting of the board with the Grand Trunk Pacific officials held at the Inn on Saturday afternoon, Mr. Williams bringing it to their attention.

J. E. Dalrymple, vice president and traffic manager, said the city need take no further concern regarding the matter as it had already been attended to by the railway. He said the company intended to erect here one of the most modern type of elevator now in use and similar to the one that company now has in operation at Fort William, on the Great Lakes. The elevator could be erected here in nine months' time, but the exact location for it had not yet been fixed. It is to have a capacity of 800,000 bushels, constructed in circular cement cells. The plans will be

so arranged as to admit of enlargement from time to time as the demand increases, and no doubt the ultimate capacity of the one to be erected here would amount to ten million bushels. Therefore, the company would be able to handle all grain shipments here that offered by the time the railway was completed.

#### DELAY OF GOVERNMENT MAY HAVE COST LIFE

Workmen Placed in Perilous Position by Inaction of Officials at Victoria

Vancouver, April 18.—Failure of the Provincial Government to do its duty and issue licenses for the carrying of guns, nearly resulted in a double tragedy on Malifz lake last week, according to a story brought to town by F. G. Earl of Lytton, who is at the Hotel Metropole.

The law provides that no person shall carry a gun without a license, but although workmen in the district have asked for their license, and although there is a notice in the local postoffices to the effect that the law must be observed, applications for licenses have resulted in the reply that there are none to hand, and that the applicant must wait for the documents to come from Victoria.

The trappers cannot do their work without a gun; they are not safe without weapons; yet when they take the necessary steps to get their licenses, the licenses are not forthcoming and they are liable to penalty if they carry guns without such licenses.

**DO SOMETHING FOR THE POOR RAILWAY**

Saturday afternoon was a great occasion for the Board of Trade and representatives of the city council to get something as near to an expression of opinion from Vice-President J. E. Dalrymple, whose special business on the railway company's board is dealing in freights—as may occur for some time. What the Board of Trade is seeking to do, on behalf of the merchants of this city and the settlers along the Skeena and Bulkley Valleys, is to get a freight rate by which these men who are building up the country can live, and not have their nose held to the grindstone by the one transportation company all the time. The vice president's reply, even the kind of one he made, was of deep interest.

When Mr. Mobley pointed out that the merchants were paying the same rate for freight to Prince Rupert as the C. P. R. was charging to Skagway, double the distance of a haul, Mr. Dalrymple said he did not think they should compare the Alaska rates with those here. That his company had nothing to do with. And when Mr. Mobley pointed out that the C. P. R. made a discriminating rate from Vancouver to this point in keeping with the high rates fixed by the G. T. P., Mr. Dalrymple evaded the point and said the two companies were giving a splendid service and had been to heavy expenditure and that it was not unreasonable to expect a profit. That was all the comfort and consolation the worthy vice president had to offer on that subject.

It was only Friday that a local newspaper published the following as the exact words of the vice-president's statement on the subject: "I hope the citizens of Prince Rupert will give the utmost aid to encourage the new settler and exhibit the possibilities of this district to the curious, land-hungry homeseekers of the Pacific coast and elsewhere."

Now why should the citizens of Prince Rupert burn their paws pulling the chesnuts out of the fire for the railway company? The more they did the more profit would be coming to the railway, and how much aid does Mr. Dalrymple promise on behalf of his company in aid of the struggling settler? That's just the point.

Mr. Gordon of Kitsumkalum recently received an account for cattle feed—chop, barley and so forth, in sacks—calling for \$80 f. o. b. Vancouver. With it was a freight bill for \$60. The vice president thinks the citizens of Prince Rupert should "give the utmost aid to the new settler." The citizens are willing, and made an effort to do this on Saturday. According to the vice president and traffic manager of this great transcontinental railway, they failed to take the proper course and his wisdom suggested no other. He did state that as to steamer service the citizens would not like to go back to conditions as they were before the G. T. P. steamers were put on, but he could not say this in regard to the railway as the freight rates are now about as high as by Skeena navigation.

