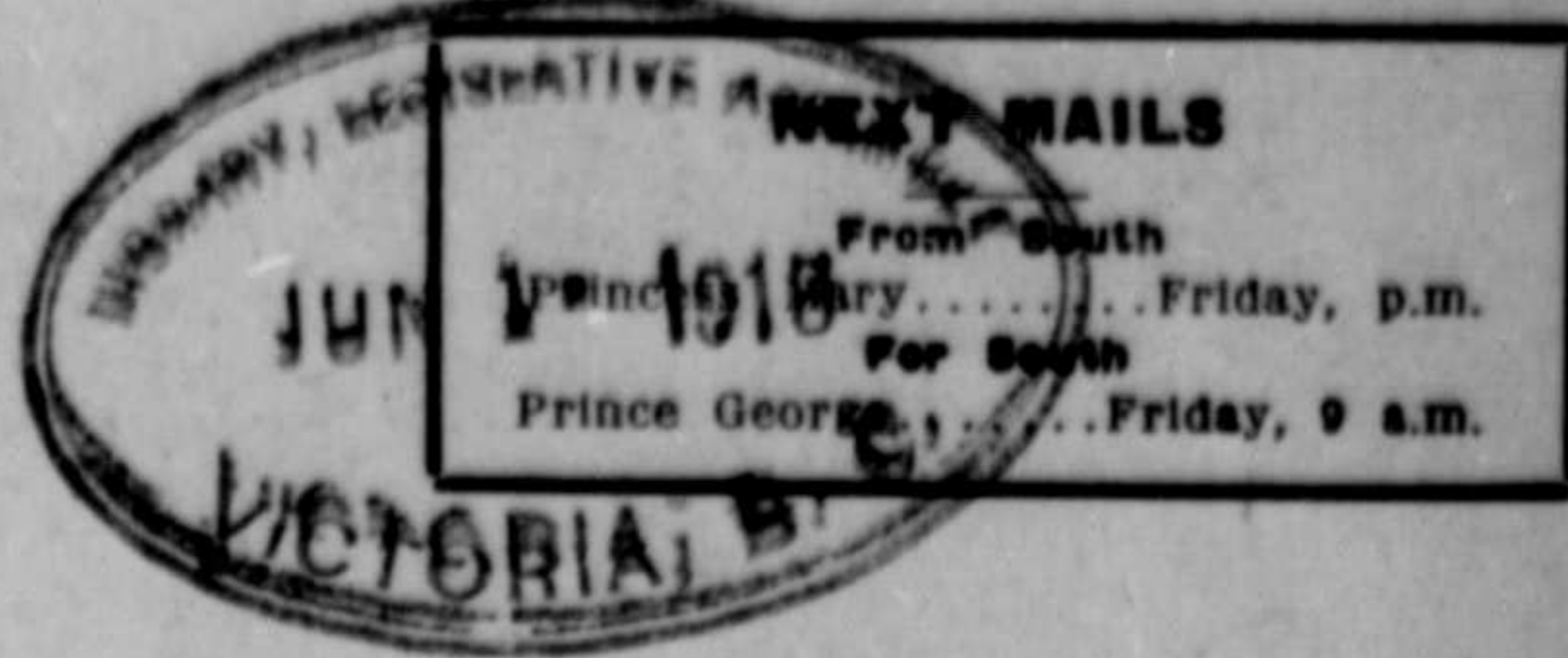

## VANCOUVER LIBERALS TO PREPARE FOR ELECTION

### SENATE'S AMENDMENT TO NAVAL BILL—ROOSEVELT SAYS HE NEVER DRANK A "HIGHBALL"

#### NAVAL BILL SEEMS BOUND TO BE REJECTED BY THE SENATE

LEADER ROSS SAYS THE SENATE IS NOT JUSTIFIED IN GIVING ASSENT UNTIL BILL HAS BEEN SUBMITTED TO THE COUNTRY.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, May 28.—"That this house is not justified in giving assent to this naval bill until it has been submitted to the country." Such was the motion made in the senate, upon the second reading of the naval bill, by Senator George Ross, Liberal leader of the senate, seconded by Senator Bostock. Senator Ross spoke from shortly before three yesterday afternoon to a quarter past five upon this amendment, and that it will be adopted there is not a reasonable doubt.

ponents of the bill in the Commons that the Senate would destroy it, I entertain a higher conception of this chamber than to believe that they are simply the echo of that Opposition. I believe this chamber has a due sense of its responsibility not only to itself, but to the people of Canada and of Canada's duty to the Empire. I believe the members of this Senate though free as air to exercise their political sympathies at the proper time will hesitate to let political sympathy stand in the way of the public voice and of the public interest.

