A ROYAL PROCLAMATION AGAINST IMPORTING MORE ARMS

PREMIER ASQUITH ANNOUNCES ACCEPTANCE OF CARSON PRINCIPLES FOR PACIFICATION OF ULSTER--EVICIONS HAVE BEGUN IN DUBLIN

London, Dec. 6.—A royal proclamation was issued yesterday prohibiting the importation of arms and ammunition into Ireland. This course was decided upon at a cabinet council and the proclamation duly signed by King George. It has already been published that this was the step the cabinet was likely to take to counteract the activities of the Ulster volunteers, who have been for some time quite openly drilling with a view to forcefully opposing the Irish government should the home rule bill become law.

ster, and stated that Ulster would remain under the protection of the imperial parliament after the passage of the home rule bill. The Unionists regard the announcement as a decided victory while the Nationalists are at present determined that the Home Rule bill shall be defeated if it is to apply to one part of Ireland only.

Dublin, Dec. 6.—The eviction of the strikers and their families has begun as the culminating result of the great strike. The workless thousands still pin their faith on Larkin. The suffering is terrible, thousands of women and children being literally numbed by weeks of starvation. Looting on a general scale is likely to follow the evictions, bringing further disorders in their train.

HUERTA'S ARMY THREATENS TO STRIKE FOR THEIR BACK PAY

SOME OF THE HORRORS OF THE BARBARIC WARFARE GOING ON IN MEXICO--WHY CHIHUAHUA WAS EVACUATED

Mexico City, Dec. 5.—The most appalling story of the horrors that were attendant upon the trip made by the refugees from Chihuahua is now told here. Children and women who were too weak to stand the marches on the trail were left by the settlers who were fleeing before the advances of the insurgents who captured the place and who are sweeping the northern part of the republic of all federals.

General Mercado's proclamation said: "Under the circumstances which have existed in Chihuahua it is deemed necessary for the federal troops to evacuate. I leave in charge Federico Moya, a person who is not identified with politics, and who is, therefore, qualified to give full protection to foreigners. It is impossible to remain here longer, as there is no money with which to pay the troops."

A threatened mutiny among the federals of the army is threatened here today. A signed declaration against the authority of the army leaders is being signed by the ranks and there is every prospect that there may be a decided outbreak against the power of the provisional president, Huerta.

There are not wanting other evidences of the dissatisfaction of the army and the general public with the government. Although the officials of the Huerta government deny the report it is an established fact that for the past twenty-four hours many officers whose loyalty has hitherto been unquestioned have been released from duty and placed on the reserve list.

The evacuation of the federal strongholds in the north is believed by the rebels to be the result of a concerted decision to abandon the whole of Northern Mexico. Peace proposals were sent by General Mercado to General Francisco Villa, rebel leader, through Federico Moya, civil governor of Chihuahua, appointed ad interim, as the rebels approached the city of Chihuahua. Along with it came an appeal signed by all the foreign consuls in Chihuahua calling upon Villa to give police protection to the citizens of Chihuahua City.

WILL SUBMIT POWER AGREEMENT TO PROPERTY OWNERS

City Council Decides to Put it up to the People at Civic Elections Next Month---Divided on Issue

The proposed agreement between the Prince Rupert-Hydro-Electric Power Co. and the city for electric power was discussed by the aldermen yesterday afternoon and passed on for submission to the property owners at the civic elections. The aldermen were evenly divided upon the issue and the mayor's vote carried the motion to submit it to the electors. The chief critics were Ald. Dybhavn, Maitland and Kerr. The opposition of the two latter was just opposition without logic. Ald. Dybhavn produced at some of the clauses which he said he could not recommend to the electors.

Ald. Kerr opened the discussion with a question as to whether the company could not sell power in Port Edward cheaper than the city could. The mayor said clause 22 covered that. It would be possible to tighten up that clause if thought necessary. Ald. McCaffery wanted to know what Ald. Kerr wanted changed but no suggestion was forthcoming.

