AMENDMENT TO BORDEN NAVAL BILL INTRODUCED

UNITED STATES TARIFF BILL PASSES THE HOUSE—WOMAN SUFFRAGE BILL IS DEFEATED

AN AMENDMENT TO NAVAL BILL IS INTRODUCED IN COMMITTEE

LIBERALS READY TO VOTE ANY SUM FOR DEFENCE OF EMPIRE BUT MONEY VOTED MUST BE EXPENDED IN CANADA.

Ottawa, 7.—In the house of commons last night, after amendments to the Canadian naval act and to the grain act had been discussed and dealt with, the debate on the naval bill was resumed in committee of the whole. Hon. Thomas White, minister of finance, made the opening speech, confining his remarks almost entirely to a justification of his own action regarding his quotation from a speech made by Winston Churchill in the British house of parliament. William M. German, of Welland, followed in a strong speech against the Borden policy. He contended that the Liberals had shown themselves to be and were now, as ready to do their part for the defence of the empire as the opposite party. They were willing to vote the \$35,000,000 or any amount for such a purpose, but he claimed that any such sum voted for the said purpose should be devoted to the building of a navy within Canada's borders for the defence of the empire. He concluded by moving an amendment that parliament should vote from time to time \$35,000,000 for the purpose of speedily increasing the effective defence forces of the empire, such expenditure to be made in Canada and under the control of the Dominion government. The debate was continued by William Pugsley, of St. John, who seconded the amendment, and by Hon. John D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries and of the naval service.

TARIFF BILL PASSES CONGRESS BY OVERWHELMING MAJORITY

OPponents TO FREE WOOL, FREE MEATS AND OTHER NECESSITIES COMPLETELY BOWLED OVER—HUNDRED MILLION INCOME TAX A FEATURE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, D. C., May 7.—An overwhelming Democratic majority yesterday swept through the house of representatives the Underwood tariff bill and its free wool, free meats and other necessities, the chief argument being that the hundred million dollar income tax feature would more than overcome any loss the government might sustain because of the free list. The debate has been the most spirited in the recollection of the Democratic leaders. The Republicans have avoided filibustering or a demand for record votes. The caucus rule of solid Democratic votes has been strictly followed out. The bill now goes to the senate where it will be considered by the finance committee but there are to be no public hearings before this committee of those interested in the measure. Senator Simmons, its chairman in speaking of this said: "There will be no public hearings and that determination is expected to speed up consideration of the bill, after it gets to the Senate." The bill will be under the consideration of the committee for about ten days or two weeks at most and is expected to be reported to the senate about June 1st at the latest.

SALVATION ARMY SOLDIERS IN JAIL

Arrested Streets So Thronged the Army Interfered With Traffic.

Edmonton, Alta., May 3.—Six members of the Salvation Army, two women and four men, were arrested by Magistrate Downes on Saturday to ten days' imprisonment on refusal to pay fines for blocking up the thoroughfare on Whyte avenue. They all pleaded guilty to the charge. On entering the cells they commenced singing revival tunes, which they continued during the afternoon. Business men on the main side of the river, where the women took place, appealed to Attorney-General Cross and on Saturday night an order was issued for their release. They at once proceeded to a nearby corner, where the remainder of the corps was holding meetings, and joined in the services.

REFUSES TO DEPORT RUSSIAN REFUGEES

United States Authorities Allow Two Escaped Siberian Exiles To Remain.

Washington, May 3.—The United States immigration authorities here have declined to deport two young Russian political refugees who have been through the horrors of an exile in Siberia. One of these young Russians is at New York and the other at San Francisco. The Ellis Island case is that of Ellie Kogan, who was held up on the charge of being guilty of an offence involving moral turpitude. Kogan was arrested in 1906, when he was active in the anti-government political movement in St. Petersburg. He was ordered into permanent exile in Siberia.

