Meeting Connected With Night

This evening there will be a meeting held in the City Hall to which all interested in the subject of night schools are invited to be present. It is proposed that the commencement of these night schools shall follow the opening of the New Year, when provision will be made by the School Board for carrying on this department, The desire of the board and of the committee of citizens interested in this project is that all applications be sent in as soon as possible so that it will be known how many pupils should be provided for. The Department of Education makes provision for this work and it is the desire of all interested that those who are living in the city who have not had the advantages of an English education early in life should avail themselves of this opportunity, no matter at what age they may enter. The night school it is proposed should be left open only during the winter months. In the elementary subjects coming directly under the School Board there will be no fees charged. This will include the following subjects:

1-English Elementary (suitable for those wishing to learn

to read and write in English). 2-English Advanced (including Composition, Letter Writing, Business Correspondence, Etc.).

3-Arithmetic. Elementary. 4-Arithmetic and Mensuration, with practical application to Trades.

5-Drawing (Geometrical, Etc.).

A more technical course is proposed to be provided for by a fee of \$3.00 a term. This will take in the following: 1-Steam (for B. C. Stationary Engineers' Certificates).

2-Building Construction. 3-Machine Constructi on and Drawing.

4-Electricity. 5-Mechanics.

6-State below any other subject desired.


