

THAW GETS A ROUGH DOSE OF CANADIAN JUSTICE

JAPS LAND TROOPS IN CHINA—WIFE MURDER AT FERNIE—BOMBARDIER KNOCKS OUT GUNNER

THAW IS SUDDENLY DEPORTED BY THE CANADIAN OFFICIALS

KICKED AND FOUGHT HIS CAPTORS AND SCREAMED THAT HE WAS BEING KIDNAPPED—EXTRADITION PROCEEDINGS IN VERMONT

Colebrook, Que., Sept. 11.—Harry K. Thaw will not have another famous trial in Canada on the 15th, as has been announced, because he is no longer in Canada. Much against his will he is now back on American soil in the state of Vermont. The Canadian immigration authorities yesterday got a move on and hustled him over the border.

Acting under the instructions of the Minister of Justice the immigration officials took Thaw out of the immigration pen at the Grand Trunk depot and in an automobile rushed him to the Vermont boundary, where he was arrested by United States officials.

Thaw was greatly surprised when the officials entered the pen and ordered him to get ready at once for a trip to the border. He wanted to ask questions but was met with firm, curt replies. Then his surprise changed to fury. He flatly refused to budge an inch without advice from counsel. When treated like a peevish child by the officials he picked up a bottle of ink and hurled it at the one giving him orders. It missed and smashed through the window.

Then the officials closed in on him, forcibly ejecting him from

the pen. Thaw fought and kicked his captors, screaming that he was being kidnapped. He was tossed into the motor and three hours later landed in Vermont. There the United States officials were ready for him and placed him in Colebrook jail.

The move on the part of the Canadian government was so sudden and unexpected that it caused the greatest surprise. It staggered for a moment both the lawyers representing Thaw and those engaged in the effort to get him back to Matteawan. But in a very short time Thaw's American counsel reached Colebrook, where they instituted legal action to fight Thaw's extradition from Vermont to the neighboring state of New York.

Ottawa, Sept. 11.—The immigration officials here decline to give any reason for the sudden deportation of Thaw beyond the one that the fugitive from justice was illegally in Canada.

Montreal, Sept. 11.—Mrs. Thaw, the mother of Harry Thaw, upon being informed of the deportation of her son immediately collapsed and is in an unconscious and dangerous condition.

YAKUTAT BAY AND GLACIERS VISITED BY GEOLOGISTS

CANADIAN PORT WILL SOON BE POSSIBLE ON ACCOUNT OF RECEDING GLACIER—PRESENTATION TO CAPTAIN McLEOD.

The C. P. R. steamer Princess Maquinna, which went north a couple of weeks ago with a large party of geologists bound for Dawson and other mining centres, arrived in port yesterday afternoon on its return trip, having parted with the geologists at Skagway. Previous to his departure from Skagway, Captain McLeod was presented by the party with a sealed gift, which he is bound over not to open until he reaches Vancouver. Sir August Baker made the presentation on behalf of the geologists, who were delighted with the treatment they had received at the hands of the genial captain and his staff.

During his northern trip with the geologists, according to statements made by Captain McLeod yesterday, some very interesting places were visited, among

which was Yakutat Bay, where there is a receding glacier. This bay extends to near the border between Alaska and Canada and as a result of the receding glacier the bay before many years will extend into Canadian territory so that a Canadian port can be established there.

Captain McLeod took his party into Russell's fiord, an arm of Disenchantment Bay, where many glaciers were seen. The bay is uncharted and was filled with ice from the glaciers, making navigation difficult. The Maquinna was the first boat to enter the bay since 1891.

On the return trip from Skagway the Maquinna carried a fairly large number of passengers going south for the winter. She arrived here shortly before 6 and left at 6:30.

REPRESENTATIVE BUSINESS MEN PLAN TRIP ACROSS THE CONTINENT

Will Travel East to Montreal Over Grand Trunk Pacific as Soon as Line is Completed—Proposition Met With Enthusiasm

With the rapid approach of the completion of the Grand Trunk Pacific line in British Columbia and the linking up of Prince Rupert with the east by the shining steel, leading business men of this city are planning ways and means of advertising to the outside world the unlimited resources of that portion of Western and Northern B. C. opened up for development and the many business opportunities of the western terminal, the great "Pacific Port of Progress."

One proposition that has just been advanced and that has already been received with great enthusiasm by business men of the city is to run a special train right through from Prince Rupert to Montreal as soon as possible after the last spike is driven. It is proposed that a party of at least a hundred of the leading representative business men of the city make the trip on this special train and that stops be

made at the leading cities throughout the prairie and eastern provinces along the line. It is not improbable that if such a proposition be carried out the delegation would be publicly entertained in most of the places visited and in this way the city would get untold value in advertising its opportunities by direct contact between those who are best able to give first hand information and those who are seeking such information.

