WRANGELL HUNTER'S FATAL FALL OVER CLIFF--NANAIMO SENTENCES APPEALED TO OTTAWA

TWO YOUNG CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH IN INDIAN SHACK

CHILDREN WERE LOCKED IN WHILE MOTHER ATTENDED CHURCH -- HOW THE FIRE STARTED IS NOT DEFINITELY KNOWN

Hagwilget Indian village was visited early Sunday evening of last week by a fire that brought grief to the native villagers. When going to church the Indian mother left her two children aged four and two years, at home locked in the house. The church was just a few yards off and the mother felt secure. The fire had made great headway, in fact the interior of the shack was a roaring furnace, when discovered by an Indian returning from New Hazelton. The villagers were all at church but as soon as the alarm was given there was a

general exodus from the church. As the Indians drew near the burning building they could hear the cries of the perishing children. Two boys broke in the front door, but as it gave way the fire and smoke broke forth, volume after volume, and an entrance to the building was impossible. Very soon the roof collapsed and all hope was abandoned.

The village is not provided with any fire protection and even water is very scarce.

On Monday Coroner S. H. Hoskins investigated and decided an inquest was unnecessary.

MAY INCREASE RENTALS

The chances are that in many cases the sales will be fictitious and even where they are genuine the payments are likely to amount to nothing more than rental. WRANGELL HUNTER IS KILLED BY FALLING OVER PRECIPICE

SEPARATED FROM HIS COMPANIONS HE FAILED TO RETURN AND SEARCH PARTIES WERE SENT OUT--THEY RETURN WITH THE REMAINS.

Wrangell, Nov. 7. — Grant Henry, with a party composed of Ed. Brown, Art. Myers and Ase Holenbeck, left about two weeks ago for Kuiu Island for a hunt and all went well until Friday, when they went out for a hunt and separated, which was the last seen of Grant Henry. The rest of the party spent the next two days hunting for him, but was forced to give it up and come to town for assistance. A party of ten men was organized Tuesday and left on the Duckland under the leadership of Ase Holenbeck and will make a thorough search

of as much of the country as possible.

The country where he disappeared is very rough and cut with deep ravines and the general belief was that in some way he accidentally shot himself and died from the wound or exposure.

The searching party returned today with the dead body of Henry. He was found by Ase Holenbeck and "Speedy" McGlashin, part of the hunting party, a mile and a half from camp, having fallen down an eighty foot cliff, which broke his neck and one arm and both legs.

NANAIMO SENTENCES APPEALED TO OTTAWA

Prominent Labor Men Request the Minister of Justice to Reduce Them

Ottawa, Nov. 6.—Messrs. J. C. Watters and Fred Bancroft, the president and secretary respectively of the Dominion Trades and Labor Congress, waited on Hon. C. J. Doherty, Minister of Justice, yesterday afternoon and pleaded for a reduction of the heavy sentences imposed upon the Nanaimo miners, who were convicted of being leaders in the strike riots of last month.

The sentences, Messrs. Watters and Bancroft claim, were too severe, especially in the case of the two men and the two boys sentenced to two years in the Westminster penitentiary.

It is likely that every branch of organized labor in Canada will sign a petition to be sent to Hon. Mr. Doherty supporting the plea made by Messrs. Watters and Bancroft.

The minister has promised to get a copy of the testimony taken at the trial in Westminster, so that he can acquaint himself with the facts of the case. When he has done this he will make known his decision.

DROWNED AT HAMMOND

Young Man on local Survey Party Gets Bad News

Roy Horie, who has charge of a government survey party doing work at Banks, Prescott and Porcher Islands, arrived in the city last night. On his arrival here he received a wire from Burns McLellan, one of the members of the party, with the information that the latter's father, Hugh McLellan, a well known resident of Vancouver, had been drowned on November 6th. The accident happened while Mr. McLellan was crossing the Fraser River at Hammond during a dense fog. The body had not been recovered when the message was sent. The sad news was conveyed to Burns McLellan today at Porcher Island.

