BONAR LAW PLEDGES UNIONIST PARTY TO SUPPORT ULSTER—PLAN FOR PEACE IN MEXICO

BONAR LAW PLEDGES UNIONIST PARTY TO RESIST WITH FORCE

COMPARES SITUATION IN ULSTER WITH CONDITIONS IN AMERICA PRECEDING THE CIVIL WAR THERE FOR POLITICAL INDEPENDENCE

Newcastle-on-Tyne, Oct. 30.—Speaking from the same platform as Edward Carson, Mr. Andrew Bonar Law, the opposition leader in the House of Commons last night pledged the support of the Unionist party to Ulster, even to the extent of forcible resistance to Home Rule. But his eagerly-awaited reply to Premier Asquith's offer of a compromise consisted merely of the statement that Unionists would carefully consider any proposal the prime minister cared to make relative to the situation in Ulster if any solution were possible. Mr. Law compared the situation in Ulster to conditions in America preceding the civil war.

He said it was urgent that Sir Edward Carson attend this meeting so that the pledge that he (Mr. Law) had made at Blenheim Palace on July 12, 1912, to support Ulster in resistance to Home Rule be made perfectly clear. He urged that the government should secure a mandate from the whole people before granting Home Rule to Ireland.

London, Oct. 30.—The Home Rulers yesterday responded to the volunteers of Ulster by parading five thousand strong at Athlone. Redmond's followers will not tolerate the exclusion of Ulster from Home Rule. Belfast, it is claimed, if excluded would lose four-fifths of the Irish trade and commerce.

BRITISH CRUISER BLOWN UP BY NEW WIRELESS INVENTION

BRITISH ADMIRALTY MAKES PRACTICAL TEST OF IT—WIRELESS SPARK TEARS HOLE IN WARSHIP'S BOTTOM EIGHT MILES AWAY

London, Oct. 27.—A warship has been blown up by wireless at Portsmouth, during an experiment with a mysterious invention which the admiralty is testing. The ship on which the experiment was being made was the third class cruiser Terpsichore, a vessel of 3400 tons. She now lies in a dock with her bottom blown to pieces. Details of the invention are jealously guarded, but it is known that some weeks before the experiment was made the vessel was in the dockyard hands and that a mysterious metal box was fixed to the bottom of the ship. On Wednesday morning last the ship was towed to Stokes Bay and from a battleship eight miles away the material contained in the box was exploded by a wireless ray or spark.

There was a vast upheaval of water and the cruiser was afterwards seen to have a heavy list to port. Wrecking tugs, waiting in the yard, closed in on the cruiser and by means of power pumps kept her afloat until she was safe inside the docks.

It is not thought that the invention had anything to do with the "F" rays though, apparently, it is similar to Muliva's discovery.

WILL SUPPLY TWO BIG DYNAMOS FOR DRY DOCK POWER PLANT

CANADIAN GENERAL ELECTRIC COMPANY GETS \$100,000 CONTRACT IN CONNECTION WITH DRY DOCK

R. A. McGee, local representative for the Canadian General Electric Company, who returned to the city yesterday from a six weeks' trip to Toronto, Chicago, St. Paul, Minneapolis and Winnipeg, reports that his company has secured a contract in connection with the G. T. P. dry dock that will amount to more than \$100,000. They will supply two 1000 k.w. units for supplying power and light for the immense

plant under construction. In are lights alone for the plant there will be many more used than at present required for the entire city. Along the whole front of the dry dock wharves are lights will be placed at very short intervals. When these are turned on the harbor in that vicinity will be one grand blaze of light.

The construction of the great plant will mean business for almost every line of trade.

UNIONIST LEAGUE IS FORMED IN TORONTO

Fifteen Hundred Members Said to Have Enrolled with Great Secrecy

Toronto, Oct. 30.—The News last night published a sensational story of a Unionist league having been formed in Toronto, with the avowed intention of supplying men and money for an anti-home rule campaign. It says the organization has been formed with great secrecy and that it already has fifteen hundred members. It further states that the movement is not confined to Toronto, but is being actively promulgated in all large cities of the Dominion from coast to coast.

PLAGUE INFESTED RATS IN SEATTLE

Vigorous Campaign Ordered Against the Bubonic Plague—Carrying Rodents

NEW ZEALAND HAS DECIDED TO HAVE A NAVY OF HER OWN NOW

HER DECISION TO ABANDON NAVAL SUBSIDIES IS WELL RECEIVED BY MOST PRONOUNCED IMPERIAL PAPERS OF THE OLD COUNTRY

TWO SERIOUSLY INJURED BY EXPLOSION OF GASOLINE TANK

WM. GRANT, PLUMBER, IS IN A CRITICAL CONDITION, SUFFERING FROM INTERNAL INJURIES—E. GINGRAS SUSTAINED A DEEP GASH ON CHIN.

