

## MARCH OF TURKS ADDS TO HORROR OF CONFLICT

### CONCERT OF EUROPE MAY BEAR OLIVE BRANCH IN MAILED FIRST TO THE FIELD OF WAR

#### THE ACTING MAYOR SILENCES OUR ALDERMANIC JEREMIAH

**BULLOCK-WEBSTER ONCE MORE BULLOCK-WEBSTERS  
UNTIL HE IS SQUELCHED—HE GOES TO THE  
BANK FOR INFORMATION.**

Quintette of city fathers  
were more treated to a little  
when in the course of  
last evening Alder-  
Bullock-Webster once more  
webstered until his bul-  
lockian horns were sawed  
off by a brief speech of Acting  
Mayor Naden's and he was again  
reduced to a state of quiet.

A letter had been read from the  
alderman in question  
proposed to obtain the next pay-  
ment due to Messrs. McMorde  
and company for the grading  
contracts at Market Place and  
Fulton street; it was also asked  
what provision had been made  
for the eventual payment of the  
20 per cent. retention—that is  
to say, the amount already held  
back out of payments for work  
done.

In reply to this Alderman  
Bullock-Webster had been re-  
ferred to a letter from W. D.  
Vance, the city treasurer, in  
which it was stated that the ex-  
penditure on Section One grading to  
date, including No. 2 on Market  
Place grading and the grading of  
the city property on Fulton  
street, had totalled \$644,072.30,  
leaving a balance available,  
out of \$6,000.

Alderman Naden remarked con-  
cerning these questions that it  
might be remembered that Mayor  
Pattullo had obtained the prom-  
ise of \$25,000 from the Bank of  
Montreal for the carrying on of  
this work and the assurance that  
more would be available when the  
\$50,000 worth of bonds had

been disposed of. As there was  
no reason for doubt that the  
bank would live up to its agree-  
ment, there was no likelihood of  
a tie-up in accounts. There was  
money on hand for the payment  
of the next amount due and dur-  
ing the four weeks before there  
would be another demand the  
council might reasonably count  
on further advances.

Alderman Bullock - Webster  
was by no means satisfied with  
this. He declared that the city  
seemed likely to run out of money  
before the accounts became due.  
It was, he feared, going to get  
into the same fix this year with-  
out any necessity as it had got  
into last year of necessity. He  
had learned that \$20,000 of the  
\$25,000 for construction work  
obtained by Mayor Pattullo at  
Vancouver had been issued on  
notes. This didn't leave a very  
promising outlook.

Alderman Naden replied that  
notes for \$20,000 had been is-  
sued but that since Alderman  
Bullock-Webster went outside the  
council to gather his information  
and had been making enquiries  
at the bank he had better get in-  
formation that was more than  
partially correct. It appeared  
that Alderman Bullock-Webster  
had not enquired how much of  
the \$20,000 issued had been ac-  
tually expended. Alderman Na-  
den could reassure him that the  
accounts in question could be met  
without recourse to the general  
funds.

Alderman Bullock - Webster  
did not argue the question fur-  
ther.

#### ONE DOLLAR AN ACRE FOR FINE COAL LAND

**American Interests Obtain Large  
Coal Areas in Alberta—Very  
High Grade Anthracite.**

Ottawa, July 10.—The govern-  
ment has leased to American in-  
terests the remarkable coal areas  
in Alberta, on Smoky River, 40  
miles from the Grand Trunk Pa-  
cific, and 200 miles west of Ed-  
monton.

The area comprises 32,000  
acres of anthracite, said to be of  
better quality than that of Penn-  
sylvania, and has been leased for  
one dollar an acre to Dr. Reinholdt  
of Oakland, Cal., and Paul  
Hulburg of Honolulu.

They will build a railway from  
the site near Jasper Park, and ex-  
tend it to sell anthracite on the  
coast, as well as ship to the  
Pacific Coast and Europe, via the  
Panama Canal.

They are contracting with the  
Canadian government to supply  
the German navy, as the coal is  
of such high grade.

#### PERMISSION GRANTED

**Further Excavations Needed  
for New Premier Hotel.**

Permission for the construct-  
ion of the new Premier Hotel to  
include excavations of six feet on  
the street and for a distance of  
100 feet on Second Avenue was  
granted last night by the city  
council. This further excavation  
required for the installation of  
water in the basement of the  
hotel.