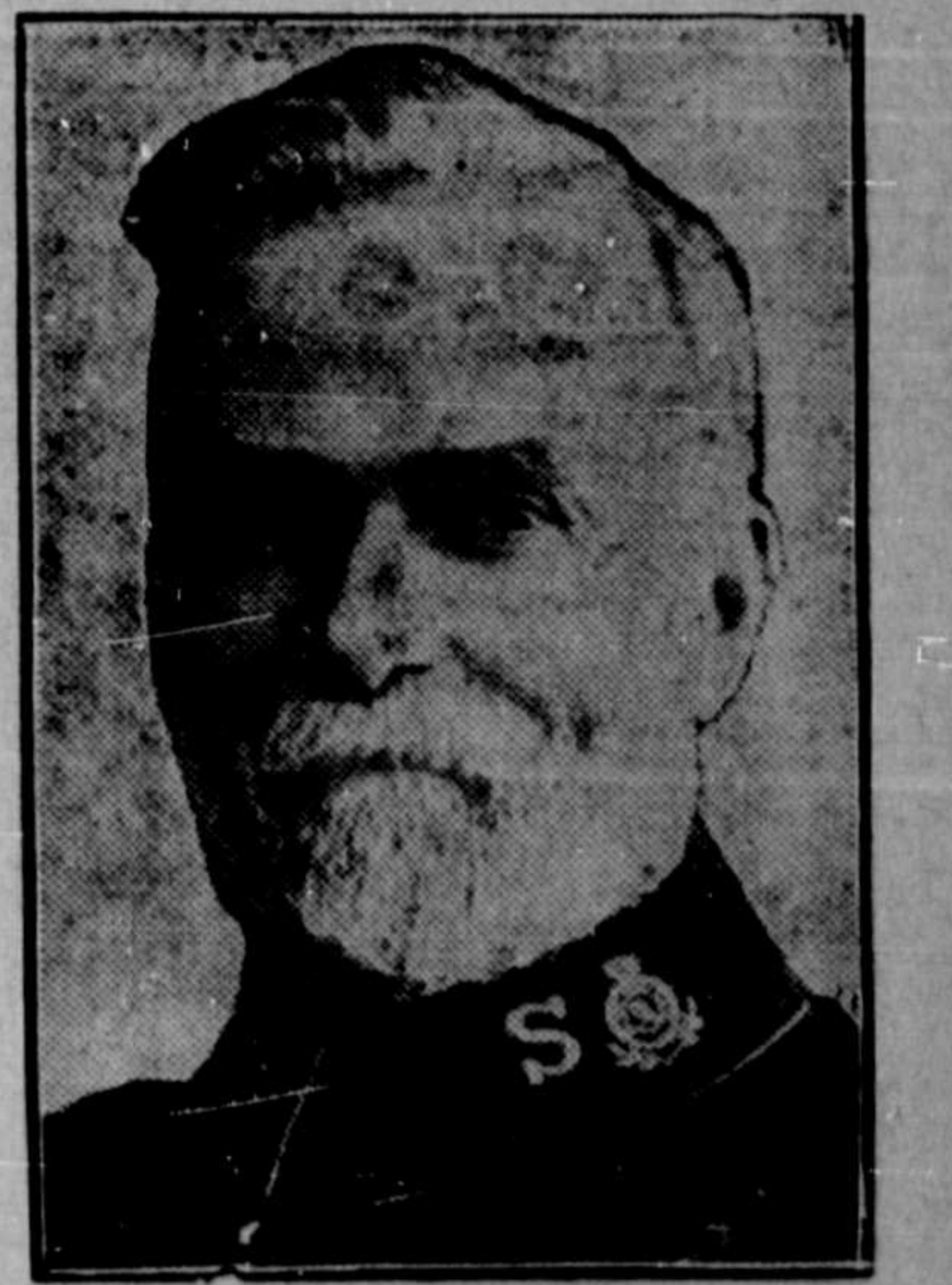
BUD CORLEY STARTS AFTER BOLIVIA GOLD

A number of people were on the wharf last night when the Princess Beatrice was in, to give a friendly send-off to Stewart A. Corley of the Royal Hotel. He goes to La Paz, Bolivia, and the wild, weird hunting stories he has told recently in a manner not readily understood, is accounted for by his amateur explorations into the Spanish language.