Ald. Dybhavn thought 3000 h.p. was a liberal limit to allow the company. He objected to the city taking the power at 12,000 instead of 430 volts. In reply to the mayor he did not know why, but he had been advised that the city should have nothing to do with 12,000 volts.

This refers to the delivery at the sub-station and the mayor explained that in taking it at 12,000 volt side in stead of on the stepped-down side there was a slight loss of current. This was the intention of the agreement.

Ald. Dybhavn continued that while the company rates at first would be cheaper than city produced power, that with the increased power, the city owned current would come down in price faster. In the five year revisions he thought it should be

agreed that the price should not be increased.

The mayor pointed out that only the city could apply for a revision of rates and a future council would not likely ask for a revision if there was any chance of the rates being increased.

Ald. Dybhavn—If the city could erect a diesel oil plant it would not consider this a minute.

The Mayor—Do you not consider this a reasonable proposal as between the city and the company, one we could submit to the property owners for their verdict? If we go on with the hydro-electric and the diesel oil plant it means an investment of \$300,000 as against \$60,000 for this proposal.

Ald. Kerr thought the price per horse power was too high. He would like to quote Nelson prices but did not have them.

Mayor Pattullo—How would you propose making a more advantageous proposition?

Ald. Kerr—The city owns several water powers.

The Mayor—No, just one.

Ald. Kerr—Haven't you got another one staked?

The Mayor—Yes, but we have heard nothing from it yet.

Ald. Kerr—Well, it has been reserved.

The Mayor—I am very glad to know it. We have had no official notification of it.

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Ald. Maitland referred to several western cities trying to get their own plants. Prince Rupert could raise money in a few months. He asked the light superintendent if the steam in the present boilers could not be increased. Supt. Duncan said it couldn't, that the plant was now carrying an overload.

The alderman said he had information that the power could be increased 250 h.p. The superintendent said it was not practical.

The mayor asked the source of the alderman's information. He thought the council was entitled to it when it was presented at the board in contradiction of the city superintendent.

Ald. Maitland—I will give it when the time comes. Continuing Ald. Maitland thought they were doing next year's business. The power is not needed until a year from now. He did not think it wise to give a 20-year contract. He would oppose the agreement "from beginning to last." He will make his arguments later on.

The Mayor pointed out that Prince Rupert would not be in the position of the other cities mentioned. This was not a franchise. We cannot hope to do all the financing necessary to develop the city. We have to encourage capital to come here instead of trying to dictate to it. Putting the question over until next year is absurd. It would take next year's council months to get a bylaw passed and then the power could not be secured before winter.

FIFTY LOSE THEIR LIVES IN THE GREAT FLOODS OF TEXAS

ALL THE IMPORTANT TOWNS OF NORTH AND CENTRAL TEXAS SUFFERING FROM DISASTROUS VISITATION—THE HOMELESS NUMBER THOUSANDS

Bryan, Texas, Dec. 6.—The death roll from the floods has now increased to fifty and positively thousands of others are marooned and suffering intensely from prolonged hunger and exposure to the cold, according to last night's reports from the flooded Brayos river in this section of South Central Texas. The Brayos is now fifty miles from three to ten miles wide and is running at a mill race speed. Scores of flood refugees are known to be in dire peril. At Bolton they are propelling baskets of provisions on the telephone wires to the flood victims. South Bosque reported that when the flood reached there it was a wall of water ten feet high. Near Marlin 175 passengers on a Houston & Texas Central

railway train were marooned all night. The flood rose over the rails until it reached the top step of the coaches.

Dallas, Dec. 6.—The inundation of the cemeteries has stopped burials throughout the city. The planing mills able to operate are turning out scores of boats to rescue the marooned and salvage property.

San Antonio is one of the most important points now affected. The floods cover a portion of nearly every county from San Antonio northward and eastward to include all the important cities of North and Central Texas. The homeless number thousands, but as they are divided into small groups throughout the enormous flood territory no serious relief problems are presented.

