

## C.N.R. MAY BECOME PROPERTY OF THE DOMINION

### HON. J. D. HAZEN IS COMING TO PRINCE RUPERT—MANY DEATHS FROM HEAT IN NEW YORK

#### DOMINION GOVERNMENT MAY BUY OUT CANADIAN NORTHERN

IT IS REPORTED THAT THE ACQUISITION OF THE MAIN LINE AND BRANCHES WILL BE DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE OF PREMIERS.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, July 4.—That the government of Canada will shortly take over the Canadian Northern Railway is reported here on good authority. The acquisition of the main line and branches will be discussed shortly, it is said, at the conference of provincial premiers here. The road in any event will seek further financial aid from the Dominion, and its control by commission is probable.

The Dominion and provincial governments are already guaranteeing it security which amounts to over one hundred and twenty million dollars.

Ottawa, July 4.—Efforts to secure any official confirmation of the report of the contemplation by the government of the acquisition of the Canadian Northern Railway are unavailing. Most of the cabinet ministers are out of town.

#### WAS LARGEST LAND OWNER IN EUROPE

Late Duke of Sutherland and His Vast Tract of Fine Farms in Alberta.

Cromarty Sutherland-Leveson-Gower, fourth Duke of Sutherland, was born July 20, 1851, and he was, with the exception of the Emperor of Russia, the largest land owner in Europe. His Scottish estates embraced nearly a million and a half acres. He owned 30,000 acres in Staffordshire and Shropshire and much landed property in other countries. He was noted as a sportsman and a fine yachtsman. His yachts included the Catania and Lizette.

In 1884 he married Lady Millicent Fanny St. Clair-Erskine, daughter of the fourth Earl of Rosslyn, two sons and one daughter being the result of the union. In recent years the Duke has been deeply interested in a colonization scheme for Western Canada, and to that end had purchased vast tracts of territory.

His colony near Brooks, Alta., is on a farm of 7,251 acres. This vast tract of land is divided up into farms. Before farmers came to settle on them the farms were prepared for them, in much the same way as the C. P. R. prepares ready made farms. The house and barns were erected, a well dug, the farm was fenced and about 50 acres were broken and seeded.

The farms range in size from 160 to 320 acres, upon which the Duke placed tenants from his estate in Scotland, preferably married men. These farms were taken by the men under a payment arrangement which will ultimately give them the title to their property.

#### KING GEORGE MAY YET PAY VISIT TO CANADA

New York Herald Says He May Open Toronto Exhibition Next Year.

New York, July 1.—The London correspondent of the New York Herald, regarded usually as the best informed of American correspondents in Britain, cables his paper as follows:

"King George's keen personal interest in the Empire and all matters imperial are well known. England has had no king so widely travelled as he and no ruler has had so intimate a familiarity with his own Dominions. It is quite on the cards that he may make an imperial tour such as he made some years ago when Prince of Wales. It is settled that communications are passing between the Canadian government and the colonial office regarding a suggestion that the King, accompanied by the Prince of Wales, should open the Toronto exhibition next year. It is understood, too, that the King has signified his willingness to perform the ceremony.

"It is not certain, however, that the Prince of Wales will accompany his father, but it is thought not probable that both the sovereign and the heir apparent should be absent from the United Kingdom at the same time. It is stated also in a well informed quarter that King George may go to South Africa and Australia as well next year."

#### TAXATION OF GERMAN RULERS DISCUSSED IN THE REICHSTAG

QUESTION OF LIABILITY OF THE RULING PRINCES TO ORDINARY ASSESSMENT AND THEIR EXEMPTION FROM TAXATION.

A recent session of the budget committee of the Reichstag was occupied by the continuation of the debate on the question whether the obligation of the German sovereigns to contribute to the unique £50,000,000 "war tax" should be fixed by statute. Two main points were raised by the discussion: first, whether these rulers could be regarded as fully embodying the principle of "sovereignty" in the Empire, as a whole; secondly, whether in the event of the foregoing question being answered in the affirmative, they could be compelled by the legislature to pay taxation.