#### ENORMOUS COSTS IN SACKVILLE HEARING

**Will Reach Hundred and Twenty-  
Five Thousand Dollars—  
Some Large Fees**

London, July 11.—Lady Sack-  
ville, who won her case in the Sir  
John Murray Scott will case on  
Monday last, is ill at her town  
house in Hill Street, Mayfair.  
She refuses to see any interview-  
ers.

In the matter of cost the Scott  
case ranks next to the National  
Telephone arbitration matter  
when the government took over  
the telephones from private cor-  
porations.

The costs of the Scott case are  
figured at \$125,000. Sir Edward  
Carson's fee as counsel for Lady  
Sackville was \$10,000, with an  
extra daily fee of \$4050. F. E.  
Smith's fee, as counsel for the  
Scott's, was \$7875, with a daily  
fee of \$785. The fees of the  
junior lawyers average two-  
thirds of those of the senior  
ones.

#### ALL THE POWERS ENTANGLED IN THE PRESENT BALKAN WAR

**WHOLESALE MASSACRE BY BULGARIANS CORROBORATED—  
SIR EDWARD GREY TELLS BRITISH PARLIAMENT IT IS  
IMPOSSIBLE TO EXAGGERATE HORRORS.**

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 15.—In the house  
of commons last night Sir Edward  
Grey, secretary for foreign af-  
airs, replying to a suggestion  
that an armistice be enforced  
upon the Balkan states by the  
powers, said it was impossible to  
exaggerate the horrors of the  
war now going on but that mere  
words would be unlikely to af-  
fect the situation to produce any  
improvement in it. Also, there  
was another difficulty. In such  
an entanglement of affairs as  
the present situation presented  
it would be an arduous task to  
effect any concert of the Euro-  
pean powers, and in any case it  
might not be wise to resort to  
force in order to impose peace.

#### Servian-Turkish Agreement.

Constantinople, July 15.—The  
Ottoman government has recalled  
its delegates to the Balkan finan-  
cial commission at Paris.

#### ALD. LEEK BACK FROM ORANGEMEN'S PARADE

**Procession Marched Ten Thou-  
sand Strong in Line of Two  
Miles Length**

Alderman George Leek returned  
from Vancouver this morning on  
the Princess May. He went down  
to take part in the convention of  
Orangemen, which had a big pa-  
rade on the Twelfth of July.

"We had a great procession,"  
said Alderman Leek. "Ten thou-  
sand men took part and made a  
column two miles long. The  
weather was fine till toward the  
close of the day, when we had a  
little rain. We marched through  
the principal streets of the city  
to Stanley Park. There we lis-  
tened to speeches and watched  
sports until the evening. The  
whole affair was quite success-  
ful and unmarred by any dis-  
turbance save in one instance.  
A man named O'Bryan tried to  
seize the flag, but was taken off  
to jail."

#### COSTLY LICENSE

**Wm. Grant Thinks He Has Been  
Overcharged.**

A letter from William Grant,  
plumber, complaining that he  
had been required to pay \$10  
every six months for his trade  
license was received yesterday  
evening by the city council. Mr.  
Grant wrote that he had been  
making payments at this rate for  
the last year and a half. The  
letter was referred to the license  
board for report.

#### To Abolish Plural Voting

The Turkish armies continue  
to advance against Bulgaria.  
It is understood that Serbia and  
Turkey have reached a satisfac-  
tory agreement in regard to the  
invasion of Bulgaria, and that it  
now only awaits ratification.

#### Making Forced Marches.

London, July 15.—The main  
body of the Turkish army is ad-  
vancing by forced marches from  
Catalja to Bulair in the attempt  
to recapture Adrianople for the  
third time.

The Bulgars being close  
pressed by the Greeks near Seres,  
sacked and burned down the town,  
cremating alive, hacking to  
pieces and crucifying all the  
people without quarter with the  
exception of some leading of-  
ficials; whom they plundered and  
then carried off for ransom.  
The Greeks fell upon the Bulgars  
as they were retreating after the  
massacre and the retreat became  
a horrible rout, many being  
killed and wounded.

#### HOTEL BAR REFUSED TO SERVE A NEGRO

**But Licensing Board Declined to  
Take Any Action Whenques-  
tion is Before Them.**

Vancouver, July 12.—Can a li-  
cense holder refuse to sell liquor  
to a negro? This question was  
asked by Mr. J. E. Bird in a com-  
plaint to the license commis-  
sioners yesterday regarding the  
refusal of the proprietor of the  
Stratford Hotel to serve drink to  
a colored man. In his complaint,  
the lawyer intimated that his in-  
structions were to test the ques-  
tion in the courts in the event of  
the board refusing to move in  
his favor.

