ON ADVERTISING THE CAUSE OF PEACE.

If Mr. Carnegie succeeds in persuading the Kaiser, Sir Edward Grey and President Wilson to sign a treaty of alliance for enforcing the keeping of the peace he will deserve that a monument of gold be erected to his fame in the capital of each of the three nations concerned. But we are inclined to be skeptical of any such momentous outcome of his visit to Berlin. It is yet, we fear, too early to hope for constructive work in international peace making. Philanthropists rush in where diplomats fear to tread. The utmost good that is likely to ensue from this visit is that it will be a good advertisement, not only for Mr. Carnegie, but also for the cause of peace. When the idea of the folly of war has been hammered into the minds of the people of the world and their rulers for another quarter of a century the general temper will have become such that it will be positively dangerous to manifest a bellicose and jingoistic spirit. It will then be recognized that the man who talks loose minded of the glories of war and shouts for blood and thunder is nothing but an inciter to national crime. And the genius of a Kipling or a Henley will not save such a man from admonishments stern enough to turn him from wallowing in the muck of decayed romanticism to walk in the straight and clean path of humanity and common sense. The cause of peace, like that of adult suffrage and most other new ideas, needs constant advertisement to make it tri-

umph. But it suffers severely from the fact that the cause of war is and long has been one of the most widely advertised in the world. The joy of the battle and the splendor of its heroes have been ever two of the main themes of which our poets have sung and our story tellers have descanted. A great step forward will be made when our saga men agree to weave their legends generally, as some of them, to their credit, are already doing, about prowess in other fields than that of Mars. The exploits of the engineer, the seaman, the merchant, the farmer are as worthy of record as are those of the soldier.

DO WE FULLY REALIZE HOW PRINCE RUPERT GROWS?

When he was here yesterday Dr. Alfred Thompson, M. P. of Dawson, made many remarks of surprise at the development of Prince Rupert. Yet it is only a few months since he was last in this city when on his way to Ottawa. Take note of this, all of you who do not realize how Prince Rupert is developing. The people who are here all the time see so many changes that they become dulled to their importance. But the man who is away from the city for even half a year finds on his return that many new things strike his eye. It would be difficult to find another place of this size on the continent in which so many new undertakings are being constantly launched. And it is only as if we were getting up speed now. Think how fast we shall go when we really get started.

THE DOMINION SHOULD FORTIFY SELF FIRST

"If She Needs a Navy for This
She Should Have One," De-
clares Lavergne.

Toronto, June 19.—"I consider that before taking any action upon the navy a plebiscite should be taken and the opinion of the people learned," said Mr. Armand Lavergne, of Le Devoir, when seen in the King Edward yesterday, immediately after his arrival from Niagara, where he spoke on "Canadian Nationalism" before the Canadian Club last evening. "The principles of nationalism are opposed to an imperial navy without an imperial parliament. If we have an imperial parliament we must submit to taxation by that parliament."

"I am opposed to the fusion of the two races of this country, believing that in two strong and separate races we have the nucleus of a great country. We might instance here Belgium, Switzerland, two strong and contented countries."

"No, I am not an Imperialist. I am a Britisher, and hold a commission in the Canadian militia. Canada's first duty is to fortify herself. If she needs a navy for this she must have one."

STUDY COAL FIELDS OF QUEEN CHARLOTTE

Federal Geological Survey Party
Has Been Sent to Islands
to Investigate.

For the purpose of getting an accurate report on the coal fields of the Queen Charlotte Islands the Dominion government has sent out a geological survey party to carefully investigate the numerous prospects that have been reported.

The party, which consists of five men, headed by J. D. McKenzie, arrived in Prince Rupert Saturday morning and left by the steamer Prince John at 8 o'clock the same evening for Skidegate. They have with them a complete camp equipment, including tents and supplies, and expect to spend at least three months in various parts of the islands.

The result of their work is of great importance to Prince Rupert and their report will be awaited with considerable interest.



WILL BUOY CANAL.

Lighthouse and Foghorn for Entrance of Portland Canal.

Word has been received from Prince Rupert that the lighthouse tender Estevan, of the Marine and Fisheries department, is due here next week to replace the buoys in the harbor. According to Captain Saunders, head of the department in the north, recommendations have been made for a lighthouse and foghorn at Portland Point, the entrance to Portland Canal, and for lights on Hetty Island, Stick Point and in the harbor at a point off the Portland City wharf.—Portland Canal Mimer.

ALICE ARM GROUP HAS BEEN BONDED

T. F. Hopkins, Representing Butte Capitalists, Makes Initial Payment on Two Groups.

Word has been received from Alice Arm that the Red Point and Race Horse groups, situated about 22 miles up the Kitsuait river, have been bonded by T. F. Hopkins of Seattle for the sum of \$101,000. Mr. Hopkins, who is well known locally, having been a principal in several deals in 1909, is said to represent Butte interests in the purchase of the two groups, on which the initial payment has been made.

