GOING TO LONDON TO OFFER CITY TREASURY CERTIFICATES

MAYOR PATTULLO WIRES FROM MONTREAL THAT BANK OF MONTREAL ADVISES THAT HE AND CITY SOLICITOR OFFER CERTIFICATES.

On Wednesday Acting-Mayor Naden received a telegram from Mayor Pattullo, dated Montreal, requesting that certain financial bylaws be passed to assist him in his work of raising funds. In consequence of this the council held a special meeting last night for this purpose, which opened with the reading of Mr. Pattullo's telegram as follows:
Montreal, Que., May 27.
Acting Mayor,
Prince Rupert, B. C.,
Bank thinks it necessary to finance temporarily by treasury certificates and advise us to go to London. Therefore pass bylaw immediately authorizing issue of treasury certificates under Act of 1912 for all debentures authorized by bylaw not already covered by former treasury certificate bylaw. Send to government copies of bylaws and ask for immediate consent, stating this course recommended by Bank of Montreal.

Ask Williams to carefully draw bylaw following bylaw 109. Cable me care Bank, London, when bylaw passed and again when government consent given. Also pass resolution authorizing me to sell certificates and cable when passed. Forward me London certified copy bylaw and resolution. Leave for London in few days. Will wire date sailing.

Acting-Mayor Naden made a brief explanation of the telegram, stating that he had had bylaws drafted for the consideration of the council in accordance therewith, at the same time expressing the hope that it would not be necessary for the mayor to dispose of treasury certificates. It was wise, however, in his opinion to give the mayor the authority asked for as it was absolutely

GREAT ADVERTISING FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Eminent Writers Left for South this Morning Enthusiastic over City's Future

Cy Warman, general assistant Grand Trunk Railway, and Fred Schaefer, of San Francisco, left for the south this morning on the s.s. Prince George after spending nearly a week in the city and district gathering data for newspaper and magazine articles which will place Prince Rupert before the eyes of hundreds of thousands of readers throughout the United States and Canada.
Mr. Warman, in talking with a "News" representative this morning said, he felt absolutely certain, from information obtained from various officials of the G. T. P., that the last spike between Edmonton and Prince Rupert will be driven in the fall of 1914. This means a continuous line of steel from Prince Rupert to Winnipeg and Fort William by the end of next year.

SAVED PAY ROLL BY A DASH UNDER FIRE

Four Masked Bandits Killed One Man and Wounded Three Others in the Scuffle.

La Salle, Ill., May 30.—Four masked bandits last night held up a party of men carrying the semi-monthly pay roll of the Illinois Zinc Company. A desperate fight ensued, in the course of which one of the party was shot dead and the three others were severely wounded. One of the wounded men saved the money, amounting to \$6,000 by a wild dash under fire.

ESCORTED BY AIRSHIPS

King and Queen Return From Royal Wedding in Berlin
London, May 30.—The king and queen arrived yesterday from the celebration in Berlin of the nuptials of the Hanoverian Prince, the Duke of Cumberland with a daughter of the German Emperor. The British royal yacht was escorted by aeroplanes all the way from Germany to this port.

NANAIMO STRIKE OVER

Western Fuel Company Agrees to Grant Increase in Wages.
Nanaimo, May 30.—The coal strike is at last ended and all the men are cheerfully going back to work. The Western Fuel Company has agreed to grant the increase the colliers demanded.

LINER ON THE ROCKS

The Thousand Passengers and Crew Reached Shore Safely.

Queenstown, Ireland, May 30.—The American liner Haverford, which sailed Wednesday from Liverpool for Philadelphia with over a thousand passengers aboard, went ashore on the rocks westward of Corks Head yesterday afternoon during a dense fog. Before dusk all the passengers and their luggage had been brought ashore. There are fifteen feet of water in the hold of the steamer.

SET FIRE TO WIFE TO PROVE HER INNOCENCE

Bride of a Month Is Dead and Suspicious Husband Is Held for Murder.

