## MEXICAN REBELS WIN ANOTHER DECISIVE BATTLE

### NATIONAL FORCE FOR HOME RULE FORMED--BORDEN WILL CALL UPON PRESIDENT WILSON

#### THE THIRTEENTH BRIDE TO BE MARRIED IN THE WHITE HOUSE

NUPTIALS OF MISS JESSIE WILSON AND FRANCIS BOWES SAYRE A BRILLIANT FUNCTION ATTENDED BY MANY FOREIGN REPRESENTATIVES.

(Special to The Daily News.) Washington, Nov. 26.—The wedding of Miss Jessie Wilson, daughter of the President, to Francis Bowes Sayre took place at the White House yesterday, and was attended by a large crowd. While the number of invitations issued was not as large as for the wedding of Alice Roosevelt and Congressman Longworth, the company was a distinguished one and the ceremony a brilliant one. The day was a general holiday, even the House of Representatives adjourning for the occasion.

Miss Wilson is the thirteenth bride married in the White House in one hundred and thirty years, the thirteenth nuptial party in the White House happening in nineteen-thirteen. One pleasing feature connected with the ceremony was the reception last night of a delegation representing 500 girl employees of a white goods factory to present to Miss Jessie Wilson, the President's daughter, a hand embroidered linen petticoat, as the wedding gift. All of the 500 girls played some part in the making of the fine petticoat, which is embroidered with a garland of roses and an American eagle and flag bearing the initials J. W. S.—J. Wilson Sayre. The idea was prompted by appreciation of the work that Miss Wilson has done as a special worker among New York factory girls.

#### INDIANS DROVE SURVEYORS OUT OF KITWANCOOL VALLEY

PROVINCIAL POLICE LEFT THIS MORNING TO MAKE DEMONSTRATION OF FORCE AND SETTLE THE TROUBLE

Six constables, as many rifles, a stack of snow shoes, rolls of blankets and camping outfit were hustled aboard the train for the interior this morning. They were in response to a telegram from up the line to the effect that the Indians of Kitwancool Valley were making trouble with the whites.