MONEY DEPOSITED BY THE RAILWAY COMPANY

Two Hundred Thousand Dollars Put Up to Protect Fort George

Vancouver, Dec. 6.—The G. T. P. Railway Company was yesterday ordered to put up a bond for \$100,000 for the expropriation of a number of Fort George lots for railway purposes. The company had offered the National Securities Company, owners of some 5365 lots, a similar amount, making \$200,000 in all which they were ordered to put up to protect the Fort George Townsite Company whose property is similarly affected.

SOME CIVIC WORK AHEAD

Prince Rupert is piling on population at a good rate. In 1911 the census shows 5000. Since that time a very large amount of building has taken place. In order to understand this one has only to walk across Hays Creek and compare the number of buildings now seen with that of 1911. In spite of that fact every house and shack in town is occupied. New faces are seen almost daily on the streets, and very soon we can walk down Second and Third Avenues without being recognized. The cities' utilities must keep pace with that development. More population means that more light, more water and more telephones will be required. With the completion of the railroad in the early summer these demands are bound to be accelerated. In view of these facts the new bylaws about to be submitted by the city council are most timely. At the coming election the people will be asked to vote money for the extension of water, light and telephone facilities for the outlying districts such as Sections 2, 7 and 8, as

well as increased accommodation for Sections 5 and 6.

Perhaps the cynic will ask: Why pass a bylaw when we have not sold the debentures for the bylaws already passed? Well it takes several months to get a bylaw into legal shape, and why not have them ready. The money market will not always be as tight as it has been the last year. Even now there is a lifting of the clouds, and our debentures may sell at any moment.

Another bylaw proposed by the council is for the erection of a municipal building on city property in close proximity to the city hall. This building will be three storeys in height and fire proof. This is wise in view of the fact that a small fire in the present telephone building would cripple the whole system for some time to come. The building will accommodate the telephone, electric light department and police. Accommodation will also be provided for a library and reading room, while the present reading room will be turned into a publicity department. It seems hardly necessary to urge that these bylaws should be passed.

GIRDLING WHOLE WORLD WITH MARCONI WIRELESS STATIONS

WORK OF ERECTING MANY OF THE STATIONS IS ALREADY WELL UNDER WAY—TRANSMITTING STATIONS AT JUNEAU AND KETCHIKAN

The announcement that the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company contemplates a chain of sending and receiving stations which in the near future will encircle the world does not surprise those who have followed recent developments of wireless telegraphy.

It is an open secret that a girdle of stations is not only contemplated, but is already well on the way towards completion. Just a year ago the "Marconigraph" published particulars of an important scheme for the construction of high power stations which the American Marconi Company had adopted. This scheme comprised stations for bringing Great Britain and the United States into more direct communication, as well as stations for an American-Eastern circuit, which is destined eventually to reach the Philippines and Japan. The work of erection at many of the stations is far advanced and before very long we should witness the fulfillment of one of the most remarkable undertakings in the history of telegraphic communication.

The service intended for the transatlantic service will be near New York City, at Belmar, New Jersey. The Clifden-Glace Bay service, which since 1908 has been in regular continuous communication, has hitherto been the only one in existence affording direct wireless communication between the Eastern and Western hemispheres, but it will not long enjoy its splendid isolation. Two miles from New Brunswick lies the transmitting section of the wireless station which will bring the United States in direct communication with the United Kingdom. The power-house is now beginning to take shape, the foundations for the motor generators are well under way, and the steel girders and beams are being erected.

The receiving section of the New Jersey station is at Behar, where, crossing the road at nearly right angles and stretching westward for almost a mile, the aerials will be carried on the top of the six masts, each 600 feet high.

The Hawaiian station will be one of the most powerful of the group of stations which the American Marconi Company have in hand, and it will be capable of working with San Francisco and the Philippine Islands. The station will be duplex, that at Koko Head being used for receiving and that at Kahuku, 50 miles distant, being used for transmitting. At Koko Head five masts each 320 feet high and 1000 feet apart are being erected for carrying the San Francisco aerial; six other masts, each 450 feet high, are being erected for carrying the Yokohama aerial.

