## BIG COLD STORAGE PLANT BUILDING AT HAYSPORT

### HUERTA'S ARMY SURRENDERS AT JUAREZ --- LARKIN'S AGITATION FOR A GENERAL STRIKE

#### ALL SPEAK ENTHUSIASTICALLY ABOUT CHISANA'S GOLD CAMP

WINTER FREIGHTING ALREADY STARTED OVER GOOD TRAIL WITH COMFORTABLE ROADHOUSES—WHITEHORSE WILL BE BUSY PLACE THIS WINTER.

Arrivals from the north on the Princess Sophia on Saturday state that sleighing has already begun from Whitehorse to the new Chisana diggings and that considerable freighting is already on the trail. If that is so there is undoubtedly freighting from Dawson by the White River route and this means that the Chisana will be a good winter camp. Mr. Pedlar of Whitehorse, on the way out to select goods for his firm, says it will undoubtedly grow to be a large camp by the opening of the year, as he knows of so many who are outfitting and ready to go in.

Mr. Pedlar was one of the first merchants to go into Whitehorse, and although still a young man had been a pioneer merchant of both Juneau and Dawson. He will probably be among the first at Chisana. He says that the White Pass Company and the Canadian government have constructed what will be first class trails to Chisana as soon as the

snow packs; that the company has established comfortable road-houses every twenty to thirty miles along the trail and have made every arrangement for doing a very large business. "It means a great increase in the activity of Whitehorse," observed Mr. Pedlar, "and our next is sure to be a banner season. What with our own copper mines so rapidly increasing in production and shipping and the new shippers we shall have from Windy Arm and Atlin, Whitehorse will be a busy place. As to Wolf Creek, not much can be said as yet because little development has been done, but it is promising."

Barney McGee, who gave a producing creek in Atlin his family name, was also a passenger on the Sophia and said that the Atlin camp never looked more promising. Mr. Drury, another merchant of Whitehorse, said he expected a tremendous trade with Chisana would develop during the winter.

#### AN AVALANCHE NEAR VALDEZ GOT FOUR MEN IN ITS ICY GRIP

ONE OF THEM WAS KILLED AND OTHERS SUFFERED TERRIBLY FROM BRUISES AND EXPOSURE BUT ARE RECOVERING

Valdez, Nov. 13.—Robert Martin was killed and John Connelly, Warren Nelson and E. S. Bruner are suffering from exposure and bruises as the result of a snow-slide a few days ago on the Big Four mining claims on Mineral Creek.

Bruner, Nelson, Connelly and Martin were overwhelmed in their tent by the avalanche of snow that came down upon them and carried them and their tent to within ten feet of a 100-foot precipice. Bruner managed to work himself loose by using a part of a whisky flask, that was near, as a

knife. With his hands badly cut and not a shred of clothing on him he walked a quarter of a mile to the tunnel and secured a shovel, with which he dug out Warren Nelson after the latter had been pinned down three and a half hours. Bruner and Nelson continued the work of rescue until John Connelly, another partner, was released. He had been buried for seven and a half hours before he was rescued but he was still alive.

Martin's body was not found until the next day. It was crushed. The accident occurred at an elevation of 5000 feet.

