EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS IN OTTAWA AND MONTREAL

MANITOBA TOWN OF GREYNA BURNING—RECIPROCITY TRADE TREATY WITH AUSTRALIA

SHALL ASSESSMENT ROLL BE EXHIBITED IN PUBLIC PLACE?

MOTION TO HAVE TYPEWRITTEN COPY AFFIXED TO WALL IN CITY HALL WAS LAST NIGHT VOTED DOWN.

Quite a discussion took place at the council last night on the question of publishing the assessment roll. Alderman Bullock-Webster having given notice of a motion that the roll be typewritten and kept in the city hall where everyone could have ready access to it.

Alderman Kerr stated the 25c charge for getting information as to assessments was an imposition—a holdup. He thought all such information should be given to the public free of any charge whatever. He was prepared to vote for the typewritten copy.

The mayor did not think the roll should be printed. Anyone who wanted to know the assessment of a certain lot or block could get this information from the assessor, but not the name of the owner. He did not think this should be given. To make a typewritten copy would be an unnecessary expense, as all the city hall stenographers were busy and a stenographer would have to be employed for the purpose.

Alderman Bullock-Webster said there were many who objected to troubling the busy officials, and they desired to look over the whole roll and see if they were all assessed fairly as compared with others, as in making the assessment prejudice or influence might creep in. Even if the typewriting did cost something it would give a general satisfaction it would give. He was not particular about giving the names but thought the more publicity the better.

The mayor said there was no prejudice or influence to be feared, the assessor being under oath to perform his duty without fear or favor. He was in no way interfered with in his work and took no instructions from anyone.

The motion was then put and defeated, the ayes being Ald. Bullock-Webster, Maitland and Kerr; the nays Ald. Sutherland, McCaffery, Dybhavn and the mayor.

EARTHQUAKE AT MONTREAL

Caused Much Alarm but Little Damage—Houses Shaken Badly at Ottawa

Montreal, April 29—An earthquake shock was distinctly felt here last night. Much alarm was felt but no damage has been reported.

Ottawa, April 29—During the earthquake shock last night the houses in the western section were badly shaken, but there have been no reports of fatalities.

RECOUNT OF VOTES CAST BY ALBERTANS

Hon. A. G. Mackay Elected in Edmonton Instead of A. C. Ewing.

Edmonton, April 26.—That Hon. A. G. Mackay was elected instead of A. C. Ewing is shown by the returns from the courts of enquiry. He had eight ballots passed in his favor yesterday and up to noon today he had fifteen more, making a total of twenty-three. It has been discovered that in poll 41 he received seventy-four instead of forty-nine votes. Indications are that he will be elected by seventeen votes. The latest election returns indicate that Rocky Mountain has gone Socialist, Mr. C. M. O'Brien, former member, winning over the Conservative (Campbell) by a majority of ten. Final returns from Edson give Hon. C. W. Cross a majority of 58, with all polls heard from. In Medicine Hat Mayor Spencer has a majority of 32 over Hon. C. R. Mithell, with all polls heard from.

There will be recounts of protested ballots in Macleod, where the premier was defeated by 17, and also in Medicine Hat, as well as in Edmonton, where the count is now in progress.

The Liberal leaders here now claim that the Conservatives have only 13 absolutely sure seats out of the 54 contested.

Protests, it is said, will be laid against the return of some twenty Liberals.

MAGISTRATE'S DECISION IS APPEALED AGAINST

Bail for the Accused is Fixed at \$500

In the case of Tom Gyr, charged with selling liquor without a license, Magistrate Carss rendered his decision this morning, finding the accused guilty and imposing the minimum penalty, six months' imprisonment. A. M. Manson, of Williams & Manson, appeared for the accused and entered an appeal against the decision. He also made application for bail which was fixed at \$500. The hearing of the appeal will be before His Honor Judge Young, probably next Monday.

NEARLY 150 TONS OF HALIBUT IN FOUR DAYS

Boats of Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company Bringing in Good Catches.

The George E. Foster, of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.'s fleet, arrived in port about 11 o'clock last night with 125,000 pounds of halibut. This is the largest catch brought in by a single boat this season. It represents about one week's fishing.

