## GRAND LODGE MASONRY TO MEET HERE NEXT YEAR

### GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC TO BE COMPLETED IN AUGUST, 1914 - BIG STORM IN LETHBRIDGE

#### GRAND TRUNK COMPLETED BY AUGUST OF NEXT YEAR

**THIS IS ANNOUNCEMENT MADE BY GOVERNMENT ENGINEER COLLINGWOOD SCHREIBER—SPEEDY CONSTRUCTION OF HOTEL**

Ottawa, June 20.—August of next year will see not only the completion but also the operation of the G. T. P. from Winnipeg to the Pacific coast, according to Collingwood Schreiber, government engineer of the

Grand Trunk Pacific. It is expected here that in view of this the G. T. P. will most certainly proceed without delay to the construction of a handsome hotel at the Pacific terminal, Prince Rupert, as is already planned.

#### WHO WILL BE CHOSEN SOLICITOR GENERAL?

**Popular Member for Cumberland Choice of Premier Borden—A. Meighen Mentioned.**

Ottawa, June 17.—The office of solicitor general, which has been vacant since the present government assumed office, will probably be filled shortly. Premier Borden's choice for the position is Mr. E. N. Rhodes, the able and popular member for Cumberland.

Arthur Meighen, M. P. for Portage la Prairie, who has been the government's ablest apologist in debate during the past session, is the choice of Hon. Robert Rogers and the western conservatives. Mr. A. C. Boyce, M. P. for West Algoma, has the support of a large number of Ontario Conservatives, and Albert Weagney, Nationalist-Conservative member for Dorchester, is the chief aspirant for the office from Quebec.

So far the cabinet has not been able to agree on a choice among the rival claimants for preference. It is probable, however, that Mr. Rhodes will be given the appointment. Mr. Meighen will likely have to wait for his reward of some later date.

Mr. Boyce will, it is understood, accept one of the vacant Ontario judgeships.

#### CANADIANS GREATEST SPENDERS IN WORLD

**Domestic Expenditures This Year in Advance of Those of Any Other Country.**

A comparison of the budgets of other nations will show what the Borden government's expenditures really mean. Germany, with the greatest army in the world, spends \$7.40 a head; Great Britain, whose taxpayers Mr. Borden wants to bonus with \$35,000,000, spends \$18.50 per head; the United States, \$9.65; France, with the fear of Germany always in hand, \$23; Canada, \$32. The only two countries which surpass Canada are Australia, with \$48.50 per head, and New Zealand, with \$42.75.

But both Australia and New Zealand have the most advanced administrative governmental systems in the world, and make large profits out of state systems of highways, hotels, pleasure resorts and all sorts of state owned enterprises. They give to citizens old age pensions, sick benefits, work benefits, and the like. On a square basis of quid pro quo Canada today is by a very wide way the most highly taxed country in the world. If Mr. Borden and Mr. Rogers continue to work long the cost of living will soon become intolerable.

#### ORE SHIPMENTS AT LAST MAKE A START

**Silver Standard the First with Ten Carloads of Galena as Its Initial Shipment.**

Mr. W. E. Duperow, general passenger agent of the Grand Trunk Pacific at Vancouver, brought some good news as the result of his trip of inspection to the interior. He states that one of the Hazelton mines, the Silver Standard, will begin shipping ore at once, and that other mines will very shortly be following the same course. He says the mines around Hazelton are showing up well and the prospects are in favor of very large ore shipments in the near future.

Many of the mine owners, he said, had been holding back in their development work until the railway had reached their vicinity, and now they had the facilities for transportation, and a freight rate with which everyone was satisfied, the mining activity of the district would be rapidly increased.

The Silver Standard is starting with a shipment of ten cars, which will be sent to the Trail smelter for treatment.

#### EIGHTY WOMEN BURNED

#### FATAL HOTEL FIRE

**Two Men Burned to Death and Several Fatally Injured.**

Chico, Cal., June 20.—The well known Barbour Hotel was totally destroyed by fire early yesterday morning. So rapid was the conflagration that a number of the inmates were unable to escape or were rescued after severe searching. Two men were burned to death and of the twenty others rescued many had received fatal injuries.

#### SIXTY REFRIGERATOR CARS FOR EXPRESS CO.

**Superintendent of Canadian Express Impressed with Possibilities for Big Business.**

M. T. Pullen, general manager of the Canadian Express Company, and N. J. Ross, superintendent of the service in this province, are here on a tour of inspection, the latter having made a trip to the interior, from which he returned yesterday. He was much impressed with the possibilities for business for his company by what he saw between here and Hazelton, believing that in a short time the farming sections will be opened up and rapidly developed and large quantities of farm produce shipped to this port.