Stavanger, in Norway, will form another station in the chain. This scheme is of great national importance, because Norway's mercantile fleet ranks fourth in the world as regards tonnage. Norwegians have no direct cable with America. The site for the station near Stavanger, and also that for the receiving station at Naerbo, about 17 miles away, were chosen some time ago, and no time will be lost in beginning the construction work.

As Mr. Marconi announced at the recent annual meeting of the company, a concession has been granted by the Brazilian Republic for a period of 50 years, and a Brazilian company is now in process of formation for the purpose of erecting stations.

The American Marconi Company have in hand the erection of two long transmitting stations in Alaska—at Ketchikan and Juneau—and these are intended to be the first links of a chain to provide Alaska with a commercial wireless service connecting it with the United States.

Everywhere stations are springing up, so that in the comparatively near future there will be not only a girdle of wireless round the world, but also a network to speak figuratively covering its surface.

PORTLAND CANAL TUNNELS.

The work of continuing the driving of the long bore is proceeding apace, an average of over 50 feet a week being accomplished. General Manager W. J. Elmendorf, who has been below for some weeks, is shortly expected to return to inspect the work, which during his absence is in charge of L. C. White. The tunnel, which was started a year ago last October, is being driven 7x7 in the clear and is in a distance of some 2,600 feet. It is designed to be of sufficient size and capacity to amply fulfill the objects of its construction—viz., after encountering the assured zone the accommodation of all probable future traffic, and the providing of drainage, ventilation, and the most economical means of development for all adjacent properties, including the holdings of the Tunnels Company, the Portland Canal Mining Co., Stewart Mining & Development Co., Glacier Creek Mining Co., Mt. Gladstone Mining Co. (owning the Portland group), the O. K. claim and the group of claims owned by the Pacific Coast Exploration Co.—Portland Canal Miner.

THE TEXT OF LORD HALDANE'S DECISION ON RECENT APPEAL

FISHING IN TIDAL WATERS A RIGHT EQUALLY TO ALL AND NATURALLY UNDER EXCLUSIVE LEGISLATION OF THE DOMINION

It was a long judgment which was delivered by Viscount Haldane in the Privy Council in the appeal of the Government of British Columbia from answers given by the Supreme Court of Canada to questions submitted by the Canadian Government. The questions did not arise in any litigation, but were of a general abstract character relating to the fishery rights of the province. Reference was made to the decision a few days ago. Further details are now available.

The questions submitted were as follows:

(1) Is it competent for the Legislature of British Columbia to authorize the Government of that province to grant the exclusive right to fish in any waters within the railway belt, firstly, as to such waters as are tidal, and, secondly, as to such waters which, although not tidal, are, in fact, navigable.

(2) Is it competent for the Legislature to authorize the Government of the Province to grant the exclusive right to fish below low water mark in the open sea within a marine league of the coast?

(3) Is there any, and what, difference between the open seas and estuaries of the rivers within the Province so far as concerns the authority of the Legislature of the Province of British Columbia to grant the right to fish?

Lord Haldane's judgment went exhaustively into the history of forming the Province of British Columbia and the general law on fishing was reviewed by His Lordship to a time even anterior to Magna Charta. Coming to more recent precedents Lord Haldane said: "Neither in 1867 nor at any date since British Columbia became a member of Canadian Federation was fishing in tidal waters a matter of property. It was a right open equally to all the public, and, therefore, when, by Section 91 of the British North America Act, the sea coast and inland fisheries were placed under the exclusive legislation of the Dominion Parliament, there was in the case of the fishing in tidal waters nothing left within the domain of the Provincial Legislature. The right being a public one, all that could be done was to regulate its exercise, and the exclusive power of regulation was placed in the Dominion Parliament."

