## TWO MEMBERS OF SCOTT PARTY HERE TOMORROW

### HOW PRESIDENT WILSON HANDLES JAPANESE NETTLE—BORDEN AGAIN PLEADING EMERGENCY

#### WILSON HANDLING THE NETTLE OF KEEN INTEREST TO BRITAIN

BECAUSE POLITICAL QUESTIONS INVOLVED SO CLOSELY AFFECT THE GOVERNMENT POLICIES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA AND AUSTRALIA.

Tokio, May 20.—A large section of the Japanese press bitterly denounces the reply of Governor Johnson to President Wilson. They describe it as strongly anti-Japanese and as illegal and unjust.

London, May 20.—The Daily News this morning says England is keenly interested in watching how President Wilson handles the Japanese nettle, because the political questions involved so closely affect the policies of British Columbia and Australia. #### HAYSPORT DROWNING AFFAIR LEADS TO INVESTIGATIONS

HARBOR MASTER REFUSED CLEARANCE PAPERS TO THE CAPTAIN THIS MORNING—NO LIFE PRESERVERS WHEN ACCIDENT HAPPENED.

From the information so far obtained it appears that the captain of the Haysport became somewhat confused in his helm. Instead of reversing the engine the boat went ahead and circled around to where the body had disappeared. An unfortunate feature of the affair is that the Haysport was not properly equipped with life preservers and life buoys. This morning the Haysport was lying alongside the Government wharf with an entire outfit of life preservers. This morning Harbor Master McCoskrie refused the captain of the Haysport clearance papers pending further investigations of a serious character.

#### SIR WILFRID FAVORS THE LEAD BOUNTIES

Says that Had they Not Been Given Years Ago Industry Could Not Exist.

Ottawa, May 20.—At the afternoon sitting of the House of Commons yesterday a discussion to renew the lead bounties developed a miniature tariff debate. Michael Clark, of Red Deer, claimed that bounty was the worst kind of protection. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that he was himself a free trader but local conditions had to be considered. Lead bounties had not been given unclad that he had to contend against a hostile American tariff.

#### VERY LITTLE DOING AT CITY COUNCIL

Proposition to Increase Salary of Police Magistrate Held Until Return of Mayor Pattullo.

The meeting of the city council last night was one of the briefest in its history. It was all over in half an hour. There were no communications and only one committee, the finance, reported. One by-law, in regard to metering the city water, was introduced by Ald. McCaffery but was laid over until the next meeting of the council.

The finance committee reported, in regard to the proposition of the police commissioners that the police magistrate's salary be increased from \$100 to \$150 per month, that inasmuch as the mayor, the presiding officer of the police board, had written to the council opposing such increase at the present time, the matter be left in abeyance until the mayor's return. The report was adopted on the motion of Ald. Bullock-Webster, seconded by Ald. Leek.

Motions were carried that Acting-Mayor Naden act in the mayor's place on the police board and the licensing board.

The report of the finance committee recommending the payment of accounts for the last month, totalling \$27,417.11 was adopted.

Council having declared next Monday to be a holiday the next meeting of the council will be on Tuesday evening.

#### RETAIL STORES INCREASING

Two New Stores Opened in the Addition to the Hart Block

With the constant increase in the population of Prince Rupert there is a corresponding growth in the retail business section of the city. One of the latest additions is an up-to-date tobacco store which has already been designated as Fitz. It is located in the new addition to the Hart block, on Third avenue and the proprietors are Fitzmaurice and McMillan. The location is one of the most central in the city, which coupled with the popularity of the management, will ensure a liberal patronage. The store itself is equipped with the most modern fittings and the cigars and tobaccos are attractively displayed.

Another new store in the Hart block is an up-town branch of the Prince Rupert Dairy. This is to be used as a central depot for fresh milk, cream and buttermilk. It is also being fitted up as an ice cream parlor and other light refreshments will likely be served.