Mr. J. B. Stevens, the license  
holder, who was present in per-  
son, explained that in the local-  
ity in which he was doing busi-  
ness there was a negro popula-  
tion of nearly 500, and if he  
served one he would have to  
serve all who wished to buy from  
him. This, he said, would be  
detrimental to his business and  
would hinder him from keeping a  
strictly first class hotel.

After considerable discussion  
of the question involved the  
commissioners unanimously de-  
cided to do nothing in the matter  
and accordingly the letter was  
filed.

#### Denies the Authorship

A GOOD EXAMPLE FOR  
CANADA TO FOLLOW.

That navy, into the complete  
possession of which our sister  
across the-Pacific has recently  
entered, has been described at  
length in a book entitled "Flag-  
ships Three." The author of  
the volume, Mr. Bean, knows,  
according to the London Post,  
"as much as any man living of  
the essential Australian and  
of his work."

At first attempts were made,  
it seems, to discourage the  
naval ambition of the Australi-  
an. He was told that he was  
"no sailorman." Yet today the  
Australian navy is an estab-  
lished fact.

"Four years ago the build-  
ing of an Australian navy was  
by no means an accepted pol-  
icy either in the mother coun-  
try or in the commonwealth,  
and even the project for a  
mosquito fleet as proposed by  
Mr. Deakin (at a capital cost  
of £1,277,000 and a total an-  
nual cost for both army and  
navy of a little over £1,000,000)  
was looked upon by many Aus-  
tralians as an absurd and im-  
possible undertaking. Now  
Australia is already spending  
about £4,000,000 yearly on her  
navy, and the huge armored  
flagship, which Mr. Bean imag-  
ined 'smoking her evening  
pipe in Sydney Harbor,' is a tre-  
mendous reality."

The writer in the Morning  
Post is quite sympathetic, and  
he has Canada as well as Aus-

tralia in view. In this relation  
he speaks as follows:

"It was said that the essen-  
tial Australian could not, would  
not grow up into a sailor—just  
as some people are now con-  
tending that Canadians can-  
not be relied upon to man  
Canada's warships when the  
politicians allow them to be  
built. Now that the Australian  
service offers a permanent and  
fairly well paid career, the  
Australian seaman is a solid,  
stolid fact. Australia now has  
32 Australian officers and 1,004  
Australian seamen, and the  
training establishments are  
full up. Canada will do as  
much when the time comes;  
better, perhaps, for she has  
Newfoundland, the greatest and  
most populous nursery of sea-  
manship in the whole wide  
world, to draw upon."

The Post reviewer believes  
that Australia's example will  
be followed by Canada. "The  
contribution theory of old  
fashioned authorities will have  
received its death blow." It is  
to be noted that Canada will  
be able to draw, not only on its  
own Atlantic provinces and on  
Newfoundland, but on British  
Columbia, a province larger  
than the United Kingdom and  
Germany combined, with splen-  
did harbors on the Pacific  
Ocean. It is surely to be ex-  
pected that the residents of  
British Columbia will have am-  
bitions similar in nature and  
at least equal in magnitude to  
those of Australia.

HOME RULE BILL IS GETTING  
ROUNDED INTO WORKING FORM

FORECAST OF PROCEDURE TO FOLLOW ITS FINAL PASSAGE  
—JOHN REDMOND LIKELY TO BE CALLED UPON  
TO FORM FIRST ADMINISTRATION.

London, July 12—The Home  
Rule Bill which passed its third  
reading in the House of Com-  
mons on Monday is now in some-  
thing like its final form. In a  
forecast of the procedure as re-  
gards the institution of Home

course Mr. Redmond will retire  
from the active leadership of  
the Nationalists in the House of  
Commons and will doubtless be  
succeeded by T. P. O'Connor.

Mr. Redmond's retention in  
office will depend upon the re-  
sult of the first Irish election.  
There is little doubt that he will  
obtain a working majority and  
the first duty of his government  
will be to establish a responsible  
administration in Dublin on a  
firm and durable basis.

"The character of Mr. Red-  
mond's policy will be what in this  
country would be called conser-  
vative. It may be taken as cer-  
tain that the main desire of re-  
sponsible persons will be to re-  
spect the susceptibilities, and pay  
due honor to the high character  
of the Protestant counties."

