## STRIKING FRASER FISHERMEN GOING BACK TO WORK

### DUKE OF CONNAUGHT TO HAVE TEMPORARY QUARTERS IN QUEBEC—FIRE AT REVELSTOKE

#### PEACE IS AT LAST IN SIGHT IN WAR WEARIED BALKANS

THREE DAYS' EXTENSION OF ARMISTICE LOOKS LIKE PEACE—  
NEW FRONTIER WILL OUTLINE TWO OF THE  
OPPOSING COUNTRIES.

Bucharest, Aug. 4.—A three days' extension of the armistice between the Balkan states was agreed to today by the peace delegates of Roumania, Serbia, Greece, Montenegro and Bulgaria. The new frontier between Roumania and Bulgaria as agreed upon will start twelve kilometres south of Balcik, a port on the Black Sea, run northwesterly to a point twelve kilometres south of Dobrich and finish nine kilo-

#### SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS IS OFFERED FOR GOVERNOR'S HEAD

SEVENTY TRAITOROUS SOLDIERS EXECUTED IN CANTON—IN-  
TERNATIONAL FLEET LYING OFF CITY INCREASED  
BY NEW ARRIVALS.

Hongkong, Aug. 6.—Although the southern rebels have suffered a number of disastrous defeats and several bodies are reported to have laid down their arms, the situation at Canton remains serious. The electric lights are cut off at midnight and the people are fearful of a mutiny. Trains, trucks and other vessels leaving the city are packed with refugees. Seventy traitorous soldiers were shot in Canton on Friday. A reward of \$60,000 has been offered for the head of Governor Chan of Canton.

#### GREAT BRITAIN'S REASON FOR NOT EXHIBITING AT THE FAIR

SIR EDWARD GREY SAYS IT HAS NOTHING TO DO WITH THE  
CONTROVERSY OVER CANAL RATES—CANADA WILL  
BE AN EXHIBITOR, HOWEVER.

London, Aug. 6.—Sir Edward Grey, foreign secretary, has made a long statement with respect to the refusal of the government to participate in the Panama-Pacific exposition. He declares that Britain's refusal has nothing to do with the canal controversy. The reason for the refusal, he adds, is partly due to commercial considerations.

#### HANSON SOLD LIQUOR TO AN INDIAN GIRL

Andrew Hanson Was Found  
Guilty of This Offense  
and Fined.

Andrew Hanson, the keeper of a store at the corner of Fifth avenue and McBride street, was found guilty this morning on the charge of supplying liquor to an Indian woman. He had pleaded not guilty, but in the course of the evidence his guilt was revealed.

The constable who made the arrest found under Hanson's bed a bottle of whisky, a bottle of port wine, two empty whisky bottles and seven empty wine bottles.

Hanson's guilt will be a surprise to many, as he has generally been regarded as a highly respectable man in poor circumstances and on that account a number of people are said to have given him a helping hand.

He was given the option of paying a fine of \$50 or spending two months in jail with hard labor.

#### GOVERNOR GENERAL TO STAY IN QUEBEC

Duke of Connaught Will Remain  
in England Until After Prince  
Arthur's Wedding.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—The Duke of Connaught will delay his return to Canada until October 17th. This is necessary in order that he may attend the wedding of his son Prince Arthur.

On the return of the Duke to Canada Quebec is likely to become temporarily the seat of government for Canada, as His Royal Highness will take up his residence there during the alterations to Rideau Hall.

BLAZE AT REVELSTOKE

Three Boarders at City Hotel  
Probably in the Ruins.

Revelstoke, B. C., Aug. 6.—The City Hotel was destroyed by fire last night, the loss being estimated at thirty thousand dollars. Three laborers who were boarding in the hotel are missing and it is believed that they were burned to death.

#### FISHERMEN'S STRIKE ON THE FRASER PRACTICALLY ENDED

WAS OF SHORT DURATION, BUT NO LESS THAN SIX THOU-  
SAND MEN AND WOMEN WERE IDLE—JAPS  
WERE THE STRONGEST.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Aug. 6.—In spite of the dangerous character the strike of fishermen on the Fraser River assumed a few days ago, it is now believed the difficulties are practically ended. Many of the men are returning to work at the old rate of 15 cents per fish, but some canneries are paying 20 cents, and it is believed that this will be the price for the balance of the season.

According to the figures given out by the strikers, there were over 6,000 men and women idle on the Fraser. The number includes 2,000 whites, 1,850 Indians, including women, and 2,500 Japanese, including women. The women on strike probably total 1,000.

Monday night the Japanese went out into the gulf with guns in order to prevent others from fishing. It is said here that the white men have no great objec-

tion to the 15 cent rate now offered by the canners instead of 25 cents per fish paid in July, but they are influenced to a great extent by the Japanese. The Japs contend that they had an agreement which specified that they were to receive 25 cents per sock-eye during July and August. They got this price in July, but on August 1st the canners issued a notice to the effect that the price would be reduced by 10 cents per fish. As a result the Japs immediately quit work and induced the white and Indian fishermen to leave their boats on shore as well.

