WATER BOUNDARY WILL BE BETTER DEFINED

PETITION FAVORING M'LEOD FOR COLLECTOR—MAYOR STARTS ON HIS FINANCIAL MISSION

WILL BUILD ANOTHER LARGE BOAT FOR PRINCE RUPERT RUN

COMMODORE NICHOLSON GONE TO WINNIPEG TO CONFER WITH PROMINENT OFFICIALS REGARDING PLANS FOR THE NEW STEAMER

Vancouver, May 8.—In preparation for the greatly increased traffic to Prince Rupert and the north, which is expected to take place next year with the linking up of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, the company is planning to put another large new steamer on the run.

new steamer which will be built this year in readiness for the traffic of 1914. During the present season the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George have had heavy complements of passengers, as well as increased freight shipments. The company's fleet of freighters have also been kept very busy, while the alteration of the schedule of the steamer Prince John to allow of direct communication between Vancouver and Graham Island ports has induced a great development of traffic.

CHARGE DISMISSED IN INDECENCY CASE

Magistrate Did Not Consider the Evidence Sufficiently Convincing.

This morning before Magistrate Cars the indecent exposure case was resumed, the argument of the defending and prosecuting counsels being heard. The argument hinged chiefly on the weight of the evidence given concerning the recognition of the accused. The only witness who was positive that the man guilty of the offence and the accused were one and the same was exceedingly high strung and in a nervous condition. The other witnesses, who were cool and collected in giving their evidence, would not swear positively that the accused was the guilty man. They admitted that they identified the accused more by the color of his clothes and hat than by his features. The defence argued that if the accused had been truly he would not have walked directly past the ladies concerned in the case, thus exposing himself to danger of betrayal. The prosecuting attorney, on the other hand, argued that the accused might have done this very thing to ward off suspicion that he was the guilty person. After hearing the argument Magistrate Cars dismissed the case.

HOME RULE MEASURE GETS SECOND CHANCE

To Be Reintroduced and Go Through Same Stages in House of Lords.

London, May 8.—The government bill to abolish plural voting has been read a second time in the house of commons. The only spoken opposition to it came from F. E. Smith, the brilliant young Unionist barrister, who moved its rejection. The amendment was, however, defeated by 214 votes to 227.

The battle over the home rule bill will begin all over again on June 3, when it will be introduced a second time, passed and sent to the lords again, according to an announcement made today by the chancellor of the exchequer. Everybody expects the measure to be thrown out again, when it will be presented a third time and passed over the heads of that body.

WILL BE OUR NEXT GOVERNOR-GENERAL

Authoritative Report that the Present Colonial Secretary Will Succeed the Duke

London, May 8.—Information from an authoritative source says that the return of the Duke of Connaught is an uncertainty. Even if His Royal Highness does return his sojourn at Ottawa will likely be of the briefest. He will be succeeded, it is reported, by Rt. Hon. Lewis Harcourt, the political secretary of state for the colonies, who is a representative of the ancient family tracing descendants from the Plantagenets. His ancestors have filled many high offices of state, one having been lord chancellor under George I.

NO CHANGE OF SITE FOR NEW BUILDINGS

Provincial Govt. Decides Site Influenced Investment at the Auction Sale.

Mr. William Manson, representative of Skeena district in the local legislature, is in the city for a few days, his mission being largely in connection with the early erection of the new provincial government building in Prince Rupert, says the Victoria Colonist. Construction of this combined court house and office edifice would have been initiated ere this but for the point arising that the building might perhaps be better placed on another site than that originally proposed, a suggestion which expert examination of conditions seemingly favored. The circumstances that the location of the government building had been announced at the time of the last sale by auction of government lots, and therefore very probably influenced investment at that time, has been sufficient, however, to induce confirmation of the original site. The preparation of plans and early invitation of tenders will now proceed.

RANKIN HAS SECURED ANOTHER CONTRACT

Stretch of Thirty Miles Along the Fraser River for Pacific Great Eastern

Construction work on the Pacific Great Eastern Rly. along the east bank of the Fraser river northward from Lillooet, is to be started within a few weeks. Mr. D. A. Rankin has been awarded a sub-contract for a section of about 30 miles, extending as far as Kelly Lake, a point in the highlands.

Mr. Rankin, who has had large experience in railway construction, is now locating his camps and has already shipped in three steam shovels. It is understood that additional contracts farther north will be awarded as soon as the engineers complete the final surveys.

MAYOR PATTULLO LEAVES ON CITY'S FINANCIAL MISSION

First Real Attempt Toward Permanent Financing Since the Incorporation of the City---Heavy Obligations Left by Last Council to be Taken Care of

Mayor Pattullo left on the Prince Rupert this morning on his mission to secure funds from the money centres to carry on the work of the city. He was kept busy shaking hands until the boat put off, not only by personal friends but by others interested in the success of his mission, which means so much to Prince Rupert's immediate prosperity.

