## MAN IS MURDERED IN COLD BLOOD AT BURNS LAKE

### OVERTURNING OF CANOE CAUSES TWO DROWNINGS IN NAAS RIVER NEAR AIYANSH

#### DEPUTY MINISTER OF NAVY RESCUED DROWNING YOUTH

**J. G. DESBARATS, WHO WAS HERE WITH HON. MR. HAZEN, PERFORMED HEROIC ACT ON HIS TRIP—SAVED A BOY AT BANFF**

Ottawa, July 31.—A private letter, received at the naval department here from British Columbia, discloses the fact that the deputy minister of naval affairs, Mr. J. G. Desbarats, who is now on the Pacific Coast with Hon. J. D. Hazen, was the hero of an exciting rescue from drowning at Banff, a few days ago.

Mr. Desbarats plunged into a lake there and rescued a 15-year-old lad who was sinking in deep water. The rescuer, who was strolling in the vicinity at the time, heard the boy's shout, and without waiting to throw off his coat plunged into the lake and after great difficulty brought the youth to land. Mr. Desbarats will probably be recommended for a Royal Humane Society medal.

#### WHOLE FAMILY IS SLAUGHTERED IN FIERCE DOMESTIC CONFLICT

**ALBERTA FARMER SHOTS HIS WIFE AND TWO CHILDREN DEAD WITH SHOTGUN AND THEN BLOWS TOP OFF HIS OWN HEAD.**

Calgary, July 31.—A tragedy, unequalled in the criminal annals of Alberta, was discovered here shortly before noon yesterday when George Robinson, a prosperous farmer of the Rumsey district, was found lying on the floor of the sitting room of his own home, his clothing saturated with blood and the top of his head blown completely off.

Across his body on the floor was the Winchester shotgun with which the shooting was done, and opposite him on the floor was the body of his wife, a big hole torn in her right breast, where a charge of heavy buckshot had entered, and her face bruised and beaten almost beyond recognition.

In the kitchen of the home the 2-year-old son of the couple was found, his neck almost torn in two where he had been struck by a charge from the gun, while in the bed in the rear bedroom was the body of their 3-year-old daughter, her head blown completely off.

Three empty shells were found on the floor of the house and a fourth in the gun, while furniture was overturned, blood spattered in all directions and evidence of a fierce fight found in every room. It is a clear case of murder and suicide, and from the position of the bodies and the condition of the house the mother had evidently fought hard to save her children, and after being beaten, probably into insensibility, was shot to death by her husband, who then followed his little children into the kitchen and bedroom where they had attempted to hide, and after killing them returned to the sitting room and deliberately placed the muzzle of the gun in his mouth, blowing off the top of his own head.

When found the bodies of all three of the victims and the murderer were badly decomposed, and although the tragedy was not discovered until shortly before noon, it is thought to have occurred late on Wednesday night or early on Thursday morning.

Unhappy domestic relations are believed to be the cause of the quadruple tragedy, as it has been common talk in the neighborhood that Mr. and Mrs. Robinson did not get along well together. However, no recent quarrels had been noticed by the friends and neighbors of the deceased, who are at a loss to account for the violent action of Robinson, who was usually considered to be quiet and to keep himself well under control.

#### BUSY BEES CHASE GIRLS INTO LAKE IN ASTONISHING PLIGHT

**SIX YOUNG WOMEN ARE DRIVEN INTO THE WATER IN GUISE OF GRECIAN NAIADS—THEY HAD TO TAKE A LONG SWIM.**

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 1.—Deprived of the use of their clothing by a swarm of bees, six young women, all employees of the Graham Company, were forced to take a long swim in Newman Lake while the busy bees deliberately stung them in the cook stove in their tent.

While the girls were skylarking a hive of bees decided that a laxy July day was a good time to swarm and they began to cluster in the tent.

The girls were afterward rescued by a farmer, who gave \$5 for the stove and considered his purchase a bargain.

#### ACCIDENT TO MEYERS DUE TO NEGLIGENCE

**Captain McGee of the Tug Carruthers Is Replaced by Captain Rorvik.**

Captain P. Rorvik has been placed in charge of the tug Carruthers in place of Captain McGee. Captain McGee was in charge of the tug when it crashed into the wharf at Digby Island on Friday evening, causing some damage to the vessel which it had in tow, the Albert Meyer.

Captain McGoskrie, the harbor master, found that the accident was due to gross carelessness on the part of the master of the Carruthers, who was accordingly discharged.

The total damages done amounted to about \$500 value. The Albert Meyer has been repaired and is ready to start again on her trip to the Behring Sea cod fisheries.