As regards the plans of the Ul-  
ster men, the Daily News says:  
"They are a little obscure. In  
the event of an Irish election  
taking place the Ulster men, ac-  
cording to present intentions,  
will be counselled not to vote."

"Drilling is undoubtedly pre-

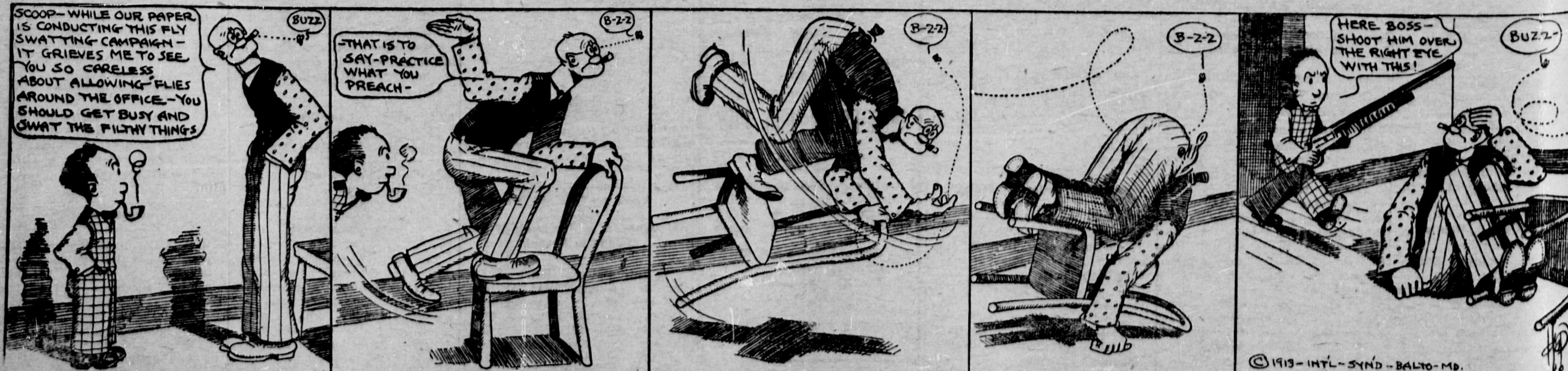

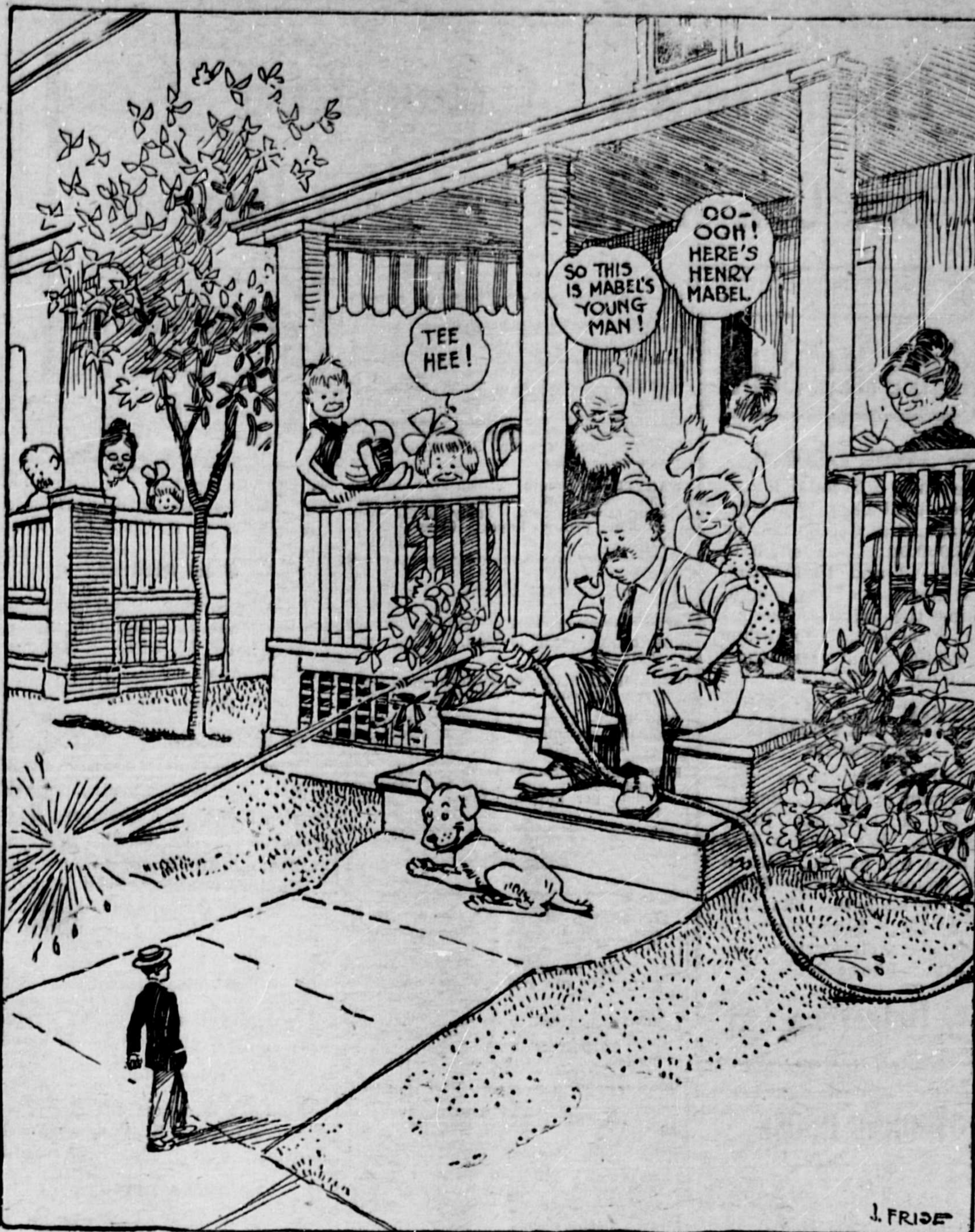

## HAZELTON MINING NOTES

Further surface trenching and  
open cuts on the Daley West  
group show the new vein to be  
at least three feet wide, with nine  
inches of solid yellow copper.  
Colin Munro brought in a large  
chunk of ore last Wednesday. It  
has much the same appearance  
as Rocher de Boule ore and the  
general opinion seems to be that  
it will go at least 15 per cent.  
copper and at least \$5 in gold.  
The Daley West group is between  
two miles south and on the New  
Hazelton side of the mountain.  
Munro will prospect the remain-  
ing three claims, on which he has  
good showings. The formation  
is a granite.

Arthur Leverett, accompanied  
by his brother Billy, arrived in  
New Hazelton Tuesday evening  
and brought with him some fine  
looking yellow copper ore off the  
White Grouse claim of the In-  
genica group, which adjoins the  
Daley West and the Centre Star,  
three miles south of New Hazel-  
ton on Rocher de Boule Moun-  
tain. Eddie Kohse, Bob Marion,  
Jack Westervelt are driving an  
adit on the ore. There are eight  
claims in the group and they have  
found good leads on all of them  
so far.

Henry McIntaggart arrived in  
New Hazelton Saturday from the  
Centre Star group with some good  
looking yellow and grey copper.  