**LUTHER M'CARTY SCORES AN EASY VICTORY OVER JIM FLYNN**

**PUEBLO FIREMAN EVIDENTLY VERY MUCH OUTCLASSED IN THE SIX-ROUND BOUT PULLED OFF AT PHILADELPHIA**

Philadelphia, April 18—Luther McCarty, claimant of the white heavyweight championship, was awarded the popular decision by a wide margin at the end of a fast six-round bout with Jim Flynn of Colorado, at the Olympic Athletic Club here last night. McCarty led throughout the fight and frequently compelled his opponent to clinch to avoid his vicious left jabs.

Although he appeared to be outclassed from the start Flynn fought gamely throughout the entire six rounds. With both gloves protecting his jaw and his body crouched in such a manner as to prevent McCarty from reaching a vital spot, the Pueblo fireman rushed into clinch after clinch and succeeded in landing many blows at close quarters.

McCarty, however, seemed to be in the pink of condition and

was not affected by Flynn's short arm hooks. With straight left jabs he pounded away at his opponent's face as the latter rushed into the clinches. At the end of the first round Flynn's nose was bleeding. In the second round his mouth was cut and at the close of the bout one eye was nearly closed.

After shaking hands in the first round both men rushed to a clinch. After they had been separated by the referee, McCarty jolted Flynn with two rights to the jaw, while the latter sent three short jabs to McCarty's face. Blows were exchanged in rapid succession at close quarters until the bell.

The following rounds were a succession of clinches with McCarty using both right and left with effect on Flynn's body, while the latter kept rushing in an attempt to land a blow which would end the fight.

