PENDING COAL FAMINE RELIEVED BY NEW SUPPLY

AMERICA'S ULTIMATUM TO DICTATOR HUERTA--NEW DISTINCTIVE PLATFORM FOR LIBERALS

FEARS OF COAL SHORTAGE ARE GREATLY RELIEVED

JINGLEPOT MINE WILL SEND ITS ENTIRE OUTPUT TO PRINCE RUPERT AND NORTHERN PORTS.

The coal famine in this city, which has prevailed for the last week or ten days, was relieved yesterday by the arrival of the steamer British Columbia with a full cargo, about 400 tons, of lump coal and 250 tons of steam coal. It is especially gratifying to know that the lump coal is of the very best quality, as good as any that has ever been shipped here. The shipment is from the Jingle Pot mine.

Another full cargo will be here on the British Columbia in about two weeks.

Plenty of Coal Now.

The Bertha, of the Swan Navigation Co., arrived yesterday with 600 tons of coal for the Westholme Lumber Co. The Jeannie of the same line is expected today or tomorrow from Seattle with a similar quantity for Rogers & Black.

SECOND DEBATE BY COUNCIL OF THE SEWER TAX QUESTION

RECOMMENDATION OF FINANCE COMMITTEE THAT TAX BE STRICKEN OFF AND NEW TAX START FROM JULY FIRST IS ADOPTED.

The city council had a brief session last night, the only subject being the wiping off of back sewer taxes amounting to \$684.50. This was debated at the last meeting but was postponed for a week for further consideration. The finance committee reported in favor of the wiping off and that the sewer tax be collectable from July 1st last.

The mayor said that in the absence of the city solicitor he could not say what was the opinion of Mr. Peters last year. But he knew what he had advised this year and what the committee this year recommended.

THE FAITHFUL DOG COMMITTED SUICIDE

Jumped in Front of Same Express Train That Long Before Killed His Little Master.

New York, Nov. 4.—Buster, a little brown and white mongrel, was killed yesterday afternoon when he deliberately jumped in front of a speeding express train of the Long Island Railroad as it passed over the Montauk avenue grade crossing in Jamaica, where six months before, on his fifth birthday, his little master, Elmer Crook, had been killed. According to children of the neighborhood, the dog committed suicide. From that day on Buster, who had always been a lively little animal, fond of performing, began to show signs of a broken heart. Every day, his tail limp and nose to the ground, the little dog would trot slowly out to the Montauk avenue crossing and sit for hours watching the trains speed by, never jumping or barking at them as had been his custom before his master's death.

ARRESTED WITH OVER \$1,300 ON HIS PERSON

Police Took Man in Charge Last Night Under Influence of Liquor.

The second time within a week the local police have probably been the means of saving men under the influence of liquor from losing a good sized wad. Last night they took in charge a man named T. Widen, who had on him about \$380 in cash and a draft on the Union Bank for \$1,000. He had been working on railway construction in the interior for about a year. He was assessed a fine of \$5 this morning.

Left Sailor Behind.

One of the members of the crew of the freight steamer Santa Rosalia, which took its departure this morning, celebrated the event last night by indulging too freely in the cup that inebriates. This morning he was fined \$5 in police court and in addition was left behind. He will be sent south on the first boat to Union Bay.

DISTINCTIVE LIBERAL PLATFORM

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—The Ottawa Free Press, the Liberal organ of the capital, is out with a strong appeal to the party to adopt before next session a distinctive platform comprising the following planks:

- An increase of the British preference to fifty per cent.
- The abolition of all duties on food.
- A free dinner table.
- Abolition or material reduction of all duties on all machinery used in the production of foods.
- The appointment of a permanent tariff commission.

OBJECTIONS TO SITE FOR LONDON OFFICES

Large Petition Cabled to Borden Against Westminster Site for Dominion Offices.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Nov. 4.—The Canadian Associated Press learns that a petition signed by every Canadian agent general and also the leading bankers and financial houses here will in a few days be cabled to Premier Borden urging him to reject the Westminster site for the Dominion offices. It declares the site unsuitable but expresses no opinion regarding Earl Grey's Aldwych scheme.