The Andrew Kelly brought in 90,000 pounds on Saturday, the Skagit 45,000 pounds yesterday and the Zibassa came in on Friday with 35,000 pounds.

The total catch brought in by the four boats since Friday amounts to 295,000 pounds, or practically 150 tons.

The G. T. P. steamer Henriette left Sunday night for Vancouver with 264 boxes, representing about 60 tons of fish. A portion of the large amount that has just been brought in is being frozen and will be kept for shipment during the fall and winter months.

NEW PREMIER HOTEL PLANS DISCUSSED BY CITY COUNCIL

NOMINAL RENTALS TO BE CHARGED BY CITY FOR BALCONY SUPPORTS AND FOR SIDEWALK CELLAR.

The board of works reported to the council last night in favor of the plans for the new Premier Hotel, to be erected at the corner of Second avenue and Sixth street. A letter was read from the president of the company, G. W. Morrow, asking permission to place a heating plant under the sidewalk and for posts on the Sixth street side on the sidewalk to support a balcony on the second storey.

The city engineer reported in favor of both the excavation and the balcony, suggesting that a nominal rent of \$1 be charged for the sidewalk so that the ground did not go out of possession of the city, and a rental of 25 cents each for the balcony posts to be placed on the edge of the sidewalk. A suggested agreement to this effect, drawn by the city solicitor, was read.

Alderman Bullock-Webster complained that everything came to the council cut and dried, leaving nothing for the discussion of the council. He approved of the report and agreement and he thought the council should encourage the building of balconies and the placing of awnings so that the whole sidewalk might be always covered. But he did not believe in this method of bringing everything cut and dried before the council. The matter of rental was certainly one to be dealt with by the whole council, and he moved that this point be cut out of the report for further discussion.

The mayor said many matters were brought up after the council met which it was advisable should be acted upon speedily. But if at any time any alderman desired to have fuller time for consideration the matter could be laid over. The report was then adopted.

Parliamentary Progress

SELECTION OF CARE TAKER FOR CEMETERY

Ald. Bullock-Webster Insists That Council Shall Make the Selection by Ballot.

At the council meeting last night the city clerk read the names of twelve applicants for the position of caretaker of the cemetery, as follows:

B. A. Spencer, Ernest Fuller, Albert Nicholson, David Holland, W. Hawkesford, E. G. Osborne, W. H. Sherman, Henry Evans, Frederic Adams, C. K. Yeterberg, Morris Couture, Joseph Garron.

The mayor observed there appeared to be plenty of applicants but the one selected would have no security as he would have to do whatever work the city engineer called upon him to do.

Alderman Bullock-Webster said these men had sent in their petition to be balloted for.

Alderman McCaffery moved applications in good faith and expected the selection be made by the city engineer and the cemetery committee.

Alderman Sutherland did not know any of the applicants and thought the city engineer should make the selection. He seconded the motion.

Alderman Bullock-Webster said it was not necessary to call in the services of the city engineer for such a matter. He moved that the man be selected by ballot.

Alderman Kerr seconded the amendment.

The mayor said the city engineer should select the man he considered the best for the work. He should have authority to hire him and to fire him if he was not found capable, as the city engineer was responsible for the work.

Alderman Bullock-Webster, Kerr and Maitland voted for the amendment and the motion was accordingly carried.

AUDITOR'S BELATED REPORT ON LAST YEAR'S CITY FINANCES

RECOMMENDATION THAT ALL PUBLIC UTILITIES SHOULD BE SUPPLIED AT AS NEAR TO COST AS POSSIBLE TO AVOID UNFAIR TAXATION.