#### BRITISH PEACEMAKER

Sir Edward Grey Trying to Untangle the Balkan Snarl.

London, May 28.—Sir Edward Grey is struggling to bring order out of chaos in the Balkan tangle. He is urging upon all the Allies the necessity of signing the peace treaty, but there are little hopes of success so long as Bulgaria and Greece are so widely estranged.

#### COURT OF REVISION HOLDS FIRST SESSION

Tomorrow Morning Section One Appeals Only Will Be Heard.

The first sitting of the Court of Revision for the City of Prince Rupert was held at the City Hall this morning, Acting Mayor Naden presiding. Sitting with him were Aldermen McCaffery, Dyb-havn and Sutherland. The greater number of appeals were from Section One, most of the complaints being that corner lots were not assessed proportionately with inside lots. There were also several complaints of inequalities, some of which are no doubt well founded. No adjustments were made, the entire time being spent in listening to the arguments of the appellants. The court adjourned at eleven o'clock this morning to resume at ten tomorrow morning at which session Section One appeals only will be heard.

#### NEW METHODIST PASTOR IS WELL QUALIFIED FOR FIELD

REV. MR. RALEY, CHAIRMAN OF COAST DISTRICT, REVIEWS WORK OF RECENT CONFERENCE AT VANCOUVER.

Rev. G. H. Raley of Port Simpson, chairman of the coast district, accompanied by Mrs. Raley and Miss Edith Raley, returned from the Prince George this morning from attending Methodist Conference at Vancouver. He reports that the conference was one of the most important and most successful held in recent years, about two hundred ministers and lay delegates being in attendance. Referring to Rev. Mr. Dimick, who is to succeed Rev. Mr. Sing at Prince Rupert, Rev. Mr. Raley said that he was eminently qualified to take charge of the work in such a new field as this, Mr. Dimick having made a special study of the great social problem.

Bostonians Excelled Themselves in A Difficult Production at the Westholme Last Night.

#### MOTOR CAR RECORD

Nine Hundred and Fourteen Miles in Twelve Hours.

Considering the many difficult problems the city has had to grapple with they were surprised to see that such wonderful development had taken place in so short a period. They are optimistic as to the city's magnificent future.

#### CY WARMAN TO BE GUEST OF CANADIAN CLUB

Eminent Writer Will Be Guest of Honor at Luncheon on Saturday.

Cy Warman, the noted Canadian writer who arrived in the city on Saturday last, has been invited by the Canadian Club of this city to be the guest of honor at a luncheon at the G. T. P. Inn on Saturday of this week. Fred Schaefer, representing the Newspaper Enterprise Association of San Francisco, who has the reputation of being a humorist of more than the average type, will also be a guest. The members of the Canadian Club will undoubtedly enjoy a rare treat in hearing these distinguished writers.

Mr. Warman and Mr. Schaefer returned last evening from a trip to the end of steel, the guests of General Superintendent Mehan. Both were delighted with the magnificent scenery along the line and extremely optimistic as to the future development of the interior both from an agricultural and a mineral standpoint. Tomorrow they will be the guests of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd., on the trawler "James Carruthers". Mr. Warman is particularly anxious to get first-hand information concerning the great fishing industry that promises so much for Prince Rupert. They will be taken to the fishing banks where the immense quantities of halibut are now being harvested.

#### Raid on Opium Joint.

#### HIGHLAND BOY GROUP WILL SOON BE HIVE OF INDUSTRY

PROPERTY SOLD TO MINING OPERATORS OF BUTTE, MONTANA, WHO WILL SPEND TWENTY THOUSAND IN DEVELOPMENT

The Butte and Rocher de Boule Mining Co. are now prepared to begin operations on the Highland Boy group which they purchased last winter upon the report and recommendation of P. J. Jennings who was here all last year. Mr. Jennings is in town again and he will have charge of the work this year. He stated to the Herald that his company had \$20,000 available for development purposes and that they were going to get busy immediately. He is leaving for the mine Sunday and upon arrival will first erect a camp on the Highland Boy claim close to the tunnel site. A trail about a mile long has to be built to connect the Highland Boy with the Rocher de Boule, but as there is considerable snow on the top of the mountain yet a snow trail will be made first to enable them to get supplies in and to get the work under way. On the property is a small basin through which the veins run, thus giving an ideal tunnel site. The company will drive several hundred feet into the vein. They will get a depth of 500 or 600 feet and the development will be in ore all the time. As soon as the necessary preliminary work is done Mr.