The government and the Conservatives advanced the view that as members of the federal council, in which full imperial sovereignty resides, the ruling princes were themselves completely endowed with sovereign attributes, and that since they had been exempt from taxation before the federation, and the federal compact had said they could not now be compelled to contribute to the revenue of the Empire.

A large majority of the committee, however, was of opinion that the federated rulers were not in the fullest sense "sovereign" in the Empire, that they consequently could not claim the exemption demanded and that, in any event, they paid indirect taxation, which differed from direct in manner rather than in substance.

It had been pointed out by the government representatives that the original Socialist motion on which the debate was concentrated, and which expressly provided the liability of rulers, implied their exemption with regard to other taxation. Recognizing the force of this contention, the Socialists withdrew their motion, and substituted another, which served their ends equally well by implying this liability. It was to the effect that "the federal council decides who has to make the assessment declaration for the federal princes and for members of formerly sovereign houses." This motion was eventually carried by a substantial majority.

#### AGED WOMAN SHOPS FOR HER OWN COFFIN

Distrusting Her Husband's Relatives, She Selects Shell to Suit Herself.

New York, July 1.—"And when the good Lord deems it advisable to call me from this world, He shall not find me unprepared." In this way Mrs. Elizabeth Watt, 85 years old, explained the presence in the parlor of her little home, on the top floor of No. 450 West Forty-second street, of an expensive mahogany coffin.

"Why did I buy it?" she asked. "Before the death of my husband, Andrew, twenty years ago, we had saved up quite a bit of money. I still have some of it. Certain of my husband's relatives have been trying to get it away from me, and I know that when I die they will get it. I came to the conclusion that if I wanted to make certain of a decent burial I would have to see to it myself before I died. Therefore, I visited an undertaker yesterday and had the coffin brought to the house. Isn't it beautiful?"

#### DUCHESS NOW ABLE TO RECEIVE FRIENDS

One Visitor at a Time Permitted to See the Duchess of Connaught.

London, June 30.—Now that the Duchess of Connaught is convalescent there is rarely an afternoon when some friend is not summoned to Clarence House to have a cup of tea in the garden with her. Just one visitor at a time. The guest is expected to do all the talking, for the royal patient still has to keep exceedingly quiet. Perhaps the guest who amuses the Duchess most is Mrs. George West, who has something entertaining to relate even though she is said to be feeling deeply her own troubles of the moment.

#### MINISTER OF MARINE COMING HERE SOON

Hon. J. D. Hazen Will Visit Prince Rupert and Dawson City in a Few Weeks.

DEVELOP LOCAL  
NATURAL RESOURCES

While Architect Cox of the  
provincial government is here  
in regard to the erection of the  
provincial building on Market  
Place, some concerted action  
should be taken to ensure that  
the stone used in the building  
should be of local origin, other-  
wise the principal material  
used in the building will be  
imported from Vancouver.

There is most excellent granite  
and marble within a short  
distance of this city that could  
be quarried and landed at the  
building site much cheaper  
than the Vancouver Island  
product. Of course the men  
directly interested in these un-  
developed quarries will push  
their claims in a business-like  
way, but there is such a thing  
as moral and political usasion  
to be used in the obtaining of  
all government contracts.  
Therefore due pressure should  
be brought to bear in this case  
that all local industries should  
be encouraged as much as possi-  
ble.

It may be said that this is  
the business of those interest-  
ed in stone quarries, lime de-  
posits, gravel beds and so on,  
and that they will reap all the  
benefit. This is much too  
narrow a view to take of the  
matter. To secure a contract  
for the building stone means  
not only a profit to the men  
owning the quarry but it  
means the opening up of an  
other permanent payroll, and  
thus a benefit to the whole  
community.