Another idea in connection with the plan is to carry along an exhibition car, in which would be displayed the mineral, agricultural, fishery and timber resources of the district directly tributary to Prince Rupert.

The scheme is being fathered by C. W. Peck, George Frizzell, M. J. Hobin and a few others. These men have just started interviewing business men of the city, but already nearly a dozen of the leading citizens have given

positive assurance that they will form members of such a party.

To successfully carry out the plan that has been proposed an early start is of paramount importance. The committee must have positive assurance as to the number of business men who will participate in the trip before the committee takes up with the railway officials the matter of securing such a train. President Chamberlin, of the G. T. P., is expected to pay a visit to Prince Rupert in the near future, and it is hoped that plans will be sufficiently matured to submit the proposition to him on the occasion of his visit.

Considering the purpose for which the trip is planned it does not seem too much to expect that President Chamberlin will accede to the request for a special train at as early a date as possible after the road is completed and that very favorable terms will be granted.

"My latest advices from home indicate that I am practically certain to be elected," said Diaz. "Huerta will not run. I will not discuss President Wilson's Mexican policy. He is a good man. I realize he means well. I expect an early peaceful settlement of my country's troubles."

Diaz was sent to Japan as a special Mexican envoy to the Mikado, but will not fulfill the mission.

CHANCES FOR GETTING COAL FROM NANAIMO REMAIN SLIM

WESTERN FUEL COMPANY STARTING UP ONE MINE BUT THE UNION MEN ARE OPPOSED — TROOPS NOT TO BE WITHDRAWN YET

Nanaimo, Sept. 8—T. R. Stockett, mine manager for the Western Fuel Mining Company, operating the No. 1 mine here, has succeeded in controlling the fire which broke out in the South Diagonal and is ready to resume operations in the bigger part of the mine. Mr. Stockett declines to be interviewed on this latest phase of the strike situation, but union leaders say that the mine manager means to employ non-union labor in the mine if the union men continue in their refusal to return to work. Up to date the union men have declined to enter into any arrangement with the company unless the company will first recognize the union and the United Mine Workers of Am-

erica. The company has offered terms which in other respects would probably be quite acceptable.

The union men propose to place pickets about the mine if the company backs up its declaration and puts non-union men to work. Police officials are planning to prevent demonstrations. They contend that according to a recent decision handed down by the privy council picketing is illegal in Canada.

Col. Hall, who returned from Victoria after a conference with the Attorney-General, says that it has been decided that the wisest course would be to leave the troops in the strike district and not disturb the situation.

PRINCE RUPERT MAN WHO WAS IN WRECK

O'Dell Says He Was Struck on the Head by Piece of Wreck But Managed to Float

Seattle, Sep. 8—George O'Dell, one of the survivors of the wreck of the steamship State of California, of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company, arrived here on the Humboldt. O'Dell took passage on the California at Prince Rupert, bound for the new gold diggings on the Shushana.

When the big liner struck and her upper works were carried away, O'Dell was struck on the head by a piece of wreckage and rendered unconscious. He says he was swimming at the time and believes his arms and legs acted automatically, keeping him afloat until he was taken out of the water by men from the Admiralty Trading Company's cannery who had gone to the rescue of the passengers struggling in the water.

O'Dell's home is at Prince Rupert. He sustained a bad scalp wound as a result of his experience in the wreck.

ULSTER'S PETITION TO KING GEORGE.

The Ulsterites, with the Unionists back of them, seem to be a little behind the times in their petition to King George, referred to in our London despatches of yesterday. The right of petition to the King has never been abrogated, nor have his sovereign rights in the premises. But customs change, and in Great Britain its laws keep pace with the customs and are based, as Tennyson tells us, "Upon precedent on precedent." The demand of the Unionists that the sovereign veto legislation passed by parliament is atrophied by disuse. It is inconceivable that the King should contemplate a step which might lead to an apparent disagreement with a majority of his people. The first principle of the unwritten constitution of Great Britain is that the King acts solely on the advice of his ministers.

CANADA MAY BE INVOLVED IN WAR.

Right cleverly does Editor Scott Bone, of the Seattle P.-I., reprimand the Canadian constabulary for breaking in upon that American game of poker at Coaticook the other morning. It was a bit of impertinence that the poker playing American is not likely to forget, and it may be depended upon that some reprisals will follow on first occasion. The P.-I. editor-in-chief had this to say:

"Just as Coaticook had arrived at the happy condition of seeing its name on the front page every day, here comes this poker incident to put a dent in the popularity earned by the Quebec village. Coaticook has received a setback in American esteem from which it may

never recover. Putting William Travers Jerome in the Coaticook cooler does not harass the hairstrung American sensibilities nearly so much as to have a Canadian constable protrude his presence into an American institution and interrupt with heavy shoes the harvest on a flush or a king full.