#### TWO SCOTT HEROES

Will Arrive Tomorrow Morning on the Prince Rupert.

The brother referred to is A. E. Wright, of the firm of Messrs. Ritchie & Agnew. Mr. Wright has also received a wire that his brother Charles will arrive here tomorrow morning, together with Mr. Debenham, who was one of the geologists on the Scott expedition.

#### WHOLESALE SLAUGHTER BY INDIAN HUNTERS

Moose, Caribou and Deer Being Killed for Skins and Meat Left to Rot.

Coming out from the Groundhog, Amos Godfrey and W. J. Sweeney passed the camp of an Indian who had killed eleven moose says the Omineca Miner. The Siwash had his kiootchman and a child with him but it was evident that they had no intention of using the meat of more than one moose. The animals had simply been killed for their hides, which, after dressing, bring about seven dollars each. At this season, when the moose are yarded in the willows, they are easily slaughtered, and Indians are reported to have killed a considerable number in the Groundhog district.

George Beirnes, on a trip to the coalfield, employed an Indian, who left him to follow a moose, which he killed on a mountain from which it was impossible to recover the meat, even had it been needed. George discharged the native, leaving him to eat the moose.

These instances are not exceptional. At Francois Lake, a couple of years ago, one Indian killed twenty-two deer—on the spring crust. The animals, which were in very poor condition, were left to rot, according to witnesses.

#### TWO LIVES LOST IN GRANBY DISASTER

Dam Gave Way and Swept Everything Before It—Damage Amounts to \$100,000.

At an early hour on Monday morning the dam at Granby on Observatory Inlet gave way and the flood of water carried everything before it. Fortunately the accident occurred before the men had started to work, otherwise the loss of life would have been very heavy. As it was two lives were lost, a Japanese woman who lived close to the dam and an Austrian workman. The dam, which was nearly completed, held back about 340 acres of water.

The old power house nearer the waterfront was swept away by the flood, thus leaving the camp without power or light. The total loss is estimated at \$100,000. The Granby Company will, no doubt, start at once to rebuild the dam.

**THE GREATEST LIBERAL MEETING EVER SEEN.**

We are enabled to give on another page a picture of the great Liberal demonstration which Tory Toronto gave to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He went there and delivered a brilliant argument on the naval bill after that measure had been reported back to the house from the committee of the whole. But, interesting as the subject undoubtedly is to all Canadians, it was the man himself that was the great attraction. And this because all true citizens rejoice in the stainless character of the one man who has lived for forty years unshamed in the fiercest light of Canadian politics. Against him the tongue of calumny has done its worst. The quivers of party antagonism have emptied at him all their shafts. Yet unscathed and unsoured, his reputation without blame, he stands erect in the presence of his foes.

As the Toronto Globe eloquently stated the morning after the great gathering: "Neither racial prejudice nor the implacable animosity of religious strife availed in the end against the high sincerity of his purpose and the undisguised integrity of his life. It is good for Canadians, especially for young Canadians with ambitions for public service, to see at least one Canadian statesman of three score years and ten with character unblemished by ruthless slander and spirit unbroken by seeming defeat."

Again, speaking of Sir Wilfrid in particular connection with the meeting, the same great Liberal journal says: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier stands, and ever stood, for the larger freedom of the many against the domination, even the benevolent domination, of the few. Affirming that faith with distinct emphasis in these days when a reactionary majority in parliament harks back to the worst forms of class privilege—the privilege not of the aristocracy but of the arrogant—the great Liberal chief won a triumph in the Arena meeting last night which makes his personality, like the personality of Gladstone in Britain, a lasting inspiration in the higher politics of Canada and a dynamic in Canadian life whose power will be felt long after the voice has passed into silence. The scene last night in the Arena building, and in all the streets that led to its doors, was a tribute to personality of which Toronto may well be proud. It was the great triumph of a great man."

