



## PREPARE FOR SHIPLOAD OF VISITORS TOMORROW

### MEMBER FOR YUKON PASSES THROUGH—PASSENGERS SUFFERED NONE BY DELAY OF TRAIN

#### BIG WORK ON BUILDINGS AT DRY DOCK HAS STARTED

MANAGING DIRECTOR BEER, OF WINELAND ENGINEERING COMPANY OUTLINES HIS PLANS—MORE INDUSTRY FOR PRINCE RUPERT.

Work commenced this morning on the erection of the buildings at the dry dock at Hays Creek. The work is being undertaken for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company by the Wineland Engineering Company of Vancouver. The buildings to be erected are a power house and chimney connected with it, a ship building shed, a combined boiler and blacksmith shop and a machine shop.

M. H. Beer, the managing director of the company, came here on Saturday to superintend the arrangements for the commencement of operations. He returned to Vancouver on the Prince Rupert this morning. Before leaving he gave The News an outline of his plans.

"The work," he said, "is not likely to be finished in less than a year, for it is a big undertaking. We shall only have a few men on the job at the start, but the number will be rapidly increased until we have a hundred or more. Mr. J. S. Pearce is the engineer in charge and Mr. L. B. Wineland is the superintendent. They, of course, will be here permanently. After the work gets well started I shall come up here myself about once a month to

see how things are progressing. I expect to be here next during the last week of July.

"Although I am trying to get as much as possible of my material—as I am getting my workers—from this locality, I shall, of course, be obliged to bring in a great deal. Five million feet of lumber will be required for the construction of the pontoons, a work which will take from eighteen months to two years. I had a quarter of a million feet shipped in last week, together with all the equipment necessary for starting work. At the end of this week a thousand barrels of cement will come in, and next month 2,000 cubic yards of gravel. All the steel will be brought here for the buildings in November. Then we shall have a large sized gang of men at the work and I shall spend at least half my time here in connection with it."

The power house is to stand in the rear of the launching platform. It will have in it provision for the electric power necessary for operating the pumping machinery of the floating dock, as well as for com-

#### GALLANT RESCUE OF A DROWNING CHILD

Boy of Eight Was Drowning at Seal Cove When Rescued by Foreman Babcock.

There was very nearly a drowning accident at Seal Cove yesterday, and it was only averted by an act of gallantry that is worthy of record. Little Fasola Girardo, a bright boy of eight, was playing among the row boats in the little bay at the rear of the cold storage plant. Whether he had managed to untie the boat he was in or it had been negligently left unsecured is not known, but it drifted out and the very much scared youngster either fell or jumped overboard in ten feet of water.

The yell he raised was fortunately heard by Foreman Babcock, of the fish department, who rushed to the water's edge and plunged in. He grabbed the little chap as he was coming up the second time and brought him to land, where he was soon restored but little the worse for his drowning.

But the swim for Mr. Babcock seemed likely to prove a costly one, for during his exertion in the water he had lost his pocket book, containing \$168. When the tide went out, however, the pocket book was found on the sands and returned to him intact.

#### OPENING UP PRINCE RUPERT COAL FIELDS

Have Coal Enough in Sight to Warrant Building a Branch Railway.

A party of eight men, under the supervision of A. J. Beaudette, left Wednesday for the property of the Prince Rupert Coal Fields, Ltd., to start the season's work. A new diamond drill outfit has been brought in and the work will be greatly facilitated by the installation of a larger boiler than that used last year, when they had insufficient power for deep drilling.

It has been proven almost to a certainty that they have coal enough to warrant the building of a railroad and start active mining, but it is their intention to determine the exact tonnage and Mr. Jefferson, manager of the company, and who is now in Telkwa, is confident that this work will be completed this year.

Frank Dockerill, who has been identified with mining in this section for a number of years, is expected to arrive within a few days to take charge of work in the field. His delay in arriving has been due to sickness, he having had to undergo an operation a short time ago. — Telkwa Tribune.

