





THE FATAL SHOOTING AT SKEENA CROSSING.

While the verdict of the coroner's inquest on the Skeena Crossing shooting case has not yet been given, it is generally believed that an innocent man has been done to death by an overzealous constable who had a false idea of his authority. Whether the whole responsibility of the fatally bad judgment should be borne by the constable, or whether some of it belongs to the department which gave temporary authority to an irresponsible person, are points to pass upon when the facts are complete. In the meantime it would appear that a poor wandering foreigner innocent of crime has been deliberately shot down in cold blood. The fact that he was fleeing from a man with a gun and that he refused to throw up his hands when called to is no excuse whatever for taking his life. The man was no doubt almost totally ignorant of the English language and probably had a very hazy idea of western law and the methods of enforcing it. His ignorance certainly was not a crime punishable by death. The affair is a blood stain which the Provincial police department cannot wash out.

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













GREAT CLEVELAND FREIGHTER "CLARK" AS SHE APPEARED BEFORE BEING WRECKED.
