GOOD EXAMPLE IN COMPOUND INTEREST.

Over a hundred years ago the United States government seized a British schooner called the Lord Nelson. The seizure was illegal and the court decided that the sum of \$4,817 with 6 per cent, interest should be paid to the owners. The money was paid into court, but before the claimants could get at it a court official absconded with it. The claimants asked the government for what was their due, but all applications were pigeon holed.

The claimants died, but their representatives and heirs have kept the claims constantly bethe authorities, always getting satisfactory answers but never any money. The interest is to be compounded according to the practice in such cases, and the claim now to \$1,634,408, which! sum, it is now alleged, the heirs of the owners of the schooner

TARIFF REFORM IS COMING IN CANADA

Manufacturers Urged to Get Together for the Protection of Their Interests.

Montreal, May 24-Important revisions in the tariff were predicted by Mr. R. S. Gourlay, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, at the annual banquet of the Montreal branch of the association last night. It was incumbent upon manufacturers, he said, to work together to protect their interests and those of the country in general so that when the time for revision arrived they could lay their views before the government as a strong and united body instead of having isolated delegations rec ommending this and opposing ARE YOU GOING EAST that without serious result. The impending revision, he said, was foreshadowed by the West Indian treaty and the coming Australian treaty and the insistent demand in some sections of the country for an increase in British preference.