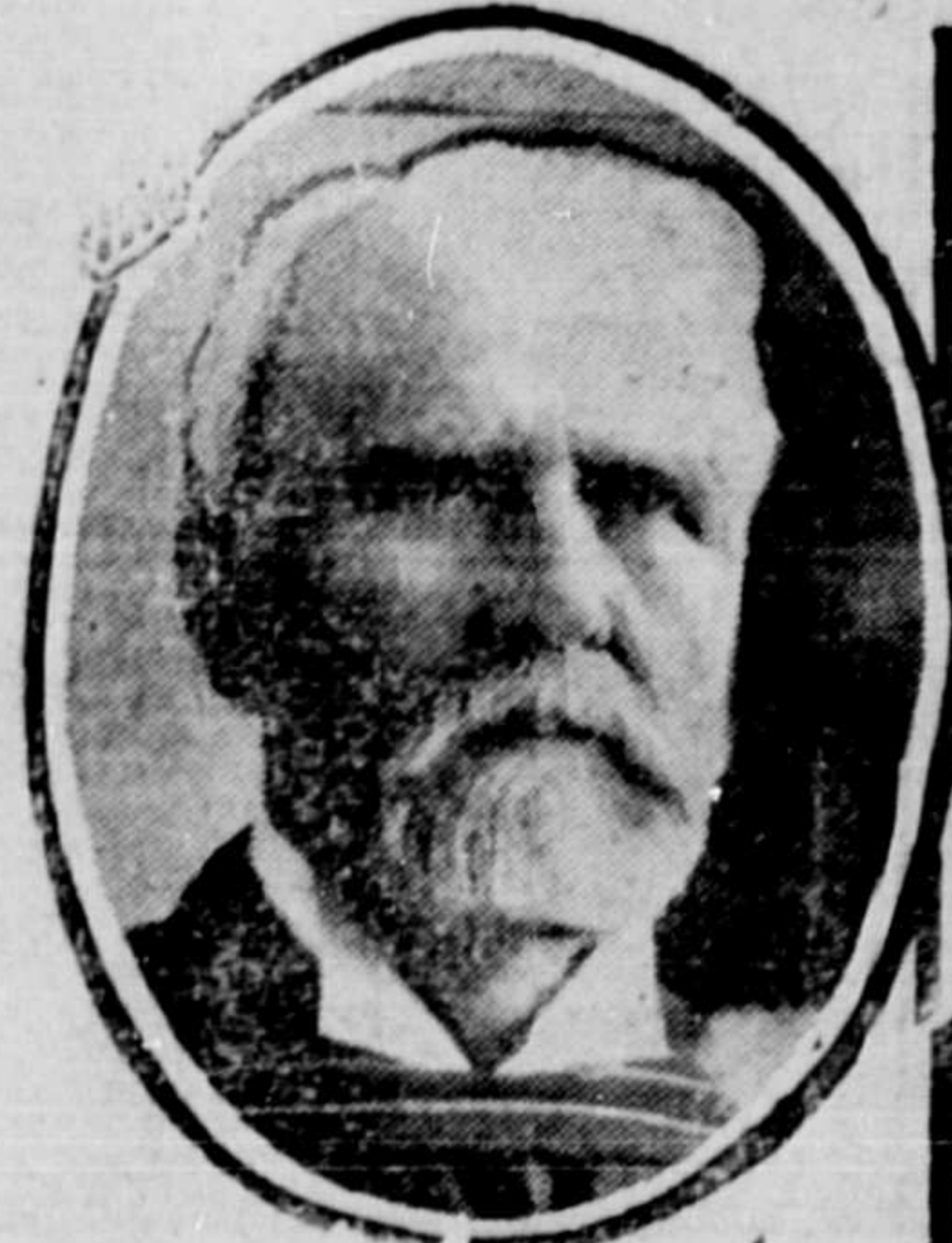

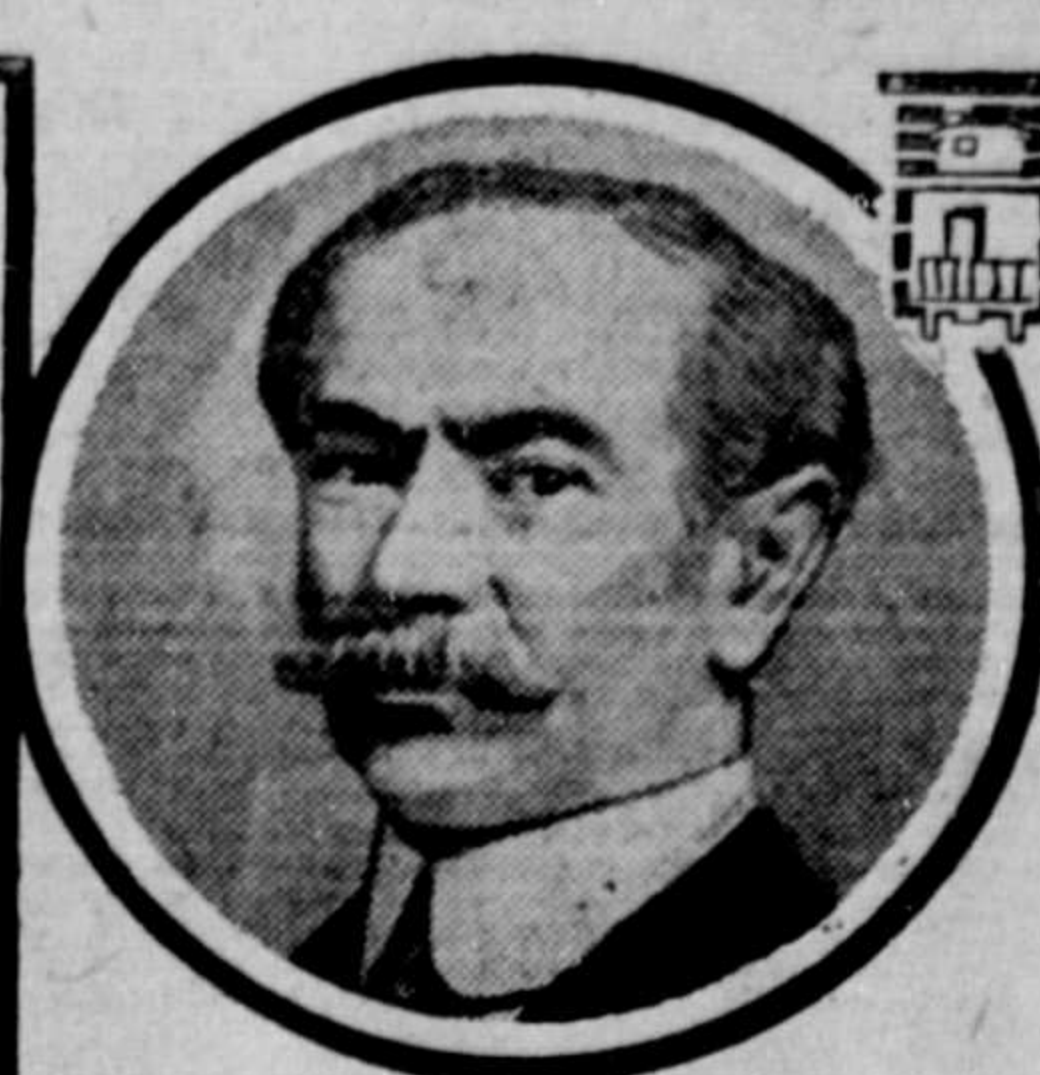
The scenes of this picture are laid in the Alaskan gold fields. Two great spectacular scenes are a race down the rapids between two canoes and views of a great forest fire.