#### BAYLEY-WELSH FIGHT

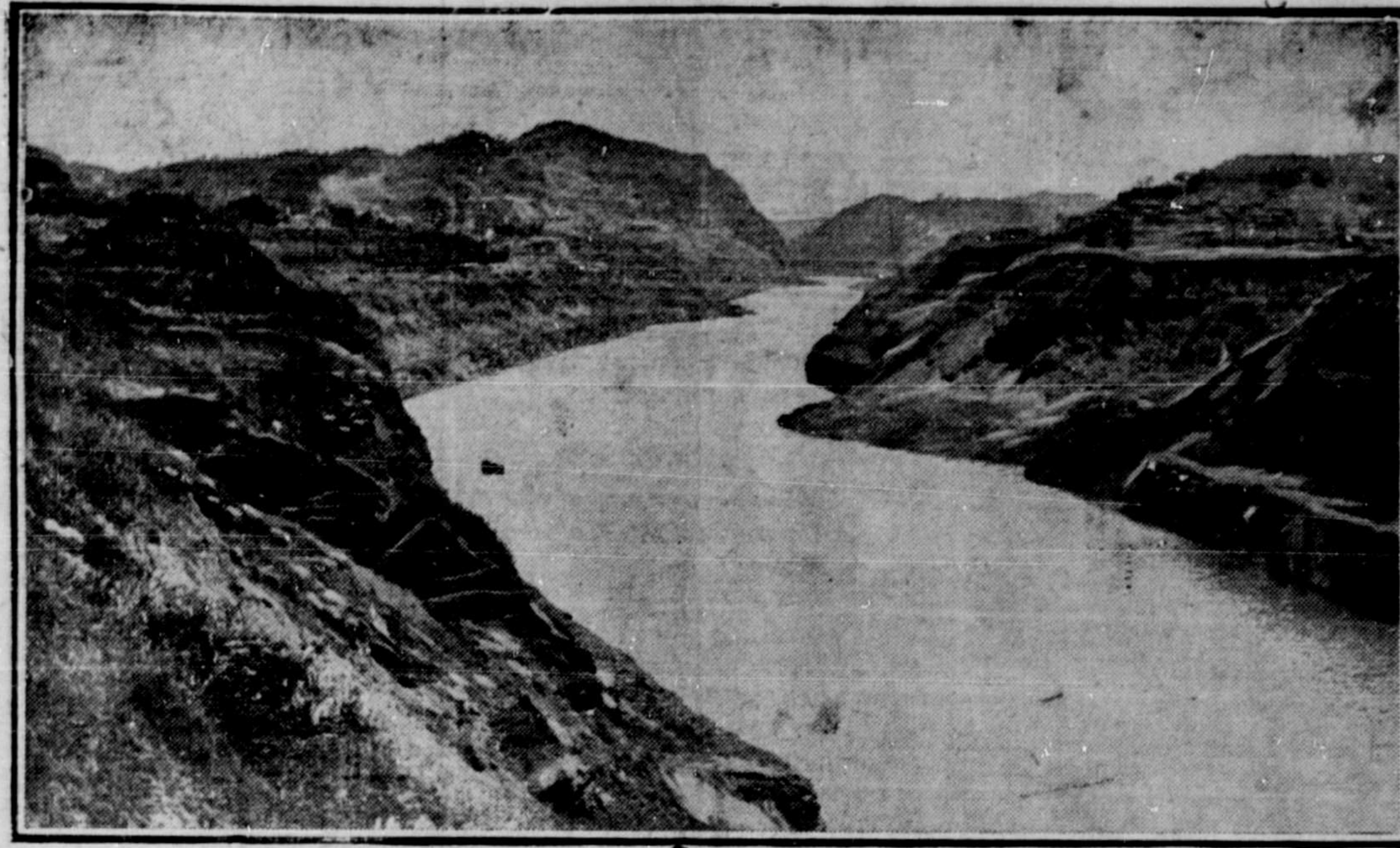

John Redmond, the Irish leader in the House, and his followers fear for Home Rule as a result of the new move. Sympathy for Irish labor threatens to force the labor party of Britain out of the Liberal coalition.

The Unionist hopes are running high in consequence. Bonar Law, the Unionist leader, declares the political tide has turned in favor of his party.

#### FINN IS CHARGED WITH MANSLAUGHTER

Constable Arrived Last Night With Man Charged With Shooting at Telkwa

Constable Russell arrived in the city from Hazelton last night with two prisoners in charge. One of them was Oscar Wicklund, the man who is charged with the shooting of Clarence Howell at the Telkwa Hotel, to law. He appeared before Magistrate Hoskins at Aldermere on Nov. 8th, charged with manslaughter and was committed for trial. Wicklund is a Swedish Finn, 33 years of age, weighing 175 pounds. He speaks English well and is an intelligent looking chap. He will be tried here.

The other prisoner brought in last night was Wm. Shannon, charged with having liquor in his possession for sale contrary to law. He appeared before Magistrate Hoskins at Aldermere on Nov. 8th, when he was sentenced to six months in the penitentiary. It is understood that an appeal will be entered.

#### DICTATOR HUERTA MUST BE DEPOSED

Declaration of Leader of Mexican Rebels—Federal General at Juarez Surrenders

Nogales, Sonora, Nov. 15.—General Carranza, the leader of the Constitutionalists in Mexico, will not consider any means of accomplishing peace in Mexico except through the forceful overthrow of Huerta and the central government. "We will recognize nobody who succeeds Huerta by the power which he usurped," is a statement of the constitutionalists.

El Paso, Nov. 17.—Juarez has fallen into the hands of the Mexican rebels. When the constitutionalists made a successful attack the federal commander threw himself on the mercy of the enemy. Bullets have fallen thick in El Paso. One American has been killed.

#### HAYSPORT CONCERN

Is Erecting Cold Storage Plant of 2,000,000 Lbs. Capacity.