He said he had seen good farming country all along the line, and as an evidence of the way in which this railway is developing trade he said his company was now laying down in Edmonton three hundred cans of cream every day. This was independent of the milk business handled by the company and merely went to show the tremendous impetus the railway had given to farming there.

The possibilities for large business in the fishery industry, he said, were far greater and not nearly so remote. His company had already ordered sixty refrigerator cars to start with, to take care of the fish that will go out of here for eastern cities as soon as the railway is coupled up. This number of cars, however, was merely a starter, as the business would rapidly develop and grow into greater things.

#### LUMBER SHIP WRECKED

#### JAPAN HAS LARGEST BATTLESHIP OF WORLD

**But British Battle Cruisers Now Being Built Will Be Even More Powerful.**

Japan is the possessor of the world's most powerful battle cruiser. In offensive, defensive and tactical qualities the Kongo has no superior. She has a length over all of 704 feet, a beam of 92 feet, and at 27 feet 6 inches draught she displaces 27,500 tons. She mounts eight 14 inch guns, as compared with the same number of 13.5 inch guns in British vessels of similar type.

Her anti-torpedo guns are of 6 inch bore, as compared with 4 inch in the British ships, while she has double the number of submerged torpedo tubes. Her steaming and gun trials, which were of a most searching nature, are said to have had unprecedented results.

She was built in England, and so satisfied with her are the Japanese authorities that they have decided to adopt the same plans for three more vessels, to be constructed in Japan. The new British battle cruisers now building will be even more powerful than the Kongo.

#### WROTE NO BOOK

#### CLOUDBURST AND HURRICANE DOES DAMAGE TO LETHBRIDGE

**VIOLENT STORM STRUCK PRAIRIE CITY DURING NIGHT—SWEPT ROOFS OFF HOUSES, TORE UP TREES AND SMASHED FENCES**

#### GRAND LODGE OF MASONS TO MEET IN PRINCE RUPERT

**PROVINCIAL ASSEMBLY HAS DECIDED TO HOLD ITS NEXT ANNUAL MEETING HERE—NEW DISTRICT FORMED FOR RUPERT.**

New Westminster, June 20.—The Grand Lodge, A. F. & A. M., of British Columbia, in session here, has decided to hold its meeting next year in Prince Rupert. This is something which should be of importance to the northern city, as it means that

it will be visited by some two hundred of the most prominent men in the province.

In addition to this, a new Masonic district has been formed for Prince Rupert, and D. H. Morrison of your city has been appointed the first district deputy.

#### CUT RATES ON YUKON

**Fresh Strawberries and Chocolates as Inducements.**

Perhaps by this time the rivalry on the Yukon has grown so keen among the cut rate transportation companies that a man may get a rebate equal to his fare. They are certainly leaving no stone unturned to beat one another. On the second boat leaving for Dawson Mr. O. L. Dickson, president of the White Pass System, purchased a large quantity of fresh strawberries and chocolates and the former will be served to the passengers and the latter distributed among the ladies on the boats making the first trip on the summer schedule.

#### HIT IN THE JAW

**Rolling Rock Tips Plank Sharply into Worker's Face.**

Pete Sackoff, one of the workers at McDougall's camp, had an unpleasant experience yesterday. A rolling rock hit one end of a plank, near the other end of which he was working. The weight of the rock tipped up the plank so that it struck him a nasty blow in the jaw. The injury, however, is not serious and was soon fixed up at the hospital.

#### MEDAL FROM ITALY'S KING

**P. Garrard Rewarded for Services Rendered at Messina.**

Edmonton, June 17.—Two or three days ago a registered parcel came through the Edmonton post office addressed to Major Griesbach. In this little parcel, which had been under the care of the Dominion government since arriving in Canada, was a medal sent by His Majesty the King of Italy to Mr. P. Garrard, formerly quartermaster of the steamer Ophir of Glasgow, who rendered valuable services during the earthquake at Messina and Reggio di Calabria in December, 1908.

#### French Language Campaign.

Montreal, June 17.—A wide appeal for assistance for the French-Canadian Association of Ontario in defending and maintaining the French language in Ontario is being made here by the St. Jean Baptiste Society. School children are expected to give at least one cent, citizens are also being asked to contribute. The speaker of the senate has sent a subscription to the fund, which will be kept open until June 24.