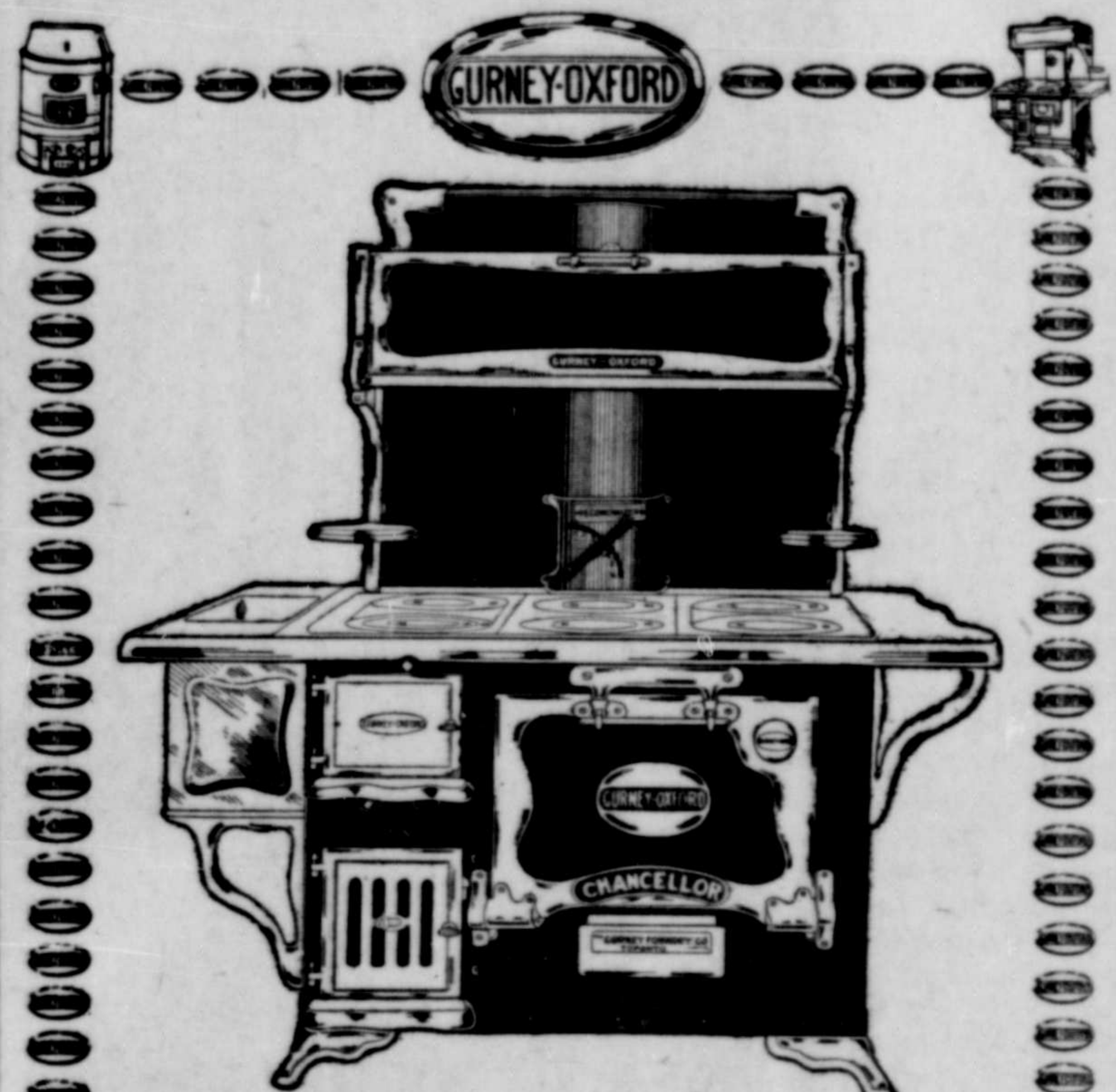

BYLAW NO. 1913-20. A BYLAW OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO PROVIDE FOR THE EXCAVATION AND GRADING OF A PIECE OF LAND SITUATE ON FULTON STREET, AND FOR THE PURPOSE OF PAYING THE AMOUNT OF \$4,000 FOR THE SAME AND INTEREST THEREON...

WHEREAS it is deemed advisable to excavate and grade a piece of land belonging to the City of Prince Rupert described as follows:

Commencing at a point on the southeastern corner of Lot 12, Block 27, Section One, and thence northeast along the southeast boundary of Second Avenue 173.61 feet more or less, thence southeast along the southwest boundary of Lot 12, Block 27, Section One, 100 feet more or less, thence southeast, northeast and again southeast along the southwest, southeast and northwestern boundaries of said Lot 12, Block 27, Section One, 100 feet more or less following the curve of the said Lot 12, Block 27, Section One, 100 feet more or less to the point of commencement, and containing 1.6 acres or less, being the same more or less, being a portion of Parcel 22 as set out in agreement between the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, Limited, and His Majesty the King in his right of his Province of British Columbia.

AND WHEREAS the City Council has been presented to the City Council signed by the owners of the requisite value of property in the City of Prince Rupert asking the City Council to pass this Bylaw.

AND WHEREAS it will be required to raise the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of paying for the said work hereby authorized to be constructed.

AND WHEREAS the City intends to issue debentures to raise the said sum of \$4,000 payable in forty (40) years at the rate of five per centum per annum, and bearing interest at five per centum per annum.

AND WHEREAS it is necessary to raise said sum of \$4,000 and to raise annually the sum of \$144.00 to pay interest thereon, in all the years of the said term, and to pay interest and sinking fund.

AND WHEREAS it is intended to borrow the sum of \$4,000 and to raise annually the sum of \$144.00 to pay interest and sinking fund, and to pay interest and sinking fund.

AND WHEREAS the value of the whole rateable land and improvements and real property of the Municipality according to the latest revised assessment roll, being the roll for the year 1912, is \$21,566,585.

AND WHEREAS the whole debt of the City of Prince Rupert, not including local improvements and school purposes, is \$771,000, which is not 20 per centum of said assessed amount.

AND WHEREAS this Bylaw cannot be altered except by the consent of the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

NOW THEREFORE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

AND WHEREAS it is deemed advisable

at the present time to provide for the construction of a certain part of said sewer system, namely, the construction of the necessary outfalls and trunk sewers, which are hereinafter specifically mentioned.

AND WHEREAS a plan has been prepared by the City Engineer for the City of Prince Rupert showing the part of the sewer system to be constructed at the present time, and which plan has, before the passing of this Bylaw, been signed by His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk, and sealed with the seal of the City, and is hereinafter referred to as the plan.

AND WHEREAS the plan shows the line of the proposed trunk sewers and the situation of the proposed outfalls at present to be undertaken and thereon marked in red.

OPPOSITION LEADERS' REPLY TO CONSERVATIVE METHODS

(Continued from Page 1.)