NEARLY A HUNDRED SALOON PASSENGERS

The s.s. Prince George arrived this morning sharp on time, notwithstanding that a call had to be made at Alert Bay to allow several passengers to get off at that point. WOMAN'S SUFFRAGE BILL IS DEFEATED BY LARGE MAJORITY

PREMIER ASQUITH DECLARED HE WOULD RESIGN RATHER THAN VOTE FOR MILITANT SUFFRAGETTES—MORE MILITANT OUTRAGES

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, May 7.—The fate of the woman's suffrage bill was sealed last night by the votes against it of more than fifty Nationalists. Even Premier Asquith spoke against the passage of the measure. He said that while he to some extent favored extending the suffrage he would most certainly resign before he would give his vote to the militant suffragettes. The bill whereby it was sought to enfranchise six millions of women was rejected by a majority of 47, the vote standing 266 against to 219 for. Whether there is any chance that the present parliament will pass a bill of a more limited character is doubted. The Nationalists feared to allow the bill to pass even a second reading, as it might lead to a parliamentary struggle which would be likely to end in dissolution of parliament before the home rule bill becomes law.

KING OF MONTENEGRO FINALLY DECIDES TO EVACUATE SCUTARI

AGED MONARCH HAS PLACED ALBANIAN CITY IN THE HANDS OF THE POWERS UNCONDITIONALLY—TENSION GREATLY RELIEVED

London, May 5.—At the close of the ambassadors' conference in London today an official communication was issued reading as follows: "The fact that the King of Montenegro has placed the fate of Scutari in the hands of the powers is a matter of great satisfaction. The governments of the powers will now consider what arrangements shall be made in the immediate future in regard to the town. The ambassadors will meet again Thursday."

FIGHTING THE BATTLE OF THE WHOLE PEOPLE.

Here is a resolution passed at a mass meeting of Toronto Liberals which rings true as a clarion call and every Liberal association of this province would do well to copy it:

"Whereas the naval policy of contribution and centralization is opposed to the principle of local self-government, upon which the British Empire is founded;

"And whereas the closure rules being introduced into the Canadian Parliament are intended to deprive the representatives of the people of this country of freedom of speech and to prevent the investigation of Governmental wrongdoing, and to vest the whole control of Parliament in the hands of the Government of the day;

"Be it therefore resolved that this meeting hereby expresses its full endorsement of the position taken by the Liberal party at Ottawa for the preservation of the British Empire and all the rights and privileges of the people of Canada, and pledges itself to do all in its power to uphold their hands, believing they are fighting the people's battle."

DIRECT VOTE FOR SENATORS.

It may now be taken as settled that United States senators will hereafter be elected directly by state voters at large, and not by state legislatures. This will bring an end to one kind of scandal which has arisen several times of late. In three states formal charges have been made and sustained that legislators accepted bribes in connection with the election of senators. The direct vote will end this kind of bribery, and the popular vote in most of the states is so large that it will be impossible to win elections by the purchase of votes. State legislators are probably no more corrupt than United States voters or the voters and legislatures of any other country, but their number is so small that on critical elections a few members of the worse sort may have a vast influence.