Winnipeg, May 20.—A Gallician living here who has only been a month married got some jealous suspicions in his head regarding the conduct of his wife. He accused her of infidelity and in order to prove her guilt or innocence last night he adopted an old Saxon custom of trial by fire. He tied his wife to a post and then deliberately set fire to her, believing that if innocent she would come out of the flames unscathed. The result of the trial by fire is that the bride of a month is dead and her husband is in custody on the charge of murder.

TOMMY BURNS BRINGS CRIMINAL LIBEL SUIT

Against Pastor Who Said He Was Nothing Less Than a Murderer

Calgary, May 30.—Tommy Burns, the trainer and manager of Pugilist Pelkey, is laying a charge of criminal libel against one of the city clergymen. The Sunday following the fatal fight between McCarty and Pelkey this clergyman is reported to have stated in the course of his sermon that Burns was nothing more or less than a murderer for the part he had played in McCarty's death, and that Burns should be driven ignominiously from the country.

CHANGES ARE SLIGHT IN SECTIONS 5 AND 6

Court of Revision Held its Third Session This Morning—Few Appeals.

The time of Court of Revision was taken up this morning in hearing appeals from Sections Five and Six, which were not very numerous. The alterations in assessment made this morning did not amount to more than \$7,000. Acting-Mayor Naden told the "News" that as far as the court could see the total reduction in the assessment of the city will not exceed \$250,000.

ITALIANS DEFEATED

Retreated With Four Hundred Killed and Many Wounded

London, May 30.—The Italian army at Tripoli suffered a severe defeat at the hands of the Turks yesterday, beating a retreat with four hundred killed and many wounded. The battle took place before Derna. Thirty Lascar colonials were among the killed.

STEFFENSSON STARTED

Left Ottawa Last Night to Join His Vessel at Victoria.

Ottawa, May 30.—Arctic Explorer Steffensson, who is to explore a million square miles of Arctic territory for the Canadian Government, left here last night for Victoria, where he will join his ship Karluk and in a few days start on his great exploration. He expects to return in 1916.

K. R. MOORE ARRESTED

Charged With Conspiracy to Defraud in Bankers' Trust Case

Seattle, May 30.—K. R. Moore was arrested here yesterday on a warrant from Victoria charging conspiracy to defraud in connection with a transaction with the Bankers' Trust Company. Habeas corpus proceedings were at once instituted with the result of his release on a \$1000 bond. The hearing of the case will take place on June 7th.

Cold at Ketchikan.

The steamer Spokane, southbound, arrived about five o'clock yesterday afternoon and left for Seattle before six. The captain reported that the weather at Ketchikan yesterday morning was cold and stormy, and said it was a pleasure to be in Prince Rupert.

MEXICAN ELECTION

Mexico City, May 30.—A bill authorizing a presidential election on October 26th, has been approved.

BORDEN'S CABINET AWAITING RESULT OF DEBATE IN SENATE

NO IMMEDIATE ACTION EXPECTED REGARDING FUTURE POLICY OF THE GOVERNMENT—NO MANDATE FROM PEOPLE FOR NAVAL BILL.

Ottawa, May 30.—The cabinet is awaiting the final move of the senate before taking any action regarding the future policy of the government. What it will be is still the subject of many conjectures, the prevailing opinion seeming to be that Premier Borden is not disposed to go to the country at present, either upon the naval bill or any other question.
The Liberals of the Senate yesterday devoted the discussion of the naval bill very largely to a repudiation of the contention of government leader Senator Loughheed that the government has a mandate from the country for its naval policy. The debate

is not expected to be long and a vote is expected early next week, if not before.

Reading Room Popular.

After the council meeting last night City Clerk Woods paid his first visit to the city reading rooms, smoked a pipe there and played a game of checkers. He found it, as everyone does, a very convenient and comfortably fitted up place. A large number have used it during the week, although its opening may not be generally known. The notice given by the committee and posted on the door is wrong in one instance. The closing hour is eleven instead of ten.

CARELESS CITIZENS WILL BE PROSECUTED

Chief Vickers is Getting After Citizens Responsible for Depositing Rubbish on Plank Roadways.