#### A RECORD BREAKER

**Halibut Weighing 268 Pounds Was Caught This Season.**

A halibut weighing 268 pounds was brought in this season to the cold storage plant. Mr. P. F. Roosa, who informed The News last week that a halibut of at least 225 pounds weight had been caught recently, discovered on looking up his books the photograph of a halibut which made the record breaking weight of 268 pounds. This fish, which is the biggest halibut that has been caught in these waters, was brought in about six weeks ago.

#### SENTENCED FOR SPEECH

**I. W. W. Worker Must Serve Year in County Jail.**

Paterson, N. J., Aug. 1.—Patrick Quinlan, Industrial Worker of the World leader, active in the recent silk workers' strike, was sentenced today to serve a year in the county jail for saying last Saturday night at a Socialist meeting: "Elect a Socialist mayor and then you won't have cops like 'Bummy' Ryan beating you over the head with a club." He is now out on bail pending an appeal.

**Impressive Ceremonies at Grave of James G. Crombie.**

The funeral of James G. Crombie yesterday afternoon gathered many members of the Masonic order and many personal friends of the deceased. The remains were taken from the Fisher mortuary to the Masonic Hall, where the exercises began at 2 o'clock. Half an hour later the funeral procession took its course to Fairview cemetery, the burial being in the Masonic plot. At the services Douglas Sutherland acted as master and Rev. F. W. Kerr as chaplain. The pallbearers were J. A. Kirkpatrick, J. F. Brandt, J. Smith, R. Cameron, G. Frizzell and J. Nelson.

#### SWAM IN BLOOMERS

**Police Officer Arrests Woman Who Bathed Without Skirt.**

Chicago, July 31.—For swimming in bloomers without a skirt Dr. Rosalie M. Ladova was arrested at the Jackson Park municipal beach here today and taken to a police station after she had put on her street clothes. Dr. Ladova took off her skirt at the water's edge, placed it under a stone so it would not blow away and started to swim. A policeman caused a lifeguard to pursue Dr. Ladova in a rowboat.

#### DELIBERATE ASSASSINATION TAKES PLACE AT BURNS LAKE

**JOHN KELLY WAS SHOT AS HE LAY IN HIS BED IN THE SMALL HOURS OF THE MORNING—POLICE ARREST ONE MAN ON SUSPICION.**

Further particulars have come to hand of the murder at Burns Lake which The News mentioned last week. It seems that John Kelly, the murdered man, was shot in his bed at 2 o'clock on the morning of Tuesday, July 29th. This cold blooded assassination is supposed to have been the result of a fight in which Kelly was engaged the day before.

Kelly was in his bunk in his cabin and the murderer shot with a rifle through the window. The bullet entered his head and Kelly died two hours later. Constables McInnes and Murdock soon got busy and made an arrest. They think they have got the right man. The prisoner was sent to Aldermere.

Kelly was well known along the line of construction, having been in several camps for a number of years. He was a worker on the Skeena Crossing bridge. He was a miner in the Klondyke, where he also had a reputation as a pugilist, although he was not considered a quarrelsome man. He was about 40 years old.

#### Acquitted of Murder.

Juneau, Alaska, Aug. 1.—Joseph McDonald, general manager of the Consolidated Mining & Milling Company of Guanajuato, Mexico, and former superintendent of the Treadwell mine here, was acquitted today by the jury which tried him on the charge of murdering N. C. Jones, a mission worker, on May 14, 1902.