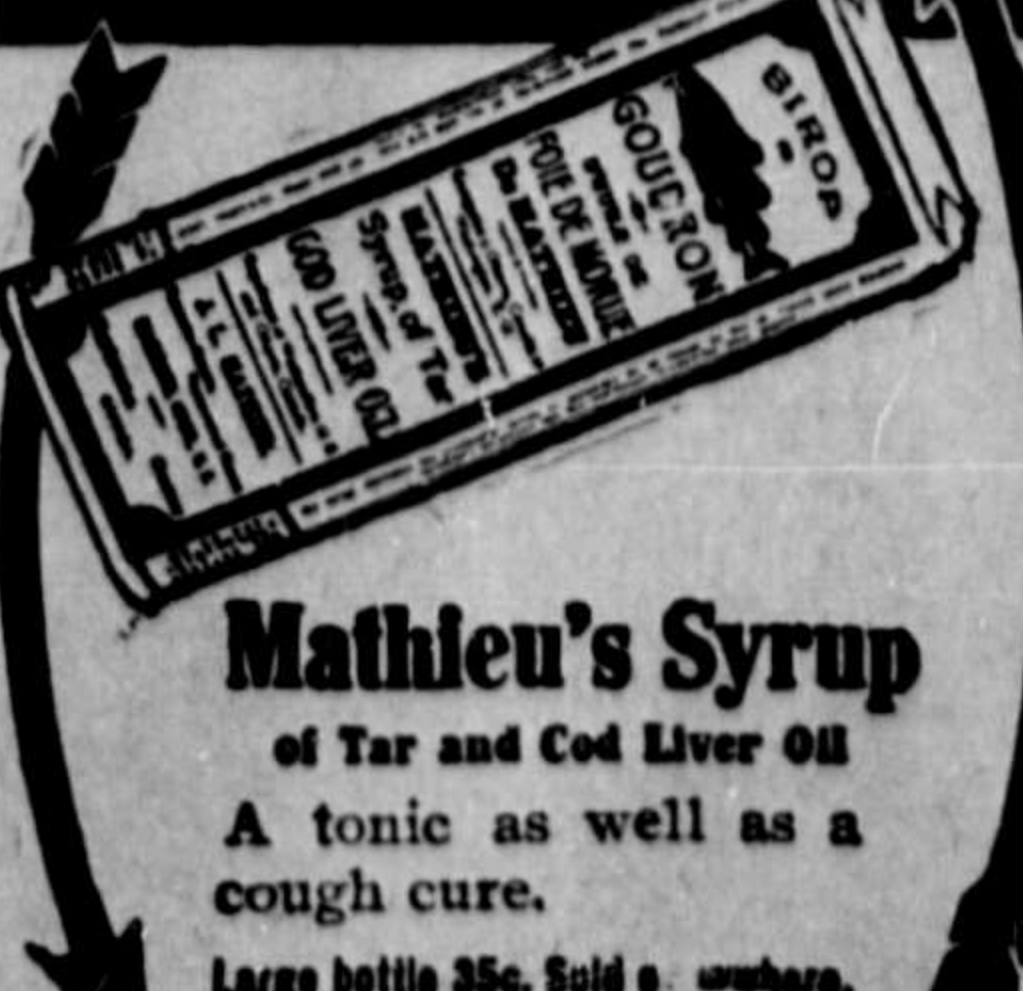

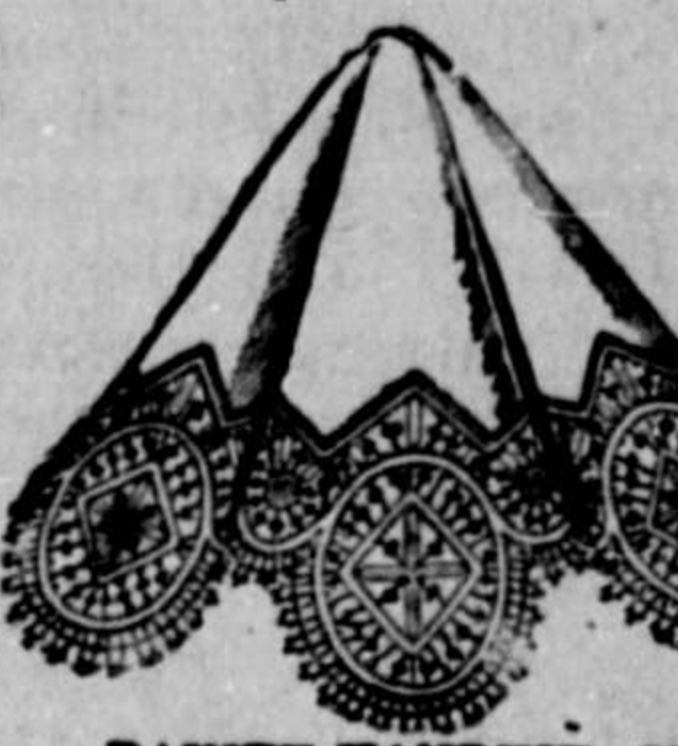

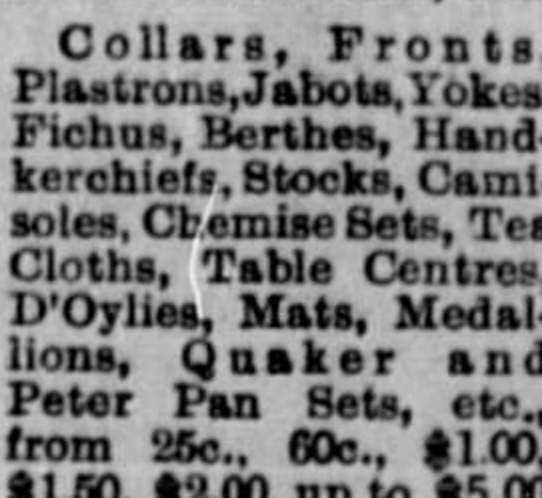

FROM MANGER TO CROSS

At Last Prince Rupert Will See Wonderful Films

Weeks and weeks ago the people of Prince Rupert have been reading in home and outside newspapers of marvellous moving pictures of the Stations of the Cross made by the Kalem Co. for water and hydro-electric scheme had been passed for \$550,000. It had cost \$320,000 to get the water to Shawatians. It would cost another \$165,000 to finish the pipe line and mains. There would be nothing left out of that by-law after the debentures are sold for a hydro-electric scheme. A city plant would mean passing another by-law. The company claim to have the money to invest; we haven't. He had sufficient confidence in Prince Rupert to believe that we would be using 25,000 h.p. in a very few years. We would be getting it at \$28 h.p. On that basis we will be better off than Vancouver, Victoria or New Westminster. If anyone opposes this agreement I would like them to show me who is going to supply the city with light and power.

Ald. Kerr here got back to the city water powers. He said the mayor was always saying "why don't you come to me for information?" I don't have to go to the mayor for information but I seem to know as much as anybody. The mayor didn't know a reservation had been put on that Work channel power two years ago.

The Mayor—I said before I was very pleased to know that the reservation had been made on that power for us but now that you say it was made two years ago, I am not so confident of it. I personally went to Mr. Wm. Manson when we staked the power this year and he has since told me nothing has yet been done about it.

Ald. Kerr wanted to compare the prices offered in the agreement with prices in other cities. The Mayor—Well we do know that they compare favorably with prices at which we can produce it ourselves.

Ald. Dybhavn said he had been advised in Seattle that the city ought not to consider any proposition for power at a price over \$30 h.p.

Ald. Naden—If we buy this power we retain our own water powers which will always be a lever to use when it comes to a question of prices. This is an agreement to purchase at a reasonable rate. If the other cities mentioned were only using 500 h.p. they would pay as much as we would under this agreement. It is all very well to say what the city can do but the fact remains that we have not got the money and have no reasonable chance of getting it. I favor municipal ownership if it is cheaper.

Ald. Maitland could not understand a business man like Ald. Naden saying a city with twenty-million assessment could not get money.

Ald. Naden said it was possible to raise money but he did not think the city could borrow sufficient for all the works required and power development would be the last thing the city could borrow money on.

Ald. Dybhavn said the power company was hard up and wanted the agreement to finance on. He thought the city could finance just as well.

The motion to submit the agreement to the electors was then offered by Ald. McCaffery and



Leek, Ald. Kerr and Maitland moved in amendment that it be left over until Monday.