Jennings states that his company will install the most modern machinery and develop the mine on a large scale. He expects that by this fall there will be some big doings on Rocher de Boule mountain.—Omineca Herald.

The fire committee reported to the council last night in favor of purchasing another Red Devil, at a cost of \$7,650, similar to the one at present in use by the fire department, and on the motion of Ald. Sutherland the report was adopted.

#### PELKEY AND TOMMY BURNS ARE COMMITTED FOR MANSLAUGHTER

REFEREE SMITH AND McCARNEY THE MANAGER OF THE LATE McCARTY, ARE ALSO TO BE TRIED ON THE SAME CHARGE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Calgary, May 28.—At the trial of the prize fighters and promoters yesterday the crown set aside the verdict of the coroner's jury exonerating Pelkey and those connected with the fight, on two grounds; first that Coroner Castello had no right to sit as coroner in the case because he had attended the fight, and second, because the jury was padded by friends of Burns. Upon this ruling by the Court McCarney, manager for the fighter McCarty who died in the ring Saturday, and Referee Smith were taken into custody and placed upon their defence.

The cases of pugilist Pelkey, and his manager Tommy Burns, ex-champion of the world, were first heard, and after evidence both were committed for trial on the charge of manslaughter. In all probability a special session of the assize court will be called for the trial of these and other commitments that may be made in connection with the death of McCarty.

**WHAT WILL HAPPEN TO THE SENATE**

Our despatches today state that the amendment of Senator Ross, the Liberal leader, to the effect that the Senate would not feel justified in giving assent to the Naval Bill until it has been submitted to the people, will undoubtedly carry. If it does, what will Mr. Borden do? No more serious problem will present itself in all probability during his term or terms of office than the solution of this recurring difficulty. And the Senate is composed of politicians who are likely to see the Bill through political glasses, and so invite attention from the government.

The Premier would have a variety of remedies open. He could make the position of Senator hereditary, which would be a permanent solution of a kind, for as it has happen-

ed in Great Britain, so would it be here, that the tendency of men holding hereditary positions would be toward a Conservative frame of mind.

As an alternative, the First Minister might declare for an elected Senate, similar to that in the United States, though probably elected directly by the people, rather than by the Provincial Legislatures.

At present the House of Commons is the more important body, because it is directly the choice of the majority of the electors, but if it should happen that the Senate were also made directly responsible to the people, it would almost certainly come to pass that the Senate would be the more important, and positions therein the most desirable. The House of Commons would be relegated to the second place, holding much the same relation to the Senate as does the House of Representatives in Washington.

**OCEAN FALLS CO.'S AFFAIRS STILL BONE OF CONTENTION**

**APPLICATION MADE BY CHICAGO CREDITORS FOR LEAVE TO APPEAL WHICH IS REFERRED TO SAME JUDGE WHO GAVE DECISION.**

Victoria, May 23—Application was made by Mr. S. A. Arnold on behalf of the Crane Company, creditors of the Ocean Falls Co., Limited, in supreme court chambers this morning before Mr. Justice Gregory for leave to appeal. The matter was referred to Mr. Justice Murphy, against whose decision it is intended to take action. The application was opposed by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, on behalf of the debenture holders and Mr. D. Armour for the Ocean Falls Company, Limited.

Mr. Justice Murphy on May 8 dismissed an application by the Crane Company, which has its headquarters in Chicago, under the winding-up act, to close the

affairs of the Ocean Falls Company.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, in opposing the application that Mr. Justice Gregory grant the appeal said that the Crane Company and the other United States, concerns having claims against the Ocean Falls Company were but small creditors, and it was practically an effort to blackmail. To this Mr. Arnold took strong objection, and a wordy dispute ensued, in which Mr. Arnold declared that the boat was on the other foot.

As the case was very much involved and had appeared before Mr. Justice Murphy, who had full knowledge of the facts, his lordship referred the matter to him.

