#### MISREPRESENTATION OF FACT. In the Evening Empire of

yesterday is another of those coffin like articles in which the editor of that newspaper so frequently exposes the corruption of his own mind. And this one is well up to the average. "In the estimates," says the

Evening Empire, "is an item of \$5,000 for incidentals. When pressed for an explanation as to what it was for, the mayor stated it was to cover the cost of his trip."

This looks like a case of deliberate misrepresentation of fact. For one thing, there was no need to "press" the mayer for an explanation. He gave it as soon as he was requested for it, without any need for "pressure" at all. Again, the mayor most emphatically did not state that this item of \$5,000 was to cover the cost of his trip. He said that among the things included under the heading of "Incidentals" were the expenses of the city solicitor and himself on their financial mission to the eastern cities and to England.

Even if the expenses of the mayor and city solicitor had totalled \$5,000 for the trip, the expense would not be so alarming as the Evening Empire seems to think. If one travels abroad in quest of money he won't meet with much success if he asks the leading finan-

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