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier visited Prince Rupert and other cities of this Tory-ridden province his receptions were also enthusiastic everywhere; politics, as against his fame and personality, faded into the background. It was something to be proud of to greet him here, in the town he may be said to have founded by his transcontinental railway policy. Let us hope he may be able to keep his pledge to us and visit us again on the first through train.

**PLAN TO CHALLENGE LIBERALS AT THE COURTS OF REVISION**

**ROAD MONEY BEING SPENT IN THE INTERIOR OF THIS PROVINCE FOR THE INTERESTS OF THE CONSERVATIVE MACHINE**

"We do not expect an election; we will not have one if we can avoid it, but it will be just as well to be prepared for eventualities" was the purport of the message from Ottawa given to the Conservative party of British Columbia at a meeting of the provincial executive held in the Conservative rooms at Vancouver. Secrecy surrounds the meeting. It was said that matters of party management were alone considered. It was also admitted that the meeting had in hand the arrangements for the representation of the party at the various courts of revision of the voters' lists, which will be held at the end of the month, says a special despatch to the Victoria Times.

It is the intention to challenge as many of the names put on by the Liberals and by the Labor party as possible, in the

hope of exhausting the patience of the men in attendance at the revision courts from the opposition.

Members of the Conservative executive who came from the interior brought what they consider gratifying reports of the position of the party. The road money and the other financial property of the whole people of the province is being laid out to the best advantage for the interests of the Conservative machine and no Liberals are allowed a chance on the works if there are any Tories or would-be Tories in sight.

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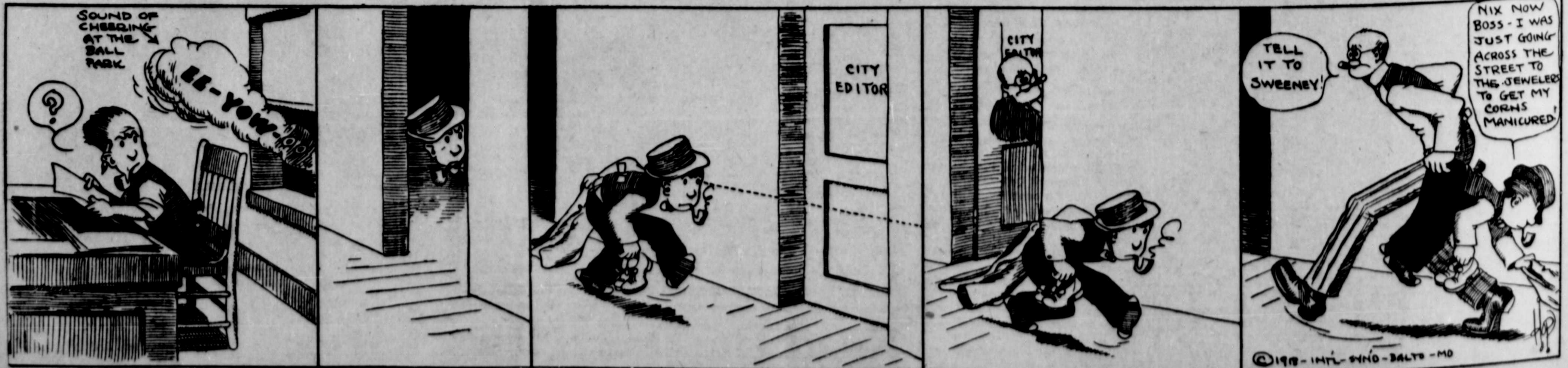

