NOTHING NEW ABOUT STYLE OF CUBISTS

Museum Authorities Possess Cubist Statue Over Three Thousand Years Old.

Philadelphia, July 14.—There is nothing new in Cubist art, according to authorities of the University of Pennsylvania museum. They have a specimen of a cubist statue 3,500 years old which was made about the time that Joseph was ruling over the kingdom. The statue is that of a famous old priest of the time and is a perfect cube with only the head of the priest protruding above it to mark the outline of the angular contour of the stone. The figure is a perfect specimen in cubist art. The statue came from the famous city of Abydos, and is that of Sadeh Abu, superintendent of the prophets in the city of Thebes or Ta Uun, wherever that may have been.

BANK OF COMMERCE MANAGER TRANSFERRED TO CRANBROOK

MR. J. M. CHRISTIE, ONE OF PRINCE RUPERT'S PIONEER AND MOST HIGHLY ESTEEMED CITIZENS, GETS MERITED PROMOTION.

The large clientele of the Canadian Bank of Commerce in this city particularly and the citizens of Prince Rupert in general will learn with considerable regret that Mr. J. M. Christie, the local branch manager, has been transferred to a similar position at Cranbrook, B. C., and will take his departure from the city in the course of a few days. Mr. Christie is one of the pioneer residents of the city, coming here as manager of the Bank of Commerce in June, 1907, more than six years ago, since which he has resided here continuously. When he came here Prince Rupert was little more than a camp and the Bank of Commerce, which had been opened about three months earlier, was the only banking institution doing business here. At that time the bank premises, the building at present occupied by Ritchie & Agnew, were located on Centre street, the principal business thoroughfare, and the staff consisted of him-

self and one assistant. Mr. Christie has thus had an opportunity of watching the city develop from very small proportions into a prosperous business centre which now has five banking institutions to handle its financial affairs. He has also had the opportunity of keeping always in close touch with the mercantile and industrial growth of the city and has acquired a fund of information that has been invaluable to his institution. With the growth of the city he has through his courteous treatment of customers and his keen insight into financial matters built up the business of his own institution until now it requires a staff of nine to handle the constantly increasing work. The promotion to Cranbrook, the largest and busiest of the mining towns in the Crows' Nest Pass, is a recognition of Mr. Christie's ability as a banker, as

DESTITUTE AMERICANS DEPART FROM MEXICO ON EVERY BOAT

CITIZENS OF UNITED STATES FACE FINANCIAL RUIN IN THE SOUTHERN REPUBLIC AND SOME ARE FORCED TO ACCEPT GOVERNMENT AID.

Washington, July 14.—Destitute Americans are arriving in the United States on every boat from Mexico. Many of them face financial ruin in consequence of the series of revolutions which have paralyzed commercial and industrial enterprise, and they are leaving the southern republic with reluctance.

American consuls are empowered to draw upon the state department for funds to bring Americans out of the various danger zones, and in some instances, notably at Torreón, Ambassador H. L. Wilson has sent money to be expended by consuls and consular agents to relieve actual hunger.

Before Mexico passed through the travail which commenced with

the Madero revolt against the Diaz regime more than two years ago most of the now indigent Americans were engaged in prosperous ranching and mining enterprises or other commercial pursuits. While the United States government has repeatedly warned them to flee and depend upon the United States to guarantee a settlement of their claims against Mexico, the fear of delay in the adjustment of claims and the hazard of the loss or destruction of all their property has made hundreds take the risk of remaining in the revolution torn country. Within the last month, however, between 400 and 500 have been brought to the United States at government expense.

CANADA'S CHIEF FINANCIAL PROFIT FROM IMMIGRATION

AUTHORITIES LAUGH AT ASSERTION OF NEW YORK STOCK BROKER THAT GREAT IMMIGRATION IS CAUSE OF STRINGENCY.

Ottawa, July 14.—The authorities at Ottawa are greatly amused over the statement alleged to have been made in London by Colonel R. M. Thompson, a New York financier, that Canada is financially embarrassed in consequence of expenditures necessitated by the large immigration flowing to this country.

Colonel Thompson is quoted as saying that each immigrant costs the country \$1,500, and that last year the total immigration cost was \$60,000,000. The fact is that for the last seventeen years Canada has derived its chief financial profit from immigrants.

A conservative estimate places the average amount of cash brought to the country by each immigrant at \$1,000. In the past seven years two million people have come in, bringing to Canada not less than two billion dollars. This is only a small part of the profit Canada has derived from immigration, as most of the immigrants take up agriculture and within a year produce crops which enormously add to the wealth of the country.

grants extension of manufacturing establishments, railroads and municipalities, facilities are required, but these are, of course, not regarded as an expense.