#### RANCHER KILLS AN UNKNOWN BURGLAR

**Fired on Man from Ambush as Bandit Was About to Break Into Ranch House**

The Dalles, Ore., June 17.—Attempts are being made today to positively identify the bandit believed by Coroner Burget to be Cecil Pettijohn, of Dayton, Wis., who was shot and killed by Artie Harriman, while attempting to enter Harriman's ranch house after terrorizing the countryside between The Dalles and the place where he met death, a distance of eight miles. During the trip from The Dalles, part of which was taken with a stolen horse and buggy and the rest of the way on horseback, the desperado fired at at least a dozen persons, one of whom, a man, whose name was not learned, was struck in the arm.

Harriman had concealed himself within the ranch house in anticipation of the unwelcome visit and fired as soon as he was sure of the intentions of the bandit.

The bandit, who was about 22 years old, was partially identified as Pettijohn by Miss Bessie McCullough, aged 18, of Echo, to whom was addressed an envelope found on the dead man's body.

#### TO DEBATE PROBLEMS OF ALL PROVINCES

**Provincial Premiers May Meet at Ottawa to Discuss Matters of Moment**

Ottawa, June 20.—According to the Evening Journal a conference of the premiers of all the provinces will be held here in September to discuss the problems of provincial subsidies, provincial control and natural resources, jurisdiction over the island fisheries, the respective rights of Federal and Provincial governments, the incorporation of companies, Federal aid to highways and to agriculture are other questions of moment which are to be considered.

**NEW YORK VIEW**  
**BORDEN EMERGENCY**

The emergency of the motherland which necessitated Colonial assistance for imperial defence has become an emergency for the Dominion's government in failing to provide help as is proposed. Upon the Senate's rejection of the grant in aid of \$35,000,000 Mr. Churchill announced last week that England itself would build the three ships which Canada had offered to give. There was nothing else to do. Those ships were on the British programme, and if they were not built the balance with Germany would be disturbed. This is such a lame and impotent conclusion to the Right Honorable Robert Borden's six months' campaign of loyalty, says the New York Times, that Sir Wilfrid asked his opponent what he proposed to do about it. The reply was surprising. It was that before the three dreadnoughts were finished Canada would pay for them.

The offer which failed was farcical. The proposal to persist after Parliament's refusal is an insult to popular government. There was no popular mandate to give these vessels, and none dare be sought, for it is sure not to be given. The present government of Canada came into power on a false cry that better commercial relations with the United States—as proposed by Sir Wilfrid—was treason to the Empire. Instead a policy of Imperial loyalty was proposed which parliament refused to accept, and which Britain neither asked for or liked. Now the government proposes to sit tight, and to bring the bills for the warships before the

parliament which refused to authorize them. If the Canadians will stand being deprived of their trade and will not resent being asked twice to reverse a policy which had been formally and unanimously adopted, why, then, they will stand anything.

**WONDERFUL STORY**  
**OF PROSPERITY.**

The Calgary News-Telegram on Saturday, June 14th, issued a prosperity edition of no less than one hundred and four pages, probably the largest daily newspaper issue of the Canadian West. Typographically it is excellent and its numerous illustrations are of the best class. It tells and illustrates how from a mere fort of the Northwest Mounted Police with about 500 inhabitants in 1884, Calgary has grown in less than 20 years until it boasts a population of between 75,000 and 85,000, and in 1920 confidently expects to number 200,000 souls within its gates. In this connection, it would be well to trace this same growth of population year by year, except that accurate figures are not available from 1884 until 1891. The population in 1884 was 500, in 1901 it had risen to 6,557; in 1904 this total had reached 10,543; in 1905 still another gain to 12,550; that year only represented an increase of less than 2,000, but from 1905 to 1907 there was an increase of about 75 per cent., or from 12,500 to 21,040. The total at the end of 1908 was 25,000; 1909 was 35,000; 1910 was 50,000; 1911 it ran up to 55,000; 1912 was 70,000, and the end of the present year is confidently expected to show a total of 85,000.

**STEFANSSON'S PROTEST AS TO MISREPRESENTATION OF PRESS**

**DISCLAIMS THAT IT IS A FREAK EXPEDITION TO FIND LOST TRIBES OF ISRAEL OR CACHE OF FIFTY-YEAR-OLD BRANDY.**

The troubles of an Arctic explorer would aptly summarize the address delivered in the Alexandra Club by Mr. V. Stefansson at a luncheon tendered him by the Canadian Club of Vancouver. Misrepresentation in the press was the principal grievance he discussed, and the examples he was able to quote in articles alleged to be descriptive of the forthcoming expedition were amusing and interesting. In the course of his remarks on this point the explorer said:

"This is not a freak expedition that we are conducting, and I desire that fact to be strongly impressed upon the minds of the public. For the past two months there has been a series of misstatements made concerning it which I desire to dissipate for the last time. For instance, it has been reported that some fifty years or so ago there was a large quantity of brandy and rum dumped somewhere in the northern latitudes by someone or other and it is our object to go into the Northland and find it. There is some point to the story of the liquor being lost, but our object is certainly not to find it."