In 1908 there was obstruction in connection with a bill introduced by the Liberal government dealing with the voters' lists in Manitoba and New Ontario. He was bound to say that the appeal which had been made by the opposition at that time had impressed him and a compromise had been offered and accepted.

"I found no fault; I never whined," declared Sir Wilfrid. "As the head of the government I thought it fair to come down and offer a compromise. Sir, is that not better than closure?" (Cheers.)

The last occasion on which there was obstruction was in 1911, when the reciprocity bill was opposed. It was brought down on January 26, and on July 29 not even a preliminary vote had been taken. The measure was met with dilatory motions of every kind; speech after speech was delivered in the "dog days."

He had not complained or whined on that occasion either. He could have introduced closure as was now proposed, but had adopted another course. He had appealed to the people.

"We were defeated," Sir Wilfrid added, "but as Heaven is my witness, I would rather stand here today defeated than be in office by the power of the gag."

The Liberals, at this declaration, rose in a body and cheered wildly for some minutes.

Sir Wilfrid said that but for the generous action of the minister of marine he had proposed to move an amendment to refer the resolution to a committee to report upon it in accordance with the binding rules. This was in accordance with traditions, but the prime minister knew when he rose to speak that he was going to gag the house and not allow free discussion of his proposal.

Sir Wilfrid said he had intended to move to strike out of the resolution the clause which prevents discussion on two days of the week, when the house is being moved into committee of supply. This had no bearing whatever on the naval bill, to facilitate the passage of which these rules were devised. It was just a plan to deprive the minority of the right to state their grievances before going into committee of supply. It was designed to prevent the asking of searching questions affecting the government of the day. It was applying the gag to parliament with a vengeance. In conclusion Sir Wilfrid said: "Let me repeat to my right honorable friend: as you are fair, so shall you meet with fairness; as you are unjust, so shall you meet with injustice. My right honorable friend two years ago took a certain attitude on the reciprocity bill. He has no right to complain if the same methods that he made use of are applied to him in the present case. My right honorable friend has not forgotten the words of Shakespeare: 'This even-handed justice commends the ingredients of our poisoned chalice to our own lips.'

"The poison has come already to his own lips at the present day. The poison that he offered to us today will come again to his own lips at some future day. We are in the minority; we can be gagged; we can be prevented from expressing our opinions. They can trample upon our body. But, sir, the day of reckoning will come as soon as we have a dissolution of the present parliament." (Prolonged cheers.)

### OCEAN FALLS CO. HAD NO RIGHT TO ISSUE DEBENTURES

(Continued from Page 4.)

The tremendous nature of this contention, if upheld by the courts, consists in the fact that the original board of directors arranged a first issue of debentures to raise a sum of \$2,000,000 and later on arranged a second debenture issue of \$1,500,000. To secure the debenture holders the directors on January 8, 1910, gave a debenture holders' trust deed, covering the entire assets of the company. It is by virtue of this debenture holders' trust deed that Mr. Archer B. Martin, receiver for the debenture holders, has authorized the sale of the company's assets by auction on Monday morning next. These assets include over 80,000 acres of timber leases, the townsite at Ocean Falls with hotel, buildings, lumber mill, pulp mill, water power, a retail lumber yard at Prince Rupert, and three vessels engaged in the company's work.

By his recent purchase of the Nelson line the English knight has secured the control of a fleet of mail merchant steamers far greater than that owned by any company in the world. Hundreds of vessels, thousands of employees and millions of dollars invested in steamers are at his disposal. It is Phillips first—the rest nowhere.

When Morgan pulled off his trans-Atlantic steamship combine all the world talked about it. Phillips has been doing this sort of thing for the last six years, but he has done it in the same unobtrusive, quiet sort of way in which he takes his luncheon. Company after company has been absorbed until today, under the direct control of this one man, there are more vessels and greater tonnage than are owned by any American, German or French combine. The trade of Africa and South America is almost entirely in his hands.

## THOUSANDS FLOCKING TO WEST FROM EUROPE

Totals for the week are 5,666. Of these 3,876 were British, 340 Russians, 150 Galicians, 350 Germans, 200 Italians and 560 Scandinavians.

Today about seven hundred immigrants will arrive from the Corinthian and Mount Royal. Tomorrow seven hundred are due from the Letitia and next day 660 from the Anconia and Letitia are due to arrive.