The money for such expenditures is borrowed on bonds, as a rule, and turned into undertakings, which constitute the prime assets. As a matter of fact, instead of each immigrant costing the country \$1,500 they cost less than \$15.

WAIT FOR CONFERENCE

United States Delays Action in Mexican Situation.

Washington, July 18.—No further action will be taken in the Mexican situation till President Wilson and William Jennings Bryan have a conference with the United States ambassador to Mexico, Henry Lane Wilson. It will then be determined in what form and how vigorous will be the protest of the United States against the present outrages on her subjects resident in Mexico.

BULGARIAN KING HAS BECOME SUPPLIANT FOR PEACE TERMS

ROMANIAN TROOPS ARE NOW WITHIN THIRTY MILES OF THE BULGARIAN CAPITAL—POWERS INTERVENE TO PROTECT SOFIA

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, July 18.—The Roumanian troops are at Plevna and Andra, thirty miles from Sofia. Ferdinand of Bulgaria is a suppliant to the King of Roumania for terms of peace. The powers are trying to induce Roumania not to occupy Sofia. The speed with which Roumania

has taken a leading place in the present war is all the more remarkable as she was subject to the jeers of Europe for her niggardly attitude of mere self-preservation when she watched while the others fought. Now, stepping in at the eleventh hour, she has given the final blow that has brought the Bulgarian King to his knees.

THE ALBERT MEYER HAS REACHED PORT

Small Schooner Which Great Anxiety Was Felt Is Now in Safety.

The Albert Meyer, a four hundred ton schooner belonging to Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, relieved her owners much anxiety as to her safety when she came in to the harbor this morning after a long and perilous voyage from San Francisco. The schooner left San Francisco on June 23rd under the command of Captain Dan Martin, a skipper who has much knowledge of these waters. She was accordingly expected here a week ago and when she did not arrive it was feared that she had been driven far out to sea by adverse winds. There was great relief when she was seen coming up the harbor this morning. She will now be out-fished here for cod fishing in the north and will then proceed to the Behring Sea.

CAPITAL ORNAMENTS

Mexican Would Deck Poles with Heads of Americans.

Nogales, Ariz., July 15.—General Ojeda says he wants to decorate the telegraph poles between Guaymas and Hermosillo with the heads of Americans, according to an unconfirmed report brought here by refugees from Southern Sonora.

The federal commander at Guaymas is reported to have been aroused by various alleged participations of Americans in the present insurgent investment of the gulf town.

All non-combatants have been removed from Guaymas to islands in the harbor directly under protection of the two federal gunboats. Skirmishing continues on the outskirts of the town.

WHAT CAN BE DONE?

The Toronto News has discovered that the Borden naval policy is being opposed for reasons which contradict each other. Some people want a Canadian navy, which would cost more than a contribution to the British navy. Others are opposed to all kinds of naval expenditure.

No doubt this is correct, and it is also probable that those who want a Canadian navy and those who do not like any kind of naval expenditure are together more numerous than the friends of the Borden naval policy. That is the reason why the government will not have a general election, will not have a plebiscite, and delays the bye-elections.

Similarly, the Laurier naval policy was defeated by a combination of dreadnought or contribution advocates and people who did not want any kind of navy. Representatives of both views are in Mr. Borden's cabinet. He could not govern Canada without both.

But admitting that it is equally difficult to carry the Liberal policy and to carry the Conservative policy, what are you going to do about it? Is there any policy which would carry with it the judgment of the Canadian people?

In 1909 the two parties were united upon a Canadian policy. Mr. Borden and his friends, as Liberals say, broke the agreement. Conservatives contend that Sir Wilfrid Laurier's program was not in accord with the agreement. If so, surely the right course for Mr. Borden was to make a program of

his own in accordance with the agreement of 1909. If the Laurier fleet was not big enough he could have made it bigger.

Mr. Borden's fatal mistake was in repudiating the agreement of 1909 and reopening the question. If he is now opposed by peace advocates, and also by advocates of self-government, he has nobody to blame except the clique of busybodies who won him over to the reactionary policy of centralization.

RECIPROCITY AND THE NAVY BILL.

Conservative papers denounce as absurd the suggestion made by various opposition newspapers that there may be some relationship between present business conditions in Canada and the rejection of reciprocity two years ago. However this may be it is not one-fiftieth part as absurd as the theory, carefully cultivated by these same papers, that the present difficulty in marketing Canadian securities in England is due to the rejection of the navy bill by the senate.