Canada may trample on the flag and get away with it, but it would be well to point out that our brothers across the northern border can go too far. We are tolerant, good natured people. Britishers come over here demanding their morning tub and otherwise deporting themselves in an eccentric manner without public criticism. They have even played cricket over here unmolested, if not in actual peace; but when a British subject attempts to deny an American citizen the right to take home the increment of a pat hand the situation assumes the dimensions of a whipsaw.

LATEST RELIABLE NEWS FROM THE NEW SHUSHANA DIGGINGS

MARK HEALEY WRITES THAT IT IS THE BEST MINERALIZED COUNTRY HE EVER SAW AND THAT IT LOOKS LIKE A BIG CAMP.

Writing to an intimate friend, M. H. Healey says that the Shushana district is the greatest prospect that he has ever visited. The letter was written at Blackburn and was mailed from McCarthy, Alaska, on August 22. Healey says in his letter: "I arrived in McCarthy a day or two ago from the diggings, after a hard trip. The district is all right as far as I can see. There are Bonanza, Gold Run, Glacier and Eldorado creeks and several small tributaries that prospect well, or well enough to pay. "It is the best mineralized country that I have ever seen, and it looks to me as though it would make a big camp. There is a possible belt sixty miles long and forty miles wide, in which a prospect can be obtained. Remember, this is not all pay creek. Some streams in this belt pan

gold that shows you how extensive a gold belt this will be. "There is no grub in the country and it is impossible to buy any. We were compelled to pay \$1 a pound for grub to come out on, but at that price all we could get was some flour. "I staked on a pup butting into No. 11 above the discovery. It looks like a good location. Good prospects are being found on No. 10 and No. 11 creek claims. "A great many men have rushed into the district and staked claims, and on account of no grub were compelled to leave without doing the necessary work to hold, so in that case all of this ground will be open for relocation in ninety days. I am satisfied that there will be some new discoveries made this winter. It looks to me, from the formation, that it will be a big camp."

NOT LOOKING TOWARD BINDING ALLIANCE WITH UNITED STATES

BRITISH GOVERNMENT POLICY AS SET FORTH IN LORD HALDANE'S SPEECH SEEMS TO HAVE BEEN MISINTERPRETED

London, Sept. 8.—Not a little perplexity has been caused by the announcement that Lord Haldane's Montreal address embodied the official policy of His Majesty's Government and was approved, line by line, by Sir Edward Grey. Lord Haldane apparently handed the full text of his speech to the English journals before he left England, and it was printed extensively and accepted as the more or less academic talk of a brilliant student and jurist to an audience of his own profession. Now, however, that they have begun to regard the speech as a formal pronouncement of British policy, Britishers have begun to question and are wondering whether the British ministry means to prepare the way for binding alliances. This is how the speech is being read on the continent, but inquiry in authoritative circles shows that the ministry has no such intention.

reticence of the London and provincial press. The Standard is the only journal which discusses the entire new situation created by Lord Haldane's announcement. Every other journal keeps silent. The Standard says: "If the government think to bring about an Anglo-American alliance, they are too sanguine and distinctly premature. After all, Americans and Englishmen understand each other as no other people can, and the closer we draw together without a formal bond, the better for all of us and the world generally. We can use a freedom in our intercourse that would be perilous elsewhere and can criticize each other without offence."