There is no definite agreement between the Japs, Indians and whites, but it is quite clear that there is an understanding of sufficient strength to keep the latter off the gulf waters. Perhaps the understanding lies in the fact that the Jap fishermen are in the greater number and are also the most aggressive.

#### FIGHTING JOE SAYS HE WILL NOT RESIGN

Hon. Joseph Martin, M. P. for St.  
Pancras East, Declines an  
Invitation to Quit.

London, Aug. 3.—The independent attitude adopted by Hon. Joseph Martin, the Canadian lawyer and M. P. for St. Pancras East, in voting with the opposition at the close of the Marconi debate, has brought its penalty, and Mr. Martin has been asked by the local association not to seek re-election.

Mr. Martin tells the Canadian Press he will do nothing of the kind, and that the rumor about his resignation is entirely without foundation.

It is understood that the local Liberal Association is withdrawing its support. Mr. Martin, however, will likely start a new association in the interests of Liberal-Labor.

## PLANS OF NEW G.T.P. HOTEL HAVE ARRIVED IN THE CITY

New Two Million Dollar Structure Will Be Finest on The  
Pacific Coast---It Will Be Fifteen Stories in Height,  
With 450 Bedrooms

"Prince Rupert is to have a hotel that will probably be the finest on the Pacific coast," said Mr. Louis Swarz this morning to a representative of The Daily News.

Mr. Swarz arrived here from Victoria this morning, representing F. M. Rattenbury, the architect for the two million dollar hotel which the G. T. P. is about to erect here.

Mr. Swarz brought with him the plans for the hotel. This is to be a palatial structure, comparable with the great hotels of New York, Paris and London. It will be nearly double the size of the handsome Empress Hotel at Victoria, and will easily rank among the three or four best hotels in the Dominion.

The hotel will be situated on Second avenue, between Fourth and Fifth streets. It will have a length of 305 feet and an average depth of 150 feet. The central part of the building will be fifteen storeys in height, while the two wings will be twelve storeys high. The building will be in the chateau style of architecture.

It will be of steel construction with reinforced concrete floors. It will be faced with terra cotta and brick and will have a slate roof.

Work is already in progress on the preparation of the steel and terra cotta for the building. So far as is at present known to the architects the whole hotel will be constructed before the passenger trains have been running into Prince Rupert for any considerable time. Two years at most should see the completion of the entire building.

The visitor who passes into the hotel through the handsome entrance on Second avenue will walk across the terrace and through the loggia to the great lounge room, 64 feet square. Behind the lounge room will be a magnificent ball and tea room, 100 by 50 feet.

Off the ballroom, facing the water, will be a palm room. On the same floor is a dining room, which will have a seating capacity of 365. This will be finished in mahogany. Carved columns and a highly colored ceiling will

add to its appearance of sumptuous elegance.

The floor below this will be called the ground floor. On it will be the grill room, the barber shop, the bar, the billiard rooms and the kitchen.

Below this floor will be that on which is to be placed the First Avenue entrance. Owing to the slope on this property the hotel will have two more storeys on its First Avenue elevation than on Second Avenue. On this lowest floor there will be Turkish baths, both for men and women. Under the kitchen there will be room for the kitchen supplies and for storage. The rest of the space on this floor will be used for commercial travellers' sample rooms.

In the upper storeys of the hotel will be 450 bedrooms. They will be furnished in the best of style. Each bedroom will have a bathroom adjoining it.

It is likely that copies of the plans will shortly be placed on exhibition in the offices of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

## WHAT WILL HE DO NOW?

For a year or more now Premier Borden has been dreaming of an emergency which may overwhelm the British Empire in fury and disaster. For the same period of time he has been trying to sit between the two stools of Nationalism and Imperialism. He was furtively watching the lightning playing around the horizon and listening to the booming of the distant thunder, while at the same time he was carefully watching his Nationalist allies and listening to the boom of the growing tide of resentment against his naval acrobatics.

In despair he finally fled to the Atlantic coast to seek peace. Even there the naval ghost would not down, and he is reported to be in close cable communications with the British admiralty hoping to find some way by which he can get out of his self-imposed dilemma without following the common sense course proposed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Then came "the most unkindest cut of all." Winston Churchill cut the ground from under Mr. Borden's feet and left him derelict indeed when he declared in the British parliament on July 17th that he knew of nothing in the international situation necessitating an increase in the British naval program. And this, after Mr. Borden had intimated that the despairing British public were hurrying to get together three extra dread-

noughts to take the place of those he had proposed. It is small wonder that Mr. Borden is reported suffering from sleeplessness and the desire to put off meeting parliament till next year. There will be much to explain when he does face the representatives of the people. All this will be as nothing to the necessity of formulating some permanent policy which will not be a policy of permanent tribute, and yet hold his Nationalist allies.