**BIG PARTY OF LAND SEEKERS GONE TO THE BABINE COUNTRY**

**SPOKANE INVESTORS WHO WILL START THE TIDE OF U. S. IMMIGRATION TO FLOW THROUGH THIS PORT**

The B. C. Land & Colonization Co., of Spokane, owners of over a hundred thousand acres of land in the Babine district, and mostly along the lake shore, sent in the first colonization party this week. They arrived here on Wednesday night and after getting their supplies and outfits in shape they started out the Babine trail Thursday afternoon for the new land. There are 12 in the party and of this number several will remain on the land and get busy this spring clearing. Other parties will also be brought in shortly.

Lauchlin McLean, head of the company, says that this first party is more of an advance guard. They have had reports on the district which were very favorable, but they are now going in to see for themselves. He said that if the country was as good as he believed it to be, his company would send in many of the best farmers in the Western

States. These men who are with him all have plenty of money and they are looking for a new country to get into.

J. B. Sargeant, the senior member of the party is one of the most enthusiastic. He is an old farmer himself and he has seen new countries grow. He has faith in the northern part of British Columbia. He has four sons all in the business and they are all looking for a new country to get into.

The party consisted of the following gentlemen: Lauchlin McLean, Robt. A. Hopkins, J. B. Sargeant, Geo. A. Griffith, Benj. F. Bresnahan, John Becker, F. Little, John Roberts, Geo. Poeppling, J. B. Cole, John Harris and Jesse Coulter. The last three named will remain in New Hazelton for some time.—Omineca Herald.

### BULGARIA MAY JOIN WITH AUSTRIA NOW

Conflict Between Serbia and Bulgaria Over Spoils of War Inevitable

Cologne, Germany, May 21.—A Serbo-Bulgarian conflict is inevitable should Serbia persist in her demands for a revision of the ante-bellum treaty existing between those countries with regard to a division of spoils of war, and if Serbia does not submit for reasonable arbitration the question of the disposal of districts left open by the same treaty, according to a despatch received by the Cologne "Gazette" today from its Sofia correspondent, who says he reached this conclusion after interviewing several Bulgarian ministers and the various party leaders at the Bulgarian capital. Continuing the correspondent says: "Bulgaria will not hesitate to conclude an alliance with Austria-Hungary if such a step is necessary to achieve her end. Anti-Serbian feeling in Bulgaria is running high and is increasing hourly, and war, if it comes will be bitter."

New Lighthouse Tender is placed in Commission With Captain Barnes on Bridge.

Vancouver, May 22.—Fully officered and manned, the new Dominion Government lighthouse tender Estevan goes into commission today. Captain Barnes is one of the most capable officers in Government service on the Pacific, and his intimate knowledge of coastal waters and past record as a skilful navigator has at last found recognition at the hands of the Government by the command of the flagship of the fleet.

### HEMLOCK OR FIR FOR PLANKING PURPOSES

Letter from Section Two Contractor Asking Permission of Council to Use Hemlock.

At the city council last night the affairs of the Ocean Falls Company were referred to in a letter from J. A. Meeker, the contractor for a part of the work in Section Two, asking that he be permitted to use hemlock instead of fir for the road planking. The letter read:

"When we tendered upon the plank roadway construction in Section 2 and subsequently executed contracts for the performance of the work, it was with the expectation of securing the fir from the Ocean Falls Company, with whom we had arranged for the lumber necessary for the take debentures in payment. In the meantime this company has become unable to make delivery of the lumber and we are unable to make arrangements with any other mill to furnish the decking in fir.

"We would respectfully request, therefore, that you take the matter up with the proper authorities and see if it will not be possible to substitute hemlock decking, which in point of wear is practically as lasting as fir. The breaking weight of hemlock is not quite equal to fir but it is as hard and would give as long a wear.

"If this change can be made we would be able to save the city a dollar per thousand on this lumber, or approximately \$555, and at the same time patronize home industry by buying the same locally and would be able to proceed with the work without further delay."

On motion the letter was referred to the Board of Works with power to act.

#### MILITARY EXPERTS

(Special to The Daily News.) Oatwa, May 28.—The British War Office, at the request of the Minister of Militia, is sending out two experts from the Woolwich arsenal, to investigate conditions around the Dominion arsenal at Quebec.