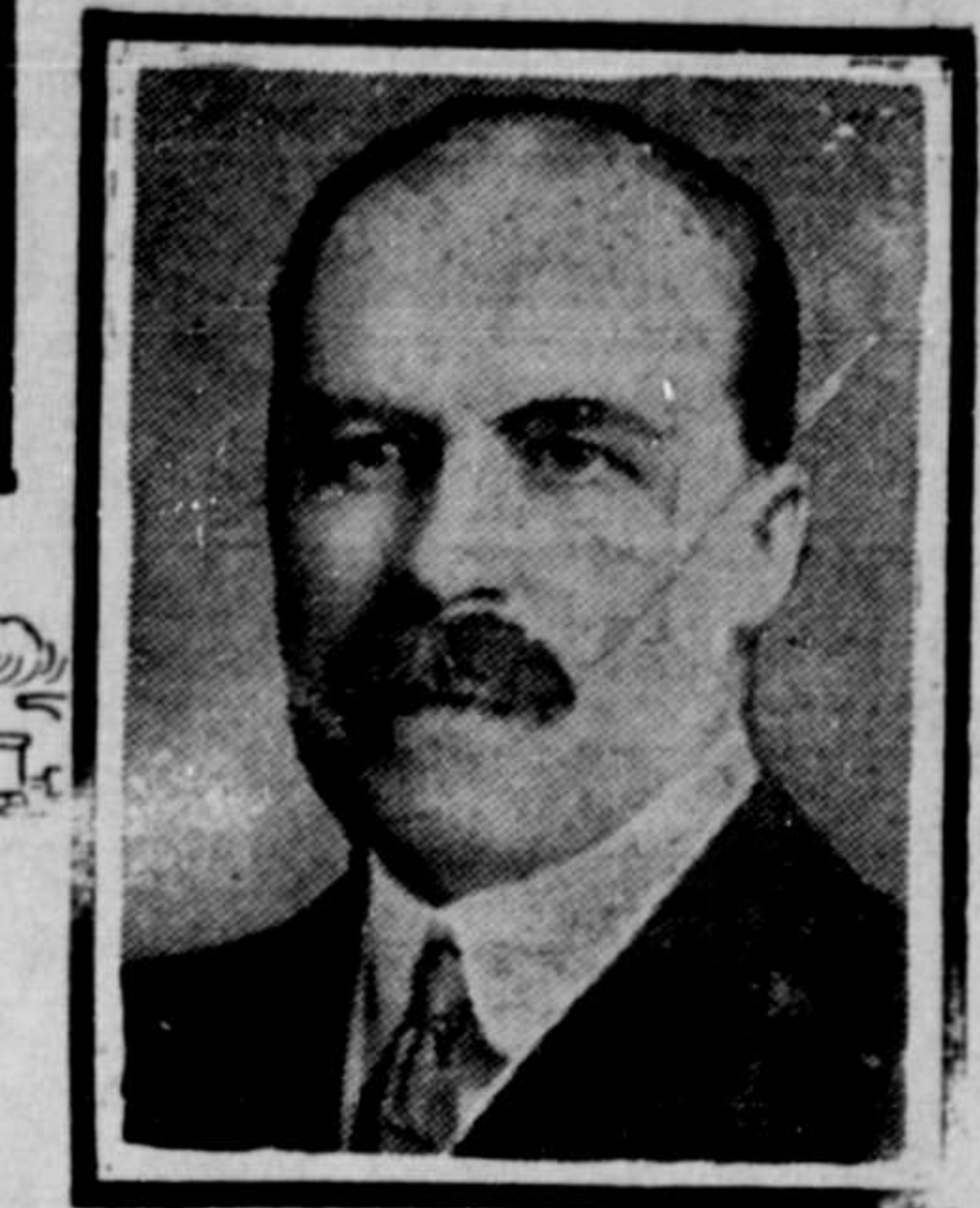

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA AND FREIGHT RATES

Representative of Province Before Railway Commission Threatened to Withdraw

(Special to The Daily News.) Ottawa, Nov. 26.—J. C. McPhillips, K. C. the new representative of British Columbia in the railway rate case, afforded the only exciting incident at the resumed inquiry of the Commission yesterday. He practically threatened to withdraw from the case before the Railway Board unless his request for an adjournment was acceded to. He said he had examined the exhibits and found it impossible for him to put forward at this stage his case for British Columbia.

