ANTI-JAPANESE LEGISLATION

California's legislators proceeded on their own course undeterred by the arguments of that great spell-binder William Jennings Bryan, Governor Johnson signed the alien land act on Saturday and the state of Califoria has thus left it to President Wilson and Secretary of State Bryan to placate, as best they can, the angry Japanese protesters against the act depriving their countrymen of the right to own agricultural land in the DRIFTS BACK. state of the Golden Gate.

It is difficult to see any good reason why the Japanese should manifest hostility at such action by California and Nevada, the latter having passed a similar measure, or why the United States government should give such great heed to their protests. It was unquestionably a measure of self-protection. Not only that Japan herself has a very similar law in force against foreign ownership of her soil. Nor can the president and his cabinet accomplish anything in face of the resolution of the people of California. The state's right to regulate its own internal affairs is undoubted, and its population are the best judges of what is for their own interests. 