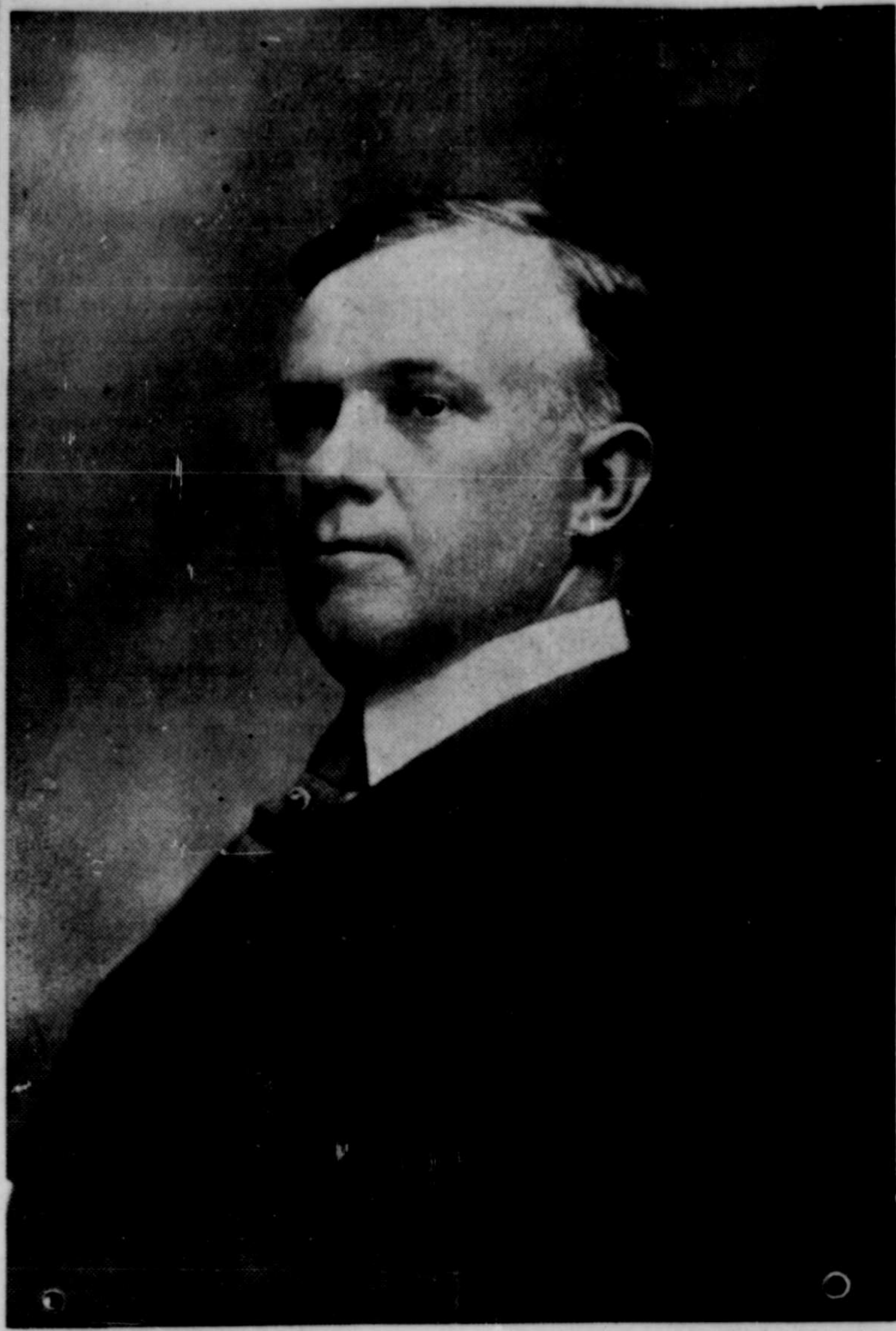

DUNCAN ROSS ON NAVAL BILL AND SOME PROVINCIAL ISSUES

VICTORIA LIBERAL ASSOCIATION ENTHUSIASTIC—CZAR McBRIDE AND HIS FORTY SLAVISH FOLLOWERS IN THE LEGISLATURE

Victoria, May 2—Determined to launch the fight at the earliest possible date the Victoria Liberals have decided to hold their convention for the purpose of nominating candidates for forthcoming Dominion and Provincial elections on the evening of Monday, May 12. This decision was reached after an earnest discussion at the annual meeting of the Victoria Liberal Association last night, and seemed to embody the opinion of practically every speaker, and was heartily welcomed by the large attendance of members present.

They had a smaller but equally live organization. A strong intercommunication among Liberal associations had been established and was proving a great strength to the cause. The healthiest sign of the campaign his committee had been conducting, said Mr. Ross, was that no organization of any kind could be effected until there was public opinion back of the principles for which it stood. The people of British Columbia were at last getting their eyes opened to the fact that party government did not consist in having Sir

Twenty-one delegates for the Provincial Liberal convention, opening at Revelstoke on May 29 were selected from among those present at the meeting last night and the rest will be chosen by the five ward associations.

Duncan Ross, ex-M.P., addressed the meeting on the work of the committee of the provincial executive appointed to perfect the general organization of Liberalism throughout the province. A note of optimism was sounded in his statement that for the first time in the twenty-four years of his experience in this province there was an organization which was felt in every corner of every constituency. There was not a single constituency, he said, without a live association, and every portion of every constitu-

Richard McBride as a czar of the province with 40 slavish followers doing his bidding. What happened in the last election, he declared, could never happen again, for the people had come to see that there must be a live opposition which would see that \$75,000 was not given away without discussion.