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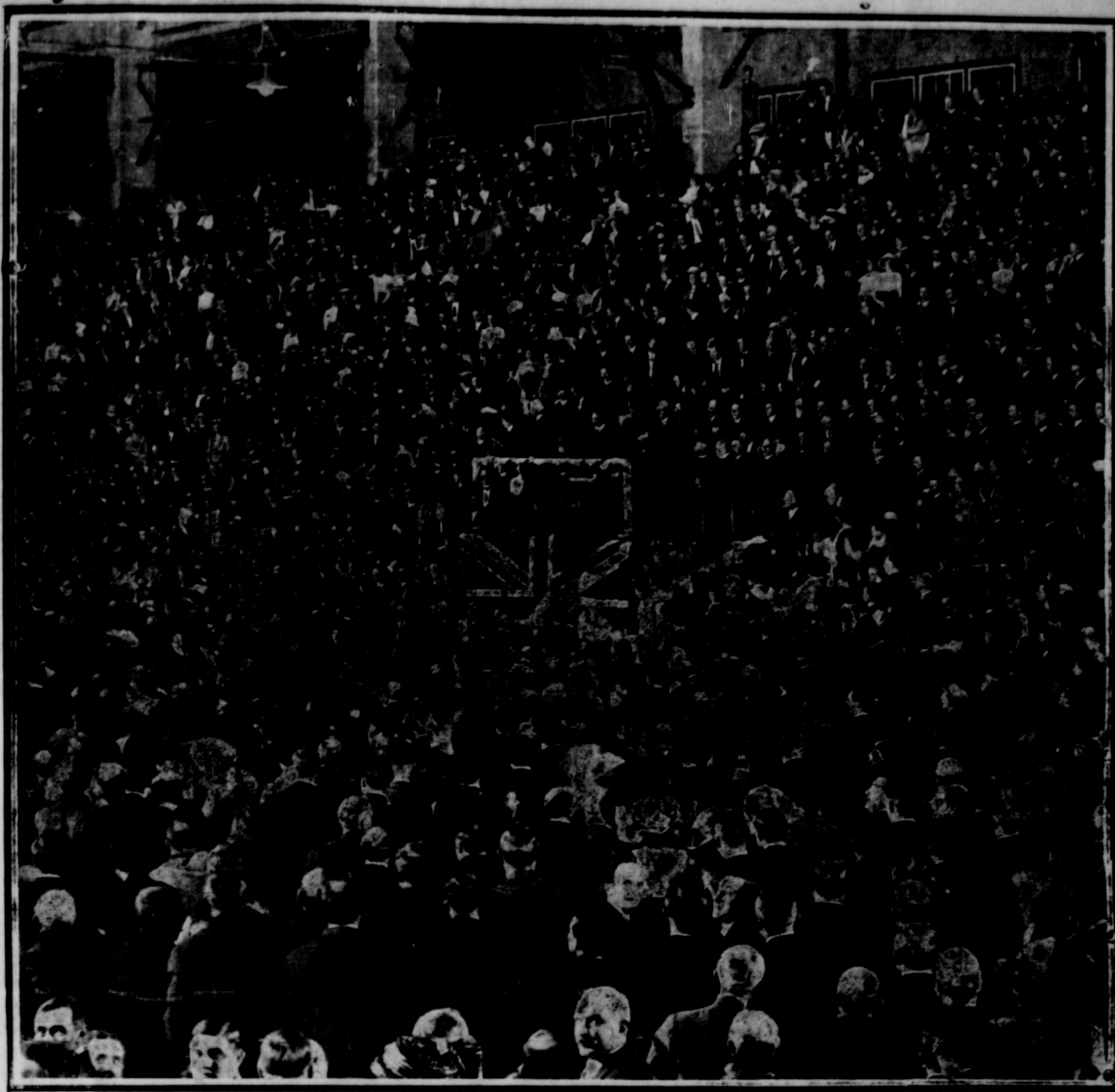

"Years ago, you will remember, Toronto had her garrison. Quebec had her garrison. Montreal had her garrison. These garrisons have been withdrawn, and Canada has filled the gap with our own militia. (Applause.) Should not we young nations of Empire strengthen the motherland by replacing her overseas fleets by squadrons built and manned by the young nations? (Renewed applause.) This was the policy laid down in 1909. This is the policy followed by Liberalism in 1913. But what are we told? What does the Government say now? No, we cannot do it." "Sir, in a few words you have now the policy of the two parties. On the one hand, you have the policy of the men who posed as the apostles of loyalty, stating that England is in a state of decadence, that she is not equal to the task which is before her; and, on the other hand, you have the policy of those who say, 'No, England is the same as the England of the past. She can fight her battles, for the cubs of the lion will come forward and take their share in the fray.' And I leave it to you, men of Toronto, and of the Province of Ontario, to decide between us."