It is said that the following law has been passed by the Chinese parliament: "All Chinese officials, without any distinction of rank, shall wear European clothing. This shall consist of black walking coat, top hat of Chinese silk and patent leather shoes." Some Europeans have also been observed to wear trousers, but perhaps the Chinese do not wish to adopt our fashions too rapidly.

UNITED STATES HAD FOREIGN DEALINGS OF FOUR BILLIONS

AGGREGATE COMMERCE OF REPUBLIC SHOWED INCREASE
OF FOUR HUNDRED MILLIONS.

Washington, July 14.—The detailed figures given out by the department of commerce show the aggregate trade of the United States with foreign countries for the eleven months ended May 31, 1913, to be in excess of \$3,983,000,000, an increase in the total trade of over \$395,000,000, compared with the corresponding period of 1912. During the eleven months the United States imported over \$1,681,000,000 worth of goods and exported over \$2,302,000,000 worth, making a balance of trade of over \$620,985,000.

The United Kingdom is the largest customer, buying over \$565,000,000 and selling a little over \$275,000, an aggregate trade for the eleven months in excess of \$840,000,000. Germany comes next, buying over \$314,000,000 and selling \$175,000,000, making a total trade in excess of \$489,000,000. Canada is the third largest customer, purchasing over \$377,600,000 and selling over \$109,600,000, making a total trade in excess of \$487,000,000. Fourth comes France, to whom was sold nearly \$140,000,000 worth, and from whom we purchased over \$129,000,000, making a total business with this republic of over \$269,000,000 for the eleven month period.

Sales abroad of manufactured and partly manufactured articles during the eleven month period show a large increase (over \$154,000,000) over the corresponding period of 1912, being in excess of \$1,386,000,000, as compared with \$1,231,000,000 last year.

The greatest increase in sales abroad is in finished manufac-

tures, in which a gain is shown of over \$96,000,000 for the eleven month period. A gain is also made in manufacturing of over \$62,000,000, whereas there is a decline in foodstuffs partly or wholly manufactured of nearly \$4,000,000.

Taking the import and export statistics for the three classes above enumerated, it will be seen that in each instance the balance of trade is in our favor. For instance, of foodstuffs partly or wholly manufactured we sold nearly \$297,000,000 worth and purchased a little over \$178,000,000 worth, making a balance of trade in this group of over \$118,000,000; of manufactures for further use in manufacturing we sold \$377,500,000 worth and bought over \$320,600,000 leaving a balance of trade in excess of \$56,900,000. Of manufacturers ready for consumption we sold over \$712,000,000 worth, and purchased a little over \$383,000,000 worth, leaving the very respectable balance in our favor of over \$329,000,000.