Chief of Police Vickers has received a number of complaints lately from teamsters and automobile drivers in regard to the amount of rubbish including nails, broken glass and other material deposited on streets. Yesterday afternoon on Borden street one of Moore Bros.' cartage horses stepped on a nail which penetrated the animal's hoof some three or four inches. Moore Bros. already have two valuable horses that have been laid off for some time through a similar accident. Chief of Police Vickers told the "News" this morning that it is his intention to prosecute citizens who are responsible for leaving such rubbish on the roadways. There are also complaints concerning goods left on the sidewalks and the police have been instructed to take action against those who are careless in this respect.

Masset Leader Changes Mands

James Cullins, who has had charge of the Masset Leader for some months, arrived in the city this morning on the Prince John. Mr. Cullins reports that the Masset Leader has been sold to Frank Traynor of Vancouver.

KAISER MAKES JOB FOR NEW SON-IN-LAW

Remodels German Map and Creates Duchy of Luneburg to Please Daughter.

Berlin, May 26.—The Kaiser is exceedingly anxious that his new son-in-law, Prince Ernest Augustus of Cumberland, should not remain idle. The Kaiser's favorite motto is "Idleness is the mother of all mischief," and he wants his daughter's husband to keep out of mischief.

He, therefore, has decided to give Prince Ernest occupation and on the day of his marriage handed him titles as the Duke of Brunswick and Grand Duke of Luneburg.
The Prince will have a very responsible job amongst the princes of the German Empire and will be considered the equal in rank of the Kings of Saxony and the Prince Regent of Bavaria. He will have to reign over a new state that the Kaiser is now shaping out by the simple process of turning a considerable portion of the Province of Hanover, which belongs to Prussia, into the new Grand Duchy of Luneburg.

Great dissatisfaction is expressed everywhere in Germany at the Kaiser's remodeling of the map of Germany, but the Emperor is absolutely master in these matters and will receive no advice.

His daughter had asked him to create this new grand duchy for the sake of her husband. That was enough for William II.

NICARAGUA CANAL AS A RIVAL TO PANAMA

Nicaraguan Minister Declares It Likely to Be Built After All by the United States.

Washington, May 28.—Another great Atlantic-Pacific waterway, making a ship route between the eastern and western coasts of the United States, two thousand miles shorter than through the Panama Canal, will be built soon by the United States in the opinion of Dr. Salvador Castriello, retiring Nicaraguan minister.

In a statement last night, Dr. Castriello said he believed that a canal treaty would be negotiated between the United States and Nicaragua, and that a canal would be constructed across his country.

The canal treaty, which is an inheritance from the Taft administration, was negotiated by Minister Weizel last winter and has received the approval of the Nicaraguan government.

By its terms Nicaragua for \$3,000,000 would grant the United States the exclusive right to construct a canal across Nicaragua by way of the San Juan River and Lake Nicaragua.

DECLARES A GENERAL ELECTION IS REMOTE

No Matter What Course Senate May Take in Regard to the Present Naval Bill.

Vancouver, May 30.—Mr. Green, member of parliament for Kootenay, while in town yesterday declared that the probability of a general election was very remote, no matter what course the senate may take in regard to the naval bill. He said it was obvious that if Borden went to the country and was returned, he has no undertaking that the same course would not be pursued by the senate. An election was extremely improbable before redistribution took place.

ASHES OF LATE POET SCATTERED TO WINDS

Joaquin Miller's Dust Thrown on a Funeral Pyre Built with His Own Hands.

Oakland, Cal., May 26.—The ashes of the late Joaquin Miller, poet of the Sierras, were scattered today among the flames of a funeral pyre built by the poet's own hands. The ceremony was held at the Miller home, "The Heights," surrounded by the picturesque hills of Oakland. The Bohemian Club of San Francisco was in charge of the rites, which were witnessed by more than 500 persons, including the poet's widow and daughter, Juanita, and many old time friends.

The services were short but impressive. At their conclusion Col. John P. Irish of Oakland mounted the steps of the pyre.

"This," said Col. Irish, "is not an occasion for mourning but for rejoicing. We are here not to mourn the death of Joaquin Miller, but to rejoice that through his genius he still lives."

Col. Irish then applied a torch to oil soaked faggots on the pyre. As the flames shot up he took the copper urn in which the poet's ashes had been sealed and gave them to the fire. Instantly a jealous wind whipped the ashes from the flames and bore them away.