The motion carried on a division, Ald. Kerr, Maitland and Dybhavn being opposed.

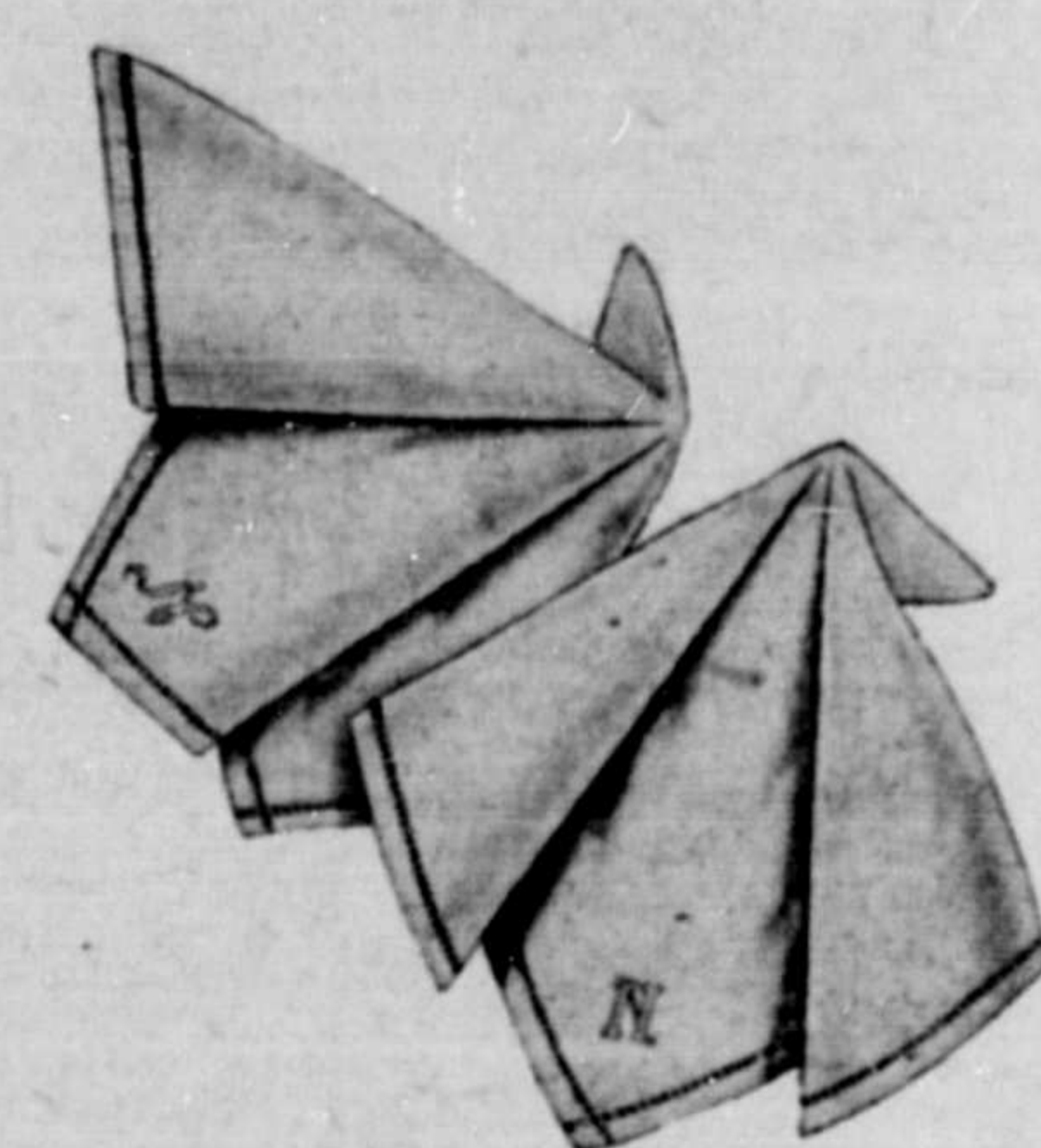