ROMANCE STORY ATTACHING TO OLD WAR CLAIMS OF CANADA

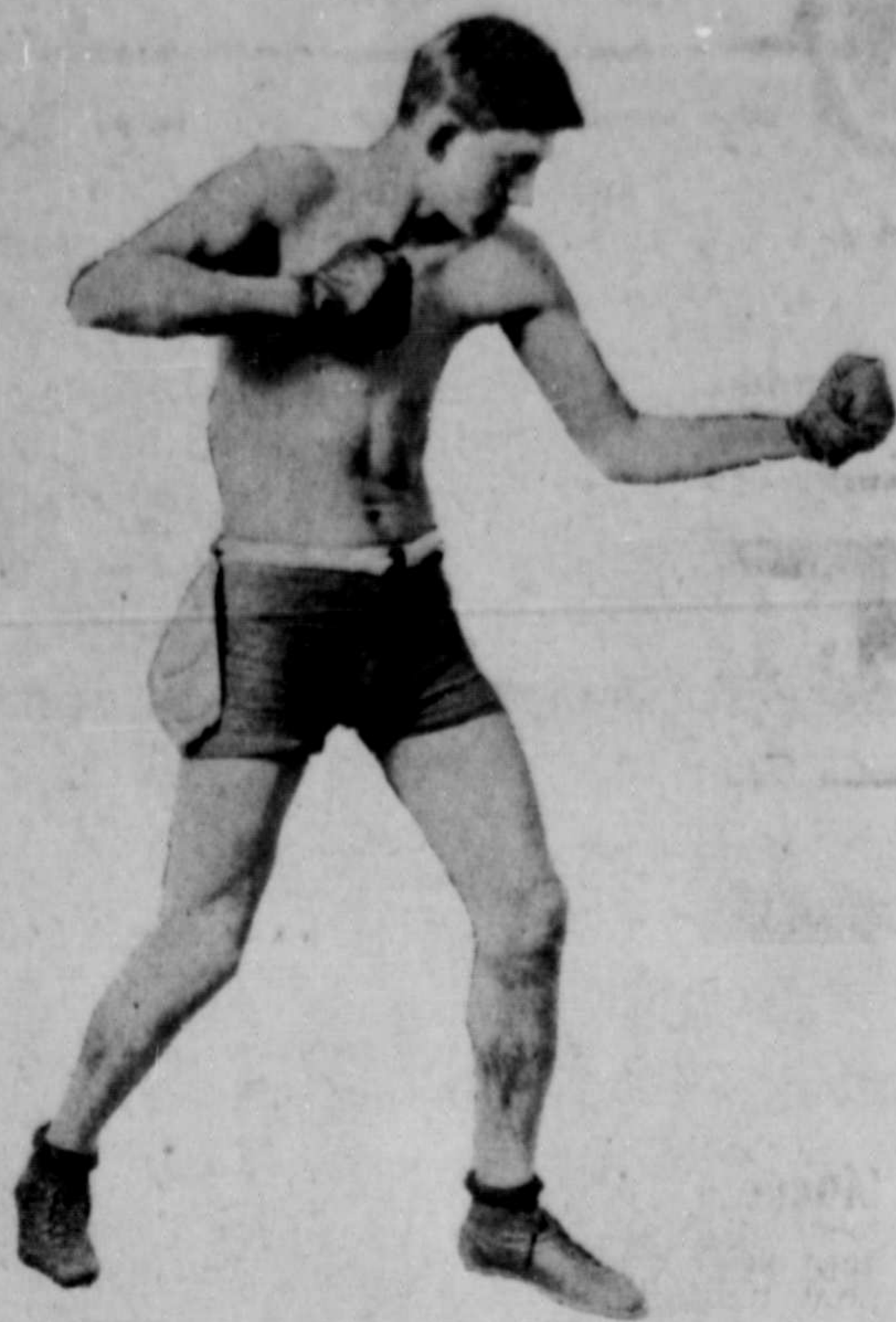
CENTURY OLD CLAIM AGAINST UNITED STATES FOR SEIZURE OF VESSEL ON GREAT LAKES NOW AMOUNTS TO LARGE SUM. Washington, May 15—Theron Ridd, when he absconded with \$5,000, less \$183 awarded to a British shipowner for the seizure of his vessel on the Great Lakes two weeks before the outbreak of the war in 1812, not only impoverished the United States district court of New York of which he was clerk, but also started a controversy that has existed since. The case has now come up before the international tribunal for the settlement of pecuniary claims, which is in session here. Henry James Bethune of Canada, is the claimant. He is the heir of the shipowner and he has pressed his claims under many administrations and before many congresses. Its legality was never seriously questioned but for some reason or other the legislation necessary to meet it always has failed. The \$5,000, minus \$183, plus 6 per cent. compound interest since 1812, more than a century, reaches a handsome amount.