CITY AIDS WIDOW

Of Brave Constable Murdered While on Duty.

Vancouver, May 30.—The city has granted to the widow of Constable Archibald, murdered while on duty, the sum of \$2,000. Archibald was on duty three nights ago on the outskirts of the city and failed to report at headquarters at the usual time. As he had not returned home a search was made and his badly beaten body was found in the brush. Burglars that same night had broken into an adjoining mill and looted the safe.

CYPRUS CEDED TO GREAT BRITAIN

Turkey has definitely ceded the island of Cyprus to Great Britain, according to the Constantinople correspondent of the London Express, who claims to have received a formal statement to that effect from the best informed source. The cession of the island is said to have been due to clauses in the Anglo-Turkish entente. Now if Turkey would also cede her last remaining thread of authority over Egypt, Britain could afford to be the friend of "the unspeakable Turk," as Gladstone styled the Ottoman government.

WHEN BORDEN WAS RIGHT

On July 1, 1909, Premier Borden (then leader of the Opposition) spoke before the Constitutional Club in London, England. The Times reported him as follows: He was aware that some feeling had been created in the British Isles owing to the fact that Canada did not by any resolution or by speech from the Prime Minister vouchsafe the offer of one, two or three Dreadnoughts. He thought the resolution in the form in which it had passed, while its terms might not upon the surface

seem as significant at the moment as the offer of one or two Dreadnoughts would have been, laid down a permanent policy for the Dominion of Canada upon which both parties united, and which would serve a more practical purpose than any such offer of Dreadnoughts. The effect of the resolutions which were passed were:—

(1) That they recognized the duty of Canada to take her share in Imperial defence as her wealth and importance increased.

(2) That the payment of regular and periodical contributions to the Imperial treasury was not, as far as Canada was concerned, the most satisfactory solution of the problem of Imperial defence.

(3) That the House approved of any expenditure necessary for the speedy establishment of a Canadian navy in close relation to and in co-operation with the Imperial navy, and along the lines suggested by the Admiralty at the last Imperial Conference, and

(4) That the Canadian people were prepared to make any sacrifices necessary for the purpose of co-operating with the Imperial navy in maintaining the integrity of the Empire and its naval supremacy.

DOMINION AND PROVINCIAL INDIAN LAND COMMISSION

HAIIDA INDIANS ON CHARLOTTE ISLANDS HAVE CALLED A COUNCIL TO FORMULATE PLAN OF PROCEEDURE BEFORE COMMISSIONERS.

The Dominion and Provincial governments have appointed a board of five commissioners to report on the lands held by the Indians of B. C. and to investigate the claims of the natives to the ownership of the land of their forefathers, which was not, the Indians claim, taken from them by either conquest or treaty. This commission will shortly begin its sessions.

The specific work of the commissioners will consist of reporting on an agreement entered into between Premier McBride and J. A. J. McKenna when the latter was in this province last year. During Mr. McKenna's visit he interviewed the Indians and was met at Prince Rupert by representatives of the Haida nation. They claimed that the appropriation of reserves made to them covered but five acres to each individual Indian, while other natives received hundreds of acres individually. With a revised appropriation the Massets and Skidegates would receive additional land.

The claim is made by the Haidas that they were brought to two central reserves to be Christianized and educated, and it was through no fault of theirs that the old settlements are in a state of decay. They proudly point to the two grand reserves on which they reside and ask where any other settlements, containing the same population, have shown

more enterprise. They are self-supporting and owners of houses, launches, cattle and other conveniences, and are fishermen who can always obtain employment at fair wages.

The Skidegate council have decided to meet with the Massets and formulate a plan of procedure when they meet the commissioners.

FUR FARMING IN CANADA

Interesting Volume Published by the Commission of Conservation on the Subject.

In a handsomely cloth bound volume of some hundred and sixty-five pages, with a number of illustrations, the Commission on Conservation has just issued a work entitled "Fur Farming in Canada," by J. Walter Jones. Fur farming, it says in the introductory lines, is a new industry in Canada, but its development has been rapid. An investigation conducted in the latter half of 1912 revealed numerous instances where animals of various species were being bred in captivity for their fur. Foxes of two species and of all color varieties, skunk, mink, raccoon, fisher, beaver and muskrat were found upon fur farms. The marten and otter are likewise being domesticated for their fur.

