#### LAST SPIKE ON THIS SECTION DRIVEN IN OCTOBER NEXT YEAR

**VICE PRESIDENT DALRYMPLE PROMISES MONTREAL PEOPLE THAT THEY WILL HAVE THROUGH CONNECTION WITH PRINCE RUPERT EARLY IN 1915.**

Montreal, May 15.—"We now begin to see daylight, as one of the greatest enterprises on the continent is being rapidly advanced to completion," was one of the statements made by J. E. Dalrymple, vice president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, who, with G. E. Bell, assistant passenger traffic manager, returned last night from a trip over the completed portion of the system from Lake Superior to Prince Rupert. As a matter of fact, Mr. Dalrymple gave out some important information. One thing he stated was to the effect that the Montreal-Winnipeg-Edmonton section, with intervening points, will be linked up for passenger service by June 7th. **Fierce Tornado Wipes Out a Nebraska Town and Does Immense Damage.**

#### WAGNER TO BE HANGED

**Believed to Have Committed Every Crime in Criminal Calendar.**

Nanaimo, May 15.—Henry Wagner has been sentenced to be hanged August 18th for the murder of Provincial Constable Westaway at Union Bay. He is one of the most notorious criminals of the northwest, and for years has defied arrest on both sides of the international boundary. He is believed to have committed practically every crime in the criminal calendar.

#### FIRST COURT SESSION AT ANYOX YESTERDAY

**David Patton, Squawman, Sentenced to Two Weeks in Gaol and Walter Haldane One Month.**

C.C. Perry, Indian agent, returned this morning from Anyox, where he had been in connection with a couple of cases that were heard at the first court session held in the future smelter city. The first case was that of David Patton, a squawman, ordered off the Indian reserve more than a year ago. He appeared before Dr. Hyde and Dr. McDonald, justices of the peace, and was sentenced to two weeks' imprisonment. Patton was also charged with cutting five trees on the Tack-u-an reserve, but was remanded until further inquiries are made.

#### BALKAN WAR CAUSING TROUBLE IN INDIA

**British Attitude Toward Turkey Again Being Used to Influence the Moslems.**

London, May 12.—"At Bombay, Calcutta and Delhi, Hindus and Mohammedans are openly arrayed, shoulder to shoulder, pledged to work against the sahibs for the regeneration of our common motherland." The passage quoted is from a speech delivered at a recent congress of the All-Indian Moslem League, which has attracted pains attention in England and British India. Officials of the Indian government are heard to declare that unless something is done there may be a cataclysm, worse even than the terrible Sepoy mutiny. England's attitude toward the Turks is being used as a torch with which the Indian Mohammedans hope to light the fires of revolution, and it has all the signs of reaching fruition in deeds of desperation.

#### LOST HIS MEMORY

**Peculiar Case Now Under Treatment at General Hospital.**

A man named Edward Smelling was seen acting strangely on the cemetery road about 7 o'clock last evening, and as he could not give any satisfactory account of himself he was taken to the hospital. He is better today but does not remember anything since last Wednesday. What occasioned this lapse of memory he is at present unable to say. There was found on him a C. P. R. ticket from Vancouver dated April 20th and this appears to be all that is known of him.

#### Road Work in Full Swing.

Road work is now general on the Queen Charlotte Islands, all the camps starting up during the week. Three crews are employed between the Indian village and Tl-el River, the foremen being William Duncan, A. Richardson and N. Schafer. The rock work between the oil works and the Indian village will be started in a week or two. At Sandspit a few men are at work under Nate Ley. The trail from the townsite to the Honna River is now well advanced and will be completed in a few days. The work is under the supervision of T. R. Davey. Nearly 100 men are employed at the various camps.

**NOT MUCH CHANCE OF DISSOLUTION.**

From the recent despatches regarding the progress of the debate on the naval bill and the recourse to the gag law of the closure, one thing seems to be fixed in the political situation at Ottawa: Premier Borden will not go to the country. Probably the party is afraid—as it has good reason to—of not being returned to power. However, no matter what Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his followers may do, and no matter either what the Senate under his direction may do, the Conservative party does not intend to give the Canadian electorate any chance to throw it out of office after so short a term in power. Hence the desperate passage of the closure resolution, which will no doubt, when the naval bill comes up again on Friday, be worked to the limit.

The prime minister is said to have stated that he has no hesitation about going to the country. But there are other men in his immediate following who feel that, after so many years spent in cold storage to the left of the speaker, they should at least, by hook or by crook, secure a full year of solid rest and enjoyment before being asked to stump their constituencies again. In view of the party's determination not to be disturbed in office, no matter the circumstances, will Mr. Borden now begin to reform the Senate and to introduce some kind of gag law there?

**MEXICO SHOULD SEND FOR OLD MAN DIAZ.**

Whether the Huerta government in Mexico is recognized

by other governments or not makes very little difference so far as the outlook is concerned. It is in a very bad way and there is no apparent prospect for a permanent peace or established order under the present regime. Three of the northern states are still practically under the control of revolutionists, and the Zapatists, with undiminished forces, are maintaining their rebellion in the south. The government is confronted by a situation which calls for a much larger army of defence and aggression, and the difficulty is enhanced by the depletion of the national treasury. The Mexican federal soldiery are of doubtful dependence under any regime, and if they are not paid they are readily given to insurgency.