O. A. Seaman, the well known quartz prospector, left here for Bolivia just about a year ago on a scheme of exploration for gold in that country which he had been planning for a couple of years. Having obtained direct information in regard to these deposits he got together among his many friends in Seattle and San Francisco a party of experienced mining men and set sail. "STROLLER" BIDS AU REVOIR TO THE FOLKS AT WHITEHORSE

UNSELFISHLY LEAVES THEM TO MINISTRATION OF PASTORS, IN HOPES THAT THEY WILL CONVERT SOME OF THE WORST

Saturday evening E. J. White, editor and proprietor of the Whitehorse Star, passed through here on the Princess May, to attend the annual Arctic Brotherhood grand lodge. While here, Mr. White, who is far better known up north as "Stroller" White, shook hands with a number of old Dawson friends and told the most recent news from the Chisana and Wolf creek strikes, none of which was startling news as recent stampedes from Prince Rupert have kept everybody here well posted.

The Stroller's au revoir to his readers, in the Whitehorse Star of October 31st, is one of his characteristic effusions. It reads as follows:

"By the time the next issue of this great family journal and household necessity is in the hands of its readers the Stroller expects to be sailing the raging main on his way to the outside world. And right here the Stroller will confess to his readers that there is nothing in the plea that he had been ordered outside for his health. The truth is that his health is vulgarly good—so good that the high cost of living is all that bothers him. The Stroller does not need a vacation and in taking one he is practicing that same self-denial

which has ever characterized his actions since he began his great campaign many years ago for the uplift of humanity. It is this way: Owing to the efforts of the Stroller, assisted by the ministers and the police court the people of Whitehorse as a rule, have attained to a higher order of life than those of many other similar-sized communities. But there are a few "hard shells" who have not yet embraced the better life. Some of them continue to eat pie with a knife and even permit dogs to sleep under their beds. They won't go to church, so the ministers have no chance at them. By hook and by crook they manage to keep out of the police court, therefore, that civilizing influence is lost to them. While they all read what the Stroller has to say, they heed not his teachings but continue to tread the time-worn path that leads to destruction. The Stroller shudders to think of how he has struggled with these wicked and perverse generation and signally failed.