"Yes, I know that I carry with me the good will and good wishes of every sensible man in Rupert. I appreciate very much the loyal co-operation and support of the council which has so expedited the business in hand that we are able to take this step. The staff of the city hall, too, seem to have taken a personal interest in getting things in shape, and the ratepayers, as you know, have clearly indicated their views.

ful civic administration. It is the only way to protect the credit and good name of the city."

"No, not particularly. We have received a mandate from the people to, among other things, try to finance public undertakings this year and Mr. Peters and I shall do our best to fulfill this. We are about to make the first real attempt toward permanent financing since the incorporation of the city. I am not prepared to prophesy as to how far our efforts will be successful. We shall take that course we believe to be safe, sane, prudent and businesslike and stand by the results.

NO CURE SHOULD BE CAPITALIZED.

Dr. Friedmann seemed a very frank, humanely disposed scientist when he landed in New York and requested medical authorities to investigate the miraculous effects of his tuberculosis cure. He would accept no fees from patients, but desired his discovery to be for the common good of all humanity. Several medical authorities in the United States and Canada did investigate his cure, one, the federal health department of the United States, giving a guarded official report. In our wire despatches Saturday it was stated that the public health board, after investigating a number of cases, found the results did not justify that confidence in the remedy which has been inspired by widespread publications. In short, the whole affair, from the sham philanthropic attitude of Dr. Friedmann down, seems but a clever piece of press agency work to gull the public.

This is proven in the fact that without waiting the results of the investigation he requested, with the aid of the wide publicity thus gained Dr. Friedmann has disposed of the American rights to the exclusive use of his alleged tuberculosis remedy to the Eisner Mendelssohn Company. It is purposed to organize a \$5,000,000 corporation and to establish thirty-six institutions where patients may be treated with the Friedmann cure. Those desiring treatment must go to the institutes, the remedy not being procurable elsewhere. It is reported that Dr. Friedmann received \$125,000 in cash and \$1,800,000 in stock of the new company to be formed.

While this is merely the usual method of exploiting a discovery and turning it to

financial advantage, it seems hardly the appropriate thing to do in connection with a discovery which may mean so much to human life, if Dr. Friedmann's clever press agent is to be believed. It would seem as if an exception could wisely have been made in this case, so as to avoid the dangers and the limitations that are bound to follow such action. No cure, even if proved, should be capitalized; and such action with an alleged cure should be made a criminal offence.

DEFENCE OF THE PACIFIC.

The Canadian Courier in the number just to hand suggests that Canada should make a working arrangement with the United States for joint defence of the Pacific Coast, in case of Asiatic invasion. The Courier argues that Great Britain has no adequate naval force of her own on the Pacific, and no military force, and that it is therefore of necessity that Canada should arrange with the United States for a Pacific Coast defence policy. It concludes: "Canada's vital point is her Pacific Coast. Take British Columbia out of the red section of the North American map and Canada is cut off from the Pacific Ocean. Her dream of being a great continental power with a navy on either ocean, and of being the great transportation avenue between the Orient and the Occident, would be over. Yet British Columbia is guarded by a training ship! "If we are not willing to join Australia and New Zealand in the defence of the Pacific, then let us make an arrangement with the United States. When the Panama Canal is opened the United States will be the strongest guardian of the Pacific Coast of North America."

DUBLIN CASTLE GEM MYSTERY CAUSING WIDESPREAD SCANDAL

SIR ARTHUR VICARS WILL TELL WHOLE STORY THOUGH HE FACES DEATH—EXALTED PERSONAGES HAVE THREATENED HIM.

London, May 8.—Sir Arthur Vicars, formerly Ulster king of arms, who was dismissed after the mysterious disappearance of the Dublin crown jewels, is under guard of Scotland Yard detectives by his own request and for his own safety.

Sir Arthur declares he will reveal in court all the facts concerning the jewel mystery—facts that involve persons of noble birth—and has received a series of threatening letters from a former high official at Dublin Castle.

"You shall never go into the witness box and tell the story," says one of the letters, which are said to be all in the possession of Scotland Yard.

The heads of Scotland Yard take these threats seriously.

In spite of the threats and his evident fear that he may meet personal harm at the hands of enemies, Vicars has just filed in court the papers in his libel suit against the London Mail. He promises to reveal not only the manner of the theft of the gems, but matters of deeper disgrace to those concerned.