ON FIRE SIX WEEKS

Steamer Templemore, Which Was Abandoned at Sea.

(Special to The Daily News.) Boston, Nov. 4.—The fire which forced the abandonment at sea of the steamer Templemore was subdued yesterday, but the vessel is only fit for the scrap heap.

CONSERVATIVE VOTE VERY MUCH REDUCED

Peel By-Election Shows Immense Gains Made by the Liberal Candidate.

(Special to the Daily News.) Brampton, Ont., Nov. 4.—In the provincial by-election for Peel yesterday J. R. Fallis, Conservative, defeated the Liberal candidate, A. H. Miller, by a majority of 375. The seat was vacated by Sam Charters, Conservative, who was appointed registrar of the county. The Conservative majority at the last election was 700.

NEW ZEALAND STRIKE

Eight Hundred Special Constables Sworn In.

(Special to the Daily News.) Wellington, N. Z., Nov. 4.—Eight hundred more special constables were sworn in last night in order to help keep order following the strike of the longshoremen. Otherwise the strike situation remains unchanged and the cry of the starving is heard everywhere.

Mayor Morley Not to Run.

Victoria, Nov. 4.—Mayor Morley stated today that he did not propose to stand for re-election at the first of the year. It is understood that he will favor the candidature of Alderman Gleason, although he refuses to say so definitely. Alderman McNeill will run for re-election.

ULTIMATUM OF UNITED STATES HANDED TO "DICTATOR" HUERTA

BLOOD THIRSTY RULER WILL HAVE TO BE GOOD NOW OR TAKE A BIG LICKING FROM THE BIG UNITED STATES ARMY.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Mexico City, Nov. 4.—An ultimatum has been received from the United States government and was yesterday duly presented to the minister for foreign affairs. This ultimatum from Washington was cabled to the American charge d'affaires, and acting under instructions from the state department he executed the commission with due promptitude. The document states that

Huerta must resign the presidency of the republic of Mexico without loss of time; that he must not leave as his successor General Blanquet, formerly minister of war and now alleged vice president; nor must he leave as his successor any member of his official family or any unofficial member of any coterie whom he might be expected to control.

Up to this morning President Huerta had made no answer to this sweeping ultimatum.

SOUTH BRUCE DEFEAT FORCES BORDEN TO CHANGE HIS POLICY

WILL NOW FOLLOW LEAD OF AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND AND DROP SCHEME OF CASH SUBSIDY TO IMPERIAL NAVY.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—The government, as a result of the decision of New Zealand to follow the Australian lead in regard to establishing a local navy, and also as a result of the South Bruce election, where the naval policy was made the chief issue, is already considering the abandonment of the contribution proposals entirely.

The belief in government circles here now is that when parliament meets in January Mr. Borden will have a new emergency naval policy to propose. This will be the strengthening of

the naval bases at Halifax and Esquimalt at once as a preliminary to a permanent declaration of a Canadian naval policy.

It is probable that a vote of ten or fifteen millions will be asked during the coming session for coast defences, with particular reference to Halifax, Quebec and Esquimalt. To this neither Liberals nor Nationalists could well take exception, and at the same time it would be giving an appearance of doing at least something at once toward preparing for the larger policy of co-operation in imperial naval defence.

FOUR MILLION DOLLARS HAVE BEEN SPENT ON LOCAL ROADS

SUM REPORTED BY PROVINCIAL MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS BUT HOW MUCH OF IT MATERIALLY AIDED THE DEVELOPMENT OF THIS SECTION?

Victoria, Nov. 4.—The gigantic sum of \$4,000,000 has been expended by the Provincial government upon road extension and improvement work within the boundaries of British Columbia during the past season, according to a statement just issued from the department offices of Hon. Thomas Taylor, minister of public works. There is now in hand the sum of approximately \$400,000 for maintenance during the winter months. There are in existence at the present time in the province 13,000 miles of roads and trails.

