THE OTHER WHITE SLAVER IS CONVICTED UNDER MANN ACT

OF UNITED STATES COMMISSIONER GENERAL OF IMMIGRATION TO RECEIVE PENITENTIARY SENTENCE FOR HIS DEBAUCHING INFLUENCE.

(Special to The Daily News)
San Francisco, Sept. 6.—Farley Caminetta was yesterday found guilty on one count of the violation of the Mann white slave act, the pronouncement of sentence not follow the conviction as there are other charges to be dealt with.
During the hearing Lola Norris, whom the prisoner had seduced to Reno, admitted having in false evidence in regard to her relations with Caminetta. She testified she had not told the jury when they were arrested at Reno, as she had decided then to shield the man she loved whom she then trusted.
Mrs. Caminetti followed her husband's testimony throwing interesting sidelights on the "eternal triangle," but in the main a repetition of what she had previously told for the benefit of Diggs at his trial. She made a willing and even eager witness for her husband.
Caminetta did not testify in person for his defence, as the government forestalled him, and in place he listened to his own words as taken down by a Sacramento court reporter. Caminetta did not deny his acts, but sought to qualify them by the motives from which they sprang. He told how he happened "incidentally and accidentally" to leave his wife in Sacramento with a baby three weeks old, when he started across the California line with Lola Norris. His defence was to all intents and purposes the same as that put forward by his companion, Diggs, convicted on like charges.

RECEIVER APPOINTED FOR THE DOUGHTY FISHING ENTERPRISES

GEORGE DOUGHTY ACTING AS TRUSTEE FOR THE DEBENTURE HOLDERS—WAS TAKEN SUDDENLY ILL WHEN IN NEW YORK.

Vancouver, Sept. 4.—Mr. J. K. H. local manager of the Bank of Toronto, was this morning appointed receiver of the B. C. Fisheries Company on the application of Mr. J. E. Bird, solicitor for the debenture holders. The order was made by Mr. Justice Clement and carries into effect a previous order made by Mr. Justice Warrington in the chancery division of the High Court of England.
The company had been notified of the application but entered no opposition. Sir George Doughty, the promoter and president of the company, is acting as trustee for the debenture holders, before whom the proposals in regard to the company's future were laid at a meeting three weeks ago. It was stated to his lordship that the debenture issues were for \$250,000, of which 80 per cent. was subscribed by parties for whom the Bank of Toronto is acting as agent. Sir George Doughty started a fortnight ago for the old country but he got no farther than New York, where he lies ill in bed.

HOT SPRINGS NEARLY DESTROYED BY FIRE

Damages Are Estimated at Over a Million and a Half Dollars in Buildings.

Hot Springs, Ark., Sept. 6.—At 8 o'clock last night thirty blocks of buildings, including the city lighting plant and the court house, had been totally destroyed by fire. The fire started in the afternoon in the outskirts, and although fought with great vigor was not got under control before it shifted to the main business section of the city. Block after block was attacked by the flames and demolished, the total loss being estimated at over a million and a half dollars.

P. railway having left this morning. The directors will also take up the question of advertising contracts in the three daily papers.

FINED FOR CONTEMPT

Secretary Western Fuel Company Failed to Produce Books

Deaths on Shushana Trail

Seattle, Sept. 4.—A special from the Shushana gold fields, Alaska, gives the total loss of life among stampedees up to August 28th as ten. Four were drowned on the trail from McCarthy, two were drowned on the way from Fairbanks, one accidentally shot himself and three are reported to have starved to death on the trail.

Says Many Are Facing Starvation and Death at the McCarthy End of Railway.

She says there are graves all along the way and dead horses everywhere. There are insurmountable difficulties of every kind. One part of the trail from McCarthy is bog and mire for miles and miles. She says that many at the McCarthy end of the railway are facing starvation and death.

THAW MILLIONS SECURE ONE MORE STAY OF PROCEEDINGS

IMMIGRATION AUTHORITIES ORDERED THE DEGENERATE'S DEPORTATION AS AN UNDESIRABLE, BUT COUNSEL SECURED ANOTHER HABEAS CORPUS WRIT.

