tion of the correctness of the report that Mr. L. V. Harcourt, now at the head of the Colonial Office, may almost immediately succeed the Duke of Connaught as governor general of Canada. One can hardly think that a cabinet minister of large ambitions would care to break up his political connections to take a post which is diplomatic rather than administrative. Mr. Harcourt will have to bid goodbye to the house of comas the appointment involve his call to the At least this is a part of the report as to his appointment. But Canadians do not care very much whether the next viceroy is a peer or a commoner, and would probably enjoy the novelty of greeting one who has no title. It would not be the first. Lord Lisgar. the first governor general after confederation, was not a peer at the time of his appointment, though he was made one by the time his term ended. He had held several offices in the min-

istry. Lord Dufferin was chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and a member of the cabinet when he was appointed to Canada. The Marquis of Lorne had been a member of the commons but had held no government office. Lord Lansdowne had been under secretary for war and for India, and was appointed from the latter office. Lord Stanley had been head of the war, colonial and board of trade departments. Neither Lord Aberdeen, Lord Minto nor Lord Grey was in

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


