PREMIER BORDEN AND HIS PLEDGES

The closure measure has passed and Premier Borden and his party have the opposition by the throat. With gag rule they can pass anything and no one can say them nay. With their supreme power, therefore, it will be of interest to observe how many of those pledges made to the people and upon which Premier Borden was elected to power are honorably redeemed. Let us look over some of these pledges:. In a speech delivered at Halifax, August 21, 1907, Mr. Borden, then leader of the opposition, laid down as his three essentials of good government:

"Honest appropriation of the public money in the public interest."

What is meant by this was exemplified by his efforts to secure \$1,000,000 for good roads, and his persistant refusal of the Liberals' demands that its expenditure be so safe guarded that every province should get its full share and that the money could not be used for partisan purposes.

"The appointment of public officials upon consideration of capacity and personal character, and not party service alone."

Yet since Mr. Borden's coming to power there has been such an unprecedented slaughter amongst the Liberal employees of the public service that the government recently stated it would take over 18 months to prepare particulars of them without including the hundreds of thousands of



(An Apology.)




