Up in Hazelton district the road building has been under the control of the Conservative executive and their management of it was so rotten that the decent element of the Conservative party kicked them all out of office about ten days ago. One of their crimes was stopping the road to one of the producing mines when it was only half built. The owners of the Silver Standard mine offered to put up the money to complete the road but their offer was spurned. As a consequence several carloads of ore will remain at the mine until it can be brought out on sleighs.


are the men who are continually to be found in the police courts. They may be compared to the dangerous mosquitoes that carry the germ of infection from the filth of the gutter to the purity of the home.



Borrowings in Country Have Gone Up About Fifty Per Cent. This Year.


London, Dec. 11.—The Daily Telegraph in discussing the financial conditions respecting Canada's loans says the heavy borrowings are producing a steady decline in credit. It is declared that the Dominion finds it cheaper to borrow than to let necessary construction work lapse.

The Dominion's borrowings this year were thirty-five million dollars; those for the provinces fourteen millions; for the municipalities seventyseven millions; for railways over a hundred and thirty-three millions, with miscellaneous borrowings of fifty millions. This makes a total of over three hundred and ten millions as compared with a total of two hundred and five millions last year.
