It is the accepted understanding at Ottawa that Roman Catholic Senators vote against neports authorizing divorce because they are opposed to divorce on principle, and it may be assumed that, in the main, this explanation is sufficient to account for their votes says the Montreal Herald. The question arises whether, when the Senate undertakes to exercise the functions of a court of justice and to render decisions according to evidence adduced, which is the situation when non-Catholics apply divorce on statutory grounds, men whose decision is taken in advance and it not open to be affected by the nature of the evidence adduced ought to exercise without the reserve the right of intervention which their position as member of the Senate technically gives them. 