Harry Sheere, of the Skeena River Syndicate, came in from Haysport on last night's train. He reports that work has started on the driving of piles for a new cold storage plant of 2,000,000 pounds capacity. Two or three boats will be added to the fleet and the main wharf is to be extended so that the largest steamers can dock there. Haysport promises to be a busy fishing centre next season.

#### TWO STEAMSHIPS ON FIRE IN MID-OCEAN

Spanish Steamer Balmes Off the Bermudas—British Steamer Eulida With Cotton

New York, Nov. 17.—A message received from Bermuda by the Cunard Line states that the Pannonia is escorting to Bermuda the Spanish steamer Balmes. The latter has been picked up afire and in a sinking condition. All the passengers of the Balmes, numbering a hundred and three, have been transferred to the Pannonia.

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 17.—The British steamer Eulida, which cleared for here yesterday from Rotterdam with a cargo of cotton, put back this morning on fire.

#### EXPLOSION ON EGERIA

Old Training Ship Blows Up—One Lad Fatally Injured

#### "NE TEMERE" DECREE DISCUSSED PASTOR DENOUNCES RAFFLES

REV. F. W. KERR SAYS THE LAW SHOULD TAKE AWAY FROM CATHOLIC CHURCH RIGHT TO PERFORM MARRIAGE CEREMONY

The announcement that Rev. F. W. Kerr, Presbyterian pastor, would discuss the "Ne Temere" decree attracted a large gathering at the Empress Theatre last night. In opening his address the reverend gentleman explained that any criticisms that he might make of the Catholic church would be made in the most friendly way but he felt he would be shirking his duty as a Christian if he did not raise his voice against certain matters. He drew attention to the apparent harmony that prevails in Canada between Catholics and Protestants. That the fires of religious controversy, however, have not been extinguished is shown by the difficulty in settling the question of Home Rule in Ireland, one of the most prominent issues before the public mind today. If there are bitter feelings between Catholics and Protestants in Canada, it is, the speaker said, the fault of the Roman Catholic church. Protestantism is referred to in the Catholic church one hundred times more frequently than Roman Catholicism in Protestant churches.

Coming to the "ne temere" decree Rev. Mr. Kerr explained that the term literally means "less rashly." The decree, issued by the Pope, first of all raises its voice against hasty and rash marriages. In doing this the preacher said the Pope had act-

ed wisely and he too would advise those who became suddenly infatuated to wait. The large number of divorces are chiefly due to hasty marriages. In the second place the decree issued its voice against mixed marriages and the Presbyterian church joined with the Pope in advising against such. The "ne temere" decree, however, did not stop here. It went so far as to declare that marriages between a Protestant and a Catholic, unless performed by a Catholic priest, are null and void. "The law of the land," the preacher said, "has a right to step in and put a stop to such infamy. So long as the Catholic church continues to declare such marriages null and void, the law of the land should take away from the Catholic church the right to perform the marriage ceremony."

Referring to certain local matters, Rev. Mr. Kerr criticized the Catholic church for certain methods in raising money. "When a church will sell one thousand tickets for a doll," he said, "a practice that is outlawed, I do not find as much fault with the church as with the weak kneed Protestants who took part in such a proceeding."

In concluding his address Rev. Mr. Kerr said that the work of the church should be to unify and solidify the home. The ne temere decree worked in the opposite direction.

#### TALLEST BOXERS TO BATTLE TEN ROUND BOUT NEXT MONTH

JESS WILLARD, THE WESTERN GIANT, AND CARL MORRIS, THE ORIGINAL WHITE HOPE, PROMISES SOMETHING OF A SENSATION

New York, Nov. 13.—Billy Gibson, matchmaker of the Garden A. C., has signed Jess Willard, the western giant, to box Carl Morris, the original white hope, at Madison Square Garden on December 2. This will be a bout between two of the tallest and heaviest men in the ring today.

The battle between these giants promises to be the sensation of the boxing season. Willard stands 6 ft. 6 inches and Morris 6 feet 3½ inches. Willard will enter the ring weighing

about 225 pounds and Morris about 230 pounds. Each has had a battle with Gunboat Smith. Both bouts were unsatisfactory, inasmuch as they terminated without a decisive victory on the part of the contestants.

Willard in his bouts here made a very favorable impression with the fans. When a novice at the game and minus the elementary parts of boxing he fought to even honors with the late Luther McCarty. Since then he has won a number of battles in the west.

