

CONVICTED NANAIMO RIOTER HAS BEEN ACQUITTED

HOPES OF ENDING GREAT DUBLIN STRIKE---THREE AUSTRIANS BADLY HURT IN EXPLOSION

REBELS NOW READY TO MARCH UPON THE CAPITAL OF MEXICO

GENERAL VILLA SAYS HE WILL HAVE A FORCE OF TWENTY THOUSAND MEN WITH HIM—WILL FIRST TAKE FEDERAL STRONGHOLD OF ZACATECAS

Juarez, Dec. 9.—Assuming military control over a large area of Northern Mexico through the defeat and the flight of the federal troops, General Villa, the rebel leader, today formally occupied Chihuahua City, the state capital, evacuated by General Mercado eight days ago.

A new era is beginning in Northern Mexico by the peaceful occupation by the rebels of the territory abandoned by Huerta's federal troops. Thousands more rebels are joining General Villa and with a strong force he entered the state capital. He will establish what will be the temporary military headquarters of the Constitutional party.

General Villa is restoring the telegraph and the railroad, where it was interrupted by burned bridges.

Having entered Chihuahua with the tattered Mexican flags which they are carrying as symbolical of their demands for a restoration of constitutional government, the rebels will have Zacatecas as the nearest federal stronghold on the south. It is toward that city that Villa insists he will march.

The flight of General Salvador Mercado, the federal governor and commander-in-chief, with all his officers and troops, after sending a peace commission to Villa, whose answer he did not wait to receive, made possible the rebel occupancy of the city without a fight.

Villa intends to direct his main army toward Mexico City. "I will have 20,000 men surrounding Mexico City about Christmas time," said Villa.

PARLIAMENT WILL BEGIN ITS LABORS JANUARY FIFTEENTH

REDISTRIBUTION BILL IS EXPECTED TO PROVE THE MOST CONSPICUOUS MEASURE—NO WORD YET REGARDING NAVAL DEFENSE

Ottawa, Dec. 7.—Parliament will assemble on Thursday, Jan. 15, in accord with a decision reached at the cabinet meeting Thursday afternoon at which Premier Borden presided. The fixing of January 15th as the date for the opening will give the government a period of six weeks in which to prepare the sessional programme, which promises to be a fairly heavy one.

Whether there will be legislation dealing with the naval defense has not been announced, but the probabilities are that the question will be discussed.

The redistribution bill made necessary by the last decennial census and which will greatly increase the representation of the west, may prove to be the most conspicuous measure of the session.

GOVERNMENT LOAN FOR FOUR MILLION

Treasury Bills and Payments on Grand Trunk Pacific Bonds to Be Met.

At the Department of Finance it was explained that the Dominion Government loan now being placed in London is for \$4,000,000, subscriptions being payable in four monthly instalments, as is usually the case with Dominion flotations. Out of the proceeds will be paid \$1,000,000 of treasury bills maturing in February and \$1,000,000 in March.

The balance will partially recoup the Government for expenditure in purchasing Grand Trunk Pacific bonds, guaranteed by the Government as a result of "complementing" agreement. The funds thus recouped become available for capital or other expenditures of the Government.

Of the proceeds of the last issue of \$3,000,000, made in September last, \$1,700,000 was required to pay off a loan contracted in 1878 for a like amount, and a currency loan contracted in 1883 for \$1,400,000, payable November 1.

The issue now being made has been underwritten at 97, and will be offered for public subscription immediately.

(Special to the Daily News) Winnipeg, Dec. 10.—The Fort Garry, the new Grand Trunk Pacific Hotel, was thrown open to the public this morning and is being visited by many people. The more formal opening will be this evening, when a ball will be given by the Winnipeg branch of the Victorian order of Nurses. This promises to be one of the most brilliant social functions that has ever taken place in Western Canada.

The hotel stands adjacent to the ruins of that historic monument "Old Fort Garry," memorable in the early history of Canada's new western metropolis. It is a magnificent edifice, one of the world's finest hotels, embodying in its construction the most advanced, scientific and architectural ideals. Located in the very heart of Canada's greatest of western cities, to which all lines of traffic converge, it is readily accessible to the railroads and electric car lines and the leading theatres, the great stores and a "stones throw" from the new terminal station of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The Fort Garry is built of the finest of Canadian granite and bluff limestone, in the style of the old French chateau of Normandy and Touraine, and rears its stately height to fourteen storeys.

Three Austrians Fatally Injured by Touching Off Blast.

Vancouver, Dec. 10.—Three Austrians were seriously hurt and their lives are despaired of because of an explosion today on the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, near Caulfields, a short distance from Point Atkinson. They were drilling to a missed hole and the dynamite in the hole exploded. They were carried on stretchers to a launch and brought to the city hospital. One man lost an eye and had both legs broken. The other is fearfully mangled and may not live.

