AMERICAN GOVERNMENT FEARS JAPANESE ACTION

FINAL VOTE ON NAVAL BILL ON FRIDAY—TARIFF TO BE LOWERED ON MANY IMPORTS

PROMINENT RAILWAY ENGINEERS ARE VISITING PRINCE RUPERT

GOVERNMENT RAILWAY ENGINEER AND CHIEF ENGINEER OF G. T. P. REACH THE CITY THIS MORNING—ARE MAKING A THOROUGH INSPECTION.

Mr. Collingwood Schreiber, government railway engineer, arrived in the city this morning on the steamer Prince George on his annual trip of inspection of the Grand Trunk Pacific lines in the west. Accompanying him are Mr. S. R. Loftus, Mr. B. B. Kellner, chief engineer, and Mr. V. G. Bogue, consulting engineer. Mr. Schreiber has on his western trip personally inspected the main line and carefully examined projected extensions. The party will spend several days in

SIX MEN OF STEAMER CREW ARE ROASTED ALIVE IN BUNKS

ENTRAPPED BY FLAMES THEY HAD NO CHANCE OF ESCAPE TO SAFETY AND MUST HAVE SUFFERED HORRIBLY.

New Westminster, May 10.—Trapped by flames which started from some unknown cause and caught them sleeping in their bunks, six members of the crew of the steamer Ophir, which sailed from Vancouver last night and tied up at the Brunswick wharf, Canoe Pass, near Ladner, in the Fraser River, were roasted to death in a fire which totally destroyed the vessel. The catastrophe happened at 3:30 o'clock this morning.

There were eleven men in the crew, many of them only being signed on in Vancouver last night for the trip to the cannery with a cargo of tin plate. The steamer arrived too late for unloading operations to be started until daylight today and the crew retired after having tied up the vessel to the cannery wharf. One of the seamen, including Captain J. Johannsen, the chief engineer, the mate, the cook and one deckhand, slept in the fore-part of the boat. All these were saved owing to the fact that the mate, awakened by the smoke, alarmed his comrades and escaped to the deck.

Grasping axes these men made their way to where the other six members of the crew were penned in by the flames, which had

UNITED STATES FEARS A JAPANESE ATTACK

Twelve Foreign Vessels Chartered to Carry Explosives from Delaware to Pacific.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, May 14.—The government really fears an attack upon the Pacific Coast by the Japanese as an outcome of the California alien land legislation. What has occurred in the conferences between the Japanese ambassador and the secretary of state has not transpired, but that the situation is apparently serious is shown by the fact that the government has chartered twelve foreign vessels to carry explosives from the Delaware government factory to North Pacific ports. Thirty-six thousand tons of explosives are to be transported as rapidly as possible.

FINAL VOTE ON THE NAVAL BILL ON FRIDAY

Motion to Censure Deputy Speaker for Rulings During the Closure Debate

(Special to The Daily News.)
Ottawa, May 14.—The final vote on the third reading of the naval bill is fixed to take place on Friday morning at 2 o'clock. Yesterday the entire session was taken up in discussing Macdonald's motion to censure Deputy-Speaker Blondin, arising out of certain rulings he made early on Saturday morning, during the turmoil which ensued when the closure rule was first applied.

The estimated expenses for the year of the National Transcontinental railway, according to the budget, are \$21,000,000. Finance Minister White, at the conclusion of his budget speech intimated there might be a lowering of the tariff on many articles, extensions of the British preference and a provision made for West Indian preference. MANY MINING INVESTORS ARE EXPECTED HERE THIS SUMMER

VISIT OF THE INTERNATIONAL GEOLOGISTS BOUND TO BRING A LARGE NUMBER OF CAPITALISTS INTERESTED IN MINERAL DEVELOPMENT.

Charles P. Richardson, the well known mining man, is back in town from business visits to Vancouver, Seattle and Spokane. He says he found business conditions in Vancouver and Seattle quiet. Money is reported by the Public Services Corporation at Vancouver as being way up and at Seattle in both professional and mercantile line business is quiet and collections hard to make. Spokane is far more quiet than either of the cities mentioned. There it looks as if the very active real estate speculation of the past few years has gone the limit, and that people must now be content to hold their properties until the normal and productive growth brings back conditions that will enable them to sell their property at former figures.

As a result of the enforced quiet in real estate, Mr. Richardson finds that there is a marked revival, especially in Spokane, of interest in mining matters and mining development. The successful development of three or four new large properties, largely backed by Spokane money, has stimulated an interest that has been lacking in mining enterprises for years. SOUTH AFRICAN UNION NOW DISCUSSING A NAVAL POLICY

HOUSE COMES TO DECISION TO HOLD CONFERENCE WITH IMPERIAL AUTHORITIES ON METHOD OF AIDING IMPERIAL DEFENCE

Cape Town, May 9.—The question of the contribution of the South African Union to Imperial Defence, which, owing to political reasons, had to be left very much in the background of General Botha's speech at the opening of the House of Assembly, has been raised in a subsequent debate by Major Silburn, one of the Natal Independents.