**THAT CHANGE IN SIR RICHARD.**

Sir Richard McBride at a recent Ottawa Canadian Club banquet broke all rules of decency and courtesy in order to advertise his allegiance to the Borden naval contribution idea, but it took him longer to turn a back somersault from the unanimous position of 1909 than such agile politicians as Premier Borden and Hon. Mr. Foster.

In a speech at Vancouver on August 9th, 1912, Premier Sir Richard McBride of British Columbia said: "Here we have the responsibility of guarding the portals of the Dominion, and we should be all the readier to show that we realize the responsibility in this regard

and our readiness to act if need rises. There are even now being erected or proposed costly railway terminals and big industries will follow these. Factories and warehouses are springing up. IF WE PROPOSE TO SECURE THE SAFETY OF THESE TREMENDOUS INVESTMENTS WE MUST BE SURE OF ADEQUATE NAVAL STRENGTH."  
The same responsibility exists today of guarding the western portals of the Dominion. The same necessity for protecting the tremendous investments on the British Columbia coast exists today. By what species of political legerdemain did Premier Borden induce his picturesque follower from the Pacific Coast to swallow his opinions and common sense in order to join the "Canada Can't" contribution crowd?

**CANADA AND HER LITERATURE.**

Six hundred men and women at the banquet of the Canadian Club of New York heard Hon. George E. Foster, minister of trade and commerce, say: "There is a reciprocity deeper and greater than the exchange of butter and eggs, tomatoes and potatoes. There is the reciprocity of language and ideals and literature."

**IS SALMON INDUSTRY HURT BY RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION?**

**STARTLING AND UNEXPECTED RESULTS SAID TO FOLLOW CANADIAN NORTHERN CONSTRUCTION THROUGH THE FRASER RIVER CANYON.**

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—A loss of many millions of dollars to the British Columbia salmon fishing industry, and probably the total disappearance of the famous "big run" every four years, is one of the startling and unexpected results of the construction of the new Canadian Northern transcontinental line through the Fraser River canyon. The loss is apparently irreparable. Capitalized, it means to the Pacific Coast fishing industry, American and Canadian, in Puget Sound and on the Fraser River, possibly half as much as the whole Canadian Northern Railway transcontinental has cost to construct.

The facts of the case and the extent of the damage done are now being investigated by the department of fisheries here, with a view to co-operating with the British Columbia department of fisheries in taking all possible remedial measures.

In August last at the time of the big quadriennial run of salmon up the Fraser River to the spawning grounds it was discovered that literally millions of salmon were being held back from further ascent of the river beyond the narrow pass at Hell's Gate, where C. N. R. construction, combined with the unusually high water on the Fraser, has altered the currents and eddies in the river from previous years. The blasting and filling operations for the C. N. R. along the ledge of the river at this point had so altered the current that the salmon could not take advantage of the cross currents and eddies of preceding years to make headway against the abnormally swift flow of water and reach their usual spawning grounds. In consequence millions of the big 4-year-old fish turned back or died without spawning.

Efforts were promptly made by the provincial fisheries authorities to restore normal conditions, and a part of the C. N. R. construction was hastily demolished. A comparatively small number of salmon got through to the spawning grounds.

The result will be that four years hence, when the salmon spawned this year come back on maturity to spawn, the run will be only the usual normal run of the past three years. The recurrence of the "big year" runs every four years depends of course on the spawning being equally maintained. This year, which was a "big year," the salmon came up the river in the expected numbers and the total catch was an immense one. But the number of fish spawning fell far short. The next big run year, in 1917, will, therefore, according to the fears of the fishery experts, prove to be a comparative failure. And consequently, too, four years after that and for every fourth succeeding year the same conditions will apply. The difference in the value of the catch between the "big year" and the "off years" is at least \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000.

It may be that a similar blockade of salmon was caused when the C. P. R. was built through the Fraser River canyon, and in this may lie the recurring three year periods of comparatively small runs. An alteration of currents on the fourth year after the C. P. R. was constructed may have followed a change in the railway line at the point of blockade. Thus the fish might have all got through to the

spawning beds, with the result that four years later there would be a similar big run.

In order to prevent a similar blockade of salmon in the Fraser River near Hell's Gate next year runways for the fish are now being made, and currents are being directed so as to give the fish an opportunity to "tack" up stream at the places now made impassable through the narrowing or the straightening of the narrows by the railway work. The total cost of the remedial measures now under way will probably be nearly \$250,000. An effort may be made by the government to make the C. N. R. pay for this expenditure or part of it.

