EUROPEAN POWERS MAY BOMBARD MONTENEGRO

CLOSURE DEBATE CONTINUES—FALL OF SCUTARI IMMINENT—LAUNCHING OF AQUITANIA

BOMBARDMENT OF MONTENEGRO COAST BY POWERS IMMINENT

DESPITE MANDATES AND ULTIMATUMS, MONTENEGRO CONTINUES TO ATTACK SCUTARI AND FALL OF THAT STRONGHOLD IS HOURLY EXPECTED.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Cettinje, April 23.—The Montenegrin forces yesterday afternoon fiercely attacked Scutari and, according to an official report, the engagement lasted all night and was still proceeding this morning with distinct advantage to the attacking party. Early in the engagement the Montenegrins captured two lines upon which the Turks made a gallant effort, but after a fierce battle were repulsed. In this counter attack the Montenegrins were very heavy, but they are gaining advantages at every point and this morning the fall of Scutari is imminent.

Monday evening an officer arrived here from the fleet of the powers blockading the coast bearing an ultimatum. This was to the effect that unless Montenegro immediately withdraws her troops from Scutari the fleet will immediately land troops at Antivari, Duleigo and San Giovanni.

Ten Days' Truce.

London, April 23.—A ten days' truce has been arranged between the Bulgarian and Turkish commanders, according to a Constantinople despatch to the Daily Telegraph.

PAGODA ON WHARF FOR EXHIBITS OF ORE

Prince Rupert Has Taken Up Matter of Permanent Ore Exhibition.

At last week's meeting of the Stewart Citizens' Association, President Godenrath stated that when recently in Vancouver he had arranged with Secretary F. S. Pilling of the Vancouver Chamber of Mines for considerable space in the chamber's new quarters for the purpose of providing a local exhibit of ores, and in this connection he had also requested Robert M. Stewart, president of the Stewart Land Co., to provide a number of enlarged photographs of the townsite and mining scenes to be used in connection with the display. This Mr. Stewart had very kindly consented to provide.

At Prince Rupert he had taken up the question of a permanent ore exhibit and was advised that the proposal from the local executive had met with hearty approval, and that there was a movement on foot seeking to secure the co-operation of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company to build an exhibition pagoda on the wharf so that the mineral resources of the north could be seen by passengers from all the boats operating to and from that port.

BUFFET DINING CARS

Service May Be Established Out of Prince Rupert in Near Future.

Although not definitely decided, the G. T. P. traffic officials who recently visited the city favored the putting on of a buffet dining car service on the regular passenger trains in and out of Prince Rupert. The matter will be definitely decided in the near future. It is the desire of the G. T. P. to give the public not only as good service as the traffic warrants but to keep considerably in advance of the demands.

AGAIN ADJOURN THEFT CASE

Defence Wants Witness Who Is at Granby Bay.

The case of Isack Mackenin, charged with the theft of watches and money, occupied the attention of Judge Young's court for several hours yesterday. The accused does not deny that the watches were left with him, but does deny that he hid them where they were found by the constable. The line of defence that is put up is that Brown, who is alleged to be interested with the accused in land in Kitsumkalum, put the watches there himself in order to get the accused in trouble and thus get him out of the way. In order to account for the increased amount of money the accused is known to have had when finally arrested the attendance of another witness was required by the defence, a man named Idi Mieni, from whom the accused claims that he borrowed a sum of money. The case was, therefore, adjourned for a week.

The court held the company's liability to be determined by the laws of Great Britain, which would make the owners of the Titanic liable for about three million dollars.

JAPAN WOULD FIGHT WITH UNITED STATES

Inflammatory Speeches at Tokio Against California Alien Land Bill

Tokio, April 19.—A demand that the Japanese government resort to arms was hysterically cheered at a mass meeting here last night to protest against the Alien Land Bill now before the California Legislature.

Twenty thousand persons assembled and listened to addresses by various orators. The speakers also denounced the submissive attitude of the government.

The responsible newspapers of Tokio in commenting editorially on the meeting, denounced the proceedings as undignified and unworthy of the nation, describing them as merely an outburst of the unthinking extreme element, incited by political demagogues.

CITIZENS OF STEWART ANGRY AT HAVING TO PAY WHARFAGE

LIBERAL GOVERNMENT PROMISED THAT IT WOULD BE A FREE PUBLIC WHARF—CONSERVATIVES ARE CHARGING FEES.

