PARCELS POST A NEW YEAR'S GIFT.

In the despatches we published yesterday was an official announcement from Ottawa that the Canadian government would launch its parcels post scheme on the first of January, and no doubt many read this announcement with deep interest. Parcels post in the United States continues to develop rapidly, the actual increase far exceeding the original estimates of the official experts. They now expect that the amount of business for the current year will exceed the highest forecast made last January when the service was inaugurated. Speaking of the opening of the fall season and the introduction of lower rates for distances not exceeding 150 miles from the shipping point, Mr. John C. Kroons, chairman of the parcels post commission, said they had caused traffic to advance by leaps and bounds. He added that "when the new system was inaugurated the merchants did not utilize it for their shipments out of town. It was new to them and they didn't know how it would work.

This fall, however, the merchants are flocking to the parcels post to handle their out of town business."