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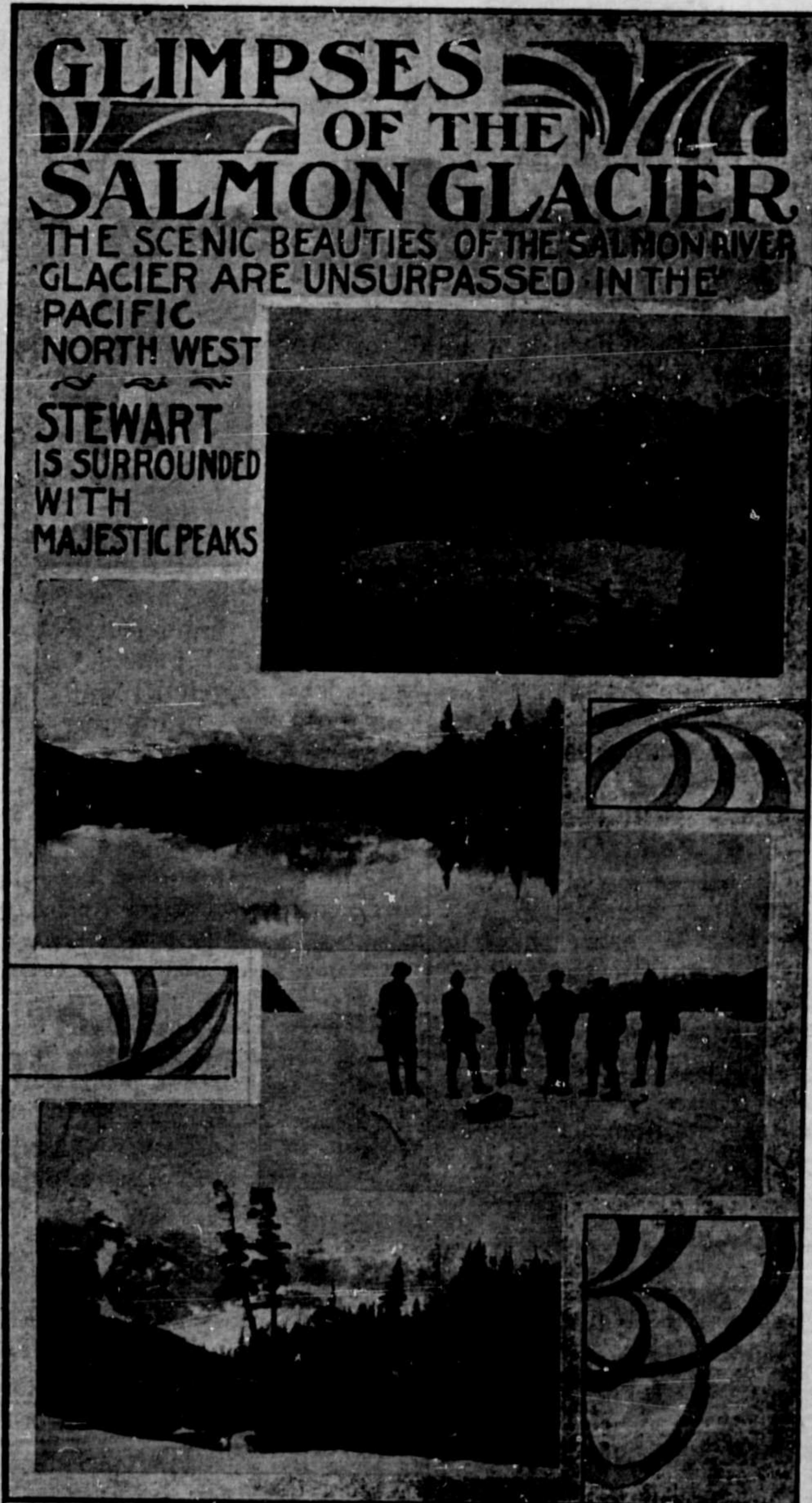

The latest addition to this talented editorial force is Julian Hawthorne, until recently known to the world as a clever litterateur and son of a world famous novelist, but now only known as "Convict No. 4435." NEW PLAN IS URGED TO ASSIST ALASKA

Sen. Poindexter Introduces Bill Providing Transportation System.

Washington, July 14.—Senator Poindexter today introduced a bill authorizing the President of the United States to construct a system of transportation in Alaska, including every connection between the Yukon and tide-water, and a system of steamers between Seattle and Alaska and to open the public coal lands in Alaska sufficiently to relieve the fuel situation in the territory.

The Poindexter bill also proposes that one-half of the government coal lands in Alaska shall be leased for commercial purposes.

The transportation system is to be managed by the Alaska transportation service and the Alaska mining service, the chiefs of each service to be appointed by the President, and the employees to be under civil service.

Preference in the sale of coal mined from leased lands shall go first to the transportation service; second, to the navy and other government branches; third, to schools and public institutions; fourth, to the ultimate consumer, and after that the wholesalers and manufacturers shall be supplied.

Senator Poindexter explains in his bill that the intent of the act is equalization of coal production between private lessees and the mining service, and the mining service product must not be less than the product of the total number of private lessees. Bona fide settlers living on the lands will be permitted to use the coal for domestic purposes without charge.

The President is authorized to issue \$50,000,000 worth of bonds for carrying out the transportation and mining project.

TUBERCULOSIS MAY NOT BE HEREDITARY

French Doctor After Extensive Examination Declares the Contrary

Paris, July 14.—The general belief that tuberculosis is hereditary is declared to be erroneous by Dr. Calmette, director of the Lille Pasteur Institute. The doctor has submitted statistics to the Paris Faculty of Sciences, compiled from the examination of 4,000 subjects, which he believes prove conclusively that the real cause of tuberculosis is infection and continued reinfection, coming after birth.

Of all the children less than one year of age which Dr. Calmette examined, only nine per cent were found to be contaminated with tuberculosis. After that age the percentage increased rapidly. Between one and two years of age 22 per cent. of the subjects proved contaminated; between two and five, 53 per cent; between five and fifteen, 90 per cent; and 91 per cent, to 97 per cent. over fifteen years.

The reason tuberculosis is more prevalent in cities, says Dr. Calmette, is because the danger of repeated reinfection is greater. He estimates that 91 per cent. of the inhabitants of Paris carry tuberculosis bacilli in their blood, and although they cannot really be called consumptive, yet these people are all capable of spreading infection.

