The morning party organ devoted a couple of columns on Sunday to the refutation of a paragraph in the last issue of the Daily News, to the effect the government had granted to the Grand Trunk Pacific a grudging loan and to the Canadian Northern a generous gift, and says: "The ministry has taken pains to see that each company concerned is dealt with on an equal basis." Hon. Mr. Oliver-That an equalization of freight rates between Eastern and Western Canada be made a condition of the grant.

Mr. E. M. Macdonald-That the rates over the whole system be subject to the Railway Commission, and that rates to Canadian ports be no higher than to American ports.

Mr. German-That any advance be repayable half yearly with interest at 4 per cent., secured by both parent and subsidiary companies and by common stock to the extent of \$15,-640,000, the amount of the loan.

Each and every one of these amendments were defeated, and the result of these votes leaves no doubt as to which party is for the "interests" and which for the people.


