ULSTER'S PETITION TO KING GEORGE.

The Ulsterites, with the Unionists back of them, seem to be a little behind the times in their petition to King George, referred to in our London despatches of yesterday. The right of petition to the King has never been abrogated, nor have his sovereign rights in the premises. But customs change, and in Great Britain its laws keep pace with the customs and are based, as Tennyson tells us, "Upon precedent on precedent." The demand of the Unionists that the sovereign veto legislation pasesd by parliament is atrophied by disuse. It is inconceivable that the King should contemplate a step which might lead to an apparent disagreement with a majority of his people. The first principle of the unwritten constitution of Great Britain is that the King acts solely on the advice of his ministers.