#### PAVED THE WAY FOR CARNEGIE MISSION

London Despatch to Toronto Star Authority for Statements of Great Import.

Toronto, Ont., June 19.—A new triple alliance for peace of import to the whole world impends if a special despatch published here today by the Toronto Star is founded on fact. Dated from London, the story says:

"It is stated here on the best authority that the conference in Berlin on Monday between Andrew Carnegie and the Kaiser was internationally of far greater significance than has generally been supposed. It is reported that Carnegie had official credentials from both England and America authorizing him to commence negotiations for a triple alliance between these three nations (Great Britain, the United States and Germany) which would establish and ensure peace to the civilized world.

"It is believed that King George, when he attended the Germany royal nuptials, opened the way for Carnegie.

"It is reported the proposal is in the form of a ten year agreement which will materially lessen the proposed increase in armaments and will guarantee peace and good will."

#### MEMBER FOR YUKON PASSES THROUGH CITY

Dr. Alfred Thompson, M. P., of Dawson, Speaks Optimistically of the North Country.

Dr. Alfred Thompson, member of parliament for Yukon Territory, came in on the Sophia and made a brief visit here with his brother, Mr. James Thompson of Second avenue. The doctor was going back to his constituents feeling very pleased with what he had been able to accomplish for them at Ottawa. Perhaps the one point among others that gave him pleasure was in having obtained a first appropriation of \$50,000 for the construction of an automobile road from Whitehorse to Dawson, a distance of approximately 400 miles. This will not only ensure a regular mail service winter and summer, but will no doubt lead to many parties of tourists from all parts of the world.

Dr. Thompson is sunnily optimistic in his opinion of the Yukon. "There is no financial stringency in that part of the country," he says, "for we produce the stuff that money's made from and that always finds a good market."

Dr. Thompson thinks that the advent of the Democrats to power should benefit the Yukon by benefiting Alaska. He would like to see the establishment of an international railway from Haines to Dawson or to Fairbanks. The cession of the Panhandle to Canada would be an excellent thing, in his opinion, for both this country and the United States.

The large moneys which have been invested in Yukon mining properties recently ensure the prosperity of the territory. There have been considerable developments of copper in the south, and altogether the mining industry is very prosperous.

Fred Stork Offers Prizes for Fishing Competition.

Fred Stork, the hardware merchant, has decided to offer two high grade fishing rods as prizes for a fishing competition. #### HARBOR WILL BE ALL ABLAZE WITH COLOR EARLY TOMORROW

STEAMER JEFFERSON WILL BE MASS OF CHROMATIC BUNTING—EVERY BOAT HERE WILL FLY ITS GLAD RAGS AND TOOT

Early tomorrow morning the harbor will look like a holiday celebration when the Jefferson steams in, as out of compliment to the Seattle visitors most of the boats will be rigged out in holiday furbelows; and those who have whistles will let them shriek. For the Jefferson will be most profusely decorated, not only with the ship's flags and the standards of the United States and Canada, but also with artistically designed pennants bearing the names of many of the commercial houses of Seattle which will be represented on the trip.

One of the distinguished men aboard will be the personal representative of President Wilson, Mr. Seth Mann. He received his appointment from the president on account of his prominence as a San Francisco lawyer thoroughly acquainted with mining and mining law, gained through his handling of many famous cases of quartz and placer litigation in the California and other courts.

Another distinguished gentleman of the party is W. D. Boyce, publisher, traveler, author, explorer and promoter of the literary output of writers generally. Several years ago Mr. Boyce purchased a cheap weekly paper

called the Chicago Blade. He reconstructed it on the line of the Saturday Evening Post and in a short time it reached the million mark in circulation. He has since travelled extensively all over the world and written an important book on his travels and experiences.

Mr. Boyce sent an expedition to Alaska in 1897, which lost all its photographic supplies and supplies. Mr. Boyce is going himself this time to insure getting the material he desires. After Lieutenant Schwatka's exploration to Alaska Mr. Boyce sent him into Africa and himself toured that country during the time ex-President Roosevelt was on his hunting trip.