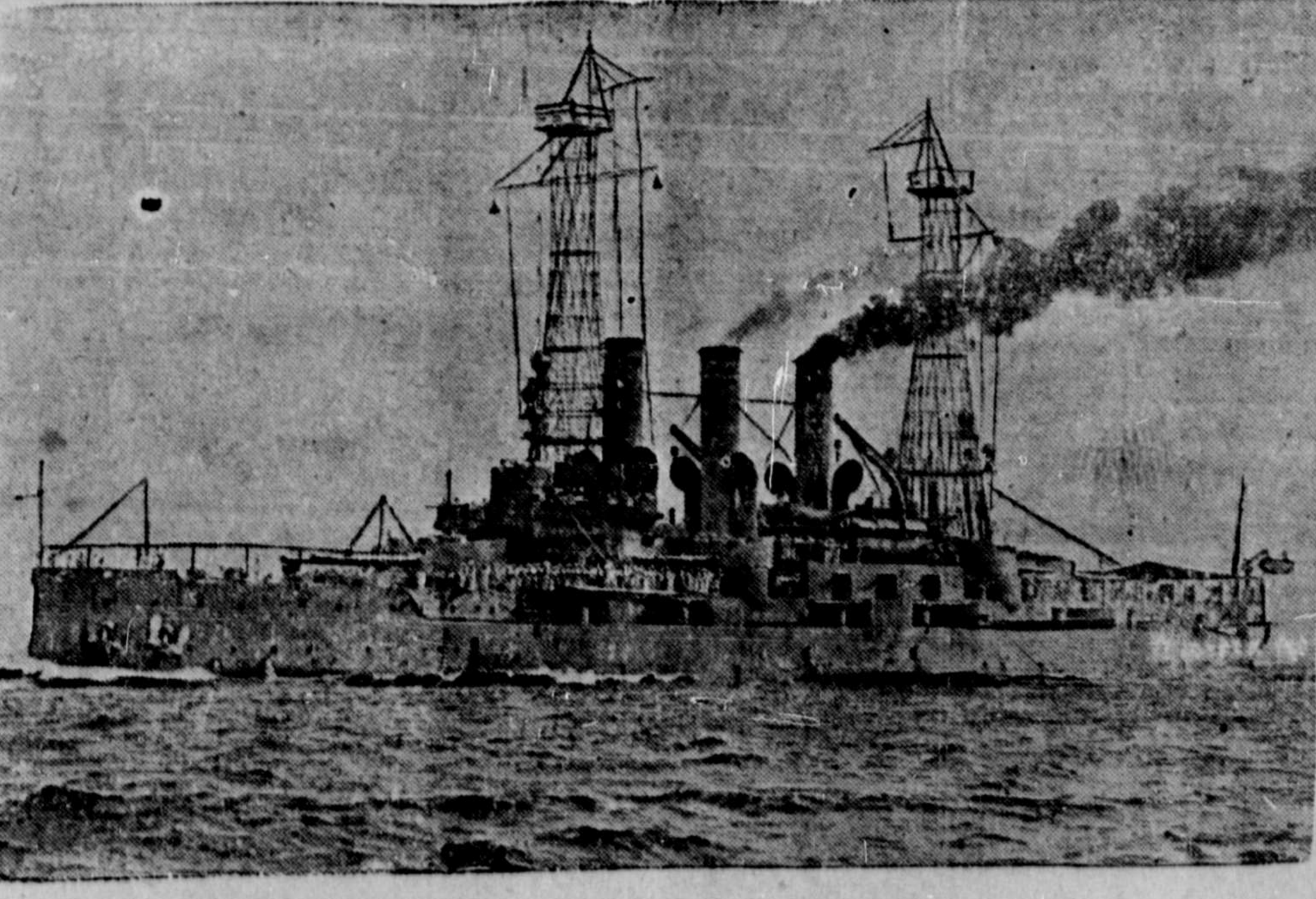
#### For Dumping Ashes.

**A WEATHERCOCK FOR PREMIER.**

It is hard to tell what Sir Richard McBride really desires, apart, of course, from his personal aggrandizement. What are his real opinions on the naval question? His public utterances make it look as if his opinions shifted with the wind that blows from Ottawa. As it is done by Borden, so, it seems, must it be done by McBride. The Provincial premier declines to take an independent stand. He will not hold by his own declarations. He shows that he is less than a man. He is a Conservative, and that is all.

In 1909 Sir Richard wanted a Canadian navy. In 1912 he moved a resolution urging the Dominion government to provide immediate naval protection for the Pacific coast. At the Revelstoke convention last fall he expressed the same view in his address. Now he favors a policy of contributions. He is no longer concerned with the protection of the Pacific. Well, which is it? Was he sincere before or is he only sincere now?

**THIS WILL NOT HELP OUR FARMERS.**

In the new United States tariff as it will finally go into the statute books agricultural implements of every description are placed on the free list,

along with baling wire, fence wire, grain sacks, shoes, cement, nails, lumber, coal, harness, wagons, sewing machines and dozens of other articles used on every farm in the country. So far as agriculture is concerned, the greater part of the burden of protection has been lifted in the United States.

Canada, on the other hand, although a greater percentage of its production is primarily agricultural than in the United States, still taxes almost everything the farmer uses. Coal, iron, cement, lumber, machinery, implements, shoes, clothing and household effects are taxed. This means that the Canadian manufacturer of any of these articles will be free to charge the Canadian farmer more for any of the articles specified than he will be likely to charge for the same articles shipped to the farmer on the south side of the 49th parallel.

This arrangement, so protectionists claim, builds up industries by preserving the home market against foreign competition. The Canadian farmer who realizes that his neighbor in Dakota is able to buy a binder made in Hamilton or Toronto cheaper than the same can be bought on this side of the line will be likely to conclude that the arrangement which takes the money out of his pocket and hands it to the Dakota farmer makes him the goat.

**TWO MINERS REPORT A RICH PLACER STRIKE IN ALASKA**

**THEY HAVE RETURNED 300 MILES FROM CHISANA RIVER TO DAWSON WITH 200 OUNCES OF GOLD SHOVELLED IN TWO DAYS.**

Dawson, July 28.—A rich placer strike has been made on Chisana River in Alaska about 300 miles from Dawson. An unauthenticated report of the find was received at Dawson some time ago. The values given were so large that the report was not generally credited.