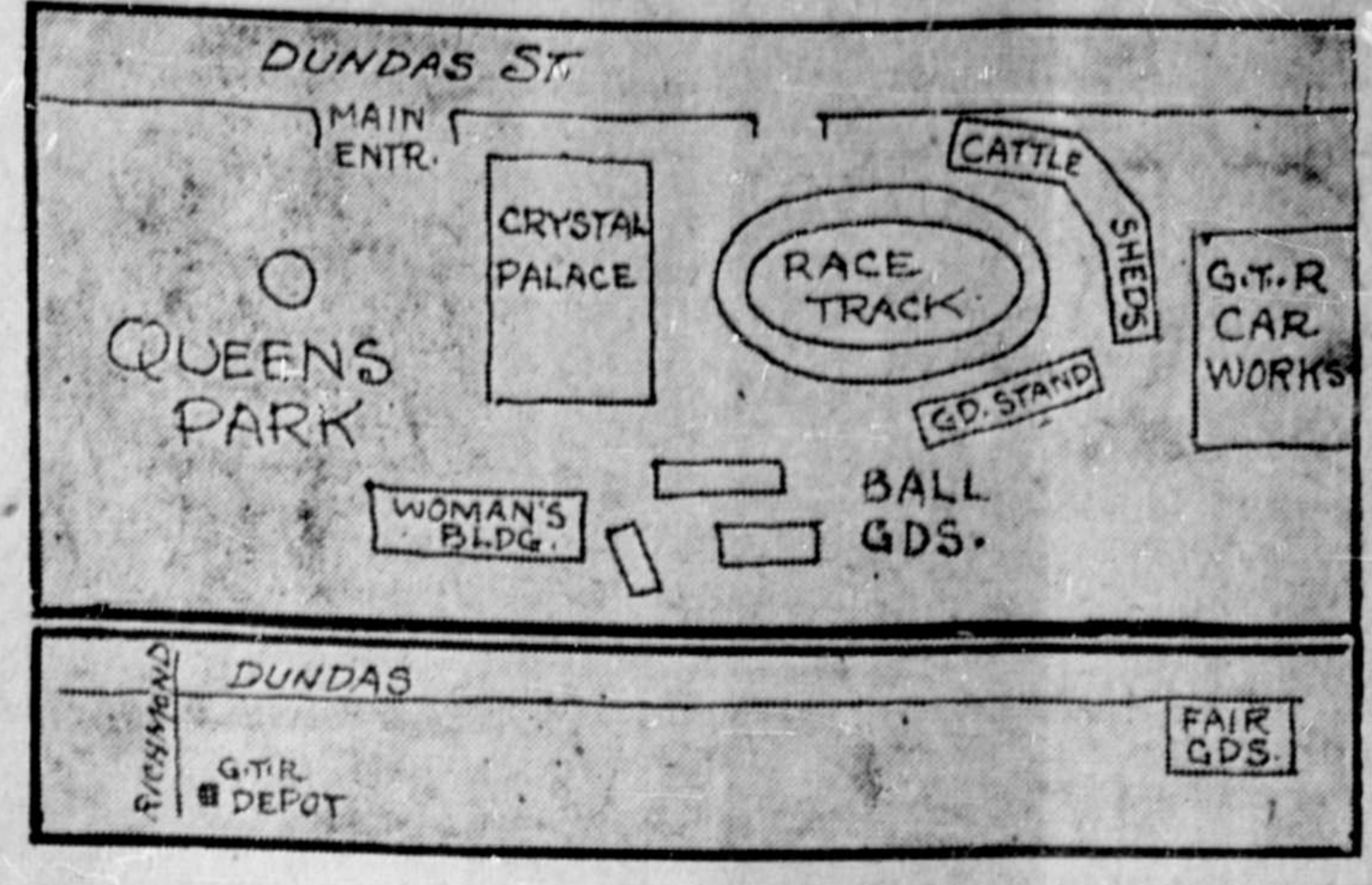

EXTENDING SERVICE
C. P. R. Now Running Observation Car Over Lines in Switzerland.
 London, Sept. 2.—Following an important agreement between the Swiss Federal Railways and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, the latter has extended the existing observation car service to Austria, which was inaugurated last year, to Switzerland, and the new service started today. Hitherto these Canadian Pacific observation cars have been confined to the three Austrian services, namely from Trieste to Salzburg, Vienna to Innsbruck and from Innsbruck to Bruchau. PROBE INTO WRECK OF STATE OF CALIFORNIA NOT COMPLETE

OFFICIALS AT WASHINGTON NOT DECIDED WHETHER THE WRECKED VESSEL STRUCK A CHARTED OR AN UNCHARTED ROCK.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 6.—Acting Secretary of Commerce Sweet has received a preliminary report on the recent sinking of the State of California in Gambier Bay, Alaska, but as yet investigators have been unable to fix the responsibility for the disaster. The report received today consists principally of an account of the accident, and advances the theory that practically all of those who lost their lives were killed outright by the explosion caused by air pressure, rather than by drowning. Responsibility for the wreck cannot be fixed until it is known whether it was a charted or uncharted rock on which the vessel struck. The inland passes in Alaska, in Frederick Sound, it is recalled, were charted in 1889, and maps on file in the interior department are referred to as showing a number of rocks near points where the State of California struck. Some of the department officials are represented as holding the opinion that it was one of these charted rocks that was struck, but testimony on this point, the report says, is not at all complete.

THE MAIL ORDER MAID

How She Showed Her Gall in the Shoe Store.

Some of the people of Fairbanks, patrons of the large mail order houses of the "outside," have been known to pull off some funny stunts, but the most nifty one ever recorded took place last week, says the Citizen. A certain young lady walked into one of the shoe stores and asked to be shown several pairs of ladies' shoes. The clerk, a very obliging man, went through all his stock until he finally succeeded in finding a shoe that would fit the dainty foot that was thrust out from beneath the skirt. She had him lace it up, looked it over carefully, walked around on the mat with it and assured the clerk that it fitted fine. All the above is, of course, very ordinary, but here is the fine work. She asked exactly the size, the width and the general description of the shoe, and the obliging one explained to the best of his knowledge.