As soon as the Jefferson arrives tomorrow morning the visitors will be taken in a special train to Terrace and entertained there by the Board of Trade. The rest of their itinerary during their stay at this port will largely depend upon arrangements to be made after their arrival, every effort being made to impress upon the distinguished visitors, the largest and most representative that has ever put in here, the growing importance in the world of commerce of Prince Rupert.

#### FIRST GOLD DUST SHIPMENT FROM THE YUKON AND ALASKA

STEAMER HUMBOLDT CARRIES TO SEATTLE NEARLY TWO TONS OF YELLOW METAL AS RESULT OF SPRING CLEAN-UP.

Seattle, June 19.—Nearly two tons of gold bullion locked in steel chests, the first big treasure cargo of the year from the mining camps of interior Alaska, reached Seattle yesterday morning on the steamer Humboldt, of the Humboldt Steamship Company. On every voyage to the Yukon to late in the fall the Humboldt has large shipments of the yellow metal, and she has been called the "gold ship" on account of the millions of dollars' worth of bullion she has brought to Seattle.

The consignment of treasure brought by the vessel yesterday is valued at \$780,000. There was \$262,000 from Fairbanks, \$60,000 from Circle and \$458,000 from the Yukon Gold Company's

mines at Dawson. The Fairbanks gold was consigned to the Dexter Horton National Bank, the Scandinavian American Bank and the Seattle assay office, and the gold from the Yukon Gold Company, at Dawson, which is owned by the Guggenheims, will go to their own smelter at Selby, Cal. The treasure shipment is the first of the spring clean-up, which for four consecutive seasons has been brought south on the Humboldt.

Apples for Australia.  
Penticton, June 19.—Mr. R. Robinson, manager of the United Okanagan Growers, reports that he has closed a contract for apples to Australia at the price of \$1.40 per box.

#### BERRIES FOR LADIES; CIGARS FOR THE MEN

One Can Travel in Luxury Down the Yukon During These Cut Rate Times.

It is learned from the Whitehorse Star that when President Dickson, of the White Pass Company, passed through Prince Rupert he carried with him fifty crates of fresh strawberries for the first lady passengers going down the river on his company's boats and ten thousand Madura cigars for the delectation of their escorts. He has now only to place a brass band on board and again cut the fare in half to secure all the trade on the river between Whitehorse and Fairbanks.

#### OVERFLOW OF SKEENA DELAYS TRAIN FOR SEVENTEEN HOURS

HAZELTON TRAIN DID NOT ARRIVE UNTIL TEN O'CLOCK TODAY—HELD UP BY WASHOUTS ON LINE

The G. T. P. train from Hazelton had the misfortune to be held up last night by several washouts, the worst being at Mile 73. In consequence, instead of arriving with its customary punctuality at five o'clock yesterday afternoon, the train did not come in till a quarter to ten this morning, almost seventeen hours after the schedule time.

A gulch had overflowed at Mile 73 and swept away the filling of about fifty feet of track. There was six feet of water on the track. As there is no siding at

Mile 73, the train was run back to Shames at Mile 77, where it stayed till seven o'clock this morning, when it was once more safe to proceed.

Those who were awaiting the train this morning expected to see a weary and famished-looking crowd of passengers alight, but they were pleasantly disappointed. All appeared as well as if nothing had happened. The food supply had held out well and the people had curled themselves up and slept on the seats as best they might.

**FINANCING EMPIRE DEVELOPMENT.**

A scheme which might do much more to solidify the Empire than Mr. Borden's plan of contributing to a centralized navy is that which was recently put forward by a prominent citizen of New Zealand. The scheme is the establishment of an Empire Development Board for the furnishing of a joint guarantee for all works of development undertaken by parts of the Empire which would benefit the Empire as a whole. This was suggested by Mr. Harold Beauchamp of Wellington, New Zealand, acting manager of the board of directors of the Bank of New Zealand, when speaking before a New Zealand royal commission.