### FLYTIME IS NEARING AND WARNING GIVEN

House Fly Plays Prominent Part in the Spread of All Kinds of Disease.

Housekeepers will shortly receive a pamphlet prepared by L. E. MacFarlane, the sanitary inspector of the city, and when they read therein what a formidable enemy to life is the common fly they are liable to have a nervous fit every time they hear one buzzing. Although Mr. MacFarlane makes as strong a brief on the subject as possible, there is no statement overdrawn, and both housekeepers and stable owners will do well to take his warning seriously.

### WHAT THE MORTGAGEE MAY NOT LEGALLY DO

Cannot "Improve" Mortgagee Out of Possibility of Redeeming Mortgage Property.

Vancouver, May 17.—The court of appeal recently sustained judgment handed down by Mr. Justice Gregory in the suit of the Manitoba Lumber Company to redeem a mortgage given Mr. James S. Emerson in connection with lands at Eburne comprising a mill site of approximately five acres.

The decision was handed down yesterday afternoon. According to this decision the lumber company has the privilege of redeeming the lands without considering the improvements, totalling \$106,000, put in by Mr. Emerson. The court held that a mortgage in possession cannot "improve" a mortgagee out of his property.

In 1908 the lumber company secured moneys from Mr. Emerson and gave him a mortgage for \$30,000. The company did not meet the payment when it came due and secured other loans from Mr. Emerson.

Mr. Emerson then was given a conveyance of the property, agreeing not to register for nine months and to pay a monthly rental for the mill. At the expiration of the redemption period Mr. Emerson registered his title to the property, took possession and expended \$160,000 in a new plant.

Chinda believe that the time has arrived to finally settle all possible points of the controversy, and they have determined there is a common ground upon which they can meet to draw up such a convention.

No definite information of what the Japanese protest against the California land bill contained has yet been made public here. It is admitted, however, that the protest is general in character but it is denied that it definitely demands that Japanese be declared eligible to citizenship.

Persons familiar with the situation state that the protest is based on a feeling that there is an effort everywhere in the United States to discriminate against the Japanese because they are ineligible to citizenship. The protest asks, the president to remedy this discrimination.

The diplomats now here, as a whole, think that a new treaty between Japan and the United States is imperative.

Sacramento, May 20.—Governor Johnson yesterday signed the anti-alien land act, which will now come into force ninety days from this date. A portion of the populace is agitating for a vote of the people on this vexed question.