As the result of an explosion of a gasoline tank two well known citizens of Prince Rupert were injured yesterday afternoon, one of them so seriously that his condition is still quite critical. The most seriously injured of the two is William Grant, the plumber, who, it is feared, sustained internal injuries in addition to being badly bruised about the abdomen. E. Gingras, of the public works department, the other man injured, sustained a deep gash from one corner of the mouth extending across the lower part of the chin. The gash practically laid the flesh open to the jaw bone. He was also bruised on the forehead and has a large lump on the back of his head.

At the time the accident occurred Mr. Grant was engaged on a gasoline launch which is being fitted up for G. B. Hull, public works engineer, making repairs to the gasoline tank, which had been leaking. Both men are positive that there was no gasoline in the tank at the time, but the fact that an explosion occurred indicates that the tank must have been filled with the vapor, which probably ignited from the torch used for soldering. Both men were in the engine room, Mr. Gingras assisting Mr. Grant for a few moments, when a terrific explosion occurred and both were thrown against the walls of the engine room and pilot house, which are combined in one. The metal tank was completely shattered and the top of the pilot house was torn off. The explosion was so violent that the heads of the bolts which holds the pilot house to the hull were literally drawn through the heavy oak timbers to which they were fastened.

When the accident occurred the boat was lying alongside the dry dock. In addition to the two men who were injured, George Davis was on board making some carpenter repairs in the galley. He was fortunate enough to escape uninjured and immediately summoned assistance. The two injured men were hurried to the hospital, where their injuries are being attended.

Reports from the hospital this morning say that Mr. Grant put in a very bad night and that his condition is very serious. Mr. Gingras was taken to the operating room this morning and several stitches put in the ugly gash on his chin. It is expected that he will be able to be out in a few days.

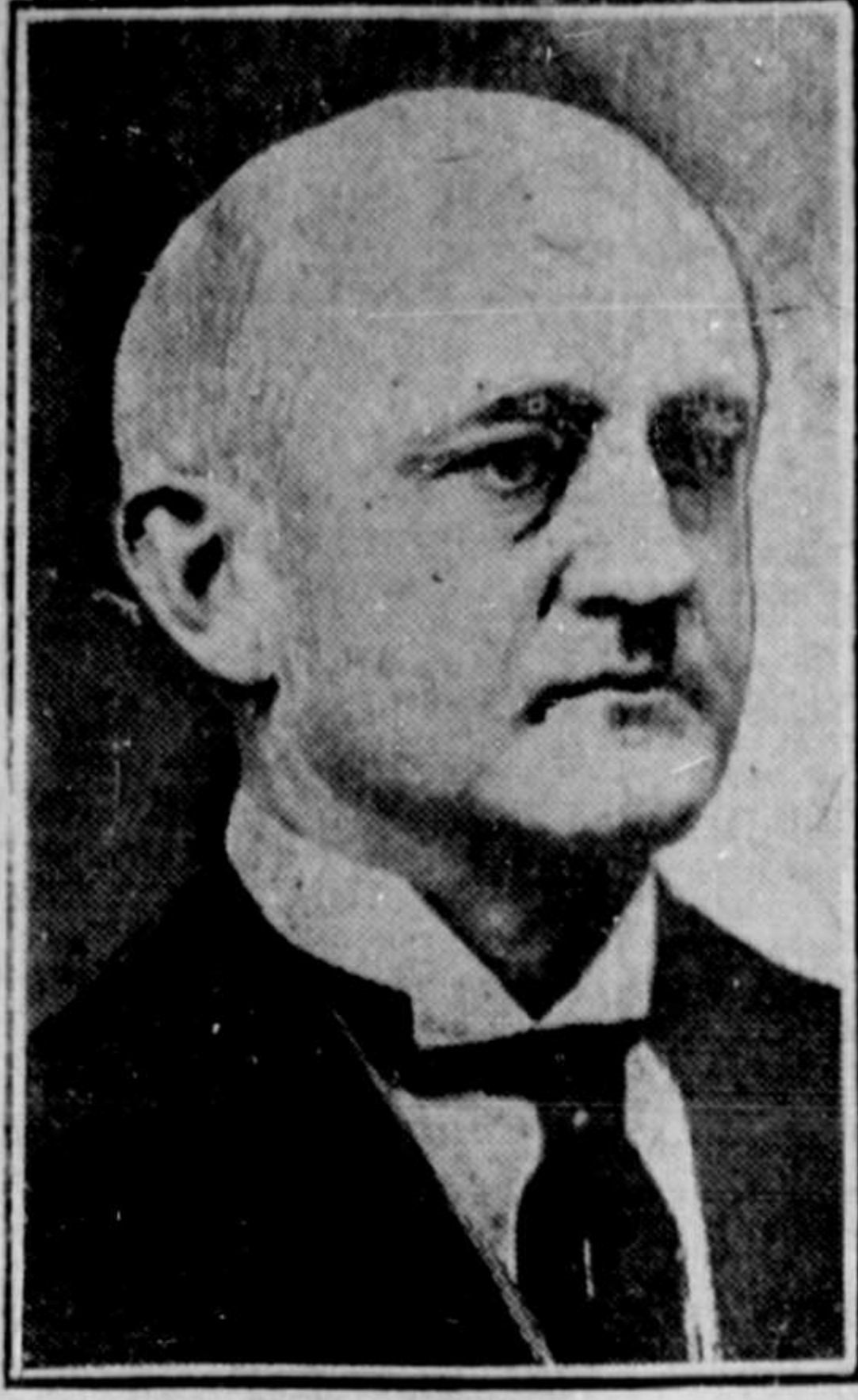
this club was used when Sulzer dared to disobey.