GORDON ACQUITTED ALTHOUGH UNDER NINE MONTHS' SENTENCE

WAS CONVICTED OF ASSAULT UPON CONSTABLE DURING NANAIMO RIOTS, BUT ORDERED NEW TRIAL BY MINISTER OF JUSTICE

(Special to The Daily News.) New Westminster, Dec. 10.—When the court opened yesterday it was stated that a telegram had been received from the minister of justice at Ottawa ordering a new trial for Richard Gordon, who was serving a nine months' sentence imposed upon him by Justice Clement for alleged assault upon a police constable at Cumberland during the strike riots.

Since Gordon was convicted it transpired that a man named McAllister had confessed that it was he and not Gordon who had struck the constable.

Gordon was brought over from the jail to the special assizes and after the affidavits were read and the communication from the minister of justice, he was de-

clared honorably acquitted. He was also acquitted on a charge of having, with others, assaulted Jack Thompson, a strike-breaker.

CIVIC ELECTION

In yesterday's News Mayor Pattullo has announced himself as a candidate for re-election. In his letter he has also outlined what has been accomplished by the present council during the year. When we consider that practically every city in Western Canada has been at a stand still for the past year one begins to realize that in Prince Rupert we have made wonderful strides.

We are just entering upon the year of completion of the road; the year that we have all been looking forward to since the advent of the city. This will be our year of jubilee, when we are expected to take our proper place in the life of the nation. We are sure to have among us a large number of distinguished guests (perhaps including the King himself), and next year's mayor should be a man who would in every sense of the word represent us before the world. The present mayor is such a man and the citizens no doubt will consider this in making their choice.

During his term of office Mr. Pattullo has had a hard row to hoe. He has been confronted with financial conditions that have not been as severe within the lifetime of any of us notwithstanding the fact that we have suffered nothing locally. The financiers of Europe had practically shut down on all Canadian enterprises, and yet in spite of this the present council did more financing than the two previous ones.

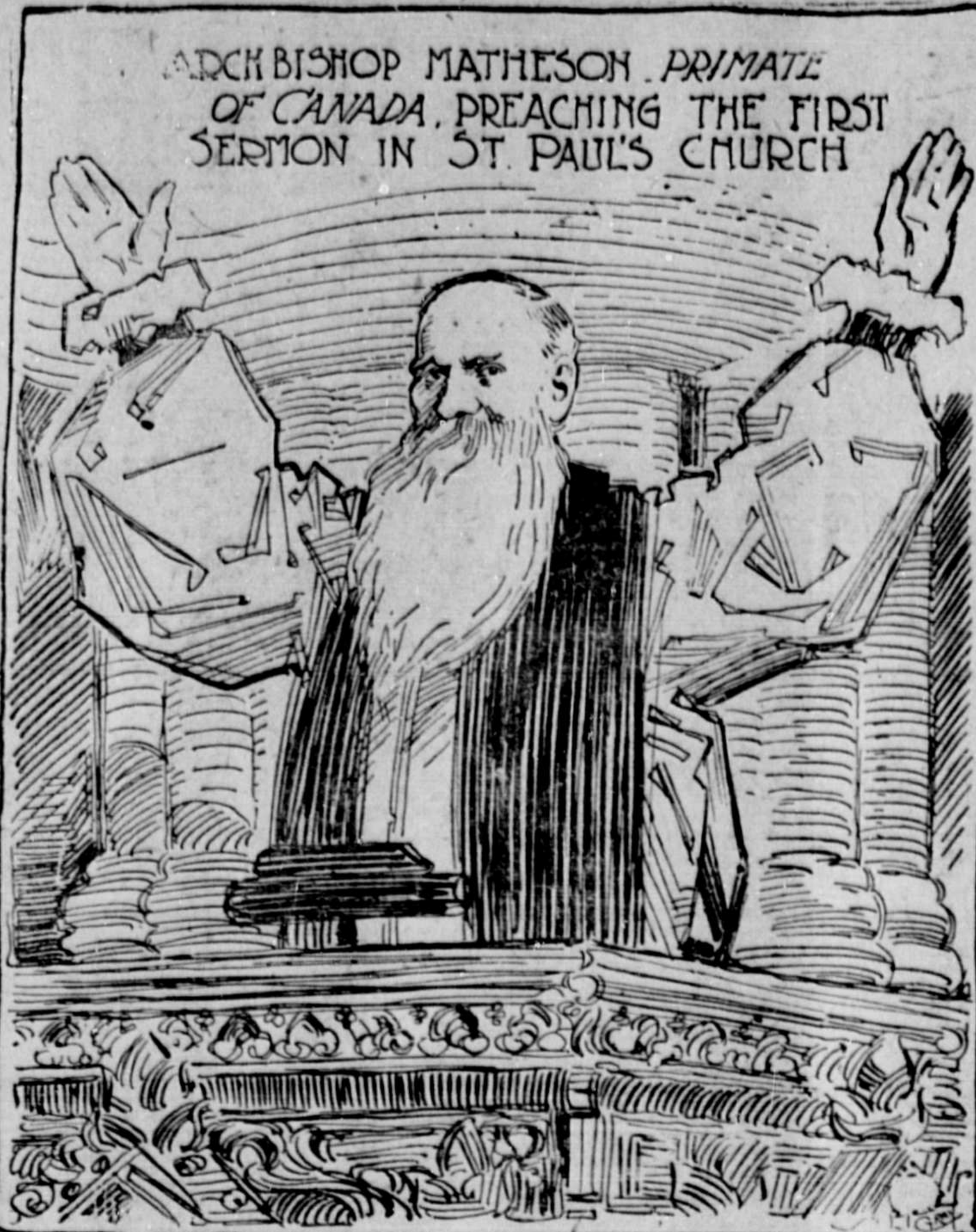
There is no man living who could step into the mayor's