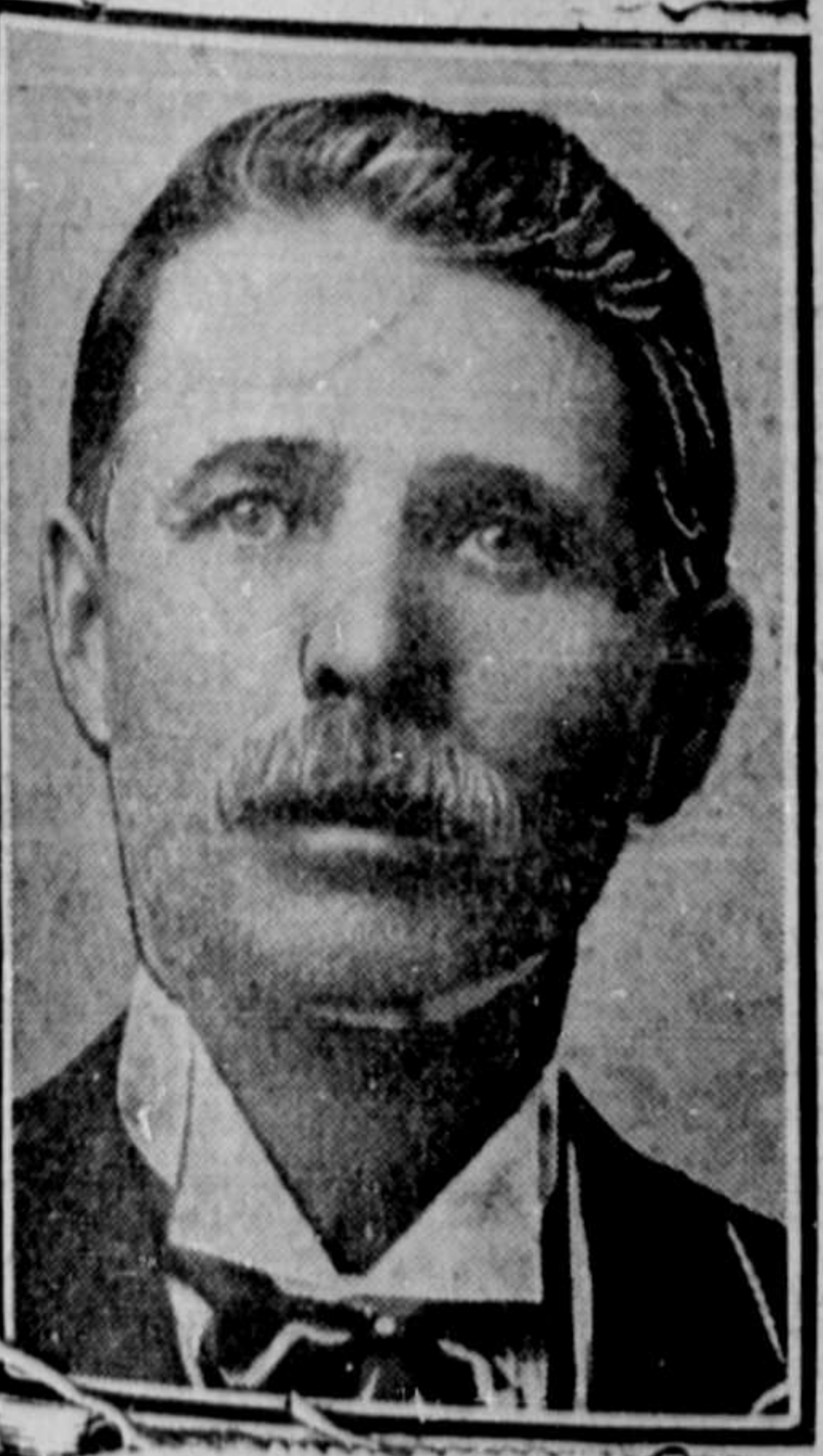

He is stepping aside for the purpose of giving a minister an opportunity for using the medium in which he has failed to reach this stiff-necked and rebellious people. Steel Nearing Ft. George

Passengers from the far interior by last night's train bring the report that track laying, which has been held up on account of a fill near Decker Lake, will be resumed within a week. Interviewed by the "News," General Superintendent W. C. C. Mehan said he did not expect that it would be resumed much before December 1st, although it might be possible to get the grade ready before that time. When the fill is ready there will be a clear stretch of from 20 to 25 miles which will bring the end of steel to Burns Lake. The end of steel coming westward is only fifty miles east of Fort George.

CALGARY OFFICIAL GUILTY OF THEFT

Former City Treasurer Gets Sentence of Five Years in the Penitentiary

Calgary, Nov. 6.—C. H. Minchin, formerly city treasurer, city alderman, and last year a defeated candidate for the office of commissioner, was found guilty at the Assize Court this morning of the theft of \$5000 from the city and was sentenced to serve five years in the Edmonton penitentiary.

Both verdict and sentence were a complete surprise as when the crown and defence rested their cases last night Minchin appeared to have an excellent chance of acquittal.

The summing up of Judge Walsh this morning was decidedly against the defendant, and when his charge to the jury was completed Minchin's conviction seemed certain. The jury deliberated for less than half an hour before returning the verdict. Sentence was imposed immediately afterward, and Minchin was taken into custody by the Mounted Police. An appeal on technical grounds is anticipated.

