## YUKON GOLD DUST NOW GOING TO VANCOUVER

Elimination of Exchange Charge at Assay Office Has Diverted it from Seattle

Ottawa, April 30-That the the exchange charge on gold at the assay office in Vancouver had been the diversion of the stream from the Yukon to Ottawa mint instead of the San Francisco mint, was asserted in the House of Commons last evening by Dr. Thompson, of the Yukon. In 1912, only one fourth of the five million dollars produced in the Yukon had reached Ottawa, and the welcome change fully justified the establishment of a Canadian mint.

The debate was occasioned by the request of the Hon. W. T. White for an increase in the vote for the mint from \$75,000 to \$110,000.

Mr. McLean, of South York, suggested a subsidiary coinage of the metals peculiar to Canada, cobalt and nickel.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said it would be better to establish nickel and cobalt industries in Canada.

Graham Island Coal.

The report of Dr. Clapp on the coal prospects of Graham Island promises to be of an optimistic character. A preliminary outline of his report says: "It was found that the cretaceous coals, while of excellent quality, occur in much smaller basins than was previously thought, and that the basins are deformed and involved with later igneous rocks, which occur chiefly as dykes and sills or laccoliths, and possibly as flows. 
