Hotel Proprietors Disciplined. Calgary, May 10 .- The King George Hotel must change hands. That is the mandate of the license commissioners of the province. The attitude of the authorities is based on complaints of violation of the liquor ordinance, and the ruling was made today that the present proprietors must dispose of their interests by June 1. 