The capping or gossan is four  
feet wide and he has traced it  
across two claims. The assays  
will be announced later. He ad-  
joins the Daley West and has  
got considerable work done the  
past two years.

When George T. Stewart was  
in town last week he made a  
short visit to his mineral claim  
on Nine Mile Mountain, the Sil-  
ver Bell, for the purpose of in-  
vestigating conditions and the  
prospects of getting out some ore  
this season. He stated that there  
was quite a little snow on the hill  
yet, but it was going very fast

from here. This will save them  
several miles on the Babine trip  
and it is also shorter and easier  
to the Groundhog.

M. J. Burns, Spokane, Wash.,  
arrived in town Wednesday night  
and will spend the next week or  
two here and on Rocher de Boule  
Mountain. Mr. Burns is associ-  
ated with P. J. Jennings in the  
Highland Boy, and it was to in-  
spect that, as well as his other  
investments in this town and  
district, that he has made the  
present trip.

The Highland Boy group, on  
Rocher de Boule Mountain, is  
opening up like a big mine. P. J.  
Jennings, who has control of the  
property, came in on Wednesday  
evening and he was all smiles.  
For several days he has had two  
shifts working on the drift which  
is opening up the vein. They  
went through twelve or fourteen  
feet of capping which showed  
copper gossan, and then broke  
into good clean ore, which has  
been improving with every round  
of holes.

S. D. Trethewey, Chilliwack,

properties in the New Hazelton  
district for the past week, closed  
with Duke Harris on Tuesday for