The city auditor's report for the year ending December, 1912, was brought before the council last night and on motion of Alderman Sutherland, seconded by Alderman Kerr, was laid on the table for one week. The mayor observed that he did not wish to reflect on anyone but the audit did seem to be a trifle late in reaching the council. The report was as follows:

Gentlemen: I have audited the accounts of the corporation of the city of Prince Rupert for the year ending 31st of December, 1912, and have the following report to make thereon:

The general revenue account includes special as well as general revenue and I have had appended thereto a special revenue account showing this as also the expenditures against it. This, with general revenue account, shows a surplus of \$1,116.62. This is not correct, as there is a liability to special revenue of \$1,709.69, which shows general revenue account \$30,593.07. There is also included in general revenue the surplus from lights

and telephone departments. I am of the opinion that these are not properly general revenue and should be carried as surplus light and telephone revenue account until specially appropriated. All public utilities should be supplied at as near to cost as possible, otherwise an unfair distribution of taxation results, as outside holders of real estate will benefit from whatever profits are derived from these utilities without any contribution thereto.

There is being carried in the sewer rentals account \$684.50 as an asset. I would advise that this be either written off or collected.

The bank balance shows an asset of \$36,936.99 and includes special accounts sinking fund amounting to \$51,704.31.

Deduct debtor balance at bank, \$36,936.99, showing current bank account overdrawn \$14,764.32.

I would advise that the sundry assets accounts be either collected or written off the books.

I have found the books well and accurately kept, and all records in a satisfactory condition.

Vancouver Board of Trade Asked to Send Monthly Cable of Information to London.

Appropos of the discussion on publicity which took place at the local board of trade recently, the Vancouver board of trade has received a request to co-operate with the Provincial Bureau of Information in the sending of cables monthly—or more often should the occasion arise—to Agent General J. H. Turner at London.

It is pointed out in the letter from the information bureau that the demands for information being made at the agent general's office in London are so frequent and sometimes so important that the ordinary mail advices do not keep his office in touch closely enough with British Columbia happenings, hence the decision to send a monthly cable letter.

SUFFRAGE STRIKE OF BELGIUM MEN.

The greatest industrial strike to settle a merely political question was practically at an end yesterday. Also, it was the very first of such strikes that has resulted in victory. The only other national strike that had politics mixed up with it and was an attack on the governing body was that in France last year, starting with the tying up of all the railways. That was a failure.

One cannot help in making a reference to this national strike of the Belgians for manhood suffrage but make some comparison with the campaign so long continued in Great Britain for woman suffrage. The militant suffragettes have not struck for the reason most of them have no jobs to quit. But compare their plan of campaign with that so successfully carried out by the men of Belgium. In their strike there was not a single act of violence that can be laid at the door of the strike leaders, and the few incidents of this character were trivial. What do we hear every day of the campaign of the suffragettes? Violence openly preached; violence openly committed; windows smashed; historic buildings, of which the British nation is so proud, damaged by dynamite; a bomb was exploded in the historic Free Trade Hall of Manchester, from which John Burns, the labor member of the cabinet, was to speak; and the whole of this woman's political campaign has been a continuous succession of acts of violence. By it all they have not only gained nothing, but are every day weakening their cause and destroying public sympathy. The Belgium men won without violence. Under the present Belgium electoral laws there are approximately 800,000 men in a total population of about 8,000,000 who may vote because the electoral qualifications of an election are based

upon property and education. No one may vote until he has reached the age of 25 years. If he owns property appraised at 2,000 francs he has two votes. Some hold three votes. A notable feature of the law is that voting is compulsory upon those who are eligible.

Very naturally, the men of Belgium grew restive under this system, and they undertook to compel the government to give them a "one man, one vote" law by sending mechanics and workmen out on strike and tying up the industries of the country. It would be useless for them to refer their demand for ballot reform to the two and three vote men, and therefore their leaders resorted to the coercive strike.

This strike has proved more effective than the destructive campaign of the women of England. So long as the men of Belgium behaved and did not endanger life and property they had with them the strong sympathy of all who believe that good government rests upon universal suffrage.

PREMIER BORDEN AND HIS GAG LAW.

"If Parliament does not adopt my proposal after reasonable discussion I will dissolve it and go to the country," said Mr. Borden. Instead he introduces the gag. He has given his party a new name. It is now the Conservative-Closure party.

The Borden-Rogers or Rogers-Borden emergency is a delusion, but the surrender of control over our money is a serious matter.

Premier Borden evidently thinks the Liberals will submit to Rogers domination as complacently as he does.