**SOME MISCONCEPTION AS TO CONSERVATION**

**Mere Hoarding Would Prove Almost as Wasteful as Reckless Destruction**

A common popular misconception with regard to conservation is that it consists in merely saving or hoarding natural wealth for the use of future generations. Nothing could be farther from the truth. Mere hoarding is not conservative; it is almost as wasteful as reckless destruction. The man who buried his talent in the earth was told that he might at least have put it out at interest even if he were afraid to venture it in business. Wise statesmanship regards our natural resources as so much capital, of which the State is the trustee. The community is entitled to the interest, but the principal should be conserved for all time. An exception to this rule must be made in the case of minerals, such as coal, of which there is only a limited supply, that, when once used, can never be restored. But in the case of our forests, our lands, our seas and our wild animal life, the existing supply of timber, of soil fertility of fish and of fur bearers, should never diminish, but should rather increase.

To be convinced that this is possible, it is only necessary to glance at Europe. In England, thanks to intensive cultivation, the soil produces better crops than centuries ago; in Germany the forests are so managed that in spite of a large output each year's cut is balanced by the new growth, while the teeming waters of the North Sea have supplied a half dozen countries with fish from time immemorial. In respect to the threatened extinction of our fur bearing animals, the new industry of fur farming may be relied on to obviate this. Conservation may be applied to mineral products in preventing unnecessary waste, and the progress of science is continually unearthing substitutes for the rarer substances. It may indeed be confidently expected that, with wise use of our natural endowments, there is no danger of humanity ever lacking any essential materials.—Portland Canal Miner.

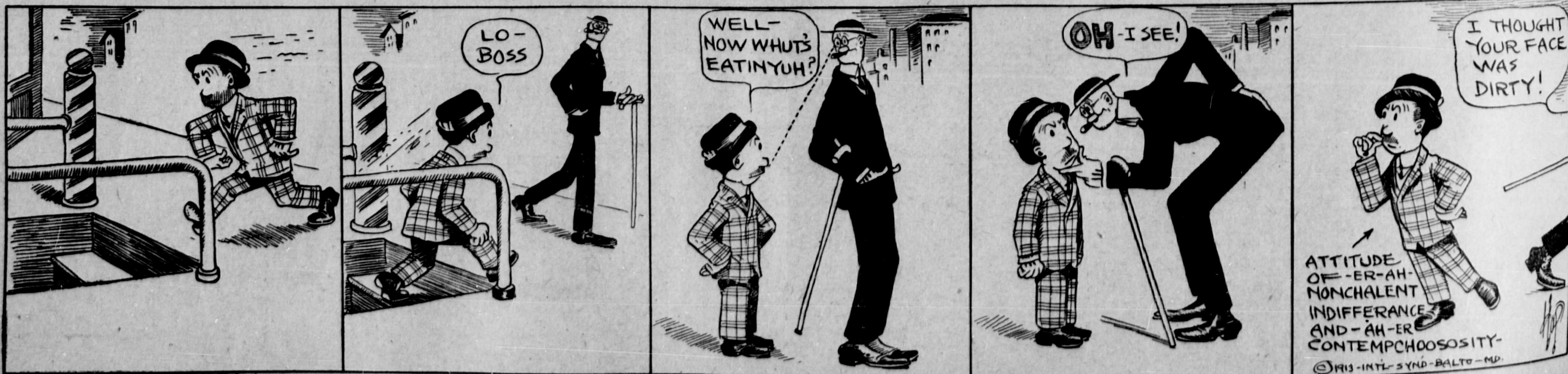

### REPORTS CONFIRMED

#### Large Mineral Deposits Near New Town of Hubert

Hubert, B.C., Nov. 11.—The enthusiastic reports by grub-stakers published several months ago in reference to the rich mineral deposits close to this city are being fully verified by competent engineers. Coal, iron and copper have been located in large commercial quantities. The Copper River district to the south has a very extensive area of copper, running from 3 to 24 per cent. The local fields cover an area of several square miles and from the analysis which has just been taken is especially adapted for steaming purposes. The iron is of the hematite variety and comes under the Bessemer limit.

Local residents are enthusiastic with the possibilities of an extensive development of the mineralized area, and are predicting a record breaking development for this town. Mr. John B. Rittenhouse, consulting mining engineer, of New York city, has just completed an extensive examination and is very enthusiastic, especially about the iron deposits. The Iron Mines, Limited, a Prince Rupert Corporation, has already been organized to conduct large development operations. Large mineral interests have already acquired holdings, and as soon as the numerous reports which are now in compilation are accepted, the development will be on a magnitude duplicated in but few parts of the country.