The action of the department of marine and fisheries in putting the Stewart wharf on the list of those charging dockage and wharfage fees has certainly not met with the approval of the business interests of the average citizen. It comes rather late in the day to inaugurate a system of wharf dues when the real need has passed, and particularly in view of the fact that the one passenger steamship line plying to this port has its own representative to look after freight receipts. However, this is not the point of greatest objection. The Miner contends that the present government is not fulfilling the promises of its predecessors in connection with the Stewart wharf. When the wharf was built the Hon. William Templeman was the sitting member for Comox-Atlin and also minister of inland revenue, and he assured the executive committee of the Stewart Citizen's Association that the

wharf would be a free public wharf, and that when Stewart became incorporated the same would be turned over to the future city as a public asset and utility.

It is quite within belief to expect that the present minister of marine and fisheries is not cognizant of this undertaking, as also H. S. Clements, M.P., the representative of the constituency, and for this reason the executive committee of the Citizens' Association drafted a resolution pointing out Stewart's claims in the matter. Looking to the future of the town we contend that under no circumstances should our rights be forfeited in the case in point.—Portland Canal Miner.

PROPOSED DRILL HALL WILL COST ABOUT \$60,000

RATEPAYERS LIKELY TO BE UNANIMOUS IN VOTING FREE SITE TO THE GOVERNMENT.

Among other bylaws to be voted upon tomorrow the ratepayers will be called upon to approve of the granting by the city of a site on Acropolis Hill to the Dominion government in order that the latter may erect a drill hall that will be a credit to the city. When it is considered that the government proposes to spend about \$60,000 on such a building and that a large portion of that amount will be spent locally, there should be little doubt as to the advisability of voting for the bylaw. A building such as is proposed will prove a great convenience to the city in many ways. Occupying a commanding position on Acropolis Hill, it will also be a great addition to the architectural beauty of the city. The plans call for a building 85 feet by 185 feet.

CLOSURE RESOLUTION STILL UNDER DEBATE IN THE HOUSE

SIR WILFRID LAURIER SPEAKS FOR SECOND TIME ON SUBJECT—WITTY LIBERAL SUGGESTS ANOTHER CLOSURE TO CLOSE CLOSURE DEBATE.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, April 23.—The debate on the closure resolution continues in the House of Commons and is becoming as dreary as that upon the main issues of the naval bill had grown to be. Last night, upon a motion to adjourn, Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke for a second time against the iniquity of introducing such a measure. He made a powerful appeal on the subject of gag rule on a par with his first speech on the subject

and the applause at certain points was so insistent and continued that he had to appeal to his followers to maintain order.

There is no indication of the termination of this debate. The Liberals have a systematic arrangement of relays of members to be on duty in the house while the remainder are within call and resting. One of the leaders remarked last night that the government might have to introduce another closure resolution to limit the debate on the present closure resolution.

ANOTHER CRITICISM OF POST OFFICE SITE

"Property Owner" Thinks the Site Should Be on a Corner.

Editor News:

Sir: Referring to the discussion regarding the location of the proposed new post office, one might imagine that he who dares raise his voice by way of criticism of the proposed site commits a most heinous offence. For instance, our good friend the Journal shows extreme agitation and yet to an onlooker the conclusion is forced that the anxiety of the Journal is not so much over the matter of the post office site as the matter of Mr. H. S. Clements. Mr. Clements possibly is a wonderful man, but still property owners in Prince Rupert may well question the judgment of a man whose home is in Vancouver and not Prince Rupert and who in consequence will not daily have brought to his attention the inappropriateness of the proposed post office site.

I think it may well be said that generally speaking the people of Prince Rupert want the new post office in a central location where the building will be an ornament and a credit to the city as well as of public utility. It makes no difference whether the site is on Second or Third avenues, but it certainly should be on a corner with two ornamental fronts rather than on inside lots with only one front.

BE SURE TO VOTE FOR THE BYLAWS.

It seems to be the very general opinion that the property owners will tomorrow vote for each of the eight bylaws submitted to them. To vote the money for the urgent city improvements for which it is asked means an added value to all the realty, and so personal interest might prove a factor. To the merchant, to every man in business, it will mean increased trade in all lines. From the fact that there are at present few unemployed in the city it will mean an increase in population, an acceleration in the growth of the city and more prosperous conditions.

The purposes for which the money is to be expended are not only for public improvements, but are for works that are badly needed at once. What would happen if we should have a very dry summer with our at present incomplete sewer system? What could happen but the breeding and spread of disease. The trunk sewers are an imperative necessity. The need of better educational facilities is close at its heels. The building in which the downtown school is held has been condemned by the medical health officer and the need of a downtown school is therefore a pressing one. Also, we have now a high school to which some fifteen pupils will be added this year, and the building of the new school on Borden street is the only way in which they can be accommodated.

Wherever the bylaws have been discussed not a single voice has been raised in objection nor any argument advanced as to why any one of them should be defeated. It seems to be almost a foregone conclusion that each and every one of them will carry almost unanimously.

JAPANESE RIGHTS IN CALIFORNIA.