In one instance even the wildcat was retained in captivity for breeding purposes, and it is authentically reported that the common black house cat is being bred for its fur on pioneer Ontario farms. Up to the present time the domestication of wild fur bearing animals has been practiced most extensively, and also most successfully, in the maritime provinces; but the industry is developing rapidly in Ontario and Quebec, while isolated fur farms are also to be found throughout the western provinces.

The book is an expert guide to this new industry, going into details as to breeds and breeding, feeding and so forth.

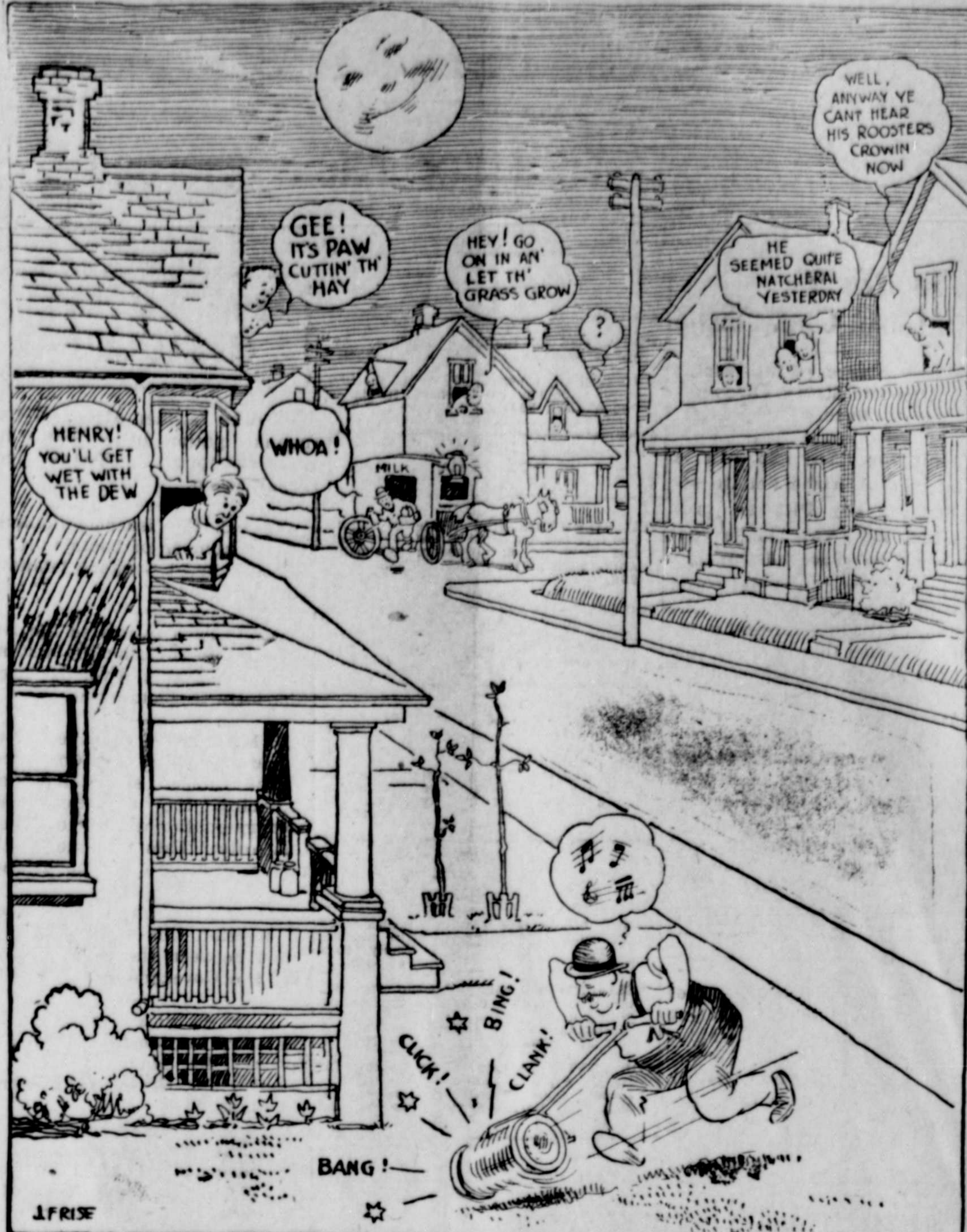

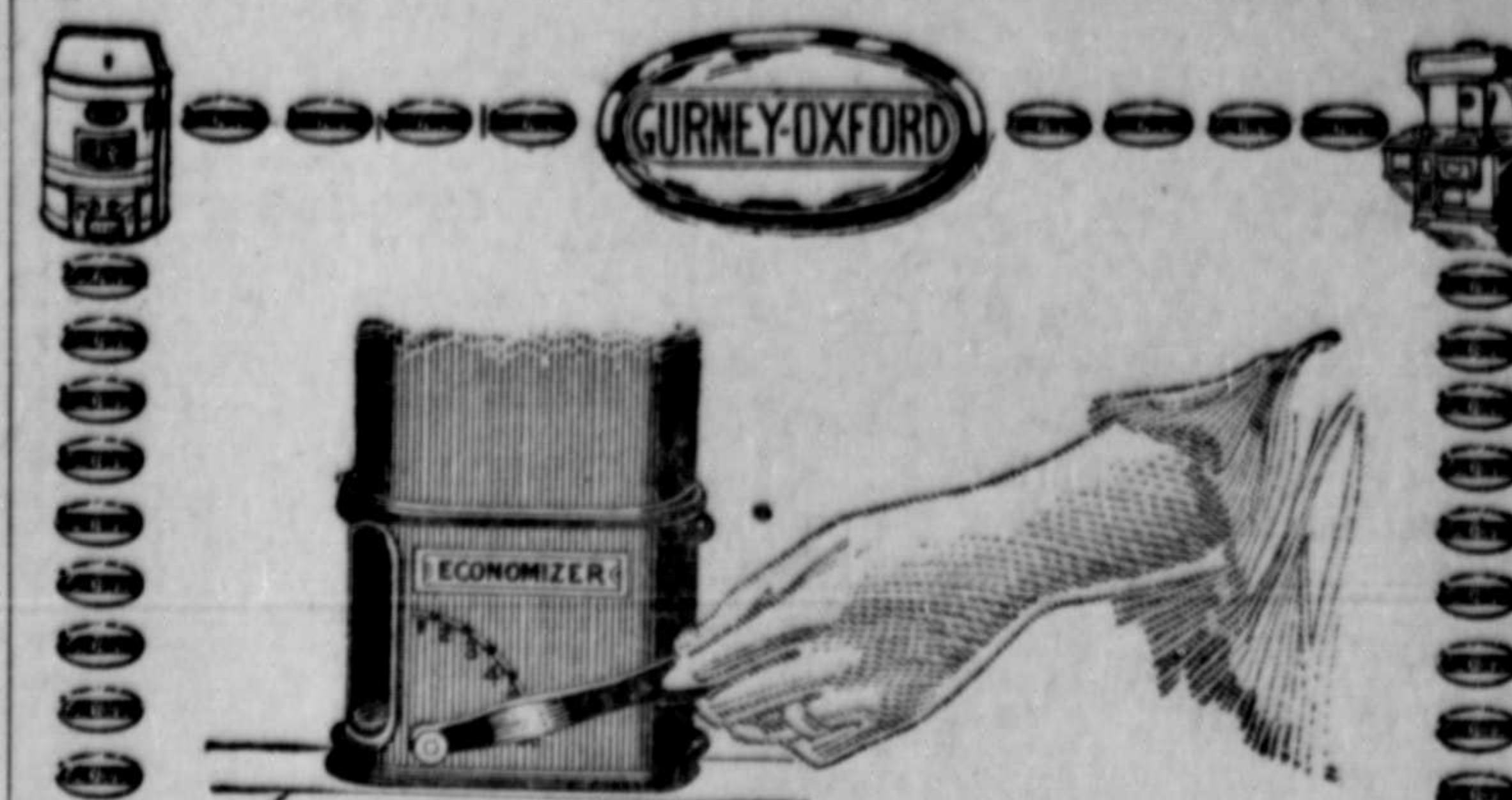

BILL TO OPEN UP ALASKA COAL FIELDS

Lands to be Surveyed into Strips and Alternate Strips Thrown Open.