#### DOMINION RAILWAY COMMISSION TO TRY THE FREIGHT RATES CASES

Seldom are the issues of any case before the Dominion Railway Commission large enough to need the services of the complete Board of Railway Commissioners. They will be gathered together at Ottawa, however, to try the big freight rates case this month. The issues include the rates charged by the companies for the transportation of freight from one province to another throughout the whole Dominion of Canada. #### FOUR THOUSAND IN GOLD EAGLES STOLEN

Taken from Package of Many Thousands While in Transit from Portland, Ore.

(Special to The Daily News.) Vancouver, Nov. 26.—When, shortly after ten o'clock yesterday morning, the messengers from the American Express Co. attempted to deliver a large package of gold eagles to an uptown business house, it was found, it is alleged, that the package was \$4,000 short. It was stated late yesterday afternoon that the theft of money is alleged to have occurred at Portland, Oregon, whence the money came to Vancouver. The total consignment was one of many thousands of dollars.

#### LARKIN'S BIG CRUSADE

Not Going to be as Big as He Anticipated

(Special to The Daily News.) London, Nov. 26.—The crusade of James Larkin, the Dublin agitator, as far as England is concerned has been a failure. He has found himself unable to arouse any enthusiasm for his cause. After the first burst of enthusiasm he has been continually losing his grip in this country.

#### Home Rule Soldiers

(Special to The Daily News.) Dublin, Nov. 26.—An Irish National Volunteer force, on the same lines as the Ulster movement but for Home Rule, was organized last night. The enrollment of the men was attended by scenes of violence, thousands being unable to gain admission to the hall. The doors and windows were smashed and the meeting was so disorderly that it was impossible to judge as to the success or otherwise of the movement.

#### PREMIER BORDEN TO CALL ON PRESIDENT

Will Discuss Problems Arising Between Canada and U.S.

Washington, Nov. 26.—The problems arising between Canada and the United States over the new tariff law will be discussed this week, when Premier Borden visits Washington and calls on the President. He will be entertained next Friday at a dinner to be given by Secretary of State Bryan.

#### LOCAL SHAREHOLDERS SUGGEST LEGAL STEPS

Claim Directors of Rocher de Boule Copper Co. are Treating them Unfairly

Last week copies of the lease given by the directors of the Rocher de Boule Copper Co. to J. E. Openheimer, were received in town. It required only a glance to see that the deal was anything but a fair one to the owning company's shareholders. The local shareholders held a meeting Saturday afternoon and decided to take steps at once to stop the work now being carried on by Mr. Openheimer's leasing company, (the Continental Development Co.), and to have the affairs of the Rocher de Boule Copper Co. inquired into by the courts.—Omineca Herald.

#### VANCOUVER TO CLOSE RESTRICTED DISTRICT

Delegation of Prominent City Women Offer Aid to those Seeking to Reform

(Special to The Daily News.) Vancouver, B.C., Nov. 26.—Orders were issued by Mayor Baxter yesterday to the police to clean up the city and close down the restricted district. The denizens were given three days to vacate. Prominent women of the city who have been urging the enforcement of the law visited that section in company with officers yesterday afternoon and offered all those who would reform aid and protection in their homes. Very few accepted. A majority of the keepers of the houses refused permission for the delegation of ladies to enter.

#### HINDUS ARE RELEASED

Thirty-Four Out of Thirty-Nine are Permitted to Enter

(Special to The Daily News.) Victoria, Nov. 26.—As a result of judgment delivered by Chief Justice Hunter, thirty-four of the thirty-nine Hindus held here since October 17 pending deportation by the immigration authorities are released.

#### HUERTA'S NORTHERN ARMY IS UTTERLY ROUTED BY REBELS

GENERAL VILLA HAD A BATTLE LINE THIRTEEN MILES LONG—BELIEVED FEDERALS CANNOT RECUPERATE—HUERTA HARD UP FOR FUNDS

(Special to The Daily News.) El Paso, Texas, Nov. 26.—The federal forces which engaged the rebel troops under General Villa near Tierra Blanca two days ago and have been constantly fighting ever since, were yesterday defeated and utterly routed, according to an official message sent last night to the rebel chiefs at Juarez.