California has taken drastic steps to prevent the further immigration of Japanese by passing a bill which prevents aliens from holding land within the state. Canadians or any other aliens are barred by the same measure, but it is starting to notice the difference in the tone of the newspapers of the two countries. The Japanese are excited, and threaten reprisal. In Canada the general feeling seems to be that it makes very little difference.

From the point of view of the average British Columbian, the California legislature has taken a wise step. If similar legislation were enacted in this province it would be an excellent means of discouraging Oriental immigration, but the objections are to some extent serious. It would mean that foreign capital could not be invested here, as far as land is concerned. This, again would have the advantage of preventing speculators from gobbling up the best portions of the province, if nothing else, but the terms of the California act are too severe.

No one thinks for a moment that the bill is aimed at others than Japanese and Chinese. The "Yellow Peril" is a live issue with the southern state, and the legislators drafted what they considered fairly effective means of lessening that peril. There are thousands of Canadians living in California who have never changed their allegiance, yet they should not object. If they intend to remain in California, make their living in California and expect the protection of California, there is no reason why they should not become citizens of the United States. If they have any objection to doing this they should not live there. The same holds true in Canada. Foreigners coming to this country, intending to take up land and live upon it, should become Canadian citizens.

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MILITANTS ONCE MORE TRY BOMB ATTACKS

This Time an Attempt to Blow up the Original Eddy-stone Lighthouse

Plymouth, Eng., April 19—A militant suffragette "bomb troop" this morning attempted to blow up the famous Smeaton tower on Plymouth Hoe. The tower is the original Eddystone lighthouse, built by John Smeaton in 1156-59, dismantled when it became antiquated and re-erected on the Hoe as a historic relic. As in many instances of recent date the bomb employed by the militants failed to explode. It consisted of the usual cylindrical tin cannister filled with explosive and with a fuse attached to the top.

On the cylinder, the women had painted in bold letters the words "Votes for Women" and "Death in Ten Minutes," while all around was scattered suffragette literature.

WHAT GREAT STRIKE IS COSTING BELGIUM

Twelve Million Dollars is the Estimate for the First Six Days

Brussels, April 19—Twelve million dollars is the figure compiled in trustworthy circles of Belgium's loss in the first six days of the strike for equal political rights, which has been joined by about 400,000 men, half the male working population of the country.

Two-thirds of this loss of \$2,000,000 a day falls, according to the Socialist trades union leaders, upon the employers and supporters of the existing system. The organizers of the strike affirm that the men by exercising self-denial can hold out as long as the capitalists are willing to endure their deprivation of dividends for a political reason only.

All appearances go to show that the strike will continue for a considerable period, as the determination of the men is met by the equally firm rejection of any idea of compromise by Premier Charles de Broville and the other cabinet ministers.

To make this possible, Mr. J. N. Cran, manager of their branch in Lillooet, and Mr. Russel of the Vancouver branch, accompanied Mr. Godfrey with the necessary supplies. After looking over the valley and meeting a number of the prominent residents, Mr. Godfrey came to the conclusion that the outlook was very hopeful, and through the kindness of Mr. F. Broughton, was enabled to open at once in the provincial police office.

HOW ASTON VILLA WON IN CUP FINAL

Defeated Sunderland by One Goal to Nil Before a Record Crowd.

London, April 19—The final game for the English Football Association cup opened at the Crystal Palace today before a record crowd. Aston Villa scored in the last half and won from Sunderland by one goal to nil.

The Villa won the toss and elected to play before the breeze. The game was brilliant from the start, with the Villa men aggressive, but the defence of Sunderland proved impregnable until Hampton netted a goal for Aston which was the signal for a tremendous burst of cheering.

London, April 19—The Star last night, in an editorial based on despatches from New York stating that Mrs. O. H. Belmont had threatened to boycott England, says:

"These subtle disasters which apparently make not a ha'porth of difference to any one are often to be feared the most. Until we looked out of the window this morning, there was nothing in the atmosphere to suggest that Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont of the U.S.A., had declared a boycott on England. Yet she had.

"The New York correspondents of the London paper announces that the lady, who is the mother of the Duchess of Marlborough, is determined to show her displeasure at the British Government's policy, by declining to stop in England this summer, by boycotting British goods and by trying to induce her friends to do likewise.

"After all, a duke is British goods, and an American society lady boycotting a duke is unthinkable. The Mauretania is big British goods too, and should be almost offensively British in American eyes, seeing that she belongs to the great company which so successfully defied Pierpont Morgan's transatlantic shipping combine. The British Mauretania will bring Mrs. Belmont to Fishguard and there land her on this repugnant island. A boycott strikes us as a rather shocking failure. If Mrs. Belmont really means to avoid us she should stop in America and do the thing properly. We should not mind."
