



## BULGARIA GOING TO WAR WITH GREECE AND SERVIA

### JAPAN SENDS UNCLE SAM A FRIENDLY NOTE—STEAMER BLOWN UP BY MINE IN SMYRNA BAY

#### JAPAN AT ONCE ACKNOWLEDGES AMERICA'S REPLY TO PROTEST

IS DISTINCTLY FRIENDLY AND CONVEYS NO PREDICTION OF ENSUING STEPS TO BE TAKEN BY THE JAPANESE GOVERNMENT.

Washington, May 22.—The Japanese government has acknowledged the receipt of the reply of the United States to Japan's protest against the California alien legislation. The acknowledgment appears to be of a preliminary nature. It conveys no prediction of ensuing steps to be taken by Japan, but in general reflects the favorable view in Tokyo in which the American note is regarded. The despatch related also that the Japanese government realized fully the difficulties under which Wash-

ington labored in handling such situations, having a full understanding of the dual system of government of the United States and the powers of legislation held by the state of California.

#### GENERAL ELECTION PREDICTED WITHIN EIGHT WEEKS

Ottawa, May 22.—Unless the government is willing to abandon the Naval Bill an election seems almost certain. In yesterday's caucus the Liberals decided that the future welfare of Canada and the Empire demanded an expression from the people upon the proposals contained in the bill. It is believed the discussion of the measure by the senate will be opened today and that, it having been so fully debated in the house, the senate will not spend much time in its deliberation. It has been freely stated in the newspapers that it is the intention of Senator Lougheed, the head of the chamber, to move a similar motion to the one he made when Sir Wilfrid Laurier was premier, and which resulted in the last election. It is predicted here in some quarters that the government will go to the country within the next eight weeks.

#### LIBERAL MEETING TONIGHT IS BOUND TO PROVE INTERESTING

GENERAL ELECTION IN THE AIR WILL STIMULATE LIBERALISM—SELECTION OF DELEGATES FOR REVELSTOKE CONVENTION

Duncan Ross, the Liberal candidate at the last election, will be among the speakers, and the meeting is bound, under the circumstances, to prove one of surpassing interest.

#### PRINCE ALBERT IS STRANDED ON ROCKS AT PORT SIMPSON

RAN ON REEF WHILE MAKING LANDING—IS EXPECTED TO FLOAT AT HIGH TIDE TONIGHT

The G. T. P. steamer Prince Albert which left here shortly after midnight for Port Simpson and the northern parts of the Queen Charlotte Islands met with an unfortunate accident while attempting to make the wharf at Port Simpson about four o'clock this morning. The steamer ran on a reef not more than two hundred yards from the wharf and is now resting high and dry. When the steamer struck it was running at almost half speed, according to the reports of the passengers who returned to Prince Rupert by the Venture at nine o'clock this morning. The passengers, who were asleep when the steamer struck were awakened by the impact and at the same instant there was a most alarming list. The passengers rushed on deck in their night clothes and for a few moments there was considerable excitement. As soon as they learned they were so close to shore and the full particulars of the accident their fears were allayed.

After the accident happened the passengers, numbering over seventy, were transferred to the Venture and brought back to this city, arriving here at nine o'clock this morning. It is expected that the Albert will return here tonight and if not seriously damaged complete its trip to the Queen Charlotte Islands. Among those on board the Albert last night was a party of provincial government surveyors, under Mr. Gillespie, en route to the district surrounding Naden Harbor, where they expect to spend the next six months surveying a tract of 100,000 acres of settlement land.

There was also a party of Icelanders who intend engaging in the fishing industry off the Queen Charlottes. Thos. Deasy, Indian Agent, and E. J. Tingley, of Queenstown, were also passengers.

An unfortunate feature of the accident is the disappointment to the St. Andrew's Society which had completed all arrangements for an excursion to Port Simpson on Saturday via the Prince Albert. If possible arrangements will be made for the Port Simpson of the Hudson Bay Co., to make the trip.

**PRATING OF PEACE  
 ALL POPPYCOCK.**

The hero of "The Crown of Thorns and Cross of Gold" got off some rather mixed metaphors at the breakfast given last week by the Army and Navy Club of Washington to the foreign delegates preparing for the centenary celebration of the treaty of Ghent. Secretary of State Bryan said these peace celebrations were in the nature of the building of the greatest superdreadnought to be called "Friendship." "Its compass is the heart," he said; "its shells carry goodwill; its missiles are projected by the smokeless powder of love; its captain is the Prince of Peace. I want you to drink with me to the battleship of 'Friendship.' No target will withstand that which Friendship sends abroad."