Tierra Blanca is twenty-six miles south of Juarez, and General Francisco Villa had a battle line thirteen miles long, thus hemming in the federals. The extreme right of this battle line rested at Bauche, on the Mexican Northwestern Railway. The extreme left was at Mesa, thirteen miles from here, on the Mexican Central Railway. The general held these two railways and one train included ten carloads of provisions and supplies for the rebel soldiers and horses and several thousand round of ammunition. Part of this ammunition was captured by the rebels Saturday night in a battle with the federals.

Between 5000 and 6000 men, cavalry and artillery were camped along this battle line, supported by cannon captured from the federals at Torreon and Juarez.

General Villa says that the result of last night's battle decided the fate of the revolution in Chihuahua and meant a victory for the Constitutionalists there. "Juarez is now safe," he said, "as we have left the federals in

such shape that they will not be able to recuperate to attack us at Juarez."

Mexico City, Nov. 26.—How large General Huerta's army is at present is not known, but the last official report placed the number at 80,000. The campaign of drafting into service all persons available available has added 30,000, according to unofficial statements at the palace. But it is certain that no such number as this is under arms, as the government has had difficulty for some time in obtaining guns. Men are more plentiful than arms and General Huerta is looking forward anxiously to the receipt of rifles purchased abroad. A large Japanese consignment should begin to arrive here about December 1st.

Huerta is facing a serious financial situation. The fact is, the condition of the national treasury is not hidden even from the most ignorant peon in the country. The new stamp tax, which goes into effect December 1st, will practically double the revenue from that source. Special taxes have been imposed, and the taxing of articles imported by parcels post is being discussed. Silver is scarce, and it is feared that the launching of one peso and two peso papers throughout the republic will not serve to restore general confidence in the banks. Behind each of these bills there is presumed to be a metal reserve, but many people are skeptical of this.

The Victoria Colonist foresees a shortage in Canada's supply of beef and as a remedy suggests the prohibition of the exportation of cows and heifers, claiming this would increase the Canadian herds.

The suggestion from Regina that a city should give free street car service, paying operating expenses out of the general tax fund, might be carried even farther.

The increase in the consumption of cigarettes in Canada by 25,000,000 per month will doubtless lead the anti-cigarette agitators to conclude that the country is going to the bad under Borden.

PLAN TO MAKE THIS PROVINCE THE PARADISE FOR SPORTSMEN

GOVERNMENT TO USE UP LICENSE FEES TOTTALLING \$82,000 IN IMPORTING ELK AND DEER

Victoria, Nov. 22.—License fees from game hunters in British Columbia so far this year have amounted to \$82,000. Non-residents have paid \$6,440 of this. It is the intention of the government to put back all this total and some besides in making British Columbia a sportsman's paradise.

The provincial game department has just arranged to import a carload of wapiti (elk) from the Wyoming herd owned by Dr. French of New York. There will be two bulls and eight cows. Their offspring will be turned out from year to year in the government game reserve in the Lillooet and also probably in Strathcona Park, on Vancouver Island. Elk was formerly plentiful in the north end of the island, but have been killed off by cougars and hunters.

It is said that there are still a few wapiti in the recesses of the mountain districts on the north end of the island. There are none, however, in the Lillooet. They are plentiful in East Kootenay, where the government has another game reserve and where no elk shooting is permitted. Arrangements are also being made to import deer from New Zealand.

NEW SCHEME FOR SOLUTION OF THE IRISH HOME RULE PROBLEM

UNIONISTS SUGGEST PLAN OF FOUR OR FIVE LEGISLATURES FOR UNITED KINGDOM TO DEAL WITH PURELY LOCAL AFFAIRS.

London, Nov. 23.—There are signs that the Unionist party is strongly tending toward the settlement of the home rule problem on federal lines.

Various unofficial Unionist members have already advocated home rule all round. Lord Lansdowne is apparently sympathetic. Austin Chamberlain declares it necessary that all parts of the United Kingdom should share in what may for practical reasons be given Ireland first.

Liberals regard this development sympathetically. The Westminster Gazette says: "If the Unionist party means to intimate they are willing for an all round settlement on lines which Liberals have only excluded because they have thought them premature, we are certain the government will meet them. Even the dream of a great convention, similar to that which worked out the salvation of South Africa, might in that case prove more than a passing mirage."