"This has been an exceedingly busy year for the department," said Deputy Minister W. W. Foster today in discussing the pro-

gram of construction carried out during the season now at an end. He pointed out that the sum required for road maintenance year by year was rapidly increasing, owing to the additional mileage, and to meet new conditions which have arisen within the past few years.

Upon bridges, which are generally classified under the heading of road improvements, the sum of \$900,000 has been expended by the Provincial works department this year, with \$50,000 for wharves, and \$70,000 for road location work. On road machinery, of which the most up to date types have been secured, the expenditure was \$100,000. These sums are included in the grand total figures.

SANTA ROSALIA TOOK DEPARTURE TODAY

Will Coal at Union Bay and Take Cargo at Frisco and South American Ports.

The tramp steamer Santa Rosalia, of the Maple Leaf Line, which last night finished unloading 4,300 tons of steel rails for the G. T. P., sailed this morning for Union Bay, where she will coal. The steamer will proceed from there to San Francisco, loaded. Thence she will proceed to South American ports for copper ore to complete the cargo. The steamer will then sail for European ports. The unloading of the rails here occupied eight days, over 500 tons per day. The steamer left here for the south without a local pilot.

THE DOUGHTY FISHERIES AND HOW THE CAPITAL WAS SPENT

SECOND ARTICLE FROM "CANADA" GIVING STILL MORE REMARKABLE FACTS IN THE BRIEF HISTORY OF THIS BRITISH COMPANY.

The weekly illustrated newspaper called "Canada," which is published in London, gives the following history in view of the total loss which is likely to accrue to the shareholders:

In 1910 Sir George Doughty, M. P., who is, of course, an authority on North Sea fisheries, paid a visit to British Columbia at the request of Earl Grey to report on the fisheries and the manner in which they might be developed.

Lavish Expenditure. It will be seen, then, that the working capital available was about £96,000, and out of this a sum of £3,000 was to be paid to Sir George Doughty and his son for special services to be rendered during the first year of the company's existence.

pany's position was so bad that when the receiver and manager was appointed on August 13 last, one of the reasons urged for his appointment being that the company was in urgent need of £5,000 to pay wages and another £10,000 to deal with this year's salmon pack.

Case for Board of Trade. This appears to us to be a clear case in which the board of trade should intervene, and should insist upon an enquiry into the circumstances of the company's birth, life and death.

The circumstances which we have detailed in last week's issue and the above resume of the company's history appear to us to point emphatically to the necessity of a searching enquiry by the board of trade authorities.