Mr. Beauchamp suggests that such a board might give a joint imperial guarantee in connection with loans for defensive purposes and for the improvement of connections, such as shipping, cables and harbors, between the different parts of the Empire.

As a result of this, he thinks, the dominions might obtain such loans at a much lower rate of interest—perhaps a full 1 per cent. less. The interest now payable on such loans is from 4 1/4 to 4 1/2 per cent, as a rule. This is indeed much lower than it could be secured from foreign money markets, but the British money market would be likely to make another reduction if each loan were guaranteed by all parts of the Empire. The interest in that case would probably not amount to more than 3 1/4 per cent.

Such an empire development

board would, however, act as a check on wildcat schemes, and would prevent possible wasteful expenditures, acting as a kind of imperial senate of finance. But above all things it would furnish "a practical and not a purely sentimental binding influence in so far as the Mother Country and the outer empire were concerned."

**ARE JAPANESE WHITE, NOT YELLOW?**

Under the heading, "Are the Japanese Mongolian?" William Elliot Griffiths has an article in the June number of the North American Review, in which he pooh poohs the talk about the danger from intermixture of the American and Japanese races.

The Japanese, he declares, are of Aryan stock, just as we are. There is undoubtedly a Mongolian strain in the race, but it is mainly Aryan. In all their characteristics, too—patriotism, energy, resourcefulness, skill in adaptation—they are Occidental rather than Oriental. The Chinese, like the Hindus, are men of thought. The Japanese, like the British and the Americans, are men of action.

Yet even if we admit all this, and speak of Japan no longer as in the Near East, but as in the Farthest West, the problem of their immigration into these countries still remains unsolved. For the present, thanks to the Lemieux agreement, it is not an acute problem with us. Let us hope that it will remain so for some time to come and leave us all our energies to undertake the great tasks of developing the wealth of this great province.

**GHOSTLY BARRIERS BETWEEN THE PROSPECTOR AND BUYER**

**ANY COPPER MINES IN BRITISH COLUMBIA FOR SALE TODAY COULD BE SOLD TOMORROW—USEFUL HINTS TO PROSPECTORS**

W. R. Hull, who has for many years given close attention to the mining situation in British Columbia and its relation to the development of the Coast cities has written the subjoined letter. What Mr. Hull says is eminently to the point and is of such importance that it should be emphasized in the fullest degree. Mr. Hull says:

"There is a barrier between the prospector and the mine. There is a ghostly wall between the prospector and the buyer. The barrier and the wall may be classified as 'lack of development.'"

The prospector can only go so far. He can discover the property, and develop it to the extent of a few open cuts and possibly a 100-foot shaft, then he must look for outside capital. And so far as Vancouver is concerned, he is up against it. He must have money to continue his development work, and he cannot get it here. He goes to Spokane, Butte or Seattle.

"Vancouver boasts regarding her building permits, her bank clearances, her customs and postoffice receipts, and most of all, of her real estate transactions. Vancouver has the voting power and the money power to control the rest of this great province, and the time is coming, and that soon, when this power must be used in developing the natural resources of the province without which the city could hardly exist.

"The mining resources of British Columbia offer a field for investment second to none in the world. The income from mines at the present forms the greatest asset which the province can show, with lumbering interests next in value. And there is not at this time a development syndicate in the province.

"This is where the barrier comes in. The prospector is a man described as being 'broad across the back, and narrow between the eyes.' The psychologist might describe him as being a man of great physical endurance and unlimited imagination, but whatever his abilities, and whatever his limitations, he can

go only so far, in the development of the property which he may discover. Eventually he must find capital for the further development of his property, and he comes to Vancouver. It is a fact, that he cannot here raise capital to go ahead with his work. Hence he goes to the cities of the United States, and in the course of time the papers publish dividend returns showing what our cousins across the line have made from our mines. If there were British Columbia development syndicates which would take likely prospects and put them in shape to appeal to the English and Eastern buyers, the mining business would be on a much more satisfactory basis than it is today. There is no reason why Vancouver men will not combine in friendly groups to handle this end of the mining business. They do not need to work mines—their business should be to make mines from prospects, and when a property is sufficiently developed, sell it to one of the companies which are always looking for mines.