Tremendous efforts are being made by exalted personages to hush the suit up at the eleventh hour, since it is feared a scandal similar to the Round Table revelations, which involved high German army officers and one of the Kaiser's closest friends, will be made public.

The Dublin crown jewels, valued at \$250,000, which are worn by the King, were missed in the summer of 1907.

The police began a drastic investigation, but dropped it within a week and it was explained that the jewels had been located. It was reported that the gems had been located in a London pawnshop and that the pawnbroker had been paid \$90,000 after threatening to tell who pledged them.

A secret official inquiry was conducted which resulted in the dismissal of Vicars, who had been custodian of the jewels. The conduct of others came under suspicion, but one of the noblemen proved his innocence and the results of the investigation were suppressed.

Sir John Simon Coming
London, May 7.—The Canadian Associated Press learns that Sir John A. Simon, K. C., Solicitor-General, intends visiting Canada this summer. Sir John is one of the brilliant young men of the present government. He is forty years of age, and has represented Walthamstow for the past seven years, and been Solicitor-General for three years. He was one of the counsel for Great Britain in the Alaska boundary arbitration.

OPPOSES ALL AID TO ALASKA RAILROADS

Manager of White Pass & Yukon Route Doing Dog-in-Manger Act.

Washington, May 8.—Opposition to government aid for Alaska railroads was expressed today to the Senate territories committee by O. L. Dickeson of Vancouver, manager of the White Pass & Yukon route. He declared that the companies in which his principals are interested would open a water and rail route to Fairbanks on June 1. A government line, he said, would send them into bankruptcy.

Under cross-examination, Mr. Dickeson declared he was not prompted to his attitude by the fact that Close Brothers, his principals, were partners with the Guggenheim-Morgan syndicate in the Copper River Railroad.

NAVAL BILL SQUABBLE DEPLORED IN BRITAIN

Would Rather Spend Hundreds of Millions Than to See Such Dissension.

London, May 8.—"The people of Great Britain, enormously as they value the co-operation of the dominions in defence, would rather spend £100,000,000 themselves than see the cause of imperial unity injured by being made the subject of party struggle," declares the Pall Mall Gazette (Unionist), tonight in an editorial which promises to deal fully in the near future with "the unhappy struggle over the navy bill now proceeding in Canada."

This is the only editorial comment in tonight's papers, although Sir Wilfrid Laurier's speech has been cabled here pretty extensively.

A prominent Liberal member of parliament on being asked by the Canadian Associated Press if there was any movement at Westminster in the direction of assisting the Ottawa house to solve the difficulty, amicably replied: "Certainly not; nobody but Premier Borden would make such an attempt."

This disposes decisively of suspicions that home members of the government, who intend visiting the dominion this year, have any hidden end in view.

AMERICAN FISHERMEN MAY BE BARRED FROM THE HECATE STRAITS

(Continued from Page 1.)

cord to be deposited with the Imperial and United States governments.

The completion of the survey of the water boundary in the lower portion of Portland Canal will also be undertaken this season by another Canadian survey party. All the general work in Southeastern Alaska will this year as usual be in charge of Mr. Neil Ogilvie, who is expected here shortly from Ottawa.

Mr. Dennis is one of the brightest members of the boundary survey. He has been engaged in that work for a good many years.

British jurists have raised the point that the treaty having defined the water boundary through the centre of Dixon Entrance separating Alaska from Graham Island, B.C., and in a marine region exceeding the three mile territorial limit, all fishing rights in the halibut grounds in Hecate Straits, to the southbound and lying between Queen Charlotte Islands and the British Columbia mainland will accordingly be regarded as British territorial waters and as such may be regarded as British waters exclusively. If this contention should be maintained by the Dominion Government and conceded by the United States government American fishermen will have no right to catch fish in the waters of Hecate Straits south of the Alaska water boundary running from a point opposite Cape Luzon, Alaska, to the entrance of Portland Canal.

It is said that the waters north of this boundary line have been conceded as American territorial waters in Alaska, therefore the contention is raised, the same rule should apply to the waters south of this line being principally Hecate Straits, between Queen Charlotte Islands and the Mainland, and the southern portion of Dixon Channel.

HOME RULE BILL

Was Read for the First Time in British Commons Thursday.

London, May 8.—The home rule bill for Ireland was reintroduced in the house of commons today by Premier Asquith and read a first time under the standing order of the house, which debars debate. It will come up for second reading on June 2.

TOOK IT SERIOUSLY

Spectator Tried to Protect the Hero of a "Movie" Show.

Leavenworth, Kas., May 7.—Patrons of a moving picture show here last night were momentarily panic stricken when a spectator, believing the villain was going to murder the hero of the picture, drew a pistol from his pocket and fired at the struggling figures on the canvas.
