From Long Trip Into the Arizona Desert.

Chicago, Aug. 25. - Colonel Roosevelt (burned almost as red as the desert Indians, among whom he has been sojourning, arrived here today. He spent less than two hours in the city before departing for Oyster Bay.

He was met at the Santa Fe station by Thomas D. Knight, president of the Chicago Progressive Club, and a delegation of members, and later took a "standing" lunch conducted on a help yourselves basis at the club.