FIRE LOSSES REDUCED

Campaign by New York Officials Causes Speedy Reduction.

New York, July 16.—Fire Commissioner Johnson's campaign of education in the common places of fire prevention and his spectacular arson crusade resulted in a \$2,238,686 reduction in fire loss for the first six months of 1913, according to the figures issued by his office. This reduction is due to the decrease in the number of fires and is based on a comparison of this year's record with that of 1912. In 1912 there were 8,455 fires prior to July 1. This year there were 6,605, a reduction of 1,850 fires. The commissioner notes the "more scrupulous care which fire insurance companies have exercised since the arson crusade began."

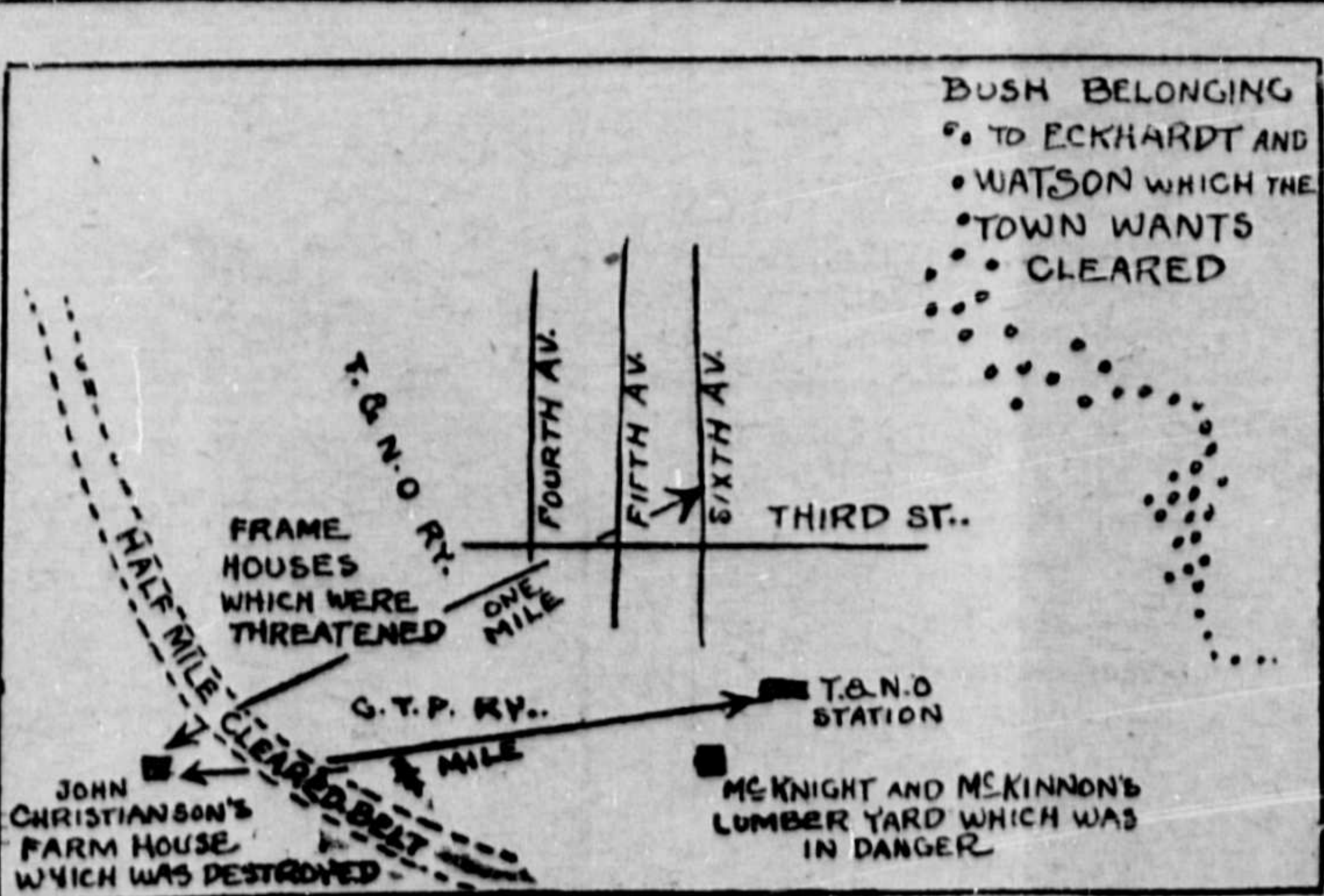
