### ALWAYS OPPOSED TO FREE SPEECH.

As cleverly pointed out recently by the Vancouver Sun, Toryism in Canada has usually been opposed to free speech and a number of instances might be cited to prove this, since they burned the parliament buildings in Montreal, rotten egged a governor general in Toronto, gagged the legislature of Upper Canada in the interests of the family compact, the clergy reserves and the privileged office holders, since they expelled, illegally and by false charges, their principal critic in 1836, William Lyon Mackenzie, and wrecked his newspaper officefrom those days down to the present the Tory party has been the party of gag, the enemy of free speech, the opponent of free institutions. It is the history of Toryism in England and Canada. Toryism has always been a synonym of force overruling or ignoring popular opinion whenever it had the upper hand.

In 1910 when Mr. Borden was asked what his attitude on naval defence would be if his party were returned to power. LAURIER AND BORDEN he said it would be to first ascertain if there was emergent need of aid by Canada and if there were he would then ask parliament for the necessary money, and if parliament refused the money he would then go to the country. In that statement he foreshadowed his desired to base his policy upon an emergency. He produced his emergency and it has fizzled out.