PROPOSAL TO RAISE SINECURE SALARIES.

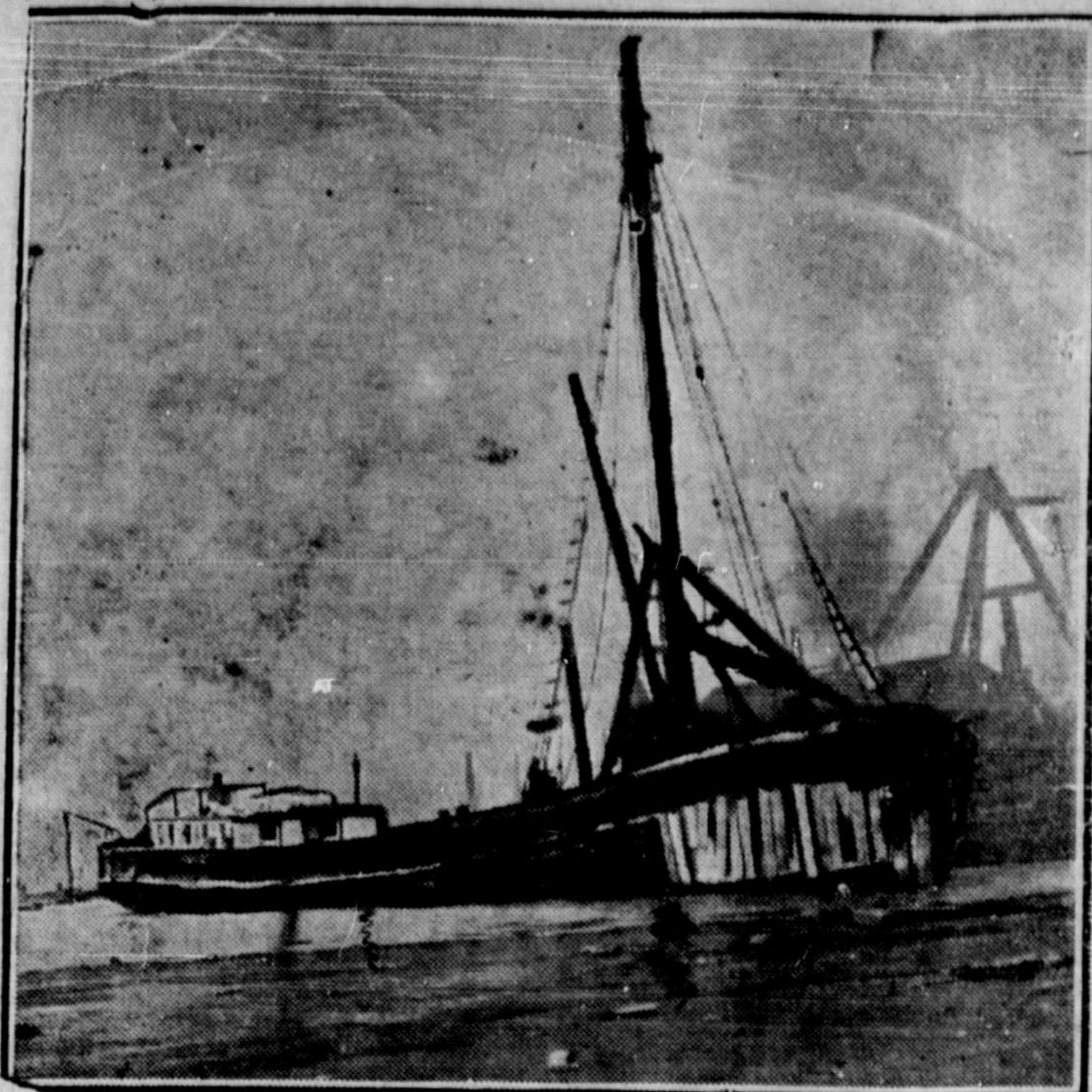
The proposal of the premiers of the provinces at their Ottawa conference that the salaries of the lieutenant governor should be increased is one that should not find favor with the federal government, while the suggestion that they should be styled "governor" instead of lieutenant-governor is too much Americanized Canadian nomenclature to need to be treated but with amused silence.