chair and give satisfaction to everybody. It is really a sign of strength when one refuses to gain popularity by pleasing the crowd. Mr. Pattullo has worked hard and disinterestedly for the city's welfare. He was elected by a fusion of political forces and not once during the year was it ever hinted that he had condescended to play the political game. Prince Rupert has been cursed by politics in the past and it is to be hoped that we have seen the last of the days when the issue at civic elections had a party tinge.

Prince Rupert has become famous for crucifying her public servants. This is perhaps one of the indications of our youth. We are now about to attain our majority and let us act like men. Let us refuse to condemn a man because of insinuations that no man will dare assert. Let us not be dictated to by the agitators who are always wanting a change, but let us do our own thinking and reward virtue where we find it.

THE FIGHTING SPIRIT OF LIBERALISM

Liberalism throughout the Dominion is in fighting spirit. In Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia, where Conservative governments are strongly entrenched, nothing is being allowed to go by default. By-elections are being strenuously fought, not so much in consideration of the prospect of immediate victory as of seeing the opportunity to arouse and educate the people. Courage and a fighting spirit of the kind now being displayed by the Liberal party in every section of the Dominion will not have long to await the day of complete victory.—Edmonton Capital.

Winfield Scott Stratton, multimillionaire of Cripple Creek, who died a dozen years ago, left a fortune of \$8,000,000 for the building and maintenance of a home for the aged poor of Colorado. The home is not ready for business yet.

After a careful study of the motor busses and cars in Paris and London, the Edinburgh city council has been advised by its own commission to adopt self-propelled street cars in preference to a system of overhead or of conduit street car service.

The Citizens' Fuel and Ice Co. of Hamilton, Ont., has been organized in that city, and is capitalized at \$500,000. The new

company figures on profits of over \$41,000 each year, and will pay 7 per cent. on the preferred stock, and expects to pay 4 per cent. on common stock.

Ulric Valquette, Supervising Engineer of the Public Works department, has left Ottawa for Victoria to consult with J. S. McLachlan, resident engineer at Victoria, in respect to the dry dock at Esquimalt. The new dock will be 1,150 feet long, so as to accommodate the largest ocean liners and the biggest British warships.

Fifteen drilling rigs will be working in the Calgary, Okotoks field by April 1, is the announcement made by the Calgary Albertan upon evidently reliable authority, and it says the greater part of the capital will be supplied by outside parties, the most of whom are practical oil men with large experience. The possibilities of the Calgary field are now generally recognized and admitted.

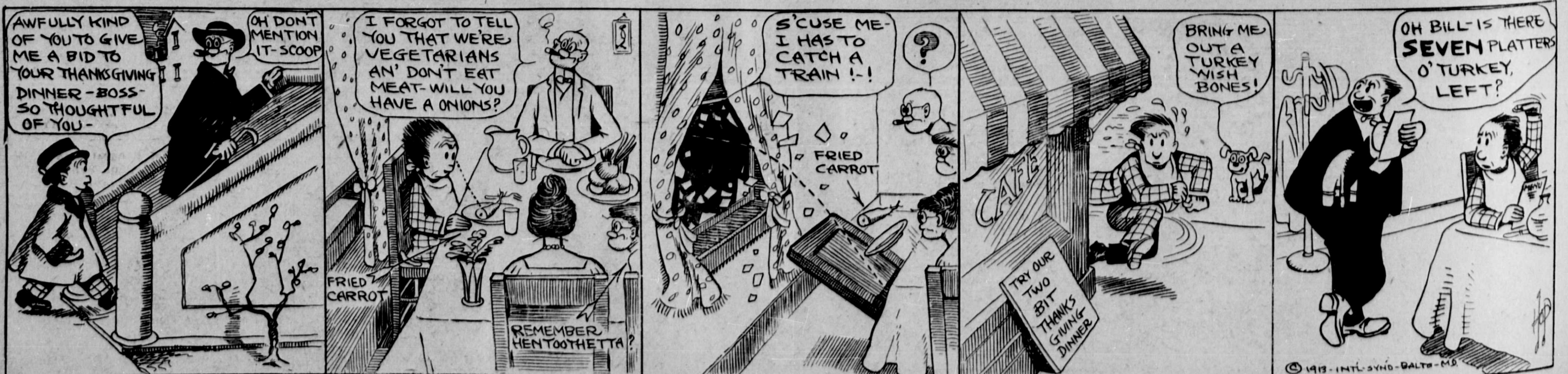