Dealing with Dominion issues, Mr. Ross said that for the first time in many years Liberals and Conservatives were divided in Canada on a historic principle, namely, centralization of control, the historic Conservative practice, as against the vigorous Liberal belief in autonomous self-control. His discussion of the naval problem was lucid and enlightening on many points.

ORTIE McMANIGAL TO HAVE FACE ALTERED

Plans to Have Scar Removed from Forehead so as to Escape Recognition.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 5—In preparation for his release from the county jail, Ortie McManigal is planning to have his face altered by surgery so that he will be able to escape detection by possible enemies. McManigal, when a mere child, fell out of a moving wagon, landing on the ground in such a position that a wheel passed over his head, leaving a deep scar upon his forehead.

That scar, according to detectives, aided them in tracking him in his operations before he finally was arrested in Detroit more than two years ago.

It has been stated by officers here that "one of these days" McManigal, who has been in Los Angeles for the greater part of two years, and who has not been prosecuted for his confessed crimes, will be given his liberty, but the date is to be kept secret so that he will be free to try to efface himself without being followed.

Pension for the Widow

Winnipeg, May 3—Mrs. Chas. Rooke, the widow of the mounted constable who was shot last January near Dauphin, Man., while performing his duty, will receive a temporary pension of \$50 a month from the Manitoba Government.

WAS KNOCKED OUT YET GOT THE DECISION

One of the Quickest Verdicts Ever Rendered in a Prize Ring Contest.

Nine out of ten chances you'll say the man who landed the punch gets the decision, but wait a second.

Ed. Smith, who sport edits on the Chicago American for a living and who referees a bit now and then for pastime, was telling a flock of fans about it one morning.

Smith witnessed this unusual ending several years ago in Chicago. The go was between Frank Hartley and Shorty Ahern, a smoke weller and was staged at the old American club in Thirty-first street.

Hartley had the fight won by a big majority for the six rounds, but in the last part of the final chapter Ahern swung wild and the blow found a restplace on Hartley's jaw, and he in turn found a resting place on the floor.

"Siler started the count, but when he lowered his hand for the eighth time the bell rang," said Smith. "He then leaned over the prostrate man and raised his right glove. Then there was a riot and general hubbub. There had been a lot of betting and an unusual amount of interest in the go."

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STRICT REGULATIONS FOR ALIEN AIRCRAFT

British Home Secretary Issues Lengthy Orders for Control of Foreign Airships.

London, May 3.—In virtue of powers conferred by the Aerial Navigation Act, the Rt. Hon. Reginald McKenna, secretary of state for home affairs, has issued lengthy orders and regulations for the control of aircraft from abroad, defining the prohibited areas for the landing of alien airships.

It is permissible for officers to fire on foreign aircraft contravening these regulations. Aeroplanes and airships from abroad cannot enter Ireland and cannot enter Scotland between Fraserburgh and the Ythan River, and England at three places on the east coast and four on the south coast.

The areas over which aircraft are prohibited from flying number five, and include dock yards, wireless stations, arsenals, railway stations used for transportation of troops and landmarks near fortresses and military works. Aircraft entering England are not permitted to carry cameras, homing pigeons, firearms or wireless apparatus. Foreign airmen must obtain clearance papers from a British consulate and must not enter the United Kingdom until forty-eight hours thereafter and must state their intended landing place and the object of the voyage.

RENO DIVORCE CROWD GREATER THAN EVER

Seven Hundred Wedlocked Ones Waiting for their Fetters to be Filed Off

Reno, May 3.—Never has the city witnessed such a crowd of women and men seeking divorce, particularly the former, in its hotels, apartment houses and cottages, walking its streets and flocking to its places of entertainment, cafes and resorts.

Fully 700 of such temporary residents are here for no other purpose than securing a legal separation from their husbands or wives. They are spending an enforced seven to nine months in any manner which will most pleasantly "kill time" until they are martially freed.

Unquestionably the final rush for a Nevada decree is in full swing. The three leading hotels which have been housing many of these so-called residents, are literally swamped. Every train from the east adds to the throng, who manage to secure quarters somewhere.

The courts have been compelled to set aside entire days each week for divorce business, some single days witnessing fourteen trials.

CHILD THOUGHT DEAD ARISES FROM COFFIN

Double services were held and the little child and his aged grandmother were laid side by side in the family plot.