(Special to The Daily News)
Coaticook, Que., Sept. 6.—The immigration officials, after an examination of Harry K. Thaw, decided that he was an undesirable under the act and ordered his deportation. But Mr. Joyce, deputy attorney general of New York state, had Thaw arrested for gambling on a railway. He was arrested on the train playing poker, the cards and chips confiscated and the newspaper men he was playing with were also arrested and placed in jail.
Thaw was later admitted to bail in \$500 and proceeded on the way to cross the international boundary line. There was a scurry then among the United States officials. Sheriff Hornbeck, of the county in which Matteawan asylum is situated, was ready to arrest him when he stepped on American soil and there were many others ready to aid him.
"Better have your machines ready, boys," said Prosecuting Attorney Jerome. "We shall soon be in Vermont."
But in the meantime Thaw's counsel had secured a second habeas corpus writ from a Montreal judge restraining Thaw's arrest, in order to be able to produce him in further proceedings on September 15th, when Thaw will appear before a Montreal court. This was a knockout for the United States lawyers and officials, and they gloomily took the court.

CRUISER WILLIAM JOLIFFE IS BOUGHT BY CANADIAN PACIFIC

CHARTERED FISHERY CRUISER WILL JOIN THE GREAT FLEET OF THE CANADIAN PACIFIC SOME TIME NEXT MONTH.

Vancouver, Sept. 4.—The chartered fisheries protection cruiser William Joliffe has been purchased by the C. P. R. and will join the service of the big company in October, according to well authenticated reports current along the waterfront. The Joliffe will be taken over by the C. P. R. for use in towing the coal hulks. The fleet will then consist of the Joliffe, the Czar, the Nanoose and the Qualicum.
The William Joliffe is a two funnelled steamer, but when she joins the C. P. R. fleet she will be placed on one boiler and one funnel and will be transformed into an oil burner. A new boiler will be installed for this purpose. The Joliffe is at present under charter to the Dominion government at a rate of one hundred and fifty dollars a day and she is now completing her second year as a fisheries protection cruiser. During her employ she has done valuable work in scaring poachers from Canadian waters and has also several captures to her credit. Captain Newcombe is the fisheries officer on board the vessel.
The William Joliffe is owned by the B. C. Salvage Co., who brought her out from Liverpool five or six years ago. The tug is well known at the Mersey port for she was one of the famous Joliffe fleet of deep sea tugs which undertook many notable long distance tows.
The release of the William Joliffe from the government service will coincide with the arrival of the first of the two cruisers built for Canada at Dublin. These vessels are modelled on the lines of the cruisers employed in the Irish and Scotch fisheries protection service and the first one is now on her way to this coast. The second is to be delivered at Esquimalt in February next.

DOES VANCOUVER IMAGINE PRINCE RUPERT IS SLEEPING?

BUSINESS MEN OF THE SOUTHERN CITY URGED TO GO AFTER TRADE ALONG LINE OF G. T. P. FROM PRINCE RUPERT EAST.

In a recent editorial in the Vancouver Sun in connection with J. W. Stewart's announcement that G. T. P. steel will be connected in April or May next, the business men are urged to get busy after the trade that will develop in Northern British Columbia. It is evident from the editorial that in the opinion of some people in Vancouver the trade of the vast territory being opened up by the G. T. P. naturally belongs to the lower coast city. One would imagine they are under the impression that the business men of Prince Rupert are peacefully sleeping and are going to let what rightfully belongs to them slip through their fingers. Following is an extract from the editorial:
"There is no reason why Vancouver should not be the great entrepot for the whole of the vast territory which, through the wise prescience of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, is being opened up in the north of this province by the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific. It will take a long time for Prince Rupert to become the wholesale distributing point which Vancouver is now, and it will be many years before Vancouver will have a better chance to tap the trade of the north of this province than she has now.
"Already the merchants of Winnipeg and Edmonton are active; they have their travellers

PREPARATIONS FOR WEDDING OF PRINCE ARTHUR OF CONNAUGHT

**WILL BE CREATED DUKE OF KENT AND WITH THE DUCHESS
PROBABLY COME TO CANADA AS NEXT GOVERNOR-
GENERAL**

London, Sept. 2.—Preparations for the wedding of Prince Arthur of Connaught and the Duchess of Fife, on October 15, are already in full swing, and hundreds of young Irish girls are busy working on the trousseau, for the

It appears that the rumor, which I think I have mentioned before, that Prince Arthur will relieve his father as Governor-General of Canada, is true, and in this case the Duke and Duchess of Kent, as it is understood Prince Arthur and the Duchess of Fife will be styled after their marriage, will not be very much in this country for some years to come.



THE DUCHESS OF FIFE.

Duchess insists that as far as possible everything must be made in Great Britain. According to English custom, wedding presents are given long before the wedding and costly gifts are arriving from all parts of the Empire. The king's personal gift to the groom will be a magnificent motor car, while gorgeous jewels have been received from Queen Alexandra, the Kaiser, the Czar, and several other European monarchs related to the English royal family.