Washington, May 26.—In a bill introduced in the Senate today Senator Key Pittman proposes that the great Alaska coal fields shall be surveyed immediately into strips of a length and width to be determined by the secretary of the interior and numbered, and when this is completed the even numbered strips shall still be withheld from the public and the odd numbered strips thrown open to settlement.

The odd numbered strips are to be subdivided into claims of 160 acres each and can be settled upon only in person.

The measure is one of the most striking attempts yet made toward bringing Alaska out of the hole, and apparently meets both the conservationists and anti-conservationists half way on the Alaska problem.

By retaining in possession of the government each alternating strip in the coal fields Senator Pittman believes that two desirable ends will be accomplished, while in throwing open to settlement the remaining areas on a basis similar to that obtaining in all other sections of the country Alaska at last will have an opportunity to develop.

Vast Wilds of Alaska.

Speaking of jaunts for business men, the excursion planned by the Alaska bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce is a rather ambitious undertaking. The itinerary as now mapped out will cover distances aggregating 8,000 miles, or one-third the circumference of the earth. The figures give to the unthinking and uninformed an idea of the vast expanse of Alaska.

WRESTLED WITH HIS SKULL FRACTURED

Zbyszko Wrestled for Twenty-six Minutes Though Suffering All Time with Broken Head.

Montreal, May 26.—Constant Le Marin practically threw away whatever championship chances he ever possessed on Saturday night when, according to Referee George Touhey of Boston, he so deliberately fouled Stanislaus Zbyszko that he lost the first fall and \$10,000 match of what was scheduled to be a best two out of three contest. Zbyszko is at the Hotel Dieu with a fractured skull and other injuries which may keep him from the mat for months.

Nineteen minutes after the contest began both men went through the ropes, Zbyszko receiving a bad gash over the eye. They returned to the ring, blood pouring from Zbyszko's wound, completely covering the men and necessitating a halt. Physicians stitched up the wound and the bout was resumed. Zbyszko was on the aggressive throughout and when he obtained a partial crotch and reverse half nelson, Le Marin, with a vicelike grip, fouled the Pole so fiercely that the referee, after a warning, disqualified the Frenchman. Zbyszko rose to his feet but fell over in a faint and had to be carried to his dressing room.

It was then discovered that he had been wrestling twenty-six minutes with a fractured skull. He was hurried to the hotel, where his condition, though serious, is not likely to prove fatal.

GOING TO LONDON TO OFFER TREASURY CERTIFICATES

(Continued from Page 1.)

necessary to make a move in order to get money in the city treasury.

Two bylaws were then introduced and carried to their third reading. The first of these authorizes the issue of treasury certificates to the amount of \$84,712 6s 7d (roughly \$371,000); the second bylaw authorizes the issue of treasury certificates to the amount of £151,117 6s 40d (equalling \$735,437.73).

Authority has already been given by the lieutenant-governor-in-council for the council to issue and sell the certificates mentioned in the first bylaw, but in regard to the second the council has power to issue such certificates but cannot offer them for sale without the consent of the lieutenant-governor-in-council. A formal resolution was therefore introduced and passed requesting this consent.

Acting-Mayor Naden then said that he hoped it would not be necessary to call so many special meetings of the council, but if the aldermen could make it convenient to have a meeting on Saturday night to finally pass the bylaws one day would be saved. No objection was raised and the council then adjourned to Saturday evening.

As soon as these bylaws are finally adopted and a copy filed in the county court of Prince Rupert, a petition will be forwarded from the council to the lieutenant-governor-in-council praying for the necessary consent to the sale of the said certificates. At the same time certified copies of the bylaws and of the resolution passed by the council authorizing him to negotiate and sell the certificates, will be forwarded to the mayor in London.