The lookout men of the Borden navy signal that a strange destroyer called "The Senate" is rapidly approaching and showing signs of hostility.

CONDITIONS AT PRINCE RUPERT STATED IN SCOTCH NEWSPAPER

AYRSHIRE LAD SAYS CLIMATE IS SIMILAR TO THAT OF THE CLYDE, OR BETTER—CAN SAVE MONEY HERE

Under the heading of "Living in Canada," a young man who signs himself "Ayrshire" and gives his address as Skeena River, writes in the following interesting way to the Glasgow Herald:

Sir,—I have read with much interest the letters appearing in "The Glasgow Weekly Herald" re prospects in Canada. With your permission I would like to make a few personal observations that may be of some assistance to anyone thinking of trying Western Canada, but fearful of taking the step. It is now almost three years since I made up my mind to give up a "bare living" in a Clyde town and try my luck in Northern B.C., then in the embryo state, but now a strapping youth. I came prepared to follow any employment for which I was suited. So after a few days of idleness I got a start

at \$50 per month, but finding this a small wage soon acquired a better position.

Spending almost a year in Prince Rupert, I moved to another position up country which I continue to hold. In all those situations I had no previous experience. This is one of the many advantages Canada offers over the "Old Country" to all who are steady and willing. At home in nearly all cases it is "Once a baker, always a baker," as you will rarely get a chance to change your livelihood, should you find you want to, through necessity. The man coming here must be prepared to take any work for which he may be suited as a start and very likely he will get a job in his own special line if he desires later on; but I know of several successful men who have built their success through tak-

ing up a "trade" they had no experience of in the "Old Country."

Above all men who want to get on here must be steady in their habits, and ready to suit themselves to conditions, which at first are inclined to be trying. Bank and government clerkships are not well paid in comparison with private positions. To me this northern B. C. country appears the best at present for the young man. There are many miles of new railroads being constructed, opening up vast new districts, and offering many opportunities, for those who are steady and pushing. Our climate is very similar to that of the Clyde—if anything, better. From the wages paid here in nearly all classes of employment more can be "saved" in comparison with rates at home, but in some instances the hours are longer. Just today I heard of a young Scotchman and his wife who left this part for Australia about a year ago. They are returning to Prince Rupert, as they find it holds the best prospects for them.

Around here, however, we have plenty of "kickers" who are always running this country down. As a rule these people have their own unsteady habits to blame for their disappointment, or else they are of the type known as "born grumblers." My only regret is that I did not come here several years sooner instead of waiting at home for "trade picking up."—I am, etc.

SMITHERS WILL BECOME ONE OF IMPORTANT POINTS ON LINE

RAILWAY CLEARING NEARLY HUNDRED ACRES FOR SHOPS AND HUNDRED AND FIFTY ACRES FOR BUSINESS AND RESIDENCE PURPOSES.

Rapid developments in the new town of Smithers, which is to be the G. T. P. divisional point in the Bulkley Valley, are predicted by W. P. Murray, of Aldous & Murray, Ltd., selling agents for the railway company. Mr. Murray arrived from Vancouver last Saturday and has since been busy with preliminary arrangements for the development of the town. To the Miner he said that the work of surveying Smithers townsite, which has been undertaken by Green Bros., Burden & Co., is to be completed by July 1 under penalty.

The town, as it will be laid out, lies between the railway and the Bulkley River, the site being practically level except to the northeast, where the ground rises eighty feet higher, being here about 150 feet above the river. This will probably be a favorite residential section, providing ideal home sites. In the business section the streets will be parallel and at right angles to the railway, which here runs approximately northwest and southeast, on a four mile tangent with no appreciable grade. In the residence portion of the town the streets, as planned, will run with the cardinal points of the compass, with series of crescents surrounding the three parks. A driveway will follow the bank of the river. The plan is the work of experts and is regarded as the last word in townsite plans.

The railway company has already let a contract for the clearing of 75 to 100 acres for railway purposes. In addition to this the G. T. P. will clear about 150 acres of the townsite, including a considerable part of the business section and the main arteries of the street system. Further clearing will be undertaken from time to time, as rendered necessary by the development of the town.