The position of lieutenant-governor is so much coveted by politicians that those who are not satisfied with their free residence and good solid salary, or who find they cannot make ends meet, should give place to those who are waiting for a chance to disperse gubernatorial honors at any provincial capital, and some of whom would jump at the chance of being appointed to the position were no salary attached to the office.

As a rule, the position is a reward for political services rendered to the party having the appointment in its gift and is a sort of crowning stone to a political career prior to final retirement either into private life or some snug permanent government appointment which is next door to a sinecure. The office is a necessary one, according to the Canadian constitution, but it is not necessary that it should be converted into a channel for making its occupant quickly rich.

IT LANDED RIGHT BETWEEN THE EYES.

The total vote of Greater New York last Tuesday, with seventy-six precincts out of its 4,780 missing, gave Mitchell, Fusion 333,142; McCall, Tammany Democrat, 224,412, and Russell, Socialist, 30,336. Tammany thus received a jolt between the eyes. Its candidate for the mayoralty of New York has been buried beneath an avalanche of adverse ballots, and although the tiger has not been killed its claws have been neatly clipped. The public conscience of Gotham has been thoroughly turned; the East Side has refused to prostrate itself before its idol, as it has done so many times. Even the Democratic press, which was more or less allied with that organization because of its ostensible connection with the politics of its party, in most cases abandoned it to the vengeance of the multitude. The responsibility of its methods for the orgy of corruption and crime; its tyrannical assumption of dictatorship; its vaunt that governors, legislators, councillors and civic officials were nothing more than its messenger boys, were pills of too bitter a quality to be swallowed.



FIRST GREAT LAKES WRECK OF THE SEASON.

With the coming of rough fall weather the grain boats and schooners on the international Great Lakes are having the usual rough time. After four days buffeting about on Lake Ontario, the schooner Sligo, shown above, was abandoned by the crew, who were rescued by the life saving boats off Toronto on Sunday, October 19th.

TO KEEP HINDUS FROM COMING TO SETTLE IN THIS COUNTRY

QUESTION OF THEIR LANDING IN THE PROVINCE CONSIDERED BY BRITISH COLONIAL SECRETARY AND SECRETARY OF STATE FOR INDIA.

London, Nov. 6.—It is understood that Mr. Lewis Vernon Harcourt, the colonial secretary, and the Marquis of Crewe, the secretary of state for India, are now considering the Canadian proposals for a revision of the regulations affecting the Canadian immigration of Hindus with a view to effecting a stoppage, by friendly arrangement with the Indian government, on the ground that the Hindus are non-assimilable with the Canadian population.

The embarrassing position of the British Indians in South Africa is regarded as a potent object lesson on the folly of repeating the blunder in Canada. The Hindus now in London met yesterday and organized a strong agitation to assist their fellow countrymen's resistance to the law in South Africa. The leader of the movement, Gokhale, has now returned from Bombay and predicts that the fiercest struggle is impending to prevent the dominant Dutch party in South Africa from crushing out the Indian community. A move will be made at the next session of the vice regal council at Delhi demanding that the Indian government send a mission to South

Africa to warn the government that serious consequences to the Empire threaten unless justice is done.

Secretary Harcourt is especially attacked for shirking the marriage difficulty. The Indians demand the amendment of the South Africa law to recognize the legality of monogamous Indian marriages celebrated according to Hindu and Mohammedan rites. Mr. Harcourt suggests that this may mean the legal recognition of polygamy. The Indians reply that although both religions sanction polygamy, only 1 per cent. of Indian marriages are polygamous.