It is suggested that Prince Arthur is to be made Duke of Kent that he and the Duchess of Fife may be styled Duke and Duchess of Kent and Fife, but this is unlikely, as there is no precedent in England for a husband taking his wife's title, as sometimes happens abroad, and the Dukedom of Fife is not royal.

The wedding will be a semi-state ceremony, the invitations being sent out by the Lord Chamberlain's office in the name of the Princess Royal. It is expected that the German Emperor, the Crown Prince and Princess, the King and Queen of Norway, the Crown Prince and Princess of Sweden, the King and Queen of Spain, and, of course, all the English royal family, will be present, while the wedding breakfast will, it is stated, be given in St. James's palace, where that of the King and Queen was held. Prince Arthur is to be married in the uniform of the Scots Greys and a detachment of his regiment will be on duty and possibly line the aisle and the Chapel Royal, unless considerations of space forbid. It is likely also that the Duff Highlanders will be represented.

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TOO MUCH PARTY POLITICS.
 In an excellent address at the annual conference of Canadian Clubs in Hamilton President McClelland strongly condemned the prevalence of partisan politics, meaning the unfortunately familiar use of party organizations to secure or retain office. There is no excuse for the existence of a political party except when it stands for a principle of sufficient importance to warrant men in sinking their smaller differences and uniting in a cause. A party maintained for any other purpose is a lowering and blighting influence. It can serve no purpose except to gratify unworthy personal ambitions or to enable schemers to advance their personal interests. The man who belongs to or supports a party without having a definite public purpose to serve is a tool or the manipulator of tools. He is used to serve the unworthy purpose of others or is making use of others to serve his own questionable purposes. Liberalism is the cause of progress. It puts every insti-

tion and every project to the test of human and national usefulness. By that test it judges, and it moves ahead by eliminating the outgrown and the decadent and taking up the new and the publicly healthful. It faces without fear the criticism and the abuse always aimed at the innovator, realizing that every right and every privilege now enjoyed was at one time called treason and that every liberty was at one time called iniquitous. Liberalism is the revolt against stagnation. Realizing that it has lifted men and nations from savagery to what they have now attained, it also realizes that its mission is only begun, and that the dead load of reaction is still as difficult to move as at any time in the world's history. The element that sees this truth clearly will always work independently in the cause of progress, and when some important objective comes within reach will sink all differences for the sake of the possible attainment. This is the party politics of which no country can have too much.—Toronto Globe.

SHUSHANA STAMPEDE NOT THE FIRST TO THAT DISTRICT

GOLD WAS SOUGHT UP THE WHITE MANY YEARS AGO UNDER UNFAVORABLE CONDITIONS

Dawson, Sept. 5.—The present stampede to the neighborhood of the head of the White is not the only one which has taken place to that locality. In 1904 quite a little excitement took place over the country. Placer gold is understood to have been brought from that region. Billy Lloyd went up with a party which started from the Klondike Hotel. Billy James, the discoverer of the diggings just located; Bob Wiley, now in the district; and Andy Taylor, the White river trail blazer, went into the country with a number of others. They made the trip over the ice with horses and sleighs.

claim to have inside information give out vague hints of wealth untold, but when pinned down to talking facts and figures have nothing definite to say.

"Several parties with large outfits have already gone to the diggings, and others are preparing to leave. 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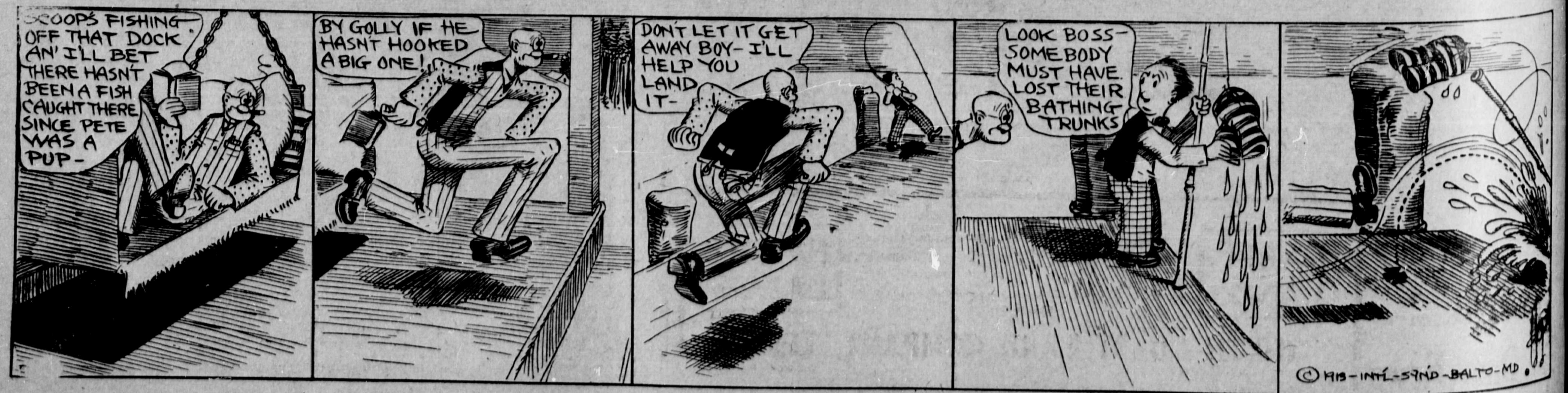