FIGURES OF SPEECH AND FIGURES OF FACT.

The cabled reports of Lloyd-George's new land policy are not sufficiently detailed for close criticism, but from the offer made by the Duke of Sutherland it can be imagined what the immense cost of effecting this social and economic revolution is bound to be. If it should work at all like the Chancellor of the Exchequer's land taxation experiment it must score a huge financial loss for a number of years at least. To date these new land taxes he imposed have yielded exactly \$1,116,185, whereas the cost of the valuation machinery for levying them has been \$6,965,000. Thus the net loss to the nation has been \$5,848,815. In speaking of these taxes and the new order of things they were ushering in, Mr. Lloyd-George in 1909 described them as "fraught with rare and refreshing fruit for the parched lips of the multitude who have been treading the dusty road along which the people have marched through the dark ages."

PRESIDENT OF CHINESE REPUBLIC IS A MAN OF GREAT DARING

FOUGHT LONG FOR THE EXPIRING PREROGATIVES OF THE MANCHUS — YUAN SHI KAI GOVERNS STERNLY AND WITHOUT MERCY

Beautiful and widespread are the gardens of the famous Winter palace in Peking. Pagodas, pavilions, even villages are encountered amid its ponds, shrubberies and flowers.

In the centre of the rear wall of one pavilion was a square marble throne. Here the puppet Emperor gave pathetic audiences, and strove to wield bravely the shadow of his rightful power. He was indeed the son of Heaven, but his world consisted of this one aspect, out across the lake to his prison walls beyond. From this hall he was hurried on that August morning when he and the old Empress fled in disguise, slipping away in a rough country cart, after the victorious troops of the allies had actually entered the gates of Peking.

Here on this same ocean terrace he lived in the last years of his life, after the return of the court from exile, and here, in 1908, he died, his last look across the lake to the great white pagoda, and his last order written, it is said, at the moment of death demanding the execution of Yuan Shi Kai, to whose betrayal he believed he owed the misery of his last ten years. And now within the same palace walls lives the same Yuan Shi Kai.

Recently a newspaper writer had a glimpse of Yuan Shi Kai. "After passing through numerous passages, and along dark stairways in the palace," he says "we turned across one of the smaller bridges to enter a large two-storied hall, rather dark until one's eyes became accustomed to the half-light. Here there were more hangings of blue, more vividly colored beams, more carved black work, more wonderful Chinese cases standing in glass cabinets. As we entered the hall, soldiers seemed to spring up from nowhere and fill the doorway beyond us. They peered cautiously in as we stood waiting, grouped at one end of the hall.

"Then suddenly from the far corner, through a low doorway, two officers entered. They wore much gold braid and many medals. Our charge stepped quickly forward, and then we saw that a short, thick-set Chinaman, wearing a simple black brocade robe had followed the two soldiers into the hall. It was Yuan Shi Kai. Behind him a half dozen

more uniformed officers formed a semi-circle.

"As our charge bowed and shook hands with the stout man, I tried to take in his silent features. His face is round, good-natured, rather than severe in expression, but with a firm eye and a bold chin. Facial strength, as we deem it, is rarely found in the Chinese or Manchu face. Yuan wears a black moustache, drooping somewhat over his mouth; his manner is simple and cordial. This is the man, perhaps the least really understood, yet the most respected and feared in China today.

London, Oct. 27.—At a dinner given in London last night to "Gaiety Girls, Past and Present," four peereesses were present. They were the Countess of Orkney, formerly Connie Gilchrist, a great gaiety favorite in the middle eighties, who became known as "The Gold Girl" through Whistler's painting under that name; the Marchioness of Headfort, formerly Rosie Boetes; Lady Poulton, formerly Sylvia Storey, and Lady Churston, formerly Denise Orme. Olive May, who married Lord Victor Paget, and Zena Dare, whose husband is now Hon. Maurice Brett, son of Lord Esher, were also present.