Unless the government can secure a large loan to provide itself with a money supply the situation threatens to become desperate. The business interests of the country are suffering greatly, and, with the uncertainties before them, cannot be expected to come to the aid of the government. The proposed foreign loan has not been effected, and the failure of negotiations in this respect is attributed largely to the delay of the United States in recognizing the Huerta government. However this may be, the Washington government is not to be blamed for withholding recognition until it is convinced that it would not be giving official support to an experiment instead of an established government. Altogether, in view of the continued revolutionary disturbances in Mexico, the outlook for that unhappy republic is far from encouraging.

**TALENTED BAPTIST LECTURER PROVES A VICIOUS WIFE PIRATE**

**REV. W. G. RAY LECTURED HERE ABOUT A YEAR AGO ON THE SUBJECT OF SOUTH AMERICAN COUNTRIES AND THEIR CUSTOMS**

Possibly some few will recall the visit here of Rev. W. G. Ray, F.R.G.S., who lectured in the McIntyre hall on May 7th of last year, with lantern slides, on the South American countries of the Atlantic. He dressed on the streets in a sort of caballero costume that was half miner and half generalissimo and in fact attracted considerable attention. There was nothing shady about the lecture, but the lecturer himself turns out to be a wife pirate and home wrecker of the first mintage, and as such he was placed under arrest at Victoria. The account of the incident in the Colonist tells the whole story as follows:

"Registered on the vessel's sailing list as man and wife, Rev. Mr. Ray, a Baptist minister, and Mrs. H. H. Marshall, wife of a prominent merchant at Calgary, were stopped here yesterday morning by U. S. Immigration Officer Sherman J. Buford, at the outer wharf just as they were about to board the boat en route to San Francisco. Their baggage consisting of eight large trunks and other pieces, had been placed aboard but upon order of the immigration official, whose duty forces him sometimes to interfere with the pranks of Cupid, the pair were forced to remain behind while the vessel which was to bear them to Uncle Sam's domain sailed away.

"En route from Calgary, as fast as the railway can bear him comes the indignant husband to recover his wayward spouse. The woman, following the refusal of the officer to allow her to proceed with her companion to the south, left on yesterday afternoon's boat for Vancouver where, she tearfully informed the immigration officials, she would meet her husband and sue for forgiveness. Rev. Mr. Ray remained in Victoria.

"The action of the immigration officer was taken following the receipt from Calgary of a telegram from Mr. Marshall tell-

ing of the elopement of his wife with the reverend gentleman. The husband had ascertained that they intended to leave on the boat for San Francisco and urged their detention. Prior to the receipt of this message Rev. Mr. Ray had called at the office of the United States immigration authorities here and secured passage for himself and the woman, stating that they were man and wife.

"Inspector Buford, with the telegram from the husband in his pocket was waiting at the wharf when the couple put in an appearance yesterday morning at 8 o'clock. He called the man aside and made enquiries. At first Mr. Ray stoutly maintained that the woman with him was his wife, but when shown the telegram from the rightful lord and master of the woman he admitted that the story was false. Then the woman was taken to one side and questioned and she also stuck to the story of being the wife of the Rev. Mr. Ray, but when confronted with the telegram and her supposed husband's admissions she collapsed and amid tears also admitted the deception. The baggage was hustled ashore and the vessel proceeded.

"The local police authorities took no action in the case. The woman consented to return home. At least she left on the afternoon boat for Vancouver. The husband was notified and he promptly replied that he was leaving immediately for Vancouver.

"Rev. Ray is stated to have a wife and two children living in Toronto. He met Mrs. Marshall in Calgary and an acquaintance ripened into an attachment strong enough to induce the woman to desert her home and elope with him. Ray stated yesterday that it had been his intention after visiting San Francisco to go to Australia.

"Rev. Mr. Ray was here about a year ago and lectured in several of the churches, his subjects

dealing with South America. He has been here this last time for a few days in company with Mrs. Marshall and the pair were awaiting the arrival of the steamer."

**VANCOUVER JUDGE IS SUED BY GOVERNMENT**

**Exchequer Court Action to Recover Money Paid to Mr. Justice Clement.**

Ottawa, May 13—A unique suit has been entered in the exchequer court here, the defendant in which is Mr. Justice W. H. P. Clement of the supreme court of British Columbia.

The action is being taken by the Dominion government to recover the sum of \$4,290, which it is alleged Mr. Justice Clement was paid upon false representations as to his travelling expenses. The statement, which has been filed in the exchequer court, declares that from August, 1907, to March, 1910, Judge Clement represented that he was residing in Grand Forks, B. C., when as a matter of fact his real place of residence was Vancouver. He charged travelling expenses on the basis of residence in Grand Forks and filed applications and certificates to this effect.

The statement filed here goes on to say: "The said defendant in said applications and certificates falsely and fraudulently stated and represented that his residence during the whole of said period was at Grand Forks, B. C., whereas the fact was and is that the said defendant during said period resided in the city of Vancouver."

Judge Clement was appointed to the supreme court of British Columbia on December 7, 1906.

Of the suffragettes who have been burning houses and setting bombs he said: "I hate them like poison," and added that "parliament will never grant suffrage to women at the point of the hat-pin."

He insisted that the movement is an hysterical outbreak of a few women who have nothing else to do, a fad from which the agitators would have to turn to anti-vivisection or some other hobby if suffrage was granted.