There was once a wealthy woman of New York state who believed she could acquire distinction by having an historical painting of the first great international arbitration case, which resulted in what is known as the Alabama Award, sent in her name to Queen Victoria and hung in Windsor Castle. The great painting showing the arbitration commission was unveiled at a Delmonica banquet. There were present the President of the United States and several members of his cabinet, Chauncey Depew, General Horace Porter, Joseph Choate—all then in the zenith of their fame as after dinner speakers—and Colonel "Bob" Ingersoll. All had spoken, as Bryan, Carnegie and others are speaking today, of the blessings of arbitration and the days when wars

shall be no more. That was naturally and necessarily the text of the evening.

It happened just this once, with such a galaxy of oratorical talent, that Ingersoll was among the last speakers. And did he take the cue? Not at all. His text was: "The olive branch of peace must ever be tendered in the mailed hand." Is not that as true today as it was then, over a quarter of a century ago? What good of a nation to prate of Peace unless it has Force behind it? Universal peace has been hovering in the distance any time these last fifty years. It still hovers.

**AWAKENING OF THE  
 CHINESE EMPIRE.**

On a recent Sunday the great awakening of the Chinese Empire was the theme of sermons and prayers in many churches throughout the English speaking world. Mr. John Archibald, who has spent 37 years in China as representative of the National Bible Society of Scotland, and who recently arrived to London from Hankow, told a Daily News representative that the Chinese people had a great future under the present republic—provided that republic is recognized at once by the great powers.

"For four thousand years," Mr. Archibald said, "the Chinese have held to ancestor worship and the teaching of Confucius. But all that is changing. With the coming of the republic caste has been abolished. The Manchus had already become effete, and the prophesy that they would be beggared their bread has been fulfilled. Confucianism has gone and China is left without a religion."

**BRITISH BOATS CHARTERED  
 TO CARRY COAL TO PACIFIC**

**PALL MALL GAZETTE THINKS THERE IS POSSIBILITY OF A  
 CONFLICT BETWEEN JAPAN AND UNITED STATES  
 OVER ALIEN LAND ACT**

London, May 19—It is stated here that a number of steamers have been chartered in England during the last ten days, by the American Government, with a view of replenishing the stock of coal for the use of American warships on the Pacific coast.

This activity on the part of the United States navy department is regarded, in shipping circles, as an indication of the possibility that a demonstration in the Pacific is contemplated.

It is not expected, of course, that the tension between the United States and Japan will result in an open rupture between the two nations.

"Should war break out the sympathies of Australia, New Zealand, and Western Canada would be violently on the side of the United States," says the Pall Mall Gazette today, in discussing the California alien land ownership controversy.

The paper considers that it would be a grave mistake to underestimate the chances of a conflict between the United States and Japan. It says:

"The opinion that Japan will never go to war to enforce her treaty rights in California is one of those dangerous generalities which lead nations blindfold to the brink of the pit."

**VANCOUVER MAY BE  
 BRITISH NAVAL BASE**

Reported in London that Admiralty Approves this as a Strategic Point

London, May 19—The absence of the leading officials of the admiralty on a visit to the Mediterranean precludes official information or denial of the statement which has been reported here that the Admiralty, in conjunction with the Canadian Government, has approved a scheme for converting the harbor of Greater Vancouver into a strategic war base.

It is generally expected, however, that, in view of the expected increase in shipping on the North Pacific, such a naval base is essential as part of Canada's permanent naval policy. The nearest naval base now is at Hong Kong. The Australian Commonwealth is creating a base at Fremantle with the co-operation of the British Admiralty, and it is fully expected that Canada will follow suit, thus greatly strengthening the striking power of the Empire navy in Pacific waters should the occasion arise.

It is also stated that the governments of Britain and Canada are considering the establishment of a naval base at Port Nelson, in view of the opening of the Hudson Bay route.

**ALL CANADIAN LINERS  
 TO BE FULLY ARMED**

Also Those Steamships Plying to Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India.

London, May 17.—All the principal liners plying to Canada, Australia and South Africa are likely to be armed in the future if another admiralty scheme goes into effect. The naval governing body is prepared to provide these vessels with guns and possibly a hundred rounds of ammunition for each ship.

As the scheme now stands the gun crews will consist of naval reservists and the admiralty will pay each member of such crew an extra three pence daily, while gunlayers will receive an extra nine pence per diem. Naval reserve officers at the terminal ports will be responsible for the training of the crews.

