On another page will be read how a Vancouver merchant, born and bred in British principles of honesty and backed by generous impulses, a few days ago went back to England and paid off all his father's old time debts with compound interest. Legally, the father's creditors had no WHO ARE THE claim. They had years ago CONSPIRATORS? agreed to accept eleven shillings in the pound and had been paid that sum. The incident therefore is all the more praiseworthy.

There may be other cases of a similar character that have not come to light, and one of these naturally occurs to the mind of the writer. A man of sturdy British stock but of American birth from a small country store in New Hampshire was able to start in New York City as a dry goods merchant. His firm prospered exceedingly but the civil war came and they failed for twenty-two cents on the dollar. He began life anew as a curbstone broker and grew to be a banker. Five years after the firm's creditors were invited to a banquet, and under each plate was found a cheque of the firm's indebtedness to each particular guest, with com-

pound interest to date. Verily honesty is its own reward, for that man later became a congressman, ambassador to Paris, vice president, governor of New York State and many times a millionaire,