Two well known Dawson men, Tom Doyle and Andy Taylor, who went on first stamped, have returned with two hundred ounces of gold shovelled in by the discoverers in two days.

A special steambot will leave here tomorrow, loaded with stampers and outfits. Dawson is the nearest outfitting point, and

over two hundred miles of the journey in can be made from Dawson by steamer, from that point on pack horses are used.

There are no supplies in the district, so everything will have to be sent in from here, where a complete supply can be had. This is the biggest strike made in the north since Bonanza was discovered.

The course from Dawson is up the White River to Snag Creek, thence up Snag Creek to the head and over the watershed to the Tanana River, on a branch of which the discovery has been made.

**PORTLAND CANAL SHARES ARE TAKING RISE IN THE MARKET**

**SHARP ADVANCE IN RED CLIFF UNEXPLAINABLE — GLACIER AND PORTLAND CANAL GO UP BECAUSE OF THE BIG TUNNEL**

Judging from the reports of the mining sections of both the Vancouver and Victoria stock markets, slowly but surely the speculative element is evidencing a more marked interest in northern shares. Under continuous buying orders Portland Canal has strengthened to three and five-eighths. Glaciers are bid at five and a half and Red Cliff has been selling around seven. The interest manifested in the two former is on account of the possibilities of the Portland Canal Tunnels, Ltd., striking the Glacier creek vein series at an early date, as the big bore is now entering the final stages of driving for its objective point. It is hard to understand the reason for the sharp advance in Red Cliff, except that a process of cleaning up the market of all loose offerings is being effected. It is learned on good authority that J. T. Hillis, a well known Vancouver mining operator who figured largely in the sale of the Hidden Creek mines to the Granby Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co., has purchased the entire holdings of W. J. Bowen of Seattle, a former Red Cliff director and associate of President A. Erskine Smith in the original purchase of the group. Mr. Hillis was one of the members of the president's party

who visited the mine the past week, and it is believed that there are now negotiations on the tapis looking to an early resumption of development at the big copper-gold property.

Word comes down the canal that the Granby Consolidated has a force of some 30 men opening up the Swamp Point property which the company recently purchased from Moults & Harkley.

G. A. Cameron and John Watkins, who have been prospecting the Orient group, have uncovered two feet of clean chalcocite ore.

At both the Indian and the Cascade Falls mines good galena shoots are now being opened up with encouraging results.

Previous to his departure for the south, H. E. Newton, owner of the Red Reef, opposite the townsite, let a further contract for extending the main tunnel, then in 281 feet, to the 300 foot mark, besides a 25 foot crosscut from the end. The contractors are Gus Olsen, Dick Carlson and G. Petersen.

Development is progressing on several claims up Glacier creek American creek, the Marmot river as well as up the main Bear river. —Portland Canal Miner.

**LANGARA LIGHTHOUSE HAS BEEN COMPLETED**

**This is First Lighthouse of its Kind on Coast—Diaphone is in Triplicate.**

The Langara lighthouse has been completed and will be in working order by the beginning of the week. It has taken about a year to construct the lighthouse and foghorn. It was a most difficult task, it being found necessary to build a road up an incline for a mile in length in order to raft the lumber and material to the shore. This is the first lighthouse of its kind on the coast, the diaphone being in triplicate. Vessels from the Orient on the passage to Prince Rupert will pass between Langara Island on the north end of Graham Island and Cape Mazon on the Alaska side of Dixon Entrance.

THE TWO WILSONS DISAGREE OVER MEXICAN DIFFICULTY

THE AMBASSADOR FAVORS RECOGNITION OF THE HUERTA GOVERNMENT IN RETURN FOR CONCESSIONS—PRESIDENT IS OPPOSED

Washington, July 28.—Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson, summoned from Mexico City to inform the Washington administration of conditions in the rebellion-torn republic, talked for an hour with President Wilson and Secretary Bryan today, submitting chiefly a recommendation that the United States use its influence to establish the Huerta regime.

No policy was evolved, at least none was announced, but it became known that the president's ideas and those of the ambassador, as to the course to be pursued, are so radically different that the administration officials interpreted the day's developments as forecasting the resignation of Ambassador Wilson's.

President Wilson and the ambassador looked on the future Mexican situation, it was learned from opposite viewpoints. The President is concerned over the morality of any policy adopted by the United States and the effect of the Latin-American countries and is disinclined to strengthen a government that came into power through the questionable events incident to Madero's assassination.

Ambassador Wilson, on the other hand, is disposed to look at the situation, not from past

Mr. McCormick made the trip in 28 minutes, or at a speed of more than a mile a minute. The machine was driven by Clarence C. Witmer. The flight was at an average height of about sixty feet.

For riding on the sidewalk Daniel Campbell was fined \$5 and \$2 costs this morning. Campbell is the lad who knocked down George Russell of The News staff on Friday afternoon.