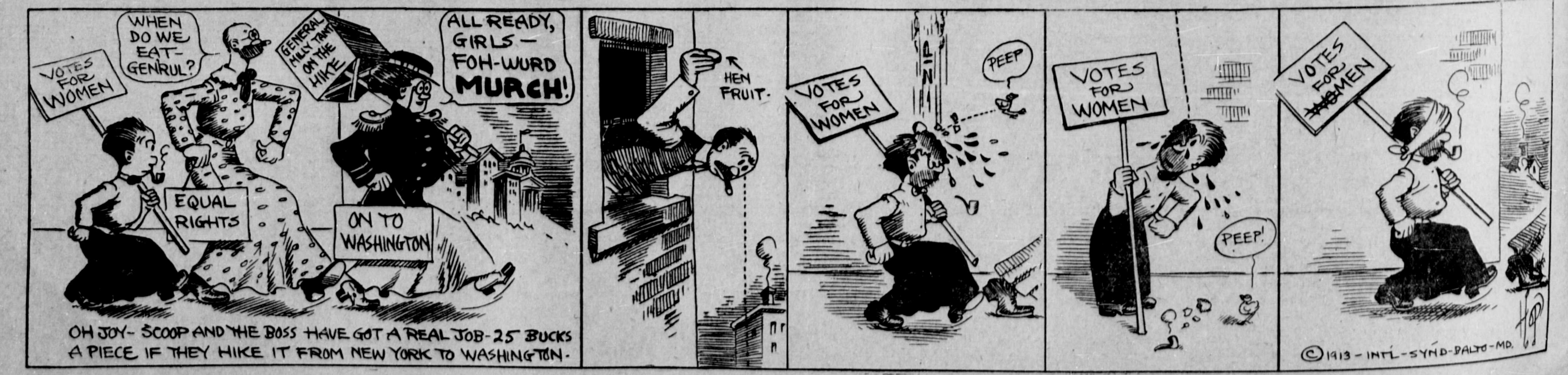

ANOTHER DEATH BLOW TO THAT BORDEN "EMERGENCY" BUGABOO

NORMAN ANGELL DECLARES THAT THE DOMINION IS IMPREGNABLE TO GERMANY BECAUSE ECONOMIC CENTRE IS FAR INTO INTERIOR.

London, Nov. 4.—Norman Angell, author of "The Great Illusion," developed another thesis last night at the Liberal Colonial Club—namely, the impregnability of the dominions, based on the fact that these countries had no governmental or economic centre, the seizure whereof paralyzes a country.

Bismarck in Paris, he said, could dictate his terms, but the conquest of Canada or Australia involved the occupation of the whole country before it could be effective. This obviously was a physical and moral impossibility.

If it took England three years with 400,000 men and £250,000,000 to conquer the Transvaal and 100,000 adults, unable to manufacture arms and ammunition, how long would it take an invader to occupy Canada with a population thirty times larger and able to manufacture arms and feed itself.

The speaker contended that there is no nation in the world capable of doing this, with the possible exception of the United States, and it is precisely against this possible exception that no military measures had been taken. If it possibly happened that Germany conquered Canada she would be unable to Germanize the country, just as England, he said, failed to transform Quebec, and Germany would be so exhausted by the conquest that she would fall an easy prey to the Franco-Russian alliance.

"The notion that Germany might conquer Canada in order to feed herself is ridiculous," concluded Mr. Angell. "Germany buys Canadian corn now, and she would still have to buy it if Canada were conquered."

"The idea of the conquest of the British dominions is due to the confusion regarding what the conqueror could or could not do."

WEIRD EXAGGERATIONS ABOUT VANCOUVER IN NEW ZEALAND

WRITER SAYS CITY IS WORLD'S DUMPING GROUND, WITH MORE JAPANESE THAN WHITE MEN IN THE PROVINCE.

Vancouver, Oct. 27.—Rogues, theft, murder and suicide are mentioned as being the order of the day here in statements of a character distinctly libellous to the province which has generally appeared in the New Zealand press.

So ridiculous and overdrawn are the reports that they might almost be treated with indifference were it not for the fact that so many New Zealanders are financially interested in Vancouver and British Columbia.

Among the strictures passed, emanating from some one who has evidently failed to make good

in this western country, are the remarks that Vancouver is the world's dumping ground; that there are more Japanese than white men in the province; that there are nearly 200,000 Chinese, and that at the present time there are over 10,000 white men out of work. The writer goes on to say:

"The summer is nearly over, and people have been starving around us all the time. Roguery, theft, suicide and murder are the order of the day, and winter still to come. Honesty is a word the meaning of which is little known here. There is little or no

VAISE MATCHED AGAIN

This Time Canadian Champion Will Meet Azevedo.

Seattle, Nov. 4.—Word was received in Seattle from Frenchy Vaise, the Renton boy, who is lightweight champion of Canada, stating that he had practically been assured a match with Joe Azevedo. Vaise, who is now in California, said he had received an offer from Matchmaker Rohan of the Oakland Wheelmen Club for the match, which he accepted. Azevedo is still to be heard from. The bout probably will be a ten round affair, and will be scheduled for a date next month.

Cummings in Jail.

New York, Oct. 30.—William J. Cummings, whose conviction for grand larceny in connection with the Carnegie Trust Company failure was recently upheld by the state court of appeals, was committed to the Tombs prison today, and the execution of his sentence of four to eight years in Sing Sing deferred for a week. Since his original trial and conviction Cummings had been at liberty under \$60,000 bail.