The Morning Post of today speaks highly of the idea and considers it a move in the right direction. The newspaper expresses a strong hope that the admiralty will be enabled to put its scheme into effect.

**Another Aviator Record.**  
 The French aviator, Marcell G. Grindeljeon des Houlinais, carrying a passenger, made a flight from Hendon and Calais and back without landing, a total distance of 100 miles, in 55 minutes.

**TO TOUCH THE BUTTON**

Queen Mary Will Perform the Unique Ceremony Next Month

Queen Mary has consented to perform the opening ceremony of a new hospital at Weston, Ontario, early in June. Her Majesty will not visit Canada for the purpose, but at Buckingham Palace will press a button to close the circuit of an electric current which will set in motion machinery by which the doors of the new institution will be opened.

The Duke of Connaught sought Her Majesty's consent to perform this ceremony. The hospital, which is to bear Her Majesty's name, has been erected by the National Sanatorium Association for the accommodation of children suffering from tuberculosis.

A sequel to the big Laurier demonstration in Toronto Monday week is that somebody printed and distributed—largely among Conservatives—about two thousand cards of admission, almost a facsimile of the legitimate cards issued and signed by Mr. F. G. Inwood, the organizing secretary. Not only did the admissions through these tickets squeeze out a corresponding number of the faithful who came, some from far distant parts of the province, with legitimate credentials to hear the "Big Chief," but, according to some Liberals, it was a part of a plot on the part of local Conservatives to break up the meeting. If it was a plot it failed miserably, for the five thousand good and true Liberal supporters totally swamped any hecklers who attempted counter demonstrations. Detectives are now endeavoring to find the printer. A close inspection of the two tickets will show a somewhat different style of type and a discrepancy in the signature. The first in the illustration is the forged, the second the real ticket.

LEAVE NORTH DAKOTA FOR PEACE COUNTRY

Forty Austrian Families Said to Have a Credit of a Million Dollars or More.

Vancouver, May 19.—As a forerunner of forty Austrian families, owning and representing wealth to the extent of \$1,000,000 or more, Mr. Geo. Platzer himself one of the wealthiest of the group, left Vancouver yesterday for Fort George. His object is to locate sufficient land to supply the forty families, which are at present successfully operating farms in North Dakota in the vicinity of Mandan.

REVOLVER THAT HITS TARGET EVERY TIME

Arrangements of Light and Lenses Showing Where Bullet is Certain to Strike.

A frightful addition has been made to the efficacy of the revolver by a French inventor. A small but powerful electric light is attached to the mechanism of a pistol of ordinary size. By use of lenses and mirrors, the glare of the circle of light which the lamp throws is bright enough to be clearly seen in daylight against so dark an object as a light colored suit of clothes. Now the centre of the circle of light, marked by a black spot, by arrangement of the lenses, is exactly the spot where the bullet will strike. Thus, all one has to do is to place the black centre of the blazing circle of light over the heart of an adversary and pull the trigger. At night the light is shockingly strong. Experiments with the new weapon show that perfect greenhorns, who have never used a revolver in their lives, can shoot far more accurately than experts using an ordinary pistol. Up to sixty yards one cannot miss a small bull-eye, day or night, while extremely accurate shooting is possible up to a hundred yards.

WHEN THE YUKON ICE STARTS MOVING DOWN

Summer Activity is Renewed Throughout Territory—Some Happenings in Dawson.

Dawson, May 15.—The Yukon river opened at Dawson at 5 o'clock this afternoon, and it is expected that the waterway will be clear from Labarge down within a week, when the first steamers wintering here will start for Fairbanks for fresh supplies. Summer activity has been renewed everywhere in the Klondike camps. There is plenty of labor available. All the dredges in the district are now running in full blast. The season has been very backward and the hydraulics are just starting. Snow has scarcely started to leave the high hills and valleys. Gold is now coming in from the creeks very plentifully and first shipments to the coast will be made as soon as the river opens sufficiently to permit navigation.

MORE STOLEN BILLS PASSED IN CHICAGO

Were Stolen from New Westminster Branch of the Bank of Montreal

Chicago, May 20.—Half of the \$271,000 stolen by four bank robbers from the Bank of Montreal's branch in New Westminster, in September, 1911, was brought to Chicago, according to J. H. Schumacher, of the Pinkerton Detective Agency. Nearly a \$100,000 of the loot has been changed into United States money by saloon keepers in Chicago, says Schumacher. Michael J. Flannigan, who was arrested early yesterday morning by Pinkerton and Chicago detectives, is said to have obtained some of the American money in exchange. Three other saloon-keepers are under surveillance and other arrests may follow.