"Were there any copper mines for sale in British Columbia today, they could be sold tomorrow. Buyers are demanding property. But they will not take prospects, they want something developed. They could get all kinds of good looking prospects, but these will not fill the bill. They must have developed mines. In order to fill their orders there is a gulf to cross. That prospect must be made into a mine. That is where the development syndicate comes, and there isn't one in British Columbia."—Portland Canal Miner.

**Shell Fish Expert Leaves.**

So we shout to you where the many weep:

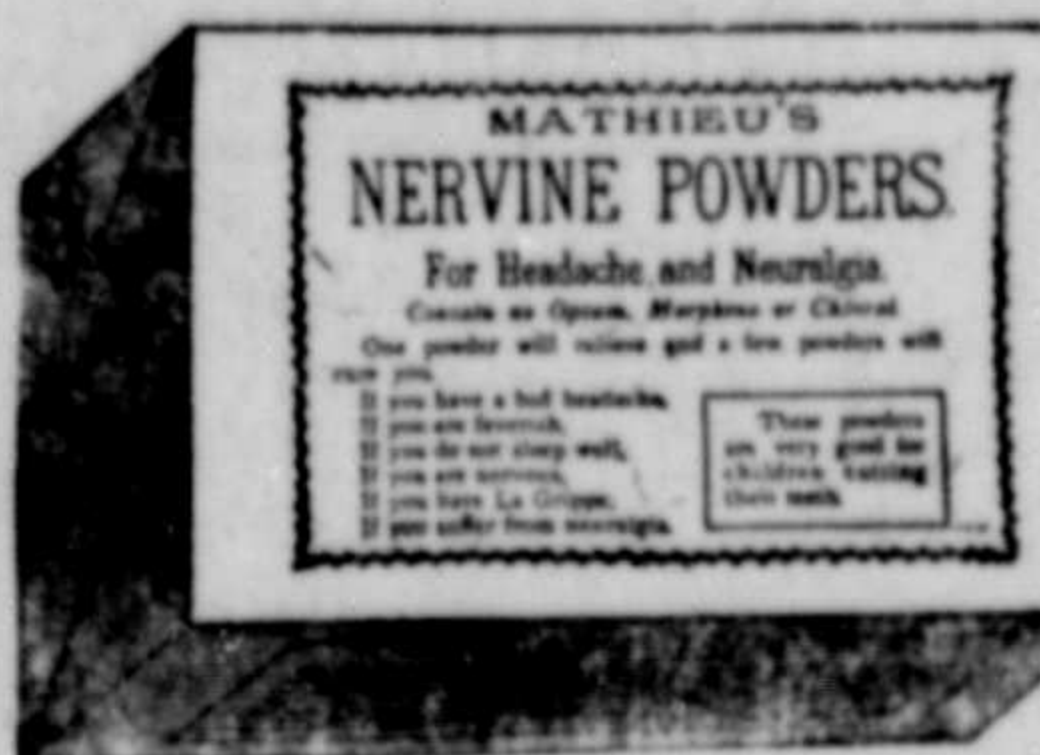

THREE NOTABLE EX-QUEENS NOW VISITING PARIS

Their presence in the gay French capital at the same time was an unexpected coincidence, and mutual friends brought them together at a social function that was quite unique. The most pathetic figure of the three is that of Ex-Empress Eugenie, once the centre around which the world of fashion whirled. During the revolution in Paris which followed her country's defeat in the Franco-Prussian war she secretly escaped to England and has since resided at Chiselhurst, Kent. There she mourned the death of her son, assassinated in the Zulu war and of her husband, Napoleon III. Her first visit to Paris was in 1881, at the time when her nephew, Napoleon Victor, better known as "Plon-Plon," issued his famous proclamation. Through his friendship with the late Dr. Evans, who had carried out her escape from Paris, Mr. Coyne, now of the Daily News, interviewed the still regal lady on the pretender's aspirations for Reuter's and the Associated Press.