## A NEW GUESSING COMPETITION.

Almost the entire newspaper community in Eastern Canada is engaged in a guessing contest concerning the rumor that Sir Hugh Graham, the owner of the Montreal Star, Conservative of the Conservative, and a leading Imperialist, is the chief backer of the new Montreal Telegraph, which is the old Witness under new ownership and new editorial management. The Telegraph confesses to being an out-and-out Liberal newspaper, and as such opposed to the Borden policy with reference to the defenses of the Empire, and in favor of the Liberal proposals. Instead of being independent as the old Witness was, it is frankly going straight in the face of the policy maintained by the Montreal Star. In spite of these facts, the rumor persists that Sir Hugh Graham is backing the Telegraph and is causing the newspapermen of Montreal and Toronto no end of food for thought and material for argument.

## MANY PRIZES WILL BE GIVEN FOR BEST MINERAL EXHIBITS

MANAGEMENT OF THE PRINCE RUPERT FAIR PURPOSE GIVING DOUBLE THE AMOUNT OFFERED BY THE BIG VANCOUVER EXHIBITION.

The Prince Rupert exhibition, to be held September 24th to 26th, has set a new pace in the liberality of its treatment in cash prizes for the mineral department of the fair. The management purpose giving double the amount offered by the big Vancouver exhibition, besides a wider variety of commercial minerals, coal, building stones, marble, clays, etc. The district prize amounts to \$50 and a diploma. Five dollar prizes are offered for the best displays of gold, silver, silver-lead, copper-gold and zinc ores. To this the Portland Canal Mine add a special \$10 prize for the largest exhibit of ore from any individual prospect or mine shown by bona fide owners. The prospectors have also been generously treated in three cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 for the best collection of district specimens. R. W. Cameron of Prince Rupert, to encourage an exhibit

of the black diamond, has offered the association a \$25 silver cup for the finest exhibit of coal. Diplomas and cash prizes of \$5 for first and \$3 for second will be awarded for the best displays of marble, brick, clay, lime, gravel, building stones and cement. Diplomas are also to be given for the best collection of concentrates and smelter products.

Word has been received by the fair management that district exhibits will be contributed by Atlin, Stewart, Kitselas, Hazelton and Queen Charlotte Islands, and keen rivalry already exists between the several sections as to who will land the district prize. Arrangements were made yesterday for the lease of a building during the fair to be used exclusively for the mineral displays, and this feature will appeal to thousands of visitors, both at home and on the outside.

## LUNATICS SAVE TWO WOMEN AND BABE FROM THE FLAMES

BAND OF FIFTEEN "TRUSTIES FIGHT BAD PRAIRIE FIRE BY DIGGING A HALF MILE TRENCH UNDER THE DIRECTION OF AN OFFICIAL.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 2.—Working at a furious pace under a scorching sun, a crew of fifteen patients from the Steilacoom asylum, directed by Superintendent A. P. Calhoun, County Engineer Roy Thompson and the county commissioners today, saved the lives of two women and a babe and thousands of dollars' worth of property by digging a trench a half mile long across the path of the worst prairie fire that started in the vicinity of Tacoma this season.

The women and the babe were in a home threatened by the fire, praying at the time Dr. Calhoun approached in an automobile.

He dashed back to the lunatic asylum, marshalled a small army of "trusties" and rushed them back to the fire, which they

fought with wet sacks, trenching and backfiring. More than 100 acres of land was burned over in an hour and a half.

## CHANGE IN SERVICE

Alaska Cable System to Be in Postal Department.

There is every probability that within the next year the management of the Alaskan cable system will be changed from the signal service to the postal department. A bill will be introduced in the next session of congress, and the probabilities are that it will be carried, authorizing the post office department to take it over.

## EXPERIMENT A FAILURE

Government's Battleship Test of Alaska Coal.

There is every probability that the attempt on the part of the government to get enough Bering Lake coal to salt water for a battleship test will end in a failure. According to the officers of the Sampson, the government has spent close to \$60,000 thus far in the work, and have less than one hundred tons available for shipping at this time, and can get out not to exceed as much more before the freeze up. As it was estimated that eight hundred tons would be necessary to make the test, the amount which will be available will be totally inadequate.

In a car following the one that was struck, Mrs. Pell and a party of friends were riding. She was brought to Long Beach, where she was treated by physicians.

Hempstead, L. I., Aug. 4.—William Lainbeer, the banker and society leader, injured last night in the automobile accident in which S. Osgood Pell and his chauffeur, Charles Gambeave, were killed outright, succumbed today to his injuries. A fracture of the skull was the cause of death, although he was suffering from numerous other injuries.