Major Silburn moved a resolution to the effect that the government should consider without delay a proposal for a contribution to be made annually by the Union to the British navy, such contribution to be commensurate with the importance of the Union.

General Botha, however, proposed an amendment to this resolution, declaring that the House, recognizing the importance of the question, should request the government to consult with the Imperial government to consider what provision should be made for such defence and submit proposals to the House.

In his speech in support of this amendment the Prime Minister advocated a South African fleet for South African waters. "I do not see," he said, "the advantage there is for this country to make an annual contribution. I think if we follow in the footsteps of other Dominions with long experience we shall do much better."

The Prime Minister was emphatic on the importance of naval defence to the development of South Africa and the importance of protection for its sea borne trade, which is something like £5,000,000 and increasing every day.

Sir Thomas Smartt, the Unionist leader, accepted the Premier's amendment on the understanding that there would be a discussion as soon as the House rose "between the Prime Minister, the Minister of Defence, the Imperial government and the British Admiralty to see about the best means of increasing the assistance of the Union to the upkeep of the British navy."

GERMANY'S OPINIONS ON PANAMA TOLLS

Claims that Exemption of American Vessels from Tolls is Unjust Discrimination

Berlin, May 10.—The exemption of American vessels from the payment of tolls for passing through the Panama Canal is unjust and places German shipping at a disadvantage, according to Philip Heineken, managing director of North German Lloyd, who writes in the Tageblatt today. He expresses confidence, however, that German shipping interests are sufficiently powerful and enterprising to maintain competition even under these circumstances.

Herr Heineken hopes under

President Wilson's regime the measure of discrimination will be revoked. He foresees a big immigrant traffic to the Pacific Coast of both the United States and Canada, and in a more limited way also to the states of South America, thus bringing to an end the inundation of the northwestern states.

Twenty Year Sentence.

Vancouver, May 10.—Twenty years' penal servitude in the provincial penitentiary was the sentence passed on Charles Turner this morning by Judge McInnes for robbing the Northern Crown Bank at Central Park last July and making a murderous assault on H. C. Temple, the young cashier.

Hotel Proprietors Disciplined.
 Calgary, May 10.—The King George Hotel must change hands. That is the mandate of the license commissioners of the province. The attitude of the authorities is based on complaints of violation of the liquor ordinance, and the ruling was made today that the present proprietors must dispose of their interests by June 1. The King George is easily the first hotel of the city, and its profits are estimated at from sixty to ninety thousand dollars per annum.

COLONEL ROOSEVELT ON PANAMA TOLLS

Makes a Speech to Peace Centennial Delegates Strongly Arguing for Arbitration.

Oyster Bay, May 10.—Theodore Roosevelt would have the United States and Great Britain agree in advance to arbitrate any question which might arise between them, so he told the international conferees, who are arranging the centennial celebration of peace among English speaking peoples, in addressing them as their host today at luncheon at his home on Sagamore Hill. Newspapermen were not admitted to the function, but a summary of his remarks, "approved by Mr. Roosevelt," was made public.

Although it was said he did not specifically mention the Panama Canal dispute, members of the foreign delegation said that he unmistakably referred to it in speaking of a question as one which should be settled by arbitration if settlement could not be reached by negotiation.

AFFECTS PICTURE SHOWS

New Provincial Act as to Censorship May Cause Rise in Price of Admission

Vancouver, May 10.—The cost of admission to the moving picture shows in British Columbia may be increased owing to the charges to be made by the censorship under the new Act to the Provincial Government. The moving picture theatre managers assert that the fees are 100 per cent. higher than in any other province in Canada. The managers of the houses in Vancouver have decided to call a meeting in the course of the next few days to discuss the situation.

TO JOIN STEFANSSON PARTY FOR THE NORTH

Canada Sending Doctor Who Went to Antarctic with the Shackleton Expedition.

Montreal, May 10.—Dr. A. Forbes Mackay, who was one of the "medical men attached to the expedition to the south polar regions which won Sir Ernest Shackleton his knighthood, was a passenger by the Allan liner Grampan, which arrived here from Glasgow this evening.

Dr. Mackay stated that he had come out to join Mr. Stefansson in his expedition to the far north, and expected to be absent for from three and a half to four years before returning to civilization.

Dr. Mackay had received a letter from Mr. J. Desbarats, of the marine and fisheries department, asking him to come at once to Ottawa in order to organize the vitalizing and other details connected with the voyage of Stefansson's ship, the Karluk. The delay which the Grampan, in common with many other ships, experience owing to adverse weather conditions, has left Dr. Mackay very little time to assist in the organization.

CHINA ACCEPTS LOAN

First Advance Will Be Made by Five Power Group.

Peking, May 10.—The bankers representing the five powers, Great Britain, France, Germany, Russia and Japan, in connection with the loan of \$25,000,000 to China, were notified today by the minister of finance of China's final acceptance of the loan. The first advance will be made today.