CANADIANS MUST HAVE HEAPS OF MONEY FOR BRITISH HOUSE

PROMINENT MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT SAYS POLITICIANS FROM DOMINION WITHOUT INFLUENCE IN ENGLAND.

London, June 19.—A story is cabled here from Ottawa today that the British Conservatives are offering at least three well known Canadian members at Ottawa nominations for British constituencies. Enquiries in the lobby at Westminster, however, discredit this story and a prominent member remarked that now that the fiscal question was almost buried the Tory party would never think of asking Dominion members to come here merely to support that propaganda. "The only Dominion politician who is wanted here by either party," declared this member, "is one who has heaps of money and will fight a hopeless battle. I see," he went on, "this Ottawa cable speaks of there already being a notable Canadian contingent at Westminster. Well, the man who wrote that does not know what he is talking about. There is not one of the ex-Canadian politicians here who has any real political influence. The truth is this class nearly always enters the British legislature too late in life, either to grasp British domestic problems or gain the real confidence of their party. "The rich Canadian who comes here to fight a hopeless battle generally gets rewarded with a knighthood, which is all he deserves." This member further informed the Canadian Associated Press that it was his conviction there would be no general election here, barring exceptional and unforeseen events, until home rule was established.

CANADIAN NORTHERN PORT IN LABRADOR

Short Mail Route to Britain May Be Established by New Railway.

TRACK LAYING NEARLY REACHES MORICETOWN

Estimated That Steel Will Be Across the Telkwa River by August Tenth.

Sherbrooke, Que., June 18.—It is stated here that the Canadian Northern will enter this city by a line from Montreal next year. This line will be in connection with the short mail route from Liverpool to this side and will involve a seaport on the Labradorian coast, a railway line from Labrador to Quebec and another from Quebec to Sherbrooke, connecting here with the Boston and Maine line.

The latest report from the track laying crew, says the Telkwa Tribune, is that they are now about one mile and a half this side of Moricetown, where they will be delayed for a day or two while a trestle is being put in over a slide. It has been given out, semi-officially, that the steel will be across the Telkwa River by August 10th, barring accident. The Trout Creek crossing will be reached by Monday evening or early Tuesday, where the last big bridge is to be put in, and it is claimed this bridge will be completed within three weeks, which is about two weeks earlier than the first estimate.

### BIG WORK ON BUILDINGS AT DRY DOCK STARTED

(Continued from page 4)

pressing air, furnishing light for the plant, etc. With a ground area of 104 by 148 feet the building is to contain both boilers and power plant under one roof, with fireproof dividing walls. It will be so constructed that two or more boilers can be added later, also an economizer can be installed if it is found that the expense is warranted by the load factor. The building will have a steel frame chimney two hundred feet high and eleven feet in diameter. It will also be provided with an overhead trolley for handling coal from storage to hoppers above stokers and also for handling ashes.

In front of the power house will be the ship building shed. It will be 160 feet by 300. In it there is to be placed a ten ton travelling crane for handling timber to build the pontoons. The pontoons also will be placed in the shed.

The boiler and blacksmith shop will be located alongside the power house. It will be a structural steel building, like the others, the walls and roof being of reinforced concrete. It will be 76 feet by 150 feet in size. The central part, 33 feet in width, will be provided with a travelling crane of fifteen tons. The flooring will be of concrete with heavy foundations necessitated by the large tools. In this shop there will be installed six 400 horse power water tube boilers, supplied with automatic stokers, chain grate type.

From the same set of plans as the boiler and blacksmith shop there is to be constructed a machine shop, so situated as to be easy of access from the dry dock and the waterfront. It will be outfitted with a complete equipment of tools. The large tools will be driven by individual motors, the smaller will be worked in groups. There will be a special room for the care and repair of air tools.

### Another Treaty Ratified.

Tokio, June 19.—Conditional upon Japanese in Austria and Italy being granted similar rights new commercial treaties granting subjects of these countries the privilege of owning real property in Japan are ratified today.
