

There was but little sound when Archie McDougall's big blast went off, but the concussion caused the ground in the imediate neighborhood to shake. One gigantic puff and some sixty thousand cubic yards of rock was lifted bodily from its base, fragments being carried a hundred feet skyward. Notice in the picture the clean break made by the uplifted mass from the remaining land. The dense smoke hides the great chunks of rock ascending but the picture shows some of the smaller splinters.

WHAT IS BORDEN PLAYING FOR?

The naval policy of Premier Borden is to give as a free gift to England thirty-five million three dreadnoughts for the defence of the empire, and the senate has very properly turned that idea of an annual subscription in cash to Great Britain down. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's proposition, to which Mr. Borden, then in opposition, and his party with him, agreed was that Canada should build two naval units, one for the Atlantic and one for the Pacific, to strengthen the imperial · navy, and that the vessels for these naval units should be built in Canada and should be manned by Canadians.

This would have been scheme in which Prince Rupert would have been largely in-We will shortly have completed a large dry dock here, and this was part of the policy of the last Liberal government to stimulate the shipbuilding industry at this going-to-be important Pacific port. But what of this present government? Does it propose to do anything to encourage the shipbuilding industry of the Dominion? Very much on the contrary.