Specimens of the local build-  
ing stone, of a first-class  
quality, have already been  
brought to the attention of Architect Cox,  
and it remains only for an in-  
vestigation of the quarries to  
see that the acknowledged  
quality is maintained in quan-  
tity. It offers an opportunity  
to start and foster the devel-  
opment of one of our undevel-  
oped natural resources which  
the Provincial Government  
would be wise not to overlook.

LORD DERBY TURNS HIS CONSERVATORY INTO PLAYHOUSE  
FOR THE ROYAL VISIT AT HIS LANCASHIRE SEAT

For what has wrongly been  
announced as the music hall  
"command" performance at  
Knowsley Hall on July 7, when  
Lord Derby entertains the King  
and Queen at his Lancashire seat  
during their Majesties' visit to  
the county, a special theatre has  
been constructed at a cost of  
£2,000.

The main fabric itself is that  
of the huge conservatory attach-  
ed to the mansion, and this has  
been converted into a handsome  
playhouse, with a dias in the  
centre of the auditorium for the

Queen. Queen Mary will sit in  
the same chair that Queen Vic-  
toria occupied on the semi-state  
occasions connected with her  
last visit to Lancashire.

An orchestra of twenty picked  
musicians will be hidden from  
view, and the space excavated  
for the purpose extends to some  
depth beneath the stage, so that  
satisfactory ventilation may be  
obtained for the performers.

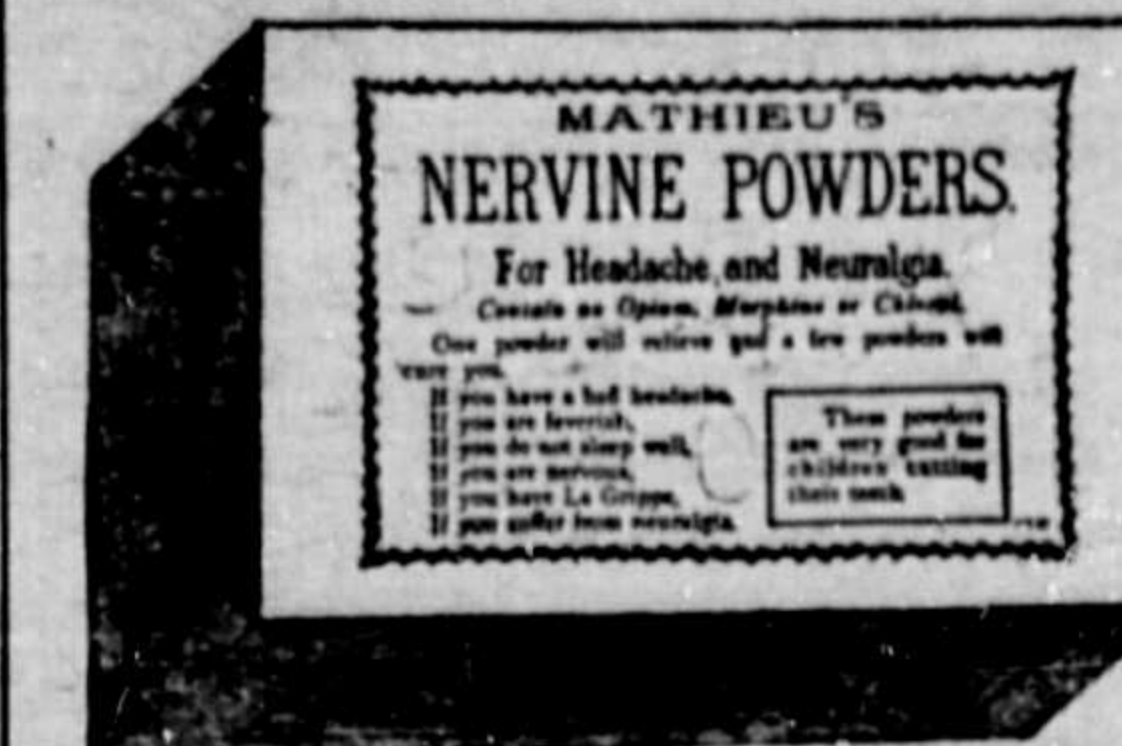
It should be insisted upon, in

MEET GUNBOAT SMITHTommy Burns Thinks the Death  
Knell of Fighting in Canada  
Has Been Sounded.