The Westminster Gazette declares that the prime minister himself has spoken of extension of home rule to all parts of the United Kingdom as the ultimate aim of Liberal policy, and the whole party has assented, while whatever doubt has existed has been due to the fear that attempts involving a larger issue at this stage might merely result in extinguishing the Irish part of the problem under a more ambitious

scheme which would probably miscarry.

Chamberlain insists that the parliaments so created must be truly subordinate, and that it must be impossible for them to rival in power or dispute the authority of the imperial parliament. The Westminster Gazette adds two further provisions, that the change of issue from home rule for Ireland to home rule all round must not be evasion or postponement of the solution of the Irish problem, and that home rule must be genuine, not nominal.

A LLOYD GEORGE STORY

Mr. A. G. Gardiner, in a character sketch of Mr. Lloyd George in the London Daily News and Leader, says that "he tells, with the boyish merriment that makes him so irresistible a companion, the story of a man who, having saved someone from drowning, was presented with a public testimonial. When, after the eulogies of the mayor, he was called upon to reply, he said, "Really, I have done nothing to deserve this reward. I saw the man struggling in the water, and, as no one else was by, I saw, he would be drowned if I did not save him. So I jumped in, swam to him, turned him over to see that he wasn't Lloyd George, and then pulled him out."

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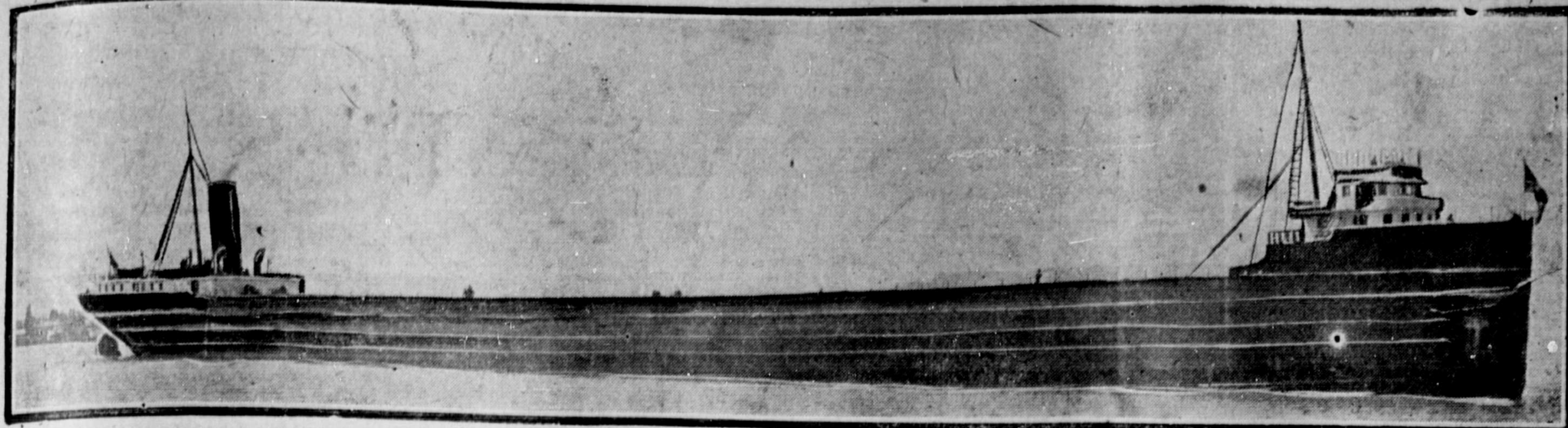