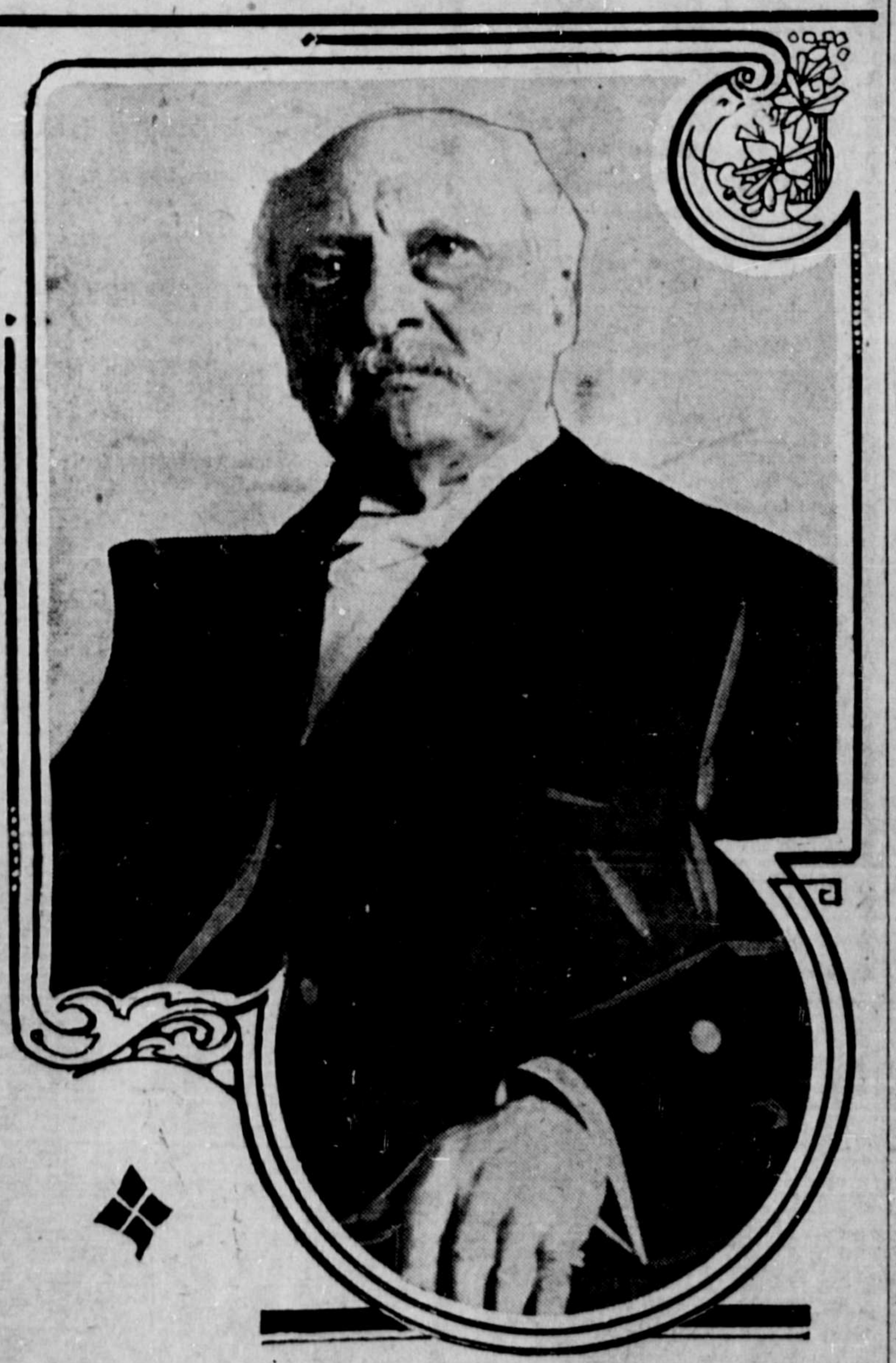