Calgary, Alta., June 30.—Arthur Pelkey's next battle will be with Gunboat Smith and the match will be arranged for the near future, according to some of Pelkey's close friends who have been at his training camp since the death of Luther McCarty here on May 24th.

Following his acquittal on the charge of manslaughter by a jury, Pelkey left for his home in Chatham, Ont. He said that he expected to re-enter the ring, but that he had not definite engagements. A crowd of his friends gathered at the station to see him off.

Tommy Burns, promoter of the McCarty-Pelkey fight, said today that he was glad to see Pelkey freed, but that the charge of Chief Justice Harvey to the jury sounded the death knell of fighting in Canada. Burns is to be tried in October and expects acquittal.

## CHIHUAHUA SURROUNDED

An Attack of Constitutionalists is  
Momentarily Expected.

(Special to The Daily News.) Chihuahua, Mexico, July 4.—The constitutionalists have surrounded this place in numbers exceeding 2,500. An attack is momentarily expected. The city of 45,000 people is entirely cut off from help and supplies.

## SCORES CONGRESSMEN

## Kaiser's Jubilee Coins.

Berlin, July 1.—Six million Jubilee coins, half of them three mark pieces and half two mark pieces, are ready for distribution. The original intention to represent the Kaiser as helmeted on these coins has been abandoned, for some reason. His Majesty appears bareheaded, in the uniform of the cuirassiers. Under the Kaiser's figure there will be a laurel wreath and the dates 1888-1913.

## Nearly a Centenarian.

New Westminster, July 1.—Mrs. Elizabeth De Beck today celebrated her ninety-ninth birthday. She was born in New Brunswick and came to British Columbia 54 years ago. She has eighty-seven living descendants.

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STANDARD OIL GETS  
ITS GRIP ON WESTWill Soon Have Complete Control  
of All Undeveloped Oil  
Fields in the West.

Calgary, Alta., July 1.—That the Standard Oil Company will, within a few years, have complete control of practically all the undeveloped oil fields in Western Canada unless the authorities do something to stop the giant octopus from extending its domain, was the statement made by H. H. Clarke, of the Clarke Manufacturing Company, Kansas City, who was in the city recently.

Twenty years ago Mr. Clarke, who is an oil expert, was employed by the Standard Oil Company, and he knows much about the inner workings of the big combine.

"I am positive that there is oil in this country," said Mr. Clarke, "and John D. Rockefeller is also sure of the same thing. In fact, did Mr. Rockefeller wish it, oil would probably be discovered in Alberta today. I know for a fact that a company in this city, at present boring in the vicinity, is practically affiliated with the Standard Oil Company."

HINDUS TO BOYCOTT  
CANADIAN IMPORTSHold a Meeting at Victoria and  
Send Resolutions to the Vice-  
roy of India.

Victoria, June 30.—At a mass meeting held at the Sikh Temple yesterday afternoon, which was largely attended by Hindus and by a number of white sympathizers, a resolution embodying the idea of a commercial boycott against Canadian imports was adopted, speakers making reference to the Canadian missionaries, life and other insurance offices and similar Dominion institutions enjoying the benefit of protection in the operation of their undertakings in the India government.

Copies of the resolution will be forwarded to the official and other quarters to notify the authorities of the position adopted.

In order that the resolution may have the full force of support of the Hindus in British Columbia, a meeting is to be held in Vancouver tonight to adopt a similar course in approaching the British ambassador, Sir Cecil Spring-Rice. The resolution adopted on this subject yesterday will be sent also to the Viceroy of India for consideration by that government.