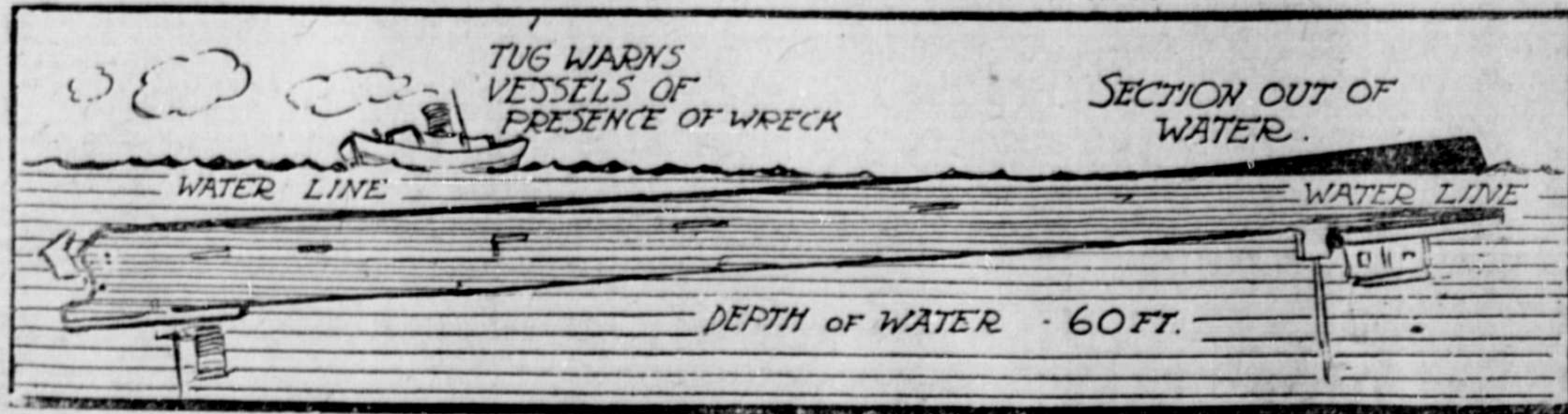

Perhaps the greatest and most inexplicable feature for several days of the terrible drama gradually unfolded in the various lake ports after the great storm was the mystery surrounding the overturned boat thirteen miles from the lighthouse and seven miles from shore northeast of Port Huron. This was the "mystery ship" of the big hurricane. Bottom side up, with only a portion of the overturned bow and hull showing above water, this boat baffled all efforts to solve her identity. Not a scrap of wreckage had been found that could be traced to the ship. The "mystery ship" had to remain a mystery until a diver could bring up her secret from sixty feet of water.

Marine men said there would have to be an absolutely smooth surface of water before a diver could go down, and for this condition the marine men waited for days. At length the lake became comparatively smooth and the diver went down. It

COST OF LIVING MUCH LOWER IN THE INTERIOR OF ALASKA

PRICES OF FOODS AT FAIRBANKS HAVE DECREASED NEARLY ONE-HALF AND ARE NOW LOWEST IN CITY'S HISTORY.

Fairbanks, Alaska, Nov. 22.—It costs from 25 to 50 per cent. less to live in Fairbanks than it did last year. With the exception of meat and fruits, the prices for food have been lower in Fairbanks the past summer than ever before in the history of the north. The reduction has been brought about in large part by the rate war in which the Northern Navigation and American-Yukon Transportation companies indulged. Flour that brought \$6.50 last year is now being sold for \$4.50. All the cereals are sold at from \$2 to \$4 a case less, while everything in the vegetable line is being quoted at prices 25 per cent. lower.

Apples can be bought for \$2 a box less, but other fruits bring

about the same prices, but canned milk is retailing for 19 cents a can, or ten cans for \$1.

Teamsters and freighters are delighted with the downward trend of prices for horse feed. Hay and oats are selling for \$20 a ton less than last year. It is expected that there will not be any appreciable difference in the price of feed during the winter, because of the plentiful stocks that are carried by local merchants.

So cheap were the prices in Fairbanks the past summer that many lower river road house owners and merchants came up for their goods. They built rafts and floated down the Tanana and Yukon to their destinations and made great savings in their stocks.

GENERAL NEWS

A conference is being held at Ottawa between the representatives of the post office department and the railway in regard to the parcels post system which is to go into force at New Years. The matter is one of rates, the railways pressing for an increase in the allowance now paid for carrying the mails.

According to the Monetary Times of Toronto, the amount of American capital now invested in Canada amounts to at least \$599,000,000, as compared with \$279,000,000 in 1909. Of this amount \$150,000,000 is in the shape of branch factories and warehouses of American manufacturers, while nearly \$124,000,000 has been invested in Canadian government, municipal and industrial bonds since 1905.