The Red Point group consists of three claims and is owned by Charles Swanson, Ola Evanson, R. L. Eik, Ole Pearson and Ernest Carlson. The Race Horse group, adjoining, consists of four claims and is owned by Charles Swanson and Alf. Miner. Considerable prospecting has already been done, proving the existence of several leads measuring from four to forty feet in width. The ore is a chalcopyrite. From the Red Point showings assays of from \$2.50 to \$11 have been obtained and from the Race Horse from a few dollars up to \$53 in gold, silver and copper.

The news of the bonding has been received with considerable satisfaction here, as it points to the fact that capital for legitimate mining development is to be had, notwithstanding the apparent money stringency. Several prospectors are already interested up the Kitsuait, and following this river the government is constructing a pack trail to the new camp, which now bids fair to attract considerable attention in mining circles.—Portland Canal Miner.

TO PURCHASE SITE FOR PLAYGROUND

Fred Stork Gives Shrewd Scheme to Council for Acquiring Recreation Ground.

Mr. Fred Stork appeared before the city council yesterday evening to propose that a recreation ground should be secured for the city. He suggested a site on Acropolis Hill between Borden street and the reservoir. This, he thought, might be purchased at small cost and converted into a recreation ground by an expenditure of not more than \$10,000. Mr. Stork recognized the fact that the council was confronted with a difficult money situation. He therefore suggested that the grounds might be purchased by a joint stock company of citizens. From ten to one hundred dollars' worth of stock might be taken by citizens. The bonds would bear no interest and would be redeemable by the city in two or three years.

This matter was referred to the finance committee and the parks committee for their consideration and report.

The outfit of the men who are now doing the city scavenging will be purchased by the corporation, which decided some time ago to take over the work. The outfit consists of two horses and carts, etc., and will cost \$900.

NOTED RAILWAYMAN HAS PASSED AWAY

Mr. Henry Wilkes Walker, Former General Auditor of G. T. R., Died in Winnipeg.

Mr. Henry Wilkes Walker, formerly general auditor of the G. T. R., and one of the best known railway men in the Dominion, died at his residence at Winnipeg, Man., on June 10. Mr. Walker was born at Brantford, Ont., February 12th, 1839. He was educated at the Hamilton grammar school and entered the service of the Great Western Railway in 1854. After four years he went to the Detroit & Milwaukee Railway, and in 1862 joined the Grand Trunk Railway as chief bookkeeper.

Mr. Walker's subsequent appointments in the service of the G. T. R. were as follows: Accountant, January, 1878; chief accountant (in succession to Sir Joseph Hickson), June 19, 1893; general auditor, April 1, 1906, from which position he retired on January 1, 1907, after 53 years' continuous service.

Mr. Walker was greatly interested in western development, and moved to Winnipeg in August, 1911, where he since then resided. He had been in Prince Rupert and had some friends here who felt a warm attachment for him.

He was married to Frances, daughter of the late John Leeming, Esq., of Montreal, who survives him, together with four sons and two daughters, Dr. J. Leeming Walker, Frank W., Arthur P. and Lewis C. Leeming. Mrs. Walter Williams and Mrs. Andrew R. McMaster, as well as two sisters, Mrs. Henry Birks and Miss Walker.

SEWER QUESTION IS AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT

Ald. McCaffery and Ald. Bullock-Webster Spar Over Rights of Private Owners.

Alderman Bullock-Webster and Alderman McCaffery were again the centres of interest for some minutes at the city council meeting. Alderman Bullock-Webster wanted to know why bills had been sent out from the city assessor's office calling for repairs to a private sewer on Fifth avenue. He did not think that the municipal officials could be well informed in the matter, as at first the cost was to be laid on ten, and then it was changed to fourteen, while even this did not include all, and it should have been laid on fifteen. As the work was for a private sewer, he did not see why the bill should be sent from the city assessor's office.

Alderman McCaffery explained that in apportioning the cost of the repairs nothing had at first been charged to some who had made connections without securing permission. He understood that Alderman Bullock-Webster was one of those who had done this. As for charging the cost of the repairs to private individuals, this had been done by Alderman McCaffery's own instructions. It was the only feasible way of meeting the expense.

Alderman Bullock-Webster said that for his part he had agreed to pay \$15 for sewer connections, and that he had already paid \$120, so he had borne his share. He still wished to know why the money for a private sewer should be collected by the city. He thought that some would object to paying.

Alderman McCaffery said that he had undertaken himself to pay for any of those who declined to take their share of the burden.

SPLENDID GALENA ON SALMON RIVER

Excellent Showing Made on Indian Mine in an Adit Following the Vein.

In a distance of some 230 feet from the portal of the upper tunnel being driven at the Indian mine, on the Salmon river, a fine shoot of galena ore has been struck recently. The adit was driven following the vein and the shoot of ore encountered is believed to be the same shoot opened up on the surface. After striking the new ore body the face of the tunnel was enlarged, showing the vein to measure six feet in width. Roy Clothier brought in some splendid samples of galena from the face of the tunnel. J. Fred Ritchie, P. L. S., of Prince Rupert, one of the directors of the Indian Mines, Ltd., is here and will shortly survey the company's holdings.—Portland Canal Miner.