"Another newspaper canard that has developed a considerable vogue is that we are going off to find the descendants of the party of Scandinavians who disappeared some seven hundred years ago. Then again we have been told that we are going to look for the ten lost tribes of Israel, who, by some ingenious authority, have become related with the first natives of this country. That last suggestion was dropped by a friend of mine, who told me it would cause the people to sit up and take notice. (Laughter.)

"Well, it did. I have never allowed myself to be photographed in skin clothes, but I find that most of the papers in the country have a 'copyrighted' picture of me in that particular garb. Also, they appear to have improved upon my maps, but they are modest enough to describe them as 'Stefansson's own map.' I will say for them that they are humorous. One of them depicts the land as being about the size of England, whereas my conception of it gives it a measurement of a million square miles. Just a matter of detail of course." (Laughter.)

**REVIEW OF WORK ON EXPERIMENTAL FARMS**

**Covers Quarter of a Century of Experiments on Crops, Animals and Farm Profits.**

For more than a quarter of a century the Dominion experimental farms have been carrying on experiments to find out the best kinds of crops and animals and the best ways of handling them for profit. This has been going on not only at the central farm at Ottawa, but also in the Maritime provinces, the Prairie provinces and in British Columbia. The benefits that have resulted to the Canadian farmer from this work are undoubtedly very great, but still thousands of earnest men are not receiving the full advantage of what is being done for them.

Perhaps many do not receive the reports and bulletins containing the information, while others receive these publications regularly but do not find the time to study out the lessons from them. In order to help especially this class of busy men and women there has been issued by direction of Hon. Martin Burrell, minister of agriculture, a special bulletin containing the outstanding conclusions that have been reached during the twenty-five years that the experimental farms were under the directorship of Dr. William Saunders, recently retired. This review, which is tastefully gotten up and well illustrated, has been issued for free distribution by the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 17.—"Philadelphia Jack" O'Brien filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy in the United States district court here today and was adjudged a bankrupt. His petition lists his liabilities at \$401,934.35 and his assets at \$10,027.50. Of the assets \$10,000 is in stocks and bonds.

O'Brien's heavy loss is attributed here to the outcome of his frame-up of a fake bout with Tommy Burns, in which Tommy violated his agreement with O'Brien and knocked him out.

**FUTURE KING TO PICK  
OUT HIS OWN BRIDE**

Prince of Wales Given a Free Hand, Subject to Certain Conventionalities.

London, June 17.—As it is considered advisable that the Prince of Wales should marry as soon as possible after he reaches the age of 24, the list of eligible princesses in Europe is being carefully examined. It is laid down, of course, as absolutely necessary that His Royal Highness should marry a Protestant princess and this narrows the field of selection considerably.

During the next year or two the Prince will visit each of the Protestant courts of Europe in turn. It is more than probable, however, judging from matters as they stand at present, that His Royal Highness will ultimately wed a British princess nearly his own age, thus following the example of his father. He paid a visit to Germany quite recently and it is intended that he shall pay another during the summer, leaving London probably the last week in July and remaining away three weeks.

Subject to certain necessary limitations, His Royal Highness is to be given a completely free hand in the choice of a bride.

**CANADIAN NORTHERN**

Has Over Four Thousand Six Hundred Miles in Operation.

Winnipeg, June 17.—The construction department of the Canadian Northern will hand over to the operating department another 200 miles of new line, which will be put under operation this month.

It is also stated that 400 miles of grade is ready for the steel and that track laying is being rushed with all possible expedition.

Under the increased train service announced in the summer time card the company now has a grand total of 4,691 miles of line in operation in Western Canada.

The civilian population at Serres is also affected. The Greeks are taking precautions to prevent the disease from spreading to their territories.

**American Currency Reform.**

Washington, June 17.—At a meeting of the senate banking and currency committee today Democrats and Republicans expressed opposition to an effort to put through currency legislation at the special session, confident that the introduction of a bill in the senate would lead to long debate, retard the progress of the tariff bill and keep congress here until November.

**Snow in North Carolina.**

Bakersville, N. C., June 17.—Three inches of snow fell in Mitchell County today. Cattle owners in Western North Carolina are facing heavy losses owing to the grass being covered.