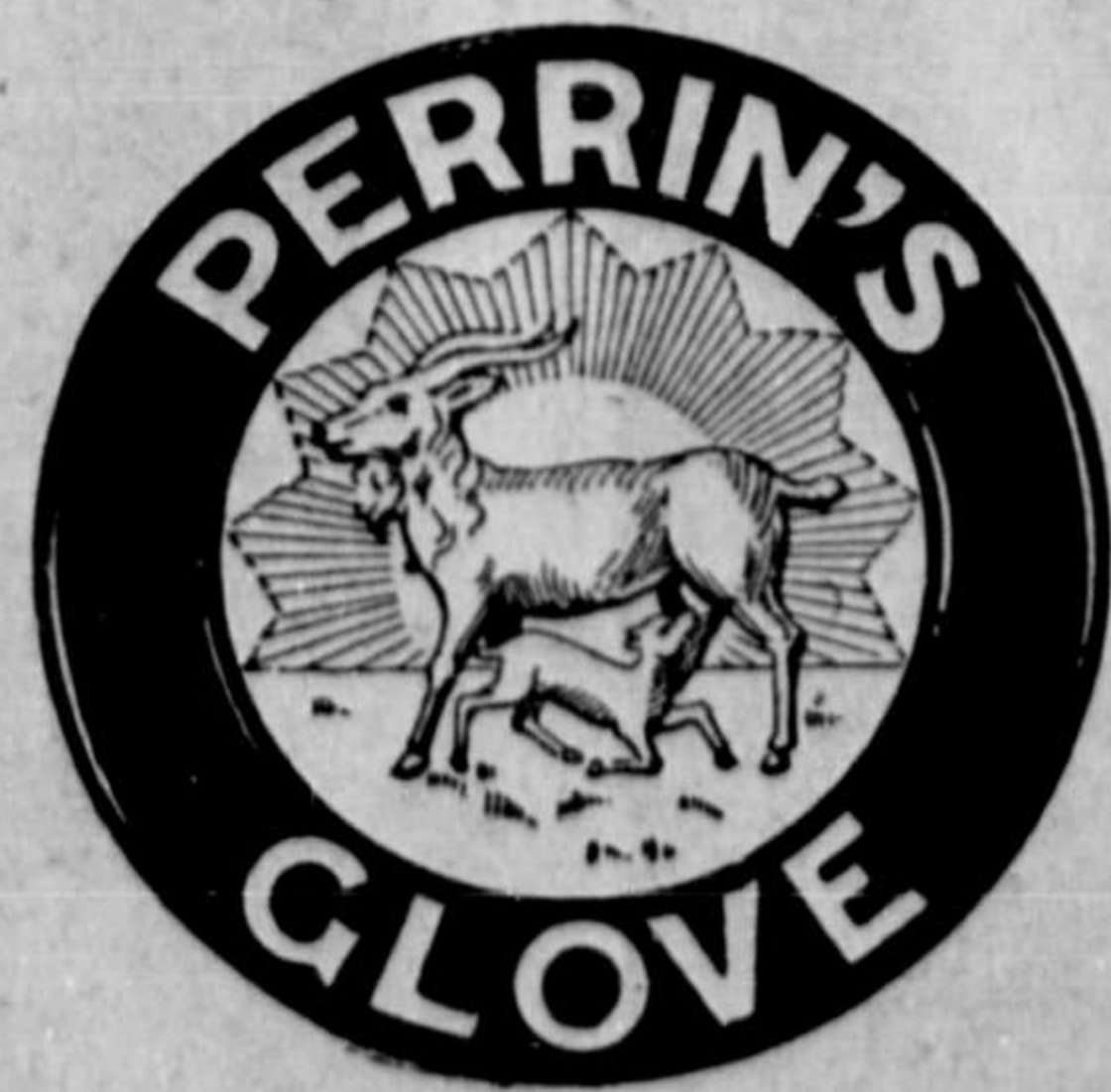

Oldest White Native of Queen Charlotte Islands Celebrates Coming of Age.

One hundred and two persons from all over the north of Graham Island responded to the invitation of Magistrate Charles Harrison last Wednesday to a dance held in Union Hall, Delkallah, to celebrate the coming of age of his son Cyril. This is the largest and most successful social function yet held on the island, and was immensely enjoyed by everyone.

The fact of being by at least eighteen years the oldest white native of the Queen Charlotte Islands is a distinction of which in years to come, when there are hundreds of thousand residents on the islands, Mr. Cyril Harrison will be proud of.

Born at the old Delkallah farm twenty-one years ago, he has witnessed practically no change in the surroundings up till three years ago. But what a change has come over Delkallah in those three years and what a change is destined to come over it in the next three years. To have lived over thirty years at Old Masset at the old farm and later at Delkallah Lodge, all within three miles, is a record of which Magistrate Harrison may well be proud and the pioneers certainly showed their appreciation of this pioneer of pioneers by responding so heartily to his invitation.

The Delkallah people saw to it that Union Hall was appropriately decorated and everybody had only just got home and comfortably in bed when the Prince Albert blew her fortnightly whistle several hours earlier than usual at 8:30 a. m., and many a sleepy eye had to be rubbed to awake again to attend to two weeks' mail and business with the outside world, which is only possible for the few hours the G. T. P. boat is in twice a month.