CAPTAIN SCOTT'S ESTATE

Property Left by Late Explorer Valued at \$16,500.

London, May 19.—The estate left by Captain Robert F. Scott, the British explorer who perished on his way back from the South Pole, amounts to \$16,500, according to his will, which was offered for probate yesterday. King George gave an audience yesterday to Commander Evans, who was second in command of the Scott expedition, and heard from him a narrative of their travels and the tragedy. The King conferred on Commander Evans the order of Commander of the Bath.

BIG STRIKE BREWING

All the English Railroads May Be Tied Up Soon

London, May 19.—There have been threats of trouble on the Great Northern Railway for several days in consequence of the suspension and firing of Chappell, an engine driver, for failure to report for duty on time. Officials of the company had a conference yesterday with the delegates of the men's union but they failed to reach a settlement. At mass meetings on Sunday a resolution was adopted calling on the National Union of Railwaymen and the Engineers' Union to demand the immediate reinstatement of Chappell, and if this is refused to give twenty-four hours notice of a general strike.

BRITISH COLUMBIA'S OFFICES IN LONDON

That Old Landmark, the Continental Hotel, Will Have to Come Down.

London, May 19.—The old Continental Hotel at Lower Regent and Charles streets, one of London's best known landmarks, and for many years a rendezvous for supper parties, has been sold to British Columbia, and in a few weeks will be torn down with the three adjoining buildings to make way for the big office building which will be the London headquarters of the most westerly Canadian province.

The decision of British Columbia to go to Regent street is a severe blow to Earl Grey, who has been trying to make Aldwich Crescent the centre for the colonial government buildings.

TO ATTACK CITY BY AIR, LAND AND SEA

Mexican Insurgents Planning a Vigorous Assault on the Guaymas Fortress.

Nogales, Ariz., May 19.—The projected attack by Sonora state troops on Guaymas may take the form of a land, marine and air battle, made possible by the crossing into Mexico during last night of a complete aeroplane. A special train from the direction of Naco and bearing the machine arrived at Nogales, Sonora, today and was hurried south. The Mexican gunboat Guerrero lies in the harbor ready to assist the federal garrison.

After the confiscation of his aeroplane below Tucson, Didier Masson, the French aviator, escaped into Mexico and since has been awaiting the arrival of the second machine. It is said that the machine which crossed last night is the second of a series of five contracted for by the insurgents' state department.

PREPARE TO PROTECT THE PACIFIC COAST

"Australian Ports" Inserted in Chartered Vessels' Papers Merely as a Blind.

Philadelphia, May 20.—Shipping men who are supposed to be well informed said today that the United States government was taking every precaution against an invasion of the Pacific Coast. Their statements were based on the information that the E. I. Dupont-De Nemours Powder Company, of Wilmington, Del., had chartered twelve foreign vessels to carry explosives to the Pacific Coast defenses.

Shipping men explain that the words "Australian ports" are put in the charters simply as a blind, and that all the explosives are to go to North Pacific ports. But their most convincing argument is that under the present laws foreign vessels cannot engage in a coastwise trade in the United States unless they are directly or indirectly in the charter of the United States government.

CHAUNCEY DEPEW ACTS AS GUIDE IN CAPITOL

Ex-Senator Tells of Senate Peculiarities to Distinguished Foreign Visitors.

Washington, May 20.—"And now, gentlemen, we come to the chamber of the senate of the United States."

The speaker was former Senator Chauncey M. Depew of New York. He was acting as guide to the capitol to the visiting commissioners come to arrange the centenary celebration of the signing of the treaty of Ghent.

"Is it much changed, may I ask?" said a British delegate. "The senate never changes," replied Depew, "except as to personnel. I happen to know from personal experience."

"Have you many rules?" asked Lord Wardaire, another British delegate. "No rules to shut off debate," said Guide Depew. "A senator can talk as long as he wants."

"And when he talks too long, you call that filibustering, do you not?" ventured a Frenchman. "We call it a nuisance," replied the venerable and polished capitol guide.

"Now we come to the marble room, gents," Guide Depew said, conducting the sightseers across the senate lobby.

"Here's where senators meet their constituents who come here to see them. You come here and send in your card to your senator and he comes out to see you if he wants to. If he doesn't want to, the page tells you he has gone to the ball game. This is the room occupied by the President of the United States. Years ago Washington and Adams used to come here often, but no one ever did that since until now. President Wilson has revived the old custom."