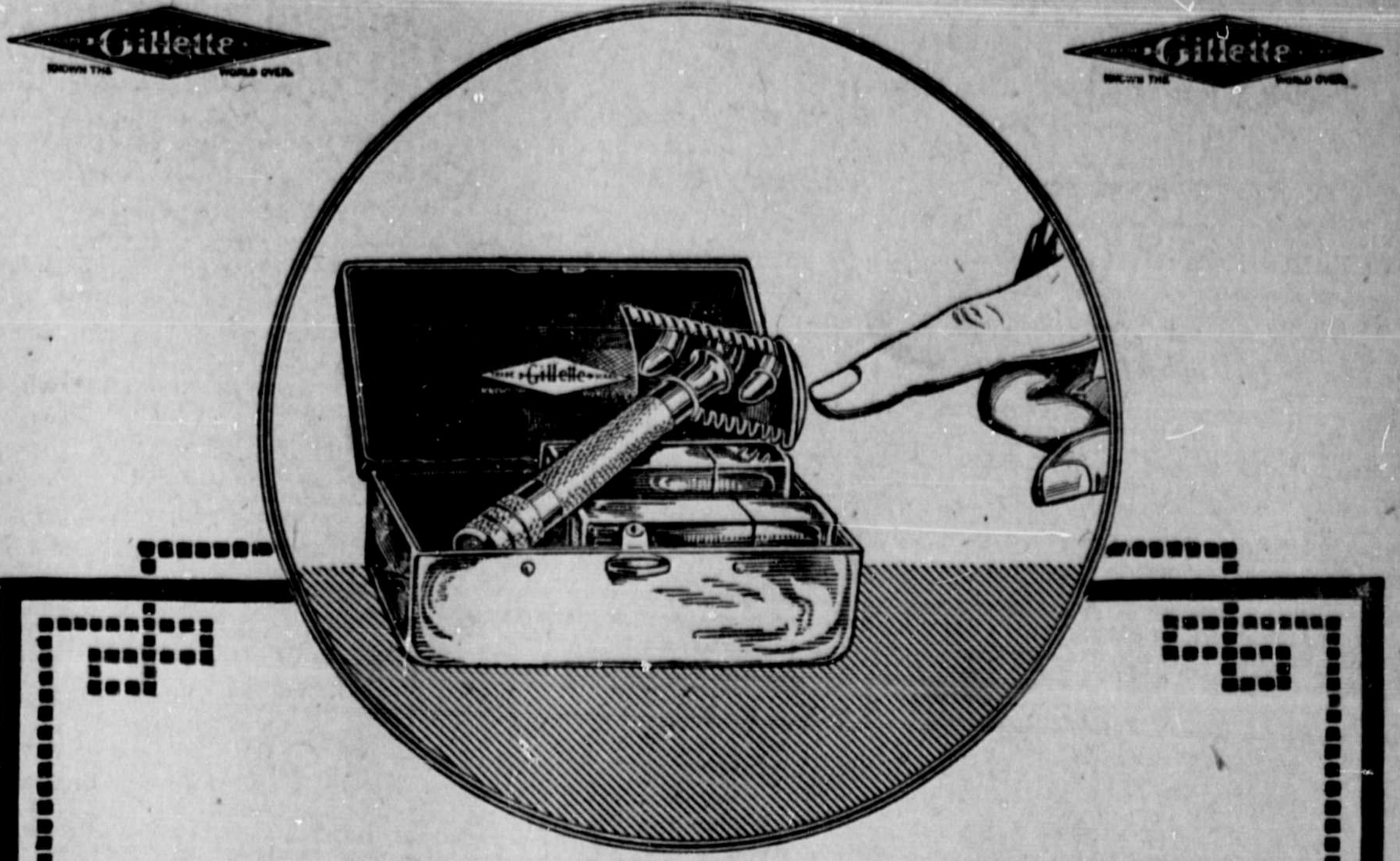
